people not to buy contad people not to buy contact
lenses from vendors who do not require a prescription.
The warning follows a TDH investigation of vendors lenses at flea markets in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and in Amarillo.
vendors did not require a prescription, used unsanitary handling and storage
practices and offered little or no instruction about proper use and cleaning of the lenses.
Though the vendors were selling primarily non-powered, tinted len than cosmetic purposes, state and federal laws require a written practitioner before contact to consumers.
