Wheat Straw Embedded In Pole By June Tornado continue to hear stories believe." Some of the power line glass door," he concluded.

We continue to hear stories involving the June 2 tornado, some involving strange or unusual

circumstances.

Most of us have heard stories from our parents or grand-parents about seeing wheat straw embedded into poles or trees.

Tommy Weemes of Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative tells us to put his name on the list of people who have seen such a phenomenon.

phenomenon.

The REC had many poles blown down or broken. In fact, over 150 poles were replaced at a cost of \$150,000.

Weemes was surveying the image on the Frank Zinzer place, which is in southern Deaf Smith County, when he saw a "bunch" of wheat straws embedded in a power pole. Zinzer's place is more or less on a line north of the rural area the tornado struck in Parmer County.

The straw was attached to the lower part of the pole. "It looked like a porcupine was stuck in the pole," he said. "I have been convinced that this can happen. Evidentally, the wind velocity was so hard that instead of breaking the straws, it embedded them in the

Weemes also told about pieces of power line that were twisted and wrapped "like you wouldn't was wrapped with electric fencing from below. The electric wire is of aluminum which is four wires

After the storm, Norwood found that all of the windows had been suctioned out of the vehicle, and even the car's interior headliner. Some of his books from a course he's taking at Amarillo College were strewn all around the scene.

But the rosebud was merely moved from one side of the window to the other, and was in place.



Well, she had me there. I am one of those guys that has never owned a pickup, but have always wanted to. It seems like since almost everbody out here owns a

almost everbody out here owns a pickup, I needed one too.

In the big cities, pickups, Surburbans, Jeeps, and Broncos are now politicly referred to as utility vehicles. Some city dwellers even buy 4-wheel drives and never get out of the city limits. out of the city limits.

There are legitimate needs for pickups, even in the cities. Plumbers, carpenters, and maintenance people use them to make a living. But then there are the wannabee's that drive pickups for the same reason little boys play

or the same reason little boys play cowboys.

A couple of years ago in Tulsa, the company I worked for had a Christmas open house. We rented three 6-foot folding tables and the next morning after the party, I was taking them back to the rental

A co-worker and I took them to the lower level parking garage at our building to load them in my mini-van. Since there were three

mini-van. Since there were three tables and two of us, we leaned the third table against the chrome tailgate of a pickup parked next to the van. Wrong thing to do.

The door to the building maintenance office flew open and the truck owner rushed out yelling, "Don't touch my truck. Nobody touches my truck." This was a guy 1 had seen on and off for two years and before now he had always been friendly. After now he wouldn't be.

For a few seconds, it was as tense as meeting a loaded Excel cattle truck on a two lane highway

cattle truck on a two lane highway with no shoulders.

The guy paced back and forth glaring at us, I guess to make sure that we didn't touch his truck. After we loaded the tables and he went back inside, I looked his truck over (without touching it).

There was not a scratch, dent, or ding anywhere on it, especially in the bed of the truck where you are supposed to haul stuff. It was a sparkling white truck with lots of chrome, so clean it almost smelled good. I know he was proud of it, but still can't figure out why he

owned it if you couldn't touch it.

From what I can see out here, pickup trucks are used to haul stuff, lean on, and carry dogs in the back.
I don't think the good old boy from
Tulsa would fit in here in Parmer
County U.S.A.

There is nothing wrong with being proud of your truck. I see some around town that are clean and

some around town that are crean and rollbars, and spotlights on top.

But most of the trucks I see are true "utility" vehicles. They have propane tanks, and shovels, and tool boxes in them. Most of the ones I have looked at have a fair amount of wear and tear in the bed amount of wear and tear in the bed from hauling stuff. Necessary stuff to make a living or to be a good

neighbor.

After the tornado, many pickup truck owners voluntarily hauled off tree limbs and other debris from neighborhoods. The guy from Tulsa would probably have hidden his truck in his garage or left town

Another thing I have discovered is that no matter how new or old it is, the owner is proud of the truck. A pickup truck is a special friend.

My stepfather, Harry Lookingbill, retired from farming several years ago. During his 50 years or so of farming he always had a pickup. When he retired, his ast pickup was a small gray truck with a shell on the back. He didn't haul much in it, so about five years ago he traded the truck for a Bronco. He has regretted it ever since.

He has regretted it ever since. He often wishes he had that truck back. It's not that he hauls stuff much anymore. It is just that there is a bond between a man (or woman) and their trucks. Even if you don't use it, it is just good to

That is why I was trying to convince my wife Cindy that I need a truck. There may be a time when

I need to haul stuff.
On the other hand, if I had a On the other hand, if I had a truck, I would have to get a big tool box and I don't have any tools either. I don't own any guns for the gun rack, and I don't have a dog to carry in back.

Maybe I'll put the truck idea on hold for a while. As long as my brother, Rick, has a truck, I guess I really don't need one. For now

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





Chief Justice of the United States.





When you invest in mutual When you invest in mutual funds, you're buying professional management. Assume you invested \$10,000 in each stock, took all dividends in cash and paid took all dividends in cash and paid no brokerage fees. Keratoconus

Keratoconus is a condition in which the shape of the eye interferes with vision. The central portion of the cornea bulges forward, becomes irregular and gets thinner. In mild cases, there will be a slight loss of vision; the

cases, there will be a slight loss of vision; the loss is greater in more severe cases. Headaches, eye strain and seeing "halos" are common complaints with this condition.

Your optometrist's professional know how is vital for proper diagnosis and treatment. The protruding comea may not be obvious. And bulging eyes may not necessarily indicate keratoconus.

Modern optical technology has created a method to control this situation. Rigid, gas-permeable contact lenses are utilized to exert pressure on the cornea to prevent it from "coning" and thinning further. Indeed, the treatment is sometimes so successful that the need for an eventual corneal transplant may be eliminated. And because the gas-permeable lens allows adequate oxygen to reach the eye, it is more comfortable for patients to wear.

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
