It's Chieftains vs Perryton For District 1-AAA Title

How many "big games" can a team have in district? Quite a few, apparently.

The latest one takes place in far-off Perryton Saturday. Kickoff time is 2:30 p.m.

For the second week in a row, the Chieftains meet a team who, like themselves, are unbeaten in district play. This game will be for "all the marbles" as far as Friona is concerned.

And unfortunately, they will meet a Ranger team which has completely turned their program around from last season when they visited Friona. The Chieftains won that game, 54-21 enroute to winning the district title.

This season, the team is sparked by senior tailback Allan Adkison (5-11,170), who has scored ten touchdowns and averaged over 200 yards per game in Perryton's last three games, which the Rangers have put into the "win" column.

Adkison missed Perryton's first three games due to disciplinary action following a "hazing" incident that caused several players to be removed from the team in '96.

Showing that he has "hit his stride" is the fact that in the past three weeks Adkison has edged ahead of Friona's Matt Kendrick as the area's class 3A leading scorer (108 to 96 points), and in yards gained rushing (1146 to 1145). The Ranger star is averaging 8.7 yards per carry

on 132 carries, which Kendrick is close with 8.2 yards-per-carry, on 141 carries.

Adkison has carried the ball an average of 26 times per game, while Kendrick has carried for only 18 times per game. His figures have been somewhat lower due to the fact that he gave way to a back-up player early in several games. This was particularly true when Matthew scored four TDs, and gained 132 yards on only eight carries in Friona's 45-6 win at Muleshoe.

Perryton's district scores have been (Rangers listed first) PHS 49, Tulia 7; PHS 13, River Road 10; PHS 41, Muleshoe 18 and PHS 49, Dalhart 26. Friona's scores may be found on page 7 of this issue.

Perryton Broadcast Is Planned Sat.

Friona High School's vital district game at Perryton Saturday afternoon will be broadcast live on KPAN and KPAN-FM of Hereford. Kickoff time is 2:30 p.m.

KPAN-AM is located at 860 on the dial, and KPAN-FM is at 106.3.

Clint Mears and Mike Hutson will handle the play-by-play duties.

Coach Morton said that the Chieftains have had a good work week. "We enjoyed having the "extra day" due to the Saturday schedule. We have had some nagging injuries, and this allowed some of them to heal somewhat," Morton said.

"The kids are focused. They realize that this game is for

the district title," the coach added.

Friona has never won district titles two consecutive years. They've never won three titles in four years. They've never started a season 9-0.

These are just some of the goals in mind when Friona visits Perryton. It's the first time Friona has visited Perryton for a football game. Besides last year's game at Friona, the 1986 Chieftains met the Rangers in a bi-district playoff game at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo, and scored an exciting 14-10 win--the school's first football playoff win.

The success of the United Way campaign depends on the generosity of the citizens of Friona, and you will be contacted during the 1997 Telethon scheduled for November 3.

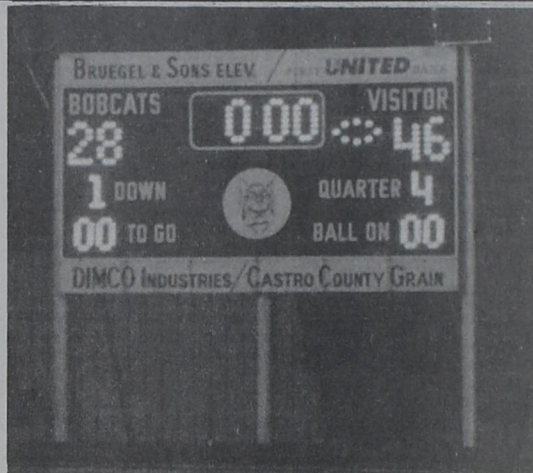
"We want to thank you in advance for your donations and pledges," a spokesman for the United Way concluded.

Not to worry. The Chieftains are tough, versatile, and on a roll. Chiefs 48, Rangers 14.

