AN ARRAY OF FLYING SAUCERS landed in a field north of Friona 25 years ago. So what's all this hype about a couple of space craft that crashed on a ranch north of Roswell, New Mexico 50 years ago this week?

Several thousand outer-space fans converged on Roswell this past week to celebrate this UFO event that the Air Force claims never happened. It was reported in the Roswell newspaper in July 1947 that the military had captured a flying saucer. Then the next day, Army Air Corps officials recinded the claim.

About six months after that, in January 1948, my family moved to Roswell, New Mexico where we lived until 1953. During the entire time that we lived there, I never heard word one about any of this. Of course, I was just a kid back then, and was more concerned with how to pass geography class without studying, or how many chores I would have to do before I could go to the movies. And then I failed to keep in touch with former friends in Roswell after we moved away from there.

Still, if anyone had talked about flying saucers landing in that area, with bodies of little outer-space men strewn around the countryside, I believe it would have captured my youthful imagination and I would have remembered it.

The terms UFO, extra-terrestrial, and close encounters had not been invented at that time. But there was a lot of interest in flying saucers and little green men from Mars.

In the ensuing 50 years, the Air Force has spent about \$10 billion investigating UFOs. They now contend that the small bodies found at the Roswell crash site were actually crash dummies being dropped for test purposes. Never mind the fact that such dummy drops did not take place until sometime in the 1950s. With what we know in the 90s about governmental honesty in such matters, you can be sure they are covering up something. We just may never know what it is they're hiding.

Anyway, the folks in Roswell are having a lot of fun with it and the extra tourist dollars from this week's events are sure to be a big boost to their economy. It was

Well, I'm sure you know the type of winds we have around here in the spring. The day of the flying saucer event in Friona turned out to be windier than a fifty-pound bag of whistling lips. But, still it would have been okay if the pilot had dropped the paper plates just south of Main Street and allowed them to drift back up into the center of town. Instead, he dropped the plates too soon and they all ended up in Tommy Jones' corn field just north of Main. Everybody hopped in their cars and drove out to the field and let their little kids out to tromp through the corn to retrieve the numbered "flying saucers" just as if it was an Easter egg hunt.

No one was very happy about the way it all turned out, so that's probably why you've never heard much about "the day the flying saucers landed in a field north of Friona."

Wheat Harvest **Gains Momentum**

Parmer County's wheat harvest had reached or approached the half-way point as of Wednesday afternoon, the Friona Star learned.

Dryland wheat in the Friona area averaged around 35 bushels to the acre, according to Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers. "We've had some

Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers. "We've had some 40 to 50-bushel dryland wheat, but there also have been some yields which were lower than the growers had anticipated," Smiley said.

Friona area farmers had gotten into their irrigated wheat by Wednesday. "I think there will be some 60 and 70-bushel irrigated wheat before we're through," Smiley said.

The late freeze, as well as hailstorms hampered what could have been a bumper crop.

Wheat harvest in the Rhea elevator was also around 50 percent complete on Wednesday.

Joe Allen, manager of th Sherley Grain's Rhea elevator, said the dryland wheat was averaging from 25 to 30 bushels per acre, with some yields better. The dryland wheat seemed to be averaging 50 bushels.

"This week will knock a big hole in the crop, and

"This week will knock a big hole in the crop, and by this time next week we could be finished," said Allen. The longtime elevator manager said that it had been a smooth harvest to date, with the main problem being a shortage of combines for a time

Helen Potts: Resident Of Rhea For All Of 85 Years

The 20-mile drive to Helen Potts place is over a two-lane blacktop and a few miles of dirt roads. On my drive out a few days back I tried to visualize what this countryside must have looked like 80 years ago.

The blacktop wasn't there. Neither were the dirt roads. Back then there wasn't anything to drive except a wagon.

wasn't anything to drive except a wagon.
In 1912, nobody climbed telephone poles, much less called 911. About the only thing I could see that might have been around in those days were fences, cattle, crops, and a few farmhouses.
Helen Potts was born Helen Schlenker on July 17, 1912. She was the youngest of 11 children of Charles and Millie Schlenker. The oldest Schlenker child, Floyd, was 20-years-old when Helen was born.

She will be 85-years-old on July 17. For all of those 85 years she has lived right here on this same farm in the Rhea Community.

She was born in the original house papa Charlie Schlenker built less than a mile away when he came to this territory from Iowa in 1906.

Papa Charlie sent one of the older boys by horseback to fetch a mid-wife named Mrs. A. H. Carnes who lived a few miles away, just over in New Mexico. He wrote a check to Mrs. Carnes for \$10 for assisting baby Helen into the world.

Helen still has the check.

It hangs on her hall wall as one of many memories she

one of many memories she cherishes.

