glaring at us, I guess to make sure that we didn't touch his truck. After we loaded the tables and he
went back inside, I looked his truck went back inside, Hooked his truck There was not a scrat or ding anywhere on it, especially in the bed of the truck where you are supposed to haul stuff. It was a sparkling white truck with lots of good. I know he was proud of it, but still can't figure out why he owned it if you couldn't touch it. From what I can see out here, pickup trucks are used to haul stuff, lean on, and carry dogs in the back.
I don't think the good old boy from Tulsa would fit in here in Parmer County U.S.A.
There is nothing wrong with being proud of your truck. I see
some around town that are clean and some around town that are clean and
shiny, with chrome accessories, and shiny, with chrome accessories, and
rollbars, and spotights on top. But most of the trucks I see are true "utility" vehicles. They have propane tanks, and shovels, and tool boxes in them. Most of the ones I have looked at have a fair
amount of wear and tear in the bed from hauling stuff. Necessary stuff to make a living or to be a good neighbor.
After the tornado, many pickup
truck owners voluntarily hauled off truck owners voluntarily hauled off tree limbs and other debris from
neighborhoods. The guy from Tulsa would probably have hidden his truck in his garage or left town for a few days.

Another thing I have discovered is that no matter how new or old it is, the owner is proud of the truck.
A pickup truck is a special friend. My stepfather, Harry Lookingbill, retired from farming several years ago. During his 50 years or so of farming he always had a pickup. When he retired, his last pickup was a small gray truck
with a shell on the back. He didn't haul much in it, so about five years ago he traded the truck for a Bronco. He has regretted it ever since.
He often wishes he had that truck He often wishes he had that truck
back. It's not that he hauls stuff much anymore. It is just that there is a bond between a man (or woman) and their trucks. Even if you don't use it, it is just good to That is why I was trying to convince my wife Cindy that I need I need to haul stuff.

he chose not to sevve a third term as President of the United States. And so a precedent was put in motion of only two terms for President. I only wish that precedent had been established for members of
congress. Then we might not have "professional politicians."
