This child prodigy will be asked to play a solo at every performance. Because of his unusual talent, the entire band will be invited to play in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.

Julliard School of Music will offer him a full scholarship, which he will decline, electing instead to go directly to the Boston Pops Orchestra.

Get real! He wants to be in the band because... stop me if you've heard this one before: "EVERYBODY ELSE IS DOING IT!"

Now comes the big decision. What instrument are you going to beg, borrow, steal or buy in order to satisfy your budding musical genius? If you've always enjoyed the sound of stampeding bull elephants, definitely go for one of the brass instruments.

If your little guy leans toward the percussion section, you'll need to stock in a lot of aspirin. But if you've always loved the sound of squealing baby pigs, try to talk him into one of the wind instruments.

It has always amazed me that the tiny, most delicate children always choose to play either the bass drum or the tuba. Doesn't anyone tell them that they are actually going to have to CARRY this huge apparatus down the street in parades and onto the football field at half-time, not to mention daily marching practice?

Speaking of practice... Yes he'll be expected to practice this instrument at home every afternoon after school. Think of it as self-discipline for pupil and parents. It is not fair, however, to send the child outdoors to practice and inflict this pain on the entire neighborhood. You could wake up one morning and find a "For Sale" sign staked out in your front yard.

This little person who has trouble keeping hair combed and shoes tied, will be expected to move his fingers, lungs and brain all at the same time while playing music. Then later, they'll add marching to this line-up. You'll ask yourself "How can all of this happen when he isn't co-ordinated enough to walk and chew gum at the same time?"

This kid has a natural aversion to hangers and is not known to willingly put articles of clothing into a closet. One of these days he's going to have to keep up with a band uniform on out-of-town band trips. Are you suddenly gaining more respect for band directors?

There is one more aspect of this whole thing which requires the co-operation of the entire family. It is known as the "Band Concert." Your young genius will have spent every waking hour for weeks practicing music for this concert so he can get up in front of the whole town and forget everything he's learned.

Nothing inspires confidence in the musical performer quite like hearing younger brothers and sisters whine "Mom, do we HAVE to go?" They'll claim to have never heard of any of the people performing on stage, just to avoid having to go to the concert. Then they'll come dragging out to the car like members of a chain gang.

This behavior does so much toward boosting the ego of the nervous performer who already has a lump in his throat and is wondering how he'll ever work up enough air to play his instrument.

I'm always amazed when, after only a few months in band, twenty or thirty of these young fledgling musicians can come together on stage in front of parents, relatives, neighbors and friends and actually pump out a few recognizable tunes. Try it. You might like it!

Courthouse Annex Is Ho-Hummed Again

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture appeared at a County Commissioner's hearing on Monday, August 14, to once again propose the Friona Courthouse Annex.

Once again they came away disappointed and empty handed.

In spite of a more attractive financial package for the County, there was no official motion made to vote either way. The Commissioners simply discussed it briefly, and informed the delegation that they did not want to ask for a vote because they were still working on the fiscal 1996 budget.

Making the presentation for the Friona Chamber were Bill McCoy and Teresa Buske. Other interested parties attending from Friona were Becky Riethmayer, B.K. Buske, and Ricky Barnett.

At the last hearing on Monday, July 24, the cost of a computer in the Friona office was a crucial issue. At that meeting, Tax-Assessor Doris Herington said the state would charge \$12,775 for the computer installation in Friona and an annual fee of \$2600.

That information turned out to be incorrect. It seems that now the state will furnish and install the necessary computer at no cost to the county.

The revised estimated budget presented by the Friona Chamber of Commerce stated an estimated initial setup expense for a Parmer County Annex at \$775.53. Thereafter, there would be \$224.50 per year revenue positive. This budget takes into account the annual deputy salary assuming the transfer of one deputy from the tax office.

However, both Judge Bonnie Clayton and Tax-Assessor Herington said that transferring an employee would not be practical and a new employee would need to be hired. Herington said, "I would

be shortchanging the county if I have to do it with two employees."

"Besides", she said, "voter's registration is getting to where it's full time, and it has to be done at the courthouse."

The hiring of an additional employee issue would again rearrange the estimated budget prepared by the Friona Chamber.

When questioned about the work load on the two employees in the tax office, Herington argued that the tax office has no control over people in the county. One day they may not be busy and the next day they may work all day, she said.

Teresa Buske questioned the money in the county's Right Of Way fund and how it might be used. Judge Clayton said that the Right of Way money could be put in either the FM Fund or the General Fund.

The \$130,000 in the Right of Way Fund will be moved to the General Fund in the 1996 budget. When Buske asked if some of the Right of Way money could be appropriated to fund the annex, Commissioner Ware stated that they could not do anything with it until the end of the year and he did not want to vote on anything at this meeting until they had a chance to look at the budget.