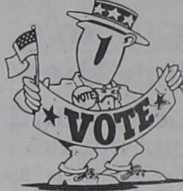

County Treasurer, Mrs. Minnie O. Aldridge, reports that Parmer County has recently recovered \$25,000 of the funds lost by the county through the failure of a Farwell bank during the year 1921. Of this amount, \$18,531 has already been returned to the county by the state. This amount has been divided among the various county and school funds in proportion to the amount lost by each. Friona-\$514.00, Bovina \$763.92, Farwell-\$798.66, District No. 15-\$202.62, and Common Schools \$351.83.

65 Yrs. Ago-Nov. 4 1932
There is a proposed amendment to the state constitution to be voted on next Tuesday making it constitutional for the state legislature, if it chooses to do so, to elect to hold a Texas Centennial honoring the pioneer days of Texas's early history.

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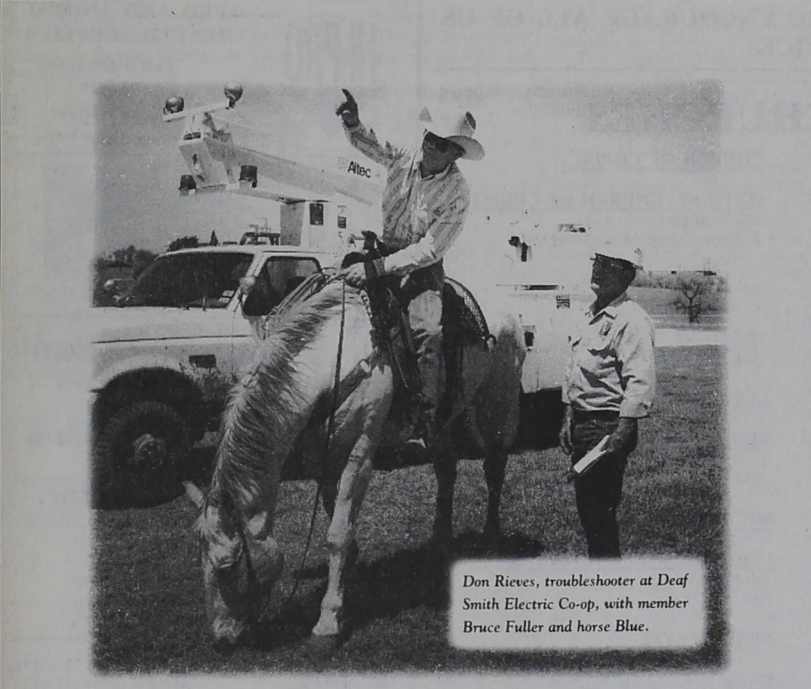
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Out Here

"Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism.

The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for AA membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions.

AA is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy, neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety."

"Norman, I liked you better when you were drinking!" declared an old pal who was feeling no pain. "That makes us even," replied Norman, "when I was drinking, I liked you better too."

It is an old joke. One of many that are told in AA meeting halls around the world every day. AA members are big on humor.

The preamble at the top of the column is read by a group leader to open every AA meeting that is held anywhere in the world.

And they are held often. Morning, noon, and night. In non-stop cities like Las Vegas, there are many meetings held between 2 a.m. and 6 a.m. in the city that never sleeps.

Old timers in the AA program say that alcohol never sleeps either. It is described in the group's Big Book as "cunning, baffling, and powerful."

Tobacco's evils have been shouted about by self-appointed non-smoking zealots for some time now. State governments found a pot of gold at the end of a brown rainbow. The tobacco companies are ponying up large doses of cash under the guise of reimbursing states for medical costs caused by

smoking tobacco.

Yet you can find many people across America, from any walk of life, who will argue that alcohol does more damage, destroys more lives, careers, and families, and kills people in much more tragic ways than does smoke.

There are experts who claim that if alcohol was listed as the cause of death everytime it was involved, the number of alcohol-related deaths would surpass tobacco.

