Nature Pulls Trick; **Farmers Are Treated**

The best April moisture in at least 25 years--probably much longer--has resulted in at least one segment of the local population, our farmers, smiling from ear to ear.

In a five-day period last week, Wednesday through Sunday, the Friona station of the National Weather Service measured 4.46 inches of moisture, which included an estimated seven inches of snow.

The snow was one of the wettest snows anyone could remember, as well as one of the latest. Out in the Rhea

remember, as well as one of the latest.

Out in the Rhea community, the snowfall was much greater, estimated at around 12 inches. There, too, the moisture from the spring storm amounted to around 4.5 inches.

The moisture couldn't have been timed any better, from an agricultural standpoint. Well, perhaps if it had come at the first of the month it would have saved corn farmers from starting up their irrigation motors.-but it allowed them to quickly shut them off, where they were running.

Some of the corn had been planted, with much of it yet to be planted. The cotton farmers will perhaps benefit the greatest, as planting was yet to get underway, for the most part.

"They just mainly need to watch the soil temperature before getting their planters into the field," said Jerry Butman, Friona Farmers Coop Gin manager. These farmers were spared the decision as to pre-watering or not, Butman said.

The local ginner said that cotton acreage might be up six to ten per cent in 1997, thanks in part to last year's bumper crop, and the expectation of higher irrigation gas prices.

"This moisture should help the wheat crop to really come on," Butman said.

And a grain elevator manager agreed.

"I'm real optimistic about our wheat crop," said Joe Allen, manager of Sherley Grain Co.'s Rhea Elevator.

Discussing the late freeze that hit the area the second week in April, Allen said that while he felt certain there would be some damage, that most of the wheat fields he has seen look exceptionally good.

About the snow in the Rhea area, Allen said "It was as wet as most folks could remember. It was a dandy, I can tell you that."

Allen said his area had received around seven inches of moisture for the entire month of April, thanks to the estimated 4.5 inches last

week, and that this good rain would help build up the subsoil moisture, which had been badly lacking, following several dry seasons.

"You can't raise a crop without some good subsoil moisture. This will help a lot," the longtime farm observer said.

Cold, Snow Kills Thousands/Cattle

An unexpected aftermath of last week's rain-snow-cold spell was the fact that hundreds--probably even thousands of cattle died during the week.

It was somewhat unusual, and definitely unexpected, since the snow fell virtually perfectly, with no hint at blizzard conditions, which would usually be expected for a big loss of cattle.

Friona veterinarian Gary Cash said he thought the cattle were "set up" for the recent cold spell by the one a couple of weeks earlier, when the temperature dipped below freezing for a day or more.

"Those cattle, especially the fresh ones (young ones) probably became stressed by that spell, and then when the cold spell of last week hit, it just finished them off," Dr. Cash opined.

Cause of the cattle deaths wasn't necessarily the same in all cases. Some may have died of hypothermia, and others from smothering.

"Cattle tend to drift away from the wind (which was from the wind (which was from the north). When they reached a fence on the south, particularly in a corner, the weak calves, or the smaller ones often get trampled," Dr. Cash continued.

The Friona veterinarian said it would be difficult to estimate the total number of cattle deaths. "Virtually everyone with cattle that I have come into contact with lost at least one or two cattle, and more often than not, more than this," he said.

It was also pointed out that the cattle were exposed to the cold and moisture for four or five days, without an

opportunity to get warm or dry, and this proved to be fatal. Apparently the cattle were piling up in an attempt to get warm.

Garth Merrick, owner of Friona Bi-Products/Hereford Bi-Products/ Merrick Pet Foods also indicated that it was difficult to come up with a head count on the lost cattle, even after an area TV report had the number between 3,000 and 5,000.

"We're running 'way behind with the farmers and feedlots. No one could anticipate or be ready for a death loss like what happened," Merrick said. "We just have so many trucks and workers to take care of it (the situation)," Merrick added.

The Bi-Products officials said that losses occurred both in the fields and in the feedyards. He also felt that the new lightweight calves were the worst hit. He echoed the fact that the cattle just were overcome by too many days of exposure.

Friona Man Is Fatality

Jimmy Mireles, 28, a Friona resident, was killed early last Monday morning when his car struck a parked truck about seven miles east of Hereford on U.S. 60, according to DPS spokesmen.

Mireles was westbound on the highway when he drifted off the traffic lane onto the shoulder, the DPS reported. His car struck a parked tractor-trailer rig. The accident happened at 4:55 a.m.

Mireles was pronounced dead at the scene.

School, Hospital **Elections Slated**

Friona I.S.D.'s trustee election, as well as the Parmer County Hospital District's board election will be held Saturday, May 3, at the Friona Fire Station on Main Street.

Five candidates are seeking three seats on the school board. Candidates are Loraine Anthony, Donny Carthel, Joe Santellana, Randy Geries and Rickey Rector.

Carthel is an incumbent, and Mrs. Anthony was appointed last year to finish the unexpired term of Rick Carr.

Cumulative voting will be in place for the school board race. Each voter may (1) vote for three different candidates; (2) vote twice for one and once for another, or (3) cast all three votes for one candidate.

No City of Friona election will be held, under the special provision that if no seat is challenged, the election is called off and the candidates declared elected.

However, the Parmer Co. Hospital District is obliged to go through its election, although only the two incumbents, Danny Kendrick and Wendell Gresham are on the ballot.

Week's Moisture **Sets New Records**

The moisture received locally during the last week in April set some new records-and for a change, they were the kinds of records that farmers, lawn and garden buffs liked.

The 4.53 inches of moisture during a five-day period, April 23-27, was the most moisture measured since 4.56 inches of rain was received here during a six-day period in May of 1992.