B. K. Buske asked about the budget shortfalls in 1994 and 1995. County Treasurer Ann Norton said the 1994 shortfall was \$104,358.36 and the projected loss this year was \$177,420.63.

The commissioners are projecting a loss in 1996 and are planning the budget for a deficit. Budget and deficit projections were not available at this time, however, Judge Clayton made it clear that the commissioners did not go over budget, even with the deficit.

At one point, Judge Clayton asked if the City of Friona could

Friona PD To Enforce Speed Zone

Police Chief John Taylor says to remember the "School Zone" speed limit of 20 mph on Highway 60. Friona Schools begin Monday, August 21. Taylor said "The school zone lights will be on Monday morning, and the speed limit in the school zone will be strictly enforced".

Residents are cautioned that the 20 mph speed limit is in effect from about 7:50 a.m. until about 4:00 p.m. According to Taylor, it is one of only two school zones in the state that has a reduced speed all day.

Because of the practice field across Highway 60, students use the crosswalk throughout the day, therefore the speed limit is enforced continuously with no time breaks.

Fines for speeding in a school zone range from \$79 to \$159 or more depending on how many miles you are over the speed limit.

Cannon AFB Set For Expo '95

CLOVIS, N.M.--The public is invited to come to Cannon Air Force Base's Air Power Expo '95 slated for Saturday, August 19.

The Twelfth Air Force F-16 Fighting Falcon demonstration team from Hill Air Force Base, Utah, headlines this year's Air Power Expo.

The team consists of a pilot, narrator and maintenance people who serve as the backbone of the multi-role fighter aircraft demonstration.

The Falcon performs at air shows throughout the United States, Canada and Mexico, and exhibits its maneuvers to over three million people annually.

The jet's single engine produces 29,000 pounds of thrust, which launches it into maximum performance climbs and descents. Spectators will see the F-16 perform high and low-speed maneuvers and rapid rolls. This Fighting Falcon is capable of flying at more than twice the speed of sound.

This year's Air Power Expo also features a variety of other aircraft performing flying passes plus static display aircraft coming from locations all over the United States.

Vendors and squadron booths will be set up along the flightline selling food, drinks and souvenirs.

Gates open at 9 a.m. and close at 4 p.m. (M.D.T.).

eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. Financial aid is available for breast screening and mammograms to individuals who qualify.

(Continued from Page 1) make any concessions and share costs with the county. This brought groans and a quick response from the Friona representatives. On the lighter side, Commissioner White then jokingly said that "We could cut out some of the fire department funds".

Bill McCoy argued one last time that people are having to take time off from work and have their pay docked, plus the travel time and expense, when the Friona annex would be a service to the people that the County government is supposed to serve.

Evoking a testy response from Herington, McCoy said that she had complained about the inconvenience in driving to Friona once a week, but didn't seem to mind if 50-60 people a week are inconvenienced by driving to Farwell.

Commissioner Ware stated, "The only thing you could do that you can't do now is register a vehicle and buy a tag." Buske and McCoy reminded him of the other

services that an annex could provide.

Commissioner John Mars asked the court, "If we can find \$17,000 in the budget, will we give them an annex?"

Clayton stated again that they would have to look for it in the budget, see if they could find it, then vote on it.

At the last hearing and at this one, they said they would put it in the budget and see what the bottom line looks like. As Commissioner White said about the budget and the annex, "It just depends on how much money we want to lose".

Bill McCoy said that it appeared there would be a tax increase regardless of the annex and Judge Bonnie Clayton agreed. She said the proposed annex would not cause the tax increase. McCoy asked the court's positive consideration during their budget hearings, of the Friona Chamber of Commerce's proposal to locate a courthouse annex in Friona to better serve more than one-half the county's population.

Eastern New Mexico. She has previously taught in Farwell for three years.

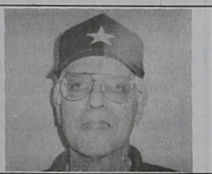

JTPA is a government-sponsored program which gives young people opportunities to acquire and practice job skills while working and earning in an actual job environment.

