Nashville, Tennessee, has always been the mecca for Country Music. As the birthplace of the Grand Ole Opry, and Opryland, Nashville has for generations been the home of country music stars.

But Branson, Missouri, an

But Branson, Missouri, an unlikely location--not even on an interstate highway--has slowly but surely become the place folks visit when they want to see their favorite

star in person. When Carol and I took the Trailways bus tour recently to Branson, we liked the fact that the shows are all "family oriented." None of the shows ever came close to having an off-color story. As a matter of fact, most of the shows' main stars have incorporated their children, or other members of their families in their show.

For instance, The Lennon Sisters are the headliners for the Sisters are the headmers for the Lawrence Welk show, and they are just as good today as they were back in the 1950s when they first joined Welk's television show, being just out of their teens.

The Lennons are augmented by their daughters, called the Lennon their daughters, called the Lennon Daughters. The Lennon Sisters have managed to age gracefully. When they did a number with their girls (four Lennon sisters plus four daughters), it was hard to tell the moms from the daughters. Mel Tillis put on an outstanding show. The youngest performer we saw in Branson was Tillis' three-

saw in Branson was Tillis' three-year-old grandson, who stole the show from grandpa. He non-chalantly strolled onto the stage with his own microphone, and sang harmony with Grandpa Mel to the 1950s favorite "This Old House."

Bobby Vinton's "80-ish" mother not only came onstage to join her son in a couple of musical numbers, but was out front during intermission selling her "jams and jellies." As you might suspect, Carol hardly ever passed a souvenir booth or gift shop without giving

it some support.

Japanese export Shoji Tabuchi is a top draw in Branson, and he definitely puts on an outstanding show. Tabuchi's wife Dorothy has been a part of the stage presentation but now is strictly his business manager. Her 15 year old daughter manager. Her 15 year old daughter Christina performs as often as possible, but never on a school night. Luckily for our group, we saw the Friday night performance, and were able to enjoy Christina's numbers. It was pointed out that she is also a straight-A student.

Jim Stafford has a show with lots of variety including laser

lots of variety, including laser lights, remote controlled hot-air balloons, and snow falling on the audience. He made us all weak from laughter and thoroughly entertained the crowd with his wit and expertise on the guitar.

Andy Williams still belts out

love songs that steal the hearts of the ladies in the crowd. The closing number of Anita Bryant's show dealt with scores of American servicemen who had given her their medals to pin on her special flak-jacket which she had acquired jacket which she had acquired during her days with the Bob Hope Air Base Tours.

There wasn't a dry eye in the crowd as Anita told about the donors of these medals. She also came onto our tour bus, and Ye Editor had his picture made hugging a star. Anita's husband Bill met our bus when it arrived, and cracked

jokes for several minutes.
All of the shows have representatives come out to greet you before you get off the bus, and then someone to come out and thank

you for coming.



Cotton Harvest Gets Underway

Harvest operations on the area's cotton crop has gotten underway, as farmers hope to have a positive conclusion on one of the strangest growing seasons and the strangest

conclusion on one of the strangest growing seasons ever experienced locally.

Although most of the leaves on the cotton plants have been killed by the freeze on November 2, the cotton stalks have not been killed, and there are still green bolls on the and there are still green bolls on the

"We need a good, hard freeze, which will open those green bolls," said Jerry Butman, manager of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. "We need for the temperature to get down to about the mid-20s, and stay for several hours," Butman

The local ginner said that the yields on the cotton which has been stripped so far are not turning out as well as expected. "The crop could average a bale per acre, straight across. Earlier in the season we were hoping for a much better yield, he said.

Kenny Fangman of Hereford brought the first bale of cotton to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on October 24.

The 1995 cotton crop was dealt a blow with late freezes in May, and hail-outs which included the June 2 tornado date. As a result thousands of acres were replanted, past the date when a cotton crop can mature under normal conditions.

These farmers with late cotton were needing a late freeze so their cotton could mature. They got the late freeze, but the crop also had to endure some late-season cold weather, which hampered the maturing process.

Then, needing a hard freeze to finish the process, the area hasn't had this type of freeze as of Wednesday of this week.

Grade reports on the '95 crop have been good so far, but the "micronaire" reading may drop when ginning begins on t irrigated cotton, it was suggested.

irrigated cotton, it was suggested.