The week's moisture pushed April's total to 6.16 inches, which may be a record for the month of April locally. It's definitely the most in the past ten years, for which monthly records are most readily available.

National Weather Service records show that for a 36-year period, 1962-96, the precipitation measured in Friona's official guage averaged .80 inches for the month of April. This turns out to be 5.36 inches less than was received for April, 1997.

Included in last week's moisture was seven inches of snow. Added to the 3/4 inch that was measured on April 12, it gave Friona 7.75 inches of snow for the month-which also might be a new record.

April's snowfall made the total snowfall for 1997 23.75 inches, and for the winterspring of 1996-97 a total of 27.75 inches. That's the most since a total snowfall of 30.5 inches was logged in the winter of 1991-92.

The biggest monthly total

moisture recorded at the Friona weather observation station prior to this April came in May of 1992, when a total of 5.63 inches was recorded.

This April's total of 6.16 inches compared to nary a trace of moisture in April of 1996. January-April's total locally is 8.76 inches, more than double the amount received in the first four months of any year in the past decade.

Two FHS Athletes Heading For State

Senior vaulter Andy Kendrick and sophomore hurdler Whitney Ellis are headed for the state track and field meet after their performances at last weekend's regional meet in Odessa.

Kendrick qualified for his fourth state meet, winning the pole vault event with his personal-best height of 15-6.
Miss Ellis placed second in the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 15.08 to earn a state meet invitation.

Kendrick narrowly missed out on qualifying in the triple jump. He led the field in the event preliminaries with his 45-9-1/2.

But the Chieftain star's

luck went sour in this event when the event winner edged ahead of him on his next-to-last jump. Then, the Coleman entrant, Sedrick Baker, made a leap of 45-11.25, less than two inches ahead of Andy. Kendrick had one last jump, and it might have been a winner, except that the judge ruled that he had just "scratched" on the jump "by a toenail."

Junior hurdler Quint Ellis placed fourth in the 110-meter finals, with a time of 15.12. Ellis' qualifying time was the second-best among the eight who advanced to the finals. "He was right in there at the tape," said Coach Sid Whitely. Only .36 seconds

separated the top four runners in the race. Ellis' time was 15.17.

Ellis, who also was an entrant in the 300-meter hurdles, failed to make the finals in that event, clocking a 43.6 time.

Friona's 400-meter relay team (Kendrick, Mario Pina, Aaron King and Ellis) qualified for the finals, but finished seventh with a time of 1:48.9. "We didn't have any blazing speed in this event--just a foursome that liked to run," Whitely said.

Thrower Charlie Milner placed sixth in the shot put with a best throw of 48-11. He also made the finals in the discus, but had to settle for seventh place with a toss of 148-9. Dimmitt's Charley Sanders won a state meet berth by placing second in the discus, and Milner had beaten the Bobcat in District. King was ninth overall in the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.3. Pina failed to gain the finals in the 200-meter race.

The Chieftains finished with 21 points in the meet, which was held in cold, rainy weather both Friday and Saturday.

Whiteley said that some of the marks were outstanding considering the weather, particularly Kendrick's pole vault.

Andy tied his personal and season best height by clearing 15-6. The event had some good competition. Kendrick started at the height of 13-6. He cleared that height, as well as 14-0, 14-6 and 15 feet without any trouble.

At that point, the select regional field had been trimmed to just two-Kendrick and T. J. Henderson of Clifton. Andy cleared 15-6 on his second try, and Henderson wasn't able to match that, and settled for second place.

Kendrick tried for 16-1, which would have been a new regional record, but this was just too much of a challenge on the wet, cold track.



Even daily use should not cause cataracts or retinal damage. The not-so-good news is that complaints about eye strain, blurry vision, headaches and neck pain are multiplying.

To keep a computer easier on the eyes, it's important that both eyes and screen be arranged for comfort.

A thorough eye examination is the first step. Even minor

A thorough eye examination is the first step. Even minor refractive errors, astigmatisms or imbalance between the eyes can cause pronounced discomfort at the computer. Properly fitted lenses-appropriate for vision 20 to 24 inches away--are the key to comfort.

Change focus every 15 minutes or so to rest the eyes.

The computer should be positioned so the center of the screen is 4 to 9 inches below eye level. Minimize glare by placing the computer at right angles to windows, rather than in front of them. Reduce room lighting. A screen filter or computer hood can help.



Parmer County Not Exempt From Child Abuse Problems

In Parmer County, there have been three child abuse cases reported within the last six months.

The 1990 Texas Census data suggests that 1,968,408 Texans age 18 and over were abused or neglected as children with 660,000 Texans receiving professional counsel-

adused of legisterial as receiving professional counseling as adults due to abuse and neglect.

How does this affect our society? Child abuse is costly for society. Victims of abuse are more likely to require tax-supported medical, legal, penal and social services. Victims of child abuse and neglect often fail to become productive members of society, are more likely to be in public assistance programs, have employment difficulties, mental health problems and overuse health care systems.

Abused and neglected

Abused and neglected children have higher rates of mental retardation, higher incidence of suicide, higher incidence of self-destructive behavior, low self esteem and an increased likelihood of becoming physically abusing

parents.

What can one person do to prevent child abuse?

"Change yourself"...Ask yourself how are you doing as a parent? Vow to learn one new thing about being a parent by reading or talking to other parents. Respect your family members. Use a courteous voice with them. Learn to apologize to your children when you are wrong. Make time to play together. Praise children and teens for being good, for doing the little things that are so easy to take for granted. Tell your children, "I love you" more often. Violence teaches violence. Forget about hitting your children.

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

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