The family didn't travel much in those days, but when they did Helen says they simply went straight across the pastures since there were no roads.

or orads.

She says her daddy traveled at the time dealing in livestock and managing the 1,777 acres of farmland. He hauled hogs by train as far away as Kansas City and Los Angeles.

About 3/4-mile from their house there was a trail used mostly by homesteaders bound for New Mexico. Papa Charlie placed a big rock along the trail to mark his place to turn toward their house.

Helen remembers one

Helen remembers one winter a group of homesteaders knocked on their door asking for shelter from an extreme winter blizzard.

Being a good Christian family, papa and momma Schlenker took them in. Helen says it turned out to be close to 20 people and they stayed for several days before the weather cleared.

Once, her daddy had too many hogs and needed to get rid of a few. He put a sign by the rock on the homesteaders trail, offering mogs for sale." No one left the trail.

Finally, she says, with

the hog population on the increase, papa Charlie changed the sign to read "hogs for free." The traveling settlers soon took advantage of the bargain.

To entertain themselves, the children often played mumbleypeg, jacks, Annie over, or rode the family donkey, Bobby.

Meanwhile Mama Millie was busy baking 21 loaves of bread a week and trying to manage a family of one husband, 11 kids, and several "cowboy hired hands".

Papa farmed and raised hogs and cattle. In addition to meat and money, the cattle provided the family with a necessary commodity in the winter. Cow chips to burn for heat.

Seems another product Parmer County lacked 80 years ago was trees for firewood through a long, (Continued On Page 5)

65 Yrs Ago-July 8, 1932
Several weeks ago, Mayor Reeve called a meeting of any and all male citzens of Friona who would be willing to enlist in a volunteer fire department for Friona. It is painful to relate that not one man responded to the call, yet it appears that practically all of our people are strongly in favor of Friona having a fire department.

55 Yrs Ago-July 3, 1942
Sometime last Tuesday, a long and fairly comfortable bench was placed by someone in front of the Friona Post Office, for the convenience of those who have the spare time to loiter there. The ladies of Friona and the surrounding community are protesting the presence of the bench, as during the busy harvest season many of the wives or daughters come for the mail and they claim that there are already too many men loafing there to stare at

them. The bench, they feel, invites more loafers.

45 Yrs Ago-July 3, 1952
Early signing of the right-to-way easements is necessary to expedite construction of the rural telephone line mapped for this area, Leo Forrest of Hereford has explained. Miss Mary Reeve is working on the project in the Rhea community. Contract for the construction of the lines is hoped for by July 30.

40 Yrs Ago-July 3, 1957
Contracts were let this week to Kerr and Middleton of Lubbock for constructing additional farm-to-market roads in Parmer County. Two projects are involved. One is from FM Road 690 at Oklahoma Lane south and southwest to the Bailey County line, where it will join another paved road already existing. The other will link Rhea with the two FM pavements running north of

Bovina and west of Friona. The combined length of the two projects is about 14

miles.



Helen remembers that their Helen remembers that their pond up the road, which they called Boney, froze hard enough in the winter the kids would all skate on it with their shoes. Papa Charlie was the only one that had skates and he would join in the family fun at the

Helen thinks the weather has definitely gotten warmer over the years. The pond at Boney doesn't freeze over for skating anymore.

They called the pond Boney because of the bones of cows that were there in abundance as cows became sick or starved, and died for a variety of reasons.

a variety of reasons.

Cow bones littered the edges of the pond. Sometimes, wagons would come by and papa would sell them the bones to haul away.

While they do not use the pond for water supply anymore, it is still there and the family still refers to the area as Ropey.

there and the family still refers to the area as Boney.

Boney was an important part of the Schlenker family life in the early years. Papa built a wagon to haul water up to the house and it was the kids job to bring it.

Once, Helen says momma sent two of the older kids to bring water.

When they didn't return she sent

When they didn't return, she sent two more to check on them. They still didn't come back so she sent

two more.
She finally ran out of kids so she went to check on them herself. Turns out the boys had shot and killed an antelope and the whole clan was dressing it to bring home for food.

The family diet was basic in the 1910s and '20s and '30s. In addition to a lot of bread, they had red beans, potatoes, watermelon, squash, tomatoes, green beans, and

Papa would kill a cow for beef Papa would kill a cow for beet in the winter and hang it on the north side of the house to keep frozen. Hogs were killed too and much of the ham and bacon was dried and cured to carry them through the summer without refrigeration.

Since chickens didn't like to

Since chickens didn't like to Since chickens didn't like to lay as many eggs in the winter, momma collected eggs in the summer and preserved them in brine, a mixture of salt, lime, and water. She kept them in big jars of the brine and stored them in the cellar for use during winter months.