Butman said that the price of cotton is holding good, from 75 to 81 cents per pound. "The cotton farmers need the price to stay good, as they will need it to come out ahead on this crop," he commented. "A survey of the county's eight cotton gins on Tuesday of this week showed that 2,372 bales had been received at that point.

Curt Miller, director of the
Parmer County CFSA office, said
that 69,800 acres of cotton were
originally certified by the county's

growers, probably an all-time record planting for the county. Miller estimated, however, that

around 9,000 acres were destroyed and not planted back to cotton. That still leaves possibly over 60,000 acres of cotton to be harvested in Parmer County.



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
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Out Here

Life is not always at its best here in Parmer County, but it beats being homeless in New York City.

Ask Chris and Harold Richardson.
They have survived perils and

They have survived perils and ordeals that most Parmer County residents could only imagine.

One day in Fast Stop, I heard a New York accent. Because I have spent a lot of time in New York City, and have many friends in New York and New England, a New York accent in Parmer County Caucht my attention like snow in caught my attention like snow in the weather forecast.

I struck up a conversation and learned that her name was Chris Richardson and she was indeed from New York City, but lived in Friona now with husband, Harold, and

daughter Hope.

When she found out I wrote for the paper, she said she was writing a book about her life too, and invited me to come by sometime and listen to their story.

When I drawe up the bard diet

When I drove up the hard dirt road to their modest trailer home just off Highway 214 North, there were two or three old cars, two or three old dogs, and not a hint of those homeless days in New York

City.

The sun lit the place as I sat in the warm and comfortable atmosphere of the living room with

a cup of black coffee.

How many times during their almost nine years of being homeless in New York City had almost nine they longed for just such a shelter. It was quiet here. It is never quiet in New York City.

Robbin Christina "Chris"
Richardson was born to a good



family in the Bronx, and grew up in Queens and Long Island. She graduated from prestigious Hofstra University in 1974 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Hematology.

Harold Richardson was born in Brooklyn by accident, when his mother was on a visit from Wake Forest, North Carolina.

Harold's mother is Mexican-Indian. His father was a mixture of Mexican, Indian, and Black. Chris is German-Polish.

In plain language, they are an interracial couple, viewed with disdain by some, overlooked by

Harold bounced around between Harold bounced around between Arizona and New York during his childhood. In 1957, he enlisted in the Air Force and spent "3 years, 9 months, and 18 days" as he tells it.

Then he went back to New York. It was 1960 and he was 21 years old. The next twenty years he bounced around driving next ting.

bounced around, drinking, partying, fighting, and sometimes working. He fixed cars, sang in bars, worked in a sock factory, and did some

One time he was stabbed in the heart by a "friend" high on drugs, and spent two weeks in a New York

Elsewhere in New York, Chris got into a couple of bad marriages, got pregnant, lost a child, got pregnant again and gave birth to a

daughter, Faith.

She had consistent health problems, depression, and some bad

All of which brings us to All of which orings us to 1981. Chris and Harold met in a New York hospital. He had broken both ankles jumping out his second floor apartment window. The apartment was on fire at the time.

It was an alcohol and drug rehab hospital. Harold says it was the kind of place you could go to escape the street. "Two beers and escape the street. "Two beers and you are in" at least for a night or

They liked each other. In fact, at the time, they needed each other, and so they clung together. For the next seven years, things didn't get much better.

They lived and slept on the

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street, in parks, under bushes. One was always awake, on guard against the dangers of New York City. Now and then, when they did some work and got a little money,

they would get a motel room for a night or so, to clean up and rest without fear.

There was a big warehouse that sold bent or dented cans of food at

sold bent or dented cans of food at cheap prices. A nickel or a dime would get you several cans of corn or sardines or pork and beans.

To this day, if you invite Chris over to lunch, "don't even think of offering me sardines or pork and beans", she says.

Harold managed to land a truck driving iob and ran between New

driving job and ran between New York City and Buffalo. Chris rode along. Later on, when their daughter Hope was born, they all rode and lived in that truck.

When he got paid, they would visit a laundromat, get another cheap motel for a night, and try to

shake the fear of the future.

