# IT'S 'PLAY BALL!' ON TUESDAY IN LITTLE LEAGUE HERE 5:30 P. M. Opener In Magnificent Park Season's Schedule Set By CHARLIE MAPLE

The 1958 Terry Little League baseball season will get under way here at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday with four games slated at Little League Park, according to Bill McGowan, president.

Simultaneous tilts pitting the Buffs and Eagles in the Minor League, and the Bears and Longhorns in the Blue Jeans League, will open the season. The Minor League tilt will be played on LL diamond while the other game is slated on an adjoining field.

The Giants will meet the Braves in the opener for Major League clubs at 6:30 p.m. on LL diamond, followed by the Red Sox and Indians in the nightcap at 8 p.m.

The three leagues will play Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays through July 18. "We had to move the schedule up to an earlier starting date to finish before area and district playoffs begin," noted McGowan.

The three-league alignment came about this week when LL officials found some 123 youngsters desiring to play were left after the major and minor groups obtained 15 players per team.

'As a result," pointed out the Rev. Jimmy Tidwell, Minor League president, "we organized the Blue Jeans League so every boy would have a chance to play."

The Rev. Mr. Tidwell revealed the newest addition to Terry LL baseball will not have baseball uniforms like the other two leagues. However, they will have caps and shirts identifying their team and they will be affiliated with Minor League clubs just as the Minors are connected with Major League clubs."

National Soil Stewardship week will be observed May 11 through 18. The event is sponsored by the National Association of Soil Conervation Districts and national church organi-Lations.

The scope of this year's observance is expected to exceed the participation of a year ago, judging from reports of district and church leaders.

The observance of man's responsibility as teward of our God-given soil and water resources has shown a steady growth. It started in scattered localities under various names before World War II. 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

#### **Texas Attorneys To Give Preference On Court Candidates**

More than 13,000 lawyers will begin expressing their perference for appellate court candidates in the Texas State Bar's secret judicial poll in May.

Bar director Richard. F Stovall of Floydada said Wednesday that the ballots will be mailed to all State Bar members soon after the May 5 filing deadline.

Stovall will leave Thursday or Galveston to attend the State Bar board of directors quarterly meeting, where details will be completed for the biennial sampling of lawyer opinion on qualifications of all andidates for higher court places.

The ballots will include candidates for contested places on the Texas Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals and the Court of Civil Appeals for the district in which the voter lives.

The Floydada attorney said the ballots will be tabulated and counted June 15 at State Bar headquarters in Austin and the results made public soon after.