Helen attended school in the Brea Community, until her junior.

Helen attended school in the Rhea Community until her junior year when she had to go to Friona to complete her education.

Lack of transportation forced her to live in Friona during the week. She lived in the old Maurer Building at the south end of Main Street with a girlfriend from Rhea and several teachers who also lived in the rooming house.

in the rooming house.

She did housekeeping and odd jobs to "earn her keep." The old Maurer building is still there. She and her friends walked to high school which was located where the elementary and junior high schools

She was able to go home to the farm on many weekends. She remembers graduating in 1932 after completing the 11th grade, the highest grade at the time.

In 1933, a young man named Cordie Potts from the nearby Hollene Community of New Mexico came over to work for papa Charlie. The four or five cowboys he employed lived upstairs in the old family place, and took their meals with the family.

Cordie Potts was born August

Cordie Potts was born August 7, 1911. He was one year older than Helen. Over the next few years, Cordie and Helen fell in love and on May 29, 1938, they were married at the homeplace by Reverend I. E. Biggs, the Methodist minister in Bovina.

Attending the ceremony were their parents and Cordie's three little sisters. Cordie had a truck, so they borrowed his brother's car for a one-week honeymoon trip to Fort Worth and Dallas.

They lived in a two-room house next door to her parents.

house next door to her parents. While Cordie continued to work for Mr. Schlenker, Helen earned \$18 per month per man from her dad to cook for the cowboys.

In 1939, one year after they were married, papa Schlenker died. They moved back over into the main house with her mother and cared for her until she died 13 years later at the age of 97.

Cordie and Helen purchased the home place. Over time they added on to it and raised three children there. Daughter Marilyn Ridley now lives in Clovis.

Son Larry lives next door in

Son Larry lives next door in the house that still contains the two rooms Cordie and Helen lived in several rooms that have been

Youngest son Jay lives about a mile away and farms Helen's land now, the same land Grandfather Charlie purchased in 1906 and on which he lived, worked, and raised

which he lived, worked, and raised his family.

Speaking of family, Helen came from a family of 11 and Cordie from a family of 10. In addition to their three children, today Helen has 8 grandchildren, one great grandchild, and "two greats on the way."

In a bit of irony, years after they met, Cordie and Helen discovered that both had been delivered by the same mid-wife, Mrs. A. H. Carnes.

Cordie Potts died January 29, 1996. He and Helen had been married 57 years and spent their entire married life on the farm where Helen was born.

Cordie served 18 years on the Friona School Board and was 1/2 owner in the Ford dealership in

wner in the Ford dealership in

In 1962 they thought about moving into Friona. Cordie and Oscar Baxter had purchased a Ford dealership in Farwell in 1958 and moved it to Friona to join with

their Ford Tractor dealership. It was the first Ford car the was the first Ford car dealership in Friona and forerunner of Friona Motors. Oscar Baxter's son John is still employed at Friona Motors where he has sold cars for over 25 years.

With two teenage boys the Potts' reckoned living in the country would be better for them. So they jacked up the old house, moved it over a few feet and lived in it while they built the new house over the existing basement. An article and picture of the old house were featured in the June 14, 1962 Friona Star.

Today life is good at Helen Potts' place. She still enjoys "cooking for cowboys" as her son-in-law and grandson take care of her cattle now.

She paints as a hobby. One painting in her house is of the Escabada, which was the old XIT Ranch headquarters building not far from the Schlenker farm. She said she had painted the Escabada 36 times for friends and family.

Hanging over an antique desk is a small painting she did of the original house.

Sunday afternoons are reserved for playing games with 10-year-old grandson Ty Potts. They play dominoes, chickenfoot, and card

games.

The game table in front of the two large den windows looks out at the back yard flanked by a big barn which according to a date whittled in the floor, was built in 1926.

Helen Schlenker Potts has logged many a mile around that backyard and up and down the road to Ponew.

to Boney.


After all, she has lived right



On the other hand, whisper words like "pizza", "rent a video", or "rugrats" and their hearing intensity can pick up the sound from behind a solid wood closed door.

The two phrases "don't slam the door" and "fold up your towel" have never been heard by a human being under 18.

Having a boy and a girl may be okay for a mom. Boys don't take much upkeep. They don't require nail polish, play makeup, or have ponytails.

Boys don't need clean clothes or shoelaces that are tied. They don't require hair spray, socks, or frequent

bathing. Boys are good for a summertime dad.



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




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

In recent years, the ship has been restored to its original splendor and is permanently on display as a museum in the Long Beach Harbor.



"Blue Boy" (1770) and the equally famous "Pinkie" by Thomas Lawrence (1794).



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