All along, Harold worried about them. He often told God, "Look, I could die by myself. Why did you send her here too?"

Somehow they managed just to keep alive. They said they never panhandled people for money when they lived in the street. "We weren't that kind of street people," Harold insisted, with a hint of pride in his voice now.

Still they clung together, hoping for a better tomorrow, which never seemed to come. Then they decided, to escape the pain and fear, "It was Friona, or nowhere."

Harold's brother came to get them in New Jersey, and they moved in with Harold's mother up on Main Street. That was seven years ago.

Since then, their deep relgious faith has sustained them, along with some help from a lot of people here in Friona.

They attend First Baptist Church, sing in the choir, and thank God for the help that some of the choir members gave to help get where they are today.

They have lived comfortably

Daughter Hope, who was born on Harold's birthday, which he considrs a sign from God, is eight now. She is a happy, sweet, quiet

little girl.
Chris' older daughter, Faith,

attends college in California.
Chris worked at Prairie Acres for two and one-half years, but is able to stay home now, where she home schools their daughter Hope.

Harold has a steady job at KAR Transportation, "shagging trucks out at Excel", he says. Through it all, they have sustained two emotions: an abiding fear and a sense of humor.

fear and a sense of humor.

They are thankful every day for what they have, and acknowledge the fear that it could all go away, and they would be homeless again.

But talking and laughing about it now seems to help. Harold doesn't mind telling you: "In New York City, we had three kinds of meals: Miss A Meal, No Meal, and Oatmeal."

It is a long way back to New

It is a long way back to New York City. They can look out now and see flat land, and those few old and see hat land, and those lew old dogs and cars. When I left that Saturday morning, in my rearview mirror I saw three big smiles. And a roof. And a home. Warm and nice, with TV's, black coffee,

and even some furniture.
Faith, Hope, and Charity.
According to the Richardson's, two out of three ain't bad.




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


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Why Investors Choose One Mutual Fund Over Another

Put four people together at a table in a restaurant, and most likely, they will order four different entrees. Who's to say why they choose differently; perhaps it's just

Give four people a choice of funds, and they, too, will probably each pick a different fund. But hopefully, they don't base their decisions on whims.

As more individual investors buy mutual funds, fund managers

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This is unfortunate. chosen based on short-term performance records. The guiding factors in choosing a mutual fund should be your investment objectives and risk tolerance.

In addition to short-term performance, the survey also showed investors' other primary considerations in choosing mutual funds. Management was the next most important factor, listed by 18.8 per cent of the survey respondents. Potential investors look for longevity and evaluate the track record of the individual who

manages the fund.

Perhaps investors are placing recommendations.

Most of the respondents agreed Most of the respondents agreed that mutaul funds are not short-term investments. In fact, only about 14 per cent followed daily price changes. About half checked prices monthly, and 20 per cent admitted to weekly reviews. Less than 30 per cent of those surveyed said they try to "time" the market-that is, quest the proper time to buy and

The survey also showed that investors who do not use brokers or advisers tend to sell their funds more quickly and return to them much more slowy. Nine per cent of those surveyed said any price drop would trigger them to sell, and another six per cent would sell during a general market decline. The majorty of fund owners, however, said they would stay the course until their objectives were

met, stay the course.

causes many investors to look to a variety of funds, and three out of every four mutual fund shareholders today own three or more funds.

The reason you buy a fund often governs the success of your investment. Funds bought with little understanding and unreasonable expectations are often abandoned quickly.

Know your financial objectives when choosing mutual funds. As long as those objectives are being met, stay the course.

"Exercise" For Your Eyes

A test of visual acuity--with an eye chart, perhaps--can indicate only whether each eye can see what it should at a certain distance. But good vision requires, also, that both eyes

focus on a page, that they can work as a team, seeing the same thing at the same time, and that they can "track" a line of type or the path of a moving object.

School and reading make real visual demands. Some problems are noticeable in the early years. In other cases, a youngster may develop adaptive behaviors to compensate--squinting, perhaps, or sitting up front in class. By high school or college, though, the

demands may be more than inefficient eyes can handle.

Your optometrist can help with corrective lenses and vision training. Carefully prescribed "exercises" for the eyes, taught in the eye doctor's office and practiced at home, are designed to improve eye movements, focusing and coordination.

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
