### **Combest Introduces** His Own Farm Bill

Congressman Larry Combest told newsmen from his area this week that he has introduced his own farm program in the U.S. House of Representatives, and is lobbying fellow congressmen for their

tellow congressmen for their support.

Rep. Combest, in one of his "conference calls" to local newsmen in his district, said the bill he was sponsoring is modelled considerably like the farm program that will be expiring in 1996.

"We're spending less than half the tax money on agriculture today."

"We're spending less than half the tax money on agriculture today than we were in 1986. I think the present bill is just what the farmers need for the most part," he said, pointing to cotton as a good example of how the market demand has grown to where farmers get a

has grown to where farmers get a fair price for their crops.

Combest said that the Sugar Alliance had come together and worked out agreements that would help their industry. "Our current sugar program returns several billion dollars to the government each year. It is a poncost item." he each year. It is a non-cost item," he told the newsmen.

The area legislator said he had

already received backing for his farm bill from several representatives from across the South and Midwest. "I'll try to do

the absolute best I can for my farmers for the next seven-year period. He explained that the Republicans had set a seven-year goal for solving the nation's money problems.

On welfare reform, Combest said the Republicans are pushing for "Medicare Plus," which will offer senior citizens more assistance than they are currently receiving.

"We're going to provide more options to Seniors than they have under the present Medicare. We're also greatly concerned about rural hospitals, who have been hurt by the old program. We want our program to work with the rural hospitals better than before," he

The congressman added that the GOP party would introduce a "Medisave Program," which will allow senior citizens to buy a highly deductible "savings policy." They would contribute to such a policy and when their savings policy, and when their savings account reaches 60% of the policy amount, they can take the rest of the money out and use it for whatever purpose they wish to," he explained. "It would be a tax-deductible medical savings deductible medical savings program," he concluded.

Local residents probably knew it already, but Mother Nature has turned her worst side to the Friona area during 1995, in most respects.

Needing several weeks of warm sunny weather to mature their crops, especially the cotton, farmland has received instead a rainy, cold week, with an extremely early freeze as a distinct possibility Friday morning.

Moisture for the week amounted to 2.01 inches, which would have been worth millions of dollars two months ago to row crops, but of marginal value this late.



Have you ever heard of the American Sunday School movement? I hadn't until I read

movement? I haunt the about it this week.
The Sunday School movement had originated in England with Robert Raikes (1735-1811). An article publisher, he knew "little Robert Raikes (1735-1811). All English publisher, he knew "little miserable wretches" in his home city, Gloucester, who worked six long days in the factories and had no chance for education. He opened his first Sunday School there in 1780

The Sunday School movement was transplanted to America by another Englishman, Robert May. It took root with special vigor around Philadelphia, and out of that city in 1824 came a national movement called the American Sunday School Union.

In the next century and a half, it planted thousands of Sunday Schools across America. Churches eventually sprang up from the majority of these Sunday Schools--more than three thousand of them

The principal man involved in the movement was Dr. Benjamin Rush, signer of the Declaration of Independence and the most eminent Independence and the most eminent American physician of his generation. One of the original vice presidents was Bushrod Washington, nephew of George Washington. Another early officer was John Marshall, one of the great

Chief Justices of the United States
Supreme Court.

Another long-time vice
president was Pennsylvania
Governor John Pollock, who, as
director of the United States Mint
in Philadelphia, first inscribed on
our coins the motto, "In God We
Trust"

But one of the movement's But one of the movements most illustrious figures, who served as a manager and vice president from the time of the American Sunday School Union's inception until his death eighteen years later, once found himself held captive heart a Pritish ship outside the aboard a British ship outside the city of Baltimore, near Fort McHenry. He watched "the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air." Then Francis Scott Key wrote The Star Spangled Banner.

And yet if we will but look back at the foundations and great men in our nation's past we find not only very religious men, but also very active men in the expression of their faith. 

The proceeds from the bonds authorized by this amendment shall be used to augment the Veterans! Housing Assistance Fund II to be administered and invested as provided by law. The bonds authorized by this amendment shall be incontestable after execution by the Veterans! Land Board, approval by the attorney general, and delivery to the purchaser.

The proposed amendment will appear "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation property of an organization chartered by the Congress of the Republic of Texas that is used primarily for the charitable, benevolent, or public service activities of the organization."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase by \$500 million the amount of general obligation bonds that may be issued to augment the veterans' housing assistance fund  $\Pi$ ."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 64 proposes a constitutional amendment which would extend the tax exemption under article VIII, section 1-b(b) of the Texas Constitution for the residence homestead of a person age 65 or older to the surviving spouse of a person who received the exemption. The surviving spouse must be age 55 or older when the deceased spouse died, and the property must be the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the deceased spouse died and remain the surviving spouse's residence homestead. A surviving spouse who already receives an exemption under this section of the Texas Constitution is not entitled to an additional exemption under the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear

or more people, and each person owns an undivided interest in the property, as opposed to a specific portion of the property. If one owner wishes to purchase the other person's interest in the property and wishes to obtain a loan to finance the purchase, the lending institution requires all interests in the property to be used as security for the loan; this is called an owelty of partition. Senate Joint Resolution 46 would allow the lending institution to foreclose on the homestead property for an owelty of partition if the purchaser defaulted on the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would allow the reinance of a lien against a homestead. Finally, the proposed amendment would allow a purchaser or lender to rely on an affidavit that states that the property to be conveyed or encumbered is not the homestead of the affinat.

## YOUR EYES



### When Eyes Water

We depend on tears to lubricate and cleanse our eyes, but older people sometimes experience excessive tearing. For most of

them, the condition may be mildly annoying, for others more serious,

Optometric examination can determine whether the problem is excess tear production or poor tear drainage from the comer of the eye. At the same time, the optometrist will look for the basic cause for the excess tearing. It might be anything from an eye infection, a foreign body in the eye, nasal or dental problems, a blocked tear gland, an uncorrected vision problem that causes continual eye strain, or even a general health problem.
