"HOW DO THEY figure out the date of Easter?" asked our "new girl." Becky London, recently. As the boss, Ye Editor is expected to know these things, and spout them off whenever asked.

Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox. The vernal equinox, in layman's terms, is the spring equinox, or the beginning of spring.

This year, spring was designated as March 20. The first full moon occurred the evening of March 23 (also a Sunday). Since the full moon didn't appear until nightfall, that placed Easter on the following Sunday, which is March 30.

The formula for determining Easter's date was decided at the First Council of Nicaea in 325, called by the Roman emperor Constantine I. We assume that the complicated rules that council adopted 1,672 years ago just goes to show that representatives of the people have always been fond of passing complicated laws.

In the early days, the

the people have always been fond of passing complicated laws.

In the early days, the exact time of the spring equinox was interpreted differently, as was the exact time of the full moon. This led to Easter being celebrated on different dates in different parts of the world.

In 387 A.D., France and Egypt celebrated Easter 35 days apart.

Church leaders later decided to arbitrally designate March 21 as the vernal equinox, so as to cut down on some of the confusion.

The earliest that Easter can occur is March 22, not too far removed from this year's date. The source that we used to research the date of Easter did not name the latest possible date, although we know that the most common date is April 19-so it has to be several days beyond this date.

Early in this century, delegations of church officials suggested that the movable date of Easter and its assoc-

gations of church officials suggested that the movable date of Easter and its associated observances be replaced by a fixed date, like that of Christmas. The Church of England and the Holy See at the Vatican had no objections to the proposed reform, but to date no change has been implemented.

Fortunately, all we have to do is flip open a calendar to to know when to plan the trip to Grandma's for Easter dinner.

I thought it was interesting, with the visit of Comet Hale-Bopp, to be reminded that our religious holidays are determined to some extent by astronomy.

Virtually everyone we come in contact with has at least made an attempt to see the comet, and most of us by now have been able to do so.

It therefore should come as no big surprise that mankind has turned his eye to the heavens and studied the stars and planets for thousands of years.

best example, and this structure dates back to pre-history.

Town and Country To Open Mon.


The Town & Country location on Highway 60 in Friona, will open for business at 6 a.m. Monday, March 31.

Crim's Forecast: Good Crop Year

"The answer my friend, is blowing in the wind. The answer is blowing in the wind."

The lyrics from this '60s pop hit are taken to heart in these parts. Especially on March 22 each year, the day of the annual "Crim forecast."

This year at exactly 6:48 a.m. "Chief" Crim conducted the annual forecasting ritual, read the smoke signals and the news for the local farmers was good. "The north wind indicates a good crop season," says Weldon Crim.

Some may ask why this is important, but obviously they haven't been in the area too long.

The Crim family has been

In the Crim family has been doing this type of "Indian" forecasting since 1910 and they claim to be accurate around eighty per cent of the

And if you don't believe in these claims, just check the recent history. Weldon has been right on the nose six of the past seven years. That in itself should be reason nearly to believe in this

in itself should be reason enough to believe in this year's prediction.

"This forecast is for the spring season, so expect some good rains," says Crim.

Taylor Crim, Weldon's grandfather, began the family tradition in 1910. He learned the ritual by watching the Comanche and Plains Indians when he worked on the railroad near El Paso.

Taylor Crim passed the

Taylor Crim passed the tradition on to his son, J.W.,

(Weldon's father), who conducted the "burnings" from 1923 until his death in 1980.

He was known throughout these parts as the "Parmer County Weather Prophet."

Weldon, simply known as the "Chief," has been continuing

"Chief," has been continuing the family tradition since 1983.

The actual "burning" is conducted by stacking wood in a tee-pee shape and setting fire to it at exactly sunrise on the second day of spring. The direction the wind blows the smoke predicts the weather for the upcoming season.

A new feature to this year's ceremony was Weldon's attire. He wore an Indian costume complete with a full-length headdress, compliments of his wife and children.

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

Life Weaves Tragedy Into Cast's Success

The play they perform is a comedy, but life has woven a strand of tragedy into the cast's success, causing tears to mingle with the hearty laughter that usually resounds in their rehearsal hall

hall.

Jason Slagle, the lead in the production of "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum," was killed in an auto accident February 21, just two weeks before the school's annual One-Act Play Festival. He was 16.

before the school's annual One-Act Play Festival. He was 16.

Principal Frank Belcher said that in a school of 350 students, losing one affects everybody. "He did so many things," Belcher said, "It just left a big void."

Drama coach Joy Morton gave her team the choice of going on with the show or calling it off. The 22 team members decided that the best way to honor Slagle's memory would be to compete-and win.

"This is what Jason would've wanted," Morton said. "Theater was one of the loves of his life."

Jason's friend Justin Grimsley was recast in the lead role. Slagle and Grimsley also were debate partners slated to compete in the state meet March 9-10.

Grimsley, who spent many hours with Slagle preparing for debate and drama competitions, said he believes the drama team made the right choice. "When I remember Jason, I'll remember he was an actor above all else, and the best way to honor his memory was to go on with the show," he said.

Grimsley, a sophomore, was named best actor in zone competition and made the all-star cast at the district level while "standing in" for his friend.

According to Belcher, watching Slagle and Grimsley on stage together was a joy.

friend.

According to Belcher, watching Slagle and Grimsley on stage together was a joy, and it was only natural that Grimsley take Slagle's place. "Jason and Justin played off each other. It was like watching your favorite skit on

Saturday Night Live," he said. "You just didn't want them to leave."