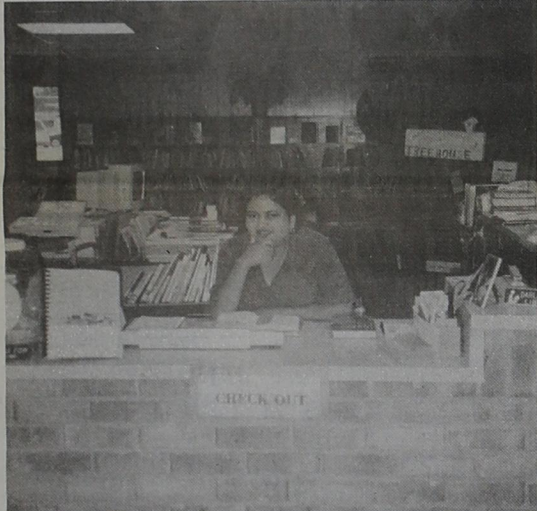

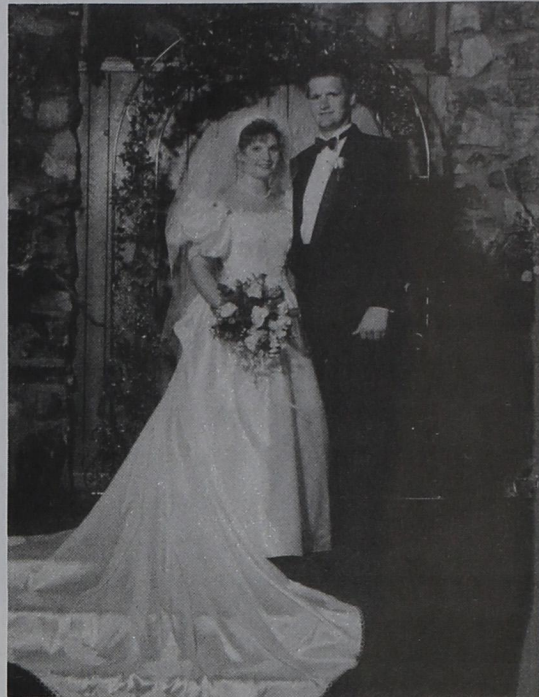

Don and Beckie White of Friona are the parents of a baby girl born Tuesday, August 8 at 3 a.m. in their home.

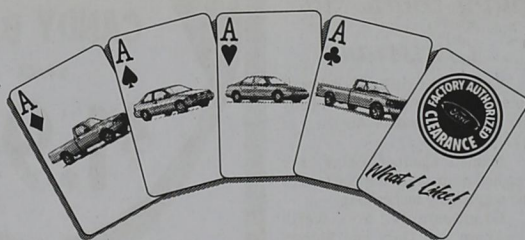

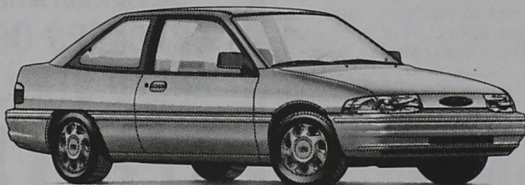

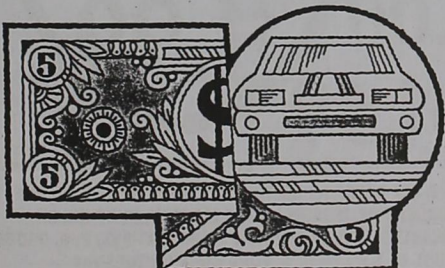

Selecting The Best Mutual Funds

Investors looking for help can find more advice than they could ever use at the nearest library or bookstore. Look under the categories of "investing" or "personal finance," and you'll find hundreds of books, each claiming to be the only one you'll need.

However, a few gems can be found among the volumes. One of those is the 1994 edition of "The 100 Best Mutual Funds You Can Buy," by Gordon K. Williamson. This book not only lists the top funds by investment category, but also provides a common-sense method of choosing the right funds to meet specific needs.

Investors are always eager to find the best funds, but first they must define their particular needs. These needs can be determined by relatively simple factors such as the investor's tax bracket and existing investments, and by more complicated considerations such as financial goals, risk tolerance and length of time the investor is willing to invest. The book provides fund recommendations in 13 separate categories, each designed to meet specific needs and different levels of risk.

Each of the 100 funds listed is given a fair and detailed analysis that rates it on a point system in each of five categories: total return, risk reduction, management, tax minimization and expense control. In addition, each fund is given a

rating of fair, good or excellent for performance in good and bad markets and predictability of returns.

Perhaps best of all, however, Williamson's book provides a three-point system that's simple enough to be used by anyone interested in mutual funds.

1. Select funds that have had the same manager for at least five years. This will cut your selection approximately in half.

2. Eliminate as much risk as possible. In the book, Williamson not only provides a risk profile for each fund listed but also explains how to create a risk profile for any fund. Creating such a profile helps you find the best returns in relation to the risk offered.

3. Choose funds that have performed well over at least the past three to five years. Ten- to 15-year periods are even better, if you can find funds that have had the same management that long.

The book also answers general questions about mutual funds and discusses the debate over load vs. no-load funds. Williamson does not suggest considering only one type or the other; in fact, his list of 100 is about equally divided among load and no-load funds. "A better way to proceed," Williamson suggests, "is to try to separate good funds from bad ones."

Investors can find multitudes of books and publications promising to help them do just that. "The 100 Best Mutual Funds You Can Buy" is one book that makes good on that promise.
