LOOK AT practically any county map anywhere in the U.S. and you will notice that 99% of the time the will notice that 99% of the time the county seat is located either (1) close to the geographical center of the county, OR (2) it is located in the town with the largest popula-tion in the county. However, Parmer County is the exception to both of these, with our county seat and courthwase being located di and courthouse being located di-rectly on the western border of the county (which is also the western border of Texas) in the town of Farwell. Friona and Bovina are both larger in population and both are closer to the geographical center

Many newcomers to these parts are puzzled as to why the county seat is located in such an out-of-the-way place. So for those of you who haven't heard our oldtimers tell this story, here it is, more or less from the horse's mouth.

James D. Hamlin (1871-1950) James D. Hamlin (18/1-1950) was one of those "larger than life" characters of the Old West. Histo-rian and biographer William Curry Holden who was personally ac-quainted with Judge Hamlin said this about the man, "Indigenous outlaws, gunmen and gamblers were among his cherished inti-mates. Madams of the bordelios esmates. Madams of the bordellos es-teemed his friendship and sought his counsel, while lovely women of

his counsel, while lovely women of impeccable proprieties all but swooned in his presence and sighed audibly with his passing." Hamlin served as county judge of Parmer County, Texas during 12 of the county's most formative years from 1912 to 1924. He was a trusted cohort of the Farwell family from Chicago and was the resident from Chicago and was the resident representative of the Capitol Syndicate which was in the process of selling off the old XIT ranchlands into farms and townsites starting about 1905. The proceeds from the sale of these lands, which included and of here the other of the other o legislature.

In 1906, Hamlin was instrumen-In 1906, Hamlin was instrumen-tal in laying out the townsite and selling lots in Farwell for the syn-dicate. A year or so prior to that he had established land claims and laid out the town of Texico. New Mex-ico which he referred to often as "my townsite of Texico." His uncle J. M. Hamlin was involved in railroad interests in the county, so naturally he was crushed when he discovered that the Santa Fe Railroad had decided not to establish Railroad had decided not to establish a division point at Texico-Farwell, but instead elected to build the roundhouse, shops and Harvey House ten miles west at Clovis,

New Mexico. Parmerton was the railroad site closest to the geographical center of this county. The townsite of Parmerton was laid out in 1907 and a petition signed by 150 of the county's residents appealed to Deaf Smith County to release Parmer County from its jurisdiction. The Parmerton site was then used as the county seat for a time and county business was conducted there. I don't know if this was before the first or second of the three county out alcolation firsh but there is seat election fights, but there is nothing at Parmerton now except a historical marker, which we owe to the efforts of former tax-assess-or/collector Hugh Moseley.

When Hamlin was elected County Judge in 1912 he claimed that his two-story office building in Farwell was used as the courthouse until the hotly contested county seat fight in 1914, in which Farwell won by a narrow margin of two or three votes.

According to oldtimers in both Friona and Bovina, the ballots were confiscated and destroyed by the Farwell faction before a re-count could be made. The \$50,000 bond issue for the building of a courthouse passed but no progress was made because three of the four County Commissioners had taken s with Friona and would not (Continued On Page 9) sides

The City of Friona was named his week as recipient of a \$160,000 grant from the Texas Department of Housing and comunity Affairs. The City applied for the grant in order to rebuild its sewer plant, which was all but destroyed by the tornado last June 2. The money is a Disaster Relief Grant through the Community Development Block Grant program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. Paula Wilson, Friona City Manager, said that a part of the sipulation is that the city will pay \$37,000 toward the project, which will have a total cost of \$197,000. The project will repair the city's wastewater treatment plant and cominment damaged by the tornado.

Then, Commissioner Robert White made commissioner Ropert while made a motion that the annex not be opened in Friona. Commissioner Kenneth McGehee seconded and the motion passed by a vote of 3 to 1,

with Mars opposed. The action is a clear indication that the Friona courthouse annex will not be approved during the 1996 fiscal year. Other action discussed was a 7

1/2% tax increase. Next budget hearing is set for Monday, September 11, and the final budget approval meeting will be September 25.

Co.), it was announced this week. Taylor joined the FPD in January of 1989 after serving several years as a reserve officer. He was named Chief of Police in October of 1991.







At that time, Hamlin requested that no book about him be published for 25 years and the authors complied with his wishes, publishing the book in 1973



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
Art Association To Hold Maize Days Art Show