Think of the car accident victims, murder victims, drownings, boat accidents, plane crashes, and liver failures, just to name a few.

When an innocent victim is killed in a car crash by a drunken driver, alcohol is not listed on the death certificate as a cause of death.

A robbery victim killed for money died from a gunshot wound, not because of the alcohol short circuiting the killer's brain.

Some debates have flared up recently as to whether alcohol addiction can be cured without the 12-step AA program.

Maybe you remember a woman named Susan Powder. She burst on the scene a few years ago with the slogan "Stop The Insanity." It was a weight loss, exercise program.

Powder herself lost over 100 pounds, and capitalized on her short white haircut and screeching

delivery to sell weight loss products and video workout tapes.

She became a millionaire and then faded into bankruptcy. She says now that she was an alcoholic, is now a recovering alcoholic, and has developed some food supplements which help keep you from being an alcoholic.

See, she discovered that most alcoholics do not eat normally (which is true, but she didn't discover it) and if drunks and potential drunks will take 30-40 of her pills per day, they will become un-alcoholics.

She has been on TV talk shows and will probably sell enough of her pills to become a millionaire again. It is easy to take advantage of the weakness of over-eaters and over-drinkers.

US News magazine had a long report on some new tests of a controlled drinking program, once again trying to figure out a way for alcoholics to drink like a normal person, without all the attendant problems that go along with being drunk every time.

Therein is the conflict which makes AA members smile as they share their experiences in countless meetings. The quest to drink like a normal person.

They call it denial, and recite Step One of the AA Program: "We realized that we were powerless over

alcohol and that our lives had become unmanageable."

Simply put, it is not possible for an alcoholic to drink in a controlled fashion. Indeed, a "good" alcoholic prefers uncontrolled drinking, and has no control of the consequences.

Alcoholism is a disease, they say. A disease for which there is no cure. No way has yet been discovered for an alcoholic to drink.

It is a progressive disease. They say that means even if you stop for some period of time, then start again, the results will be the same as though you had been drinking all along.

This too has been proven in millions of test cases. I've talked with many AA members about the AA program and their personal experiences.

Some of their stories are both tragic and funny. But all agree there is nothing funny about alcohol.

In the weeks ahead, I will be sharing some of their stories with you, as well as a look at the AA program and how it works.

It seems to be a simple program. As one member said, "We tell them (newcomers) if you don't drink you won't get drunk. And I had sure rather stay sober than try to get sober."

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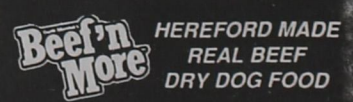

REMAIN UNBEATEN AT 8-0

Chiefs Whip Bobcats; Remain Atop District

The Indian Summer weather cooperated nicely. Kickoff temperature was in the 60s. Had the game kicked off 24 hours later, the chill factor was around or below zero.

The weather may not have been a big factor for anyone except the fans. It seemed that the Chieftains went to Dimmitt with one thing in mind: to beat the Bobcats.

Friona achieved their goal, by a score of 46-28. If you saw the game, you know that the Chieftains could have (and probably should have) had two more TDs, and around 60 points.

The Chiefs led in first downs, 29-16, and in total yardage, 455-290.

