She said, "It was a difficult decision to make and one which I have been working with all year. I still hadn't gained the courage to take the final step when contracts were brought for our signatures."

She knew the time had arrived: "But I waited yet a few days before telling my principal, because I felt I couldn't bear to discuss it with anyone. After I made myself tell, first one and then another; the telling became easier.

"I will miss the children, but I plan to be with my husband more and to help my mother (Mrs. Elsie L. Treadaway of 320 East Broadway). Mother always has such a help to me in my teaching career, and I feel it's time to return some of that aid."







THE STANCE

The stance is a bowling funda-mental of prime importance. Al-ways choose a stance that is a comfortable and relaxed one. As a general rule, use a stance that feels natural and produces the best

First, determine your starting position. The distance you stand from the foul line should range from twelve to fifteen feet and depends on the number of steps, the ength of stride, the slide and the speed with which you make your approach. By going through the steps in your approach a couple of times, you can determine what is the best distance for you.

Most bowlers recommend that the body be moderately erect, lean-ing partially forward, with the es bent. But as in the selection of a ball, the beginner should try a number of stances and select the one which is most comfortable and natural. Short people generally prefer to stand more erect so that they can get the advantage of a full backswing while taller people tend to bend forward from the waist slightly to cut down on back-

Slip your fingers into position, supporting most of the weight of the ball in your non-bowling hand. Face the pins squarely with your eyes on the target. With knees slightly bent and feet slightly apart, you are now ready to begin your approach.

BACK AGAIN-Texas officials are making another attempt to get the Supreme Court to say who's "boss" of insurance liquidation.

Both the State Board of Insurance and the judge of the local district -court handling the liquidation cases have had a hand in selecting liquidation attorneys during the past few years. In a recent test case the Supreme Court said the Board had the first responsibility for naming the attorneys and setting their salaries, but that if it failed to act, the judge could step in.

Now, the attorney general is pressing for a more definte ruling. Acting on behalf of the Insurance Department, he has asked the court to set aside a recent order by Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts raising the salaries of three liquidation attorneys.

> In our own little worm-farming process we partitioned off a bed about six feet square, in fertilizer and sawdust. We wet this down thoroughly and put in a few big brood worms dug wet it down some more.

We then tossed out potato ackle items, but in many peelings, slices of bread and corn meal. Back in those days weevils were bad about getting into corn meal. We talked the corner grocer out of the returned packages and fed the worms with them.

Other good feed for worms consists of old tea bags, poulry mash, oatmeal, etc. Do not put any citrus peels, like grapefruit or oranges in the bed. They will kill the worms.

The earthworm is bisexual. All worms can lay eggs, but they must be fertilized by other worms. They reproduce very rapidly and a small bed will provide all you need.

This little bed supplied us with many cans of big fishing worms all summer long.

TRANQUILIZERS AND DOGS by E. M. Gildow, D.V.M. Director, Friskies Research Kennel

Today, trangullizers are converting many a problem dog into a well adjusted canine. They can help calm them and rid them of some of the neurotic symptoms which beset dogs, such as timidity, anxiety, excessive barking, fear, belliger-ence, disobedience and hostility. They differ from sedatives and barbituates in that your pet remains fully aware of

veterinarians have found the tranquilizers helpful in calming dogs that get panicky riding in cars, soothing to pets that are frightened by loud noises or terrified by thunder storms and 4th of July celebrations. Administered before surgery, they permit the use of a mailer and safer amount of anesthetic. Administering the anesthetic is easier, too. Tranquilizers are also helpful in calming badly injured dogs. The veterinarian is able to proceed with the examination faster and more

While tranquilizers definitely have a place in helping prob-lem dogs, they must be given only on the advice of your vet-erninarian. So if you think your pet is a candidate for a tranquilizer, do nothing 'til you check with him.