Morton feels that going on with the show has been therapeutic for her students. "Theater is a healing process, anyway--certainly for this group," she explained. "Everyone has been able to draw strength from everyone else."

draw strength from everyone else."

One team member even found the courage to try something he'd never done before.

Senior Eric Espinoza, the team's sound technician, asked what he could do to help when Morton recast the play. Espinoza, who'd always slaved behind the scenes, was given the supporting lead opposite Grimsley and was named to the all-star cast at both zone and district level.

"We all became a little stronger and a little closer together," Espinoza said. "It was our choice to go on with the play. It's what Jason would've wanted--he loved to act."

Grimsley said rehearsals

Grimsley said rehearsals have turned into therapy sessions.

"Our rehearsals are emotionally charged," he said.
"One minute we're laughing, and the next we're crying." He said the well-known comedy they chose for this year's competition is helping the cast through their personal tragedy.

Morton feels comedy is the appropriate genre to honor Slagle. "Jason was a funny guy. He always had a smile

for everybody," she said. "He was just the kind of kid who enjoyed life."

The death of Slagle, who had competed at the state level, also affected teens from other parts of Texas. Students at the state debate meet wore blue ribbons in memory of him, and Friona's cast and crew received a letter from drama students in Wimberly, Texas, who also lost a cast-mate and wanted to offer support.

"Jason had a lot of friends from all over the state," Espinoza said.

The loss of Slagle, and the resulting closeness and purpose of the cast, is visible on stage. Morton said a judge at district competition commented about that chemistry before he learned of Slagle's death. The judge wrote in his critique that the ensemble was "outstanding, stunning and overwhelming."

After the performance, Morton told him about Slagle and the cast's decision to go on with the play. "He said that during the play, he knew something special was happening up there," she said.

"These kids feel a togetherness they hadn't ever felt before this," she added.

Grimsley said the togetherness comes from a common goal. "Everybody in the play has really become close-knit," he said. "We drew together out of a purpose-to win. Every time we do the play, it's for Jason."

Kendrick also placed third in the long jump with a 19-11 effort.

Friona's "weight specialist," Charlie Milner, placed second in the discus with a top mark of 142-10.5, and won the bronze medal in the shot put, with a distance of 49-0.

Friona's metric mile relay team turned in a time of 3:28.93 in the preliminaries (Kendrick, Angel Vega, Mario Pina and Joseph Bandy). The

Chiefs had to settle for sixth place in the finals with a time of 3:31.62. Running the laps were Kendrick, Vega, Pina and Quint Ellis).

The relay team failed to equal their season's best time of 3:27.83. Friona has the third-best relay mark in the Panhandle area. That's the good part. The bad part is that the two teams ahead of Friona in the "times" are Dimmitt and Tulia, both district opponents.

Vega placed seventh in the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.49, and Bandy was seventh in the 400-meter dash in 53.22.

Whitely had words of praise for Bandy, only a freshman, who had the fourth-best qualifying time in the preliminaries, a 52.56 mark, his best of the season.

Low Fat Cooking Tips

Decreasing total fat intake, especially saturated fat, is important in preventing and treating many physical problems that we may encounter. Some examples are coronary artery disease, diabetes and obesity.

The typical American diet is loaded with fat, but with some altering, we can all learn to eat healthier. Listed below are some basic tips to help lower our fat intake:

1) Broil, roast, grill or boil meats, poultry and fish instead of frying. Trim all visible fat before cooking.

2) Switch to 1% or skim milk if you are presently using whole or 2%.

3) Use whipped margarine instead of stick margarine instead of stick margarine.

4) Substitute 2 egg whites for 1 whole egg when baking.

5) Use non-stick cooking spray instead of oil when possible.


6) Substitute applesauce

5) Use non-stick cooking spray instead of oil when possible.
6) Substitute applesauce for cooking oil when baking.
7) Use reduced-calorie or fat-free salad dressing.
8) Try lemon juice, vinegar, garlic or onion powder on cooked foods instead of margarine.
9) Select cheeses with less than 5 grams of fat per ounce.

ounce.
10) Switch from regular bacon to turkey bacon.
11) Choose fresh fruit, gelatin or sorbet for dessert.
12) Use a tomato-based sauce instead of cream sauce for pastas.

Remember too, to avoid as much saturated fat as possible. Saturated fats are usually hard at room temperature--butter, lard, cocoa butter, meats, etc. Coconut oil and palm oil are very high in saturated fat, also. Blood cholesterol levels tend to raise with the intake of saturated fats.

Even though modifying our eating habits may be difficult at first, the results in the long run will be well worth it. Most of the time acceptable substitutes are available for our normally high-fat cravings. The following recipe is delicious and has no fat at all:

YOUR EYES

Near-Vision Stress

The cave men and women used distance vision mostly, looking for game and herbs,

vision mostly, looking for game and herbs, making rough tools, preparing skins to wear and food to eat. Today, though, we spend most of our time reading, writing and at other close tasks. And for many people, prolonged use of near vision induces real stress. It takes extra energy to achieve convergence, to aim both eyes at a specific near point. Expending this effort on a continuing basis creates the stress. In response, some people experience blurring and diminished distance vision. This nearsightedness may become permanent. After long periods of reading, some people discover they can no longer comprehend fully what they are reading, and many develop headaches as well. develop headaches as well.

Discuss any problems with near-vision tasks with the optometrist, who can prescribe ways to alleviate the stress and lessen the likelihood of permanent nearsightedness.
