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# Combest Decries U.S. Bosnian Involvement the administration is looking at ways of getting around the resolution. Meanwhile, the senate hasn't held a vote on the situation,"

"There is no justification for the United States to send troops to Bosnia--it just can't be justified when criteria is measured. But President Clinton is dead-set on our being there."

This was how Congressman Larry Combest explained the

situation following a closed-door meeting that he and some 50 fellow

meeting that he and some 50 fellow congressmen had with the president on Tuesday of this week.

"I've been opposed to the intervention of U.S. troops in Bosnia ever since our country became aware of the Bosnian situation. I have had hundreds of calls this week from my constituents, and up to now, only one caller was in favor of our involvement," the congressman said.

Combest discussed the Bosnian

Combest discussed the Bosnian situation with seven newspaper publishers in his district on Wednesday, including Bill Ellis of the Friona Star/Bovina Blade.

"There are two criteria which must be met before U.S. troops are used. One is if a situation threatens our national security or national interest. Neither of these is threatened," Combest charged.

"My second concern is that the

threatened," Combest charged.
"My second concern is that the president has stated that the entire peace scenario in Bosnia is dependant on the United States having troops on the ground and in the air. If the peace depends on us having troops there, then it's a questionable peace," the congressman eaid. congressman said.

The veteran member of congress pointed out that the two warring factions in Bosnia have been fighting each other for many years, and it doesn't make sense to risk the

lives of American troops in such a "domestic squabble." "I simply don't believe that we can risk this. It's not in our best interest. President Clinton says that our national reputation is at stake, but I'm not sure but that it's his

own "face" he's trying to save," Combest said.

If the situation were in Canada, for example, Combest said he could see the need for U.S. troops to be seent. "But this isn't in our backyard, and frankly I question how much the European nations (who are neighbors) have done," Combest said.

He added that he was fearful that

like nothing better than to embarass the United States. He pointed out that he wouldn't be surprised that American servicemen could wind up being fired at by both sides of the Bosnian factions

"It just doesn't add up," Combest

government could be closed down two weeks earlier due to the financial constraints, but could suddenly be facing millions (or billions) of dollars of expenses in the Bosnian situation, Combest said it was one of the mysteries of government.

"I hereby declare, on oath, that I absolutely and entirely renounce and abjure all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state, or sovereignty of whom or which I have heretofore been subject or citizen; that I will support and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States of America against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; and that I take this obligation freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; so help me God. In acknowledgement whereof I have

hereunto affixed my signature Two weeks ago I had three friends who went through the process of becoming American citizens and then made this oath and became citizens of the United States. I went to Amarillo to the Federal Court to watch them take the oath and then to congratulate them afterwards.

There were some 100 men and women from nine different countries who became naturalized citizens that day. There was a small reception afterwards where they were presented with American flags and welcomed as American citizens.

As I sat listening to the oath being read by the Judge, I was reminded of a persons passing from death to life as they become Christians. For in essence we pass from one kingdom into another

kingdom. time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand: repent and believe the gospel." Paul put it this way in Colossians 1:13--"Who hath delivered us from the power of the kingdom of his dear Son."

Those becoming American citizens renounced any allegiance to any other person or power, those becoming Christians repent of or renounce our old way of life and believe on the one who is able to give life, Jesus Christ.

### The Basics Of Mutual Funds

A recent letter from a reader reminded me that we spend so much time on the specifics of investing that the basics are sometimes overlooked. "What exactly is a mutual fund?" the reader asked.

The financial dictionary defines a mutual fund as a fund operated by an investment company that raises money from shareholders and invests it in stocks, bonds and other securities. But there is more to this story than the dictionary definition.

The first recorded mutual fund was established in 1822 in the Netherlands by King William I. The first mutual fund in this country was started in 1924 and still exists today. Funds eventually became so popular that toward the end of the Great Depression an intensive study was undertaken to establish laws that would protect shareholders from potential abuses.

From that study came the Investment Company Act of 1940. The act regulates investment companies by requiring them to register with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) and strictly follow all federal laws and with the securities.

guidelines relating to securities.

As a result of the Investment As a result of the investment Company Act, each mutual fund has a prospectus, which defines the fund's objective and limits the managers to specific investment parameters and risk levels. Therefore, one of the benefits of owning a mutual fund is

professional management. Diversification is another benefit of mutual funds. Most mutual funds typically own 100 or more different securities. Although diversification spreads your risk, it does not guarantee absence of risk. The market value of securities changes, so an investment that offers the potential for significant gains cannot simultaneously promise to be risk-free. When you share the rewards, you must also share the risk.

The share price of a mutual fund is calculated each business day. This price per share appears the following day in major newspapers across the nation. A quick check of your newspaper or a phone call to your broker lets you know exactly what your fund is worth that day. If you wish to withdraw money, it's as simple as writing a

check, making a phone call or having the money wired to your bank, depending on the mutual fund you own. The fund must redeen your shares on any business day at the current market price, which could be higher or lower than the price you paid at purchase. However, most mutual funds are designed to be held as long-term investments.

Today there are more than 5,000 mutual funds with about \$2 trillion invested in them. USA Today has called mutual funds possibly the nation's favorite way to investment for that next century.

# **Improving** Night Vision

Older eyes need more light to see and they adjust more slowly to changing light conditions. That's why there is controversy about the advantages of driving with yellow-,

amber-- or orange tinted lenses at night; some tints may help increase contrast, but they do reduce visual acuity and may slow recovery from glare. Here are some tips that will help:

\*Have anti-reflective coating added to your regular eyeglasses.

\*Wear sunglasses for daytime driving, but remove them at dusk. Sunglasses protect against glare during the day and make it easier for eyes to adapt to night-time glare.

\*If a car with bright lights is following too close and glare.

\*If a car with bright lights is following too close and glare bothers you, try to move to another lane, or pull over and let the car

\*To improve vision, make sure that windshields, mirrors and headlights are clean and headlights well aligned.

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