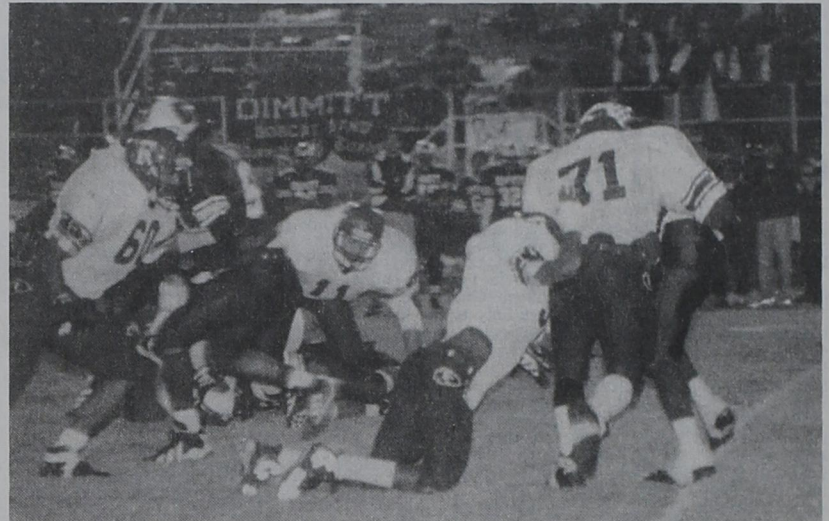
Although Dimmitt's quarterback, Erik Buckley did show why he's the leading passer in the district (on yardage), the Chieftain defense shut him down 'way below his average, allowing only four completions of 14 attempts. Friona intercepted Buckley three times. If fact, safety Aaron King was Buckley's "second leading receiver" with two INTs.

The Charging Chieftains sacked Buckley three times (Cecil Cooper two and Quint Ellis one); had two other tipped balls, and several "hurrys." Cornerback James Evans should have had a fourth interception, as a Buckley toss hit him right between the numbers. Not expecting to be the primary receiver, Evans dropped the ball.

Friona surprised the Bobcats, the fans, and even the reporters trying to keep pace by coming out with a "no-huddle" offensive attack after taking the opening kickoff.

The Chiefs ran five or six plays without a huddle, moving from their own 30 to the Dimmitt 38. What finally slowed their opening drive down at all was, of all things, a delay of game penalty prior to their seventh play.

This didn't deter Friona, as their offensive line kept opening holes, and their stable of running backs kept

charging through them.

All four backfield men contributed gains, and senior Daniel Cuevas charged in from 11 yards out for the game's first score. The point-tiry was blocked, but Friona had taken the lead at 6-0 just 4:59 into the fray. The Chieftains never relinquished the lead.

Cooper crashed through his protection to sack Buckley on Dimmitt's second play. The DHS signal-caller's throw on third down wasn't close, bringing up a fourth down.

Friona wasn't the only team dealing with lofty snaps from center, as the

Bobcat center snapped the ball over his punter's head. The defense tackled him at the Dimmitt 17, giving Friona a golden opportunity.

The Chieftains have profited greatly from turnovers throughout the season, and this one was no different. Four plays later, from the six, Cuevas ran into the end zone untouched. King tossed a pass to Jeff

Hamilton for a two-pointer.

Friona's usual capacity crowd went wild, as the scoreboard read "Visitors 14, Home 0."

The 'Cats managed a couple of first downs on their second possession, but Friona's "D" stiffened and a fourth down screen pass left Dimmitt four yards short of a first down.

King hit a wide-open Matt Kendrick over the middle on the first down play, and Kendrick, getting a couple of downfield blocks, rambled 52 yards to the Bobcat 16-yard line.

On the first play of the second quarter, King faked a pass, then rolled out, pitched the ball to Kendrick at the last minute, and Kendrick raced into the end zone. A high snap foiled the PAT, but Friona's lead had become 20-0.

Dimmitt finally managed a drive on their third attempt. Buckley ran and passed the Bobcats 73 yards in eight plays. He kept the ball four times for 36 yards, and passed for another first

down. Buckley got the TD from eight yards out, and the kick got Dimmitt on the scoreboard at 20-7 with 9:14 left in the half.

The Chieftains seemed to be heading for their fourth score in four tries when Kendrick ran 21 yards and King added ten.

FHS fans roared when King arched a beautiful pass that a streaking Angel Vega caught in full stride, and it looked like a 26-7 lead. But officials threw a flag, charging the Chiefs with holding, and brought the play back.

On the next play, no doubt rattled by the callback, King didn't notice Dimmitt linebacker Jerry Thomas, who intercepted his pass and ran it 35 yards to the Friona nine. Running back Beau Hill scored two plays later, and suddenly the score became FHS 20, DHS 14.

The penalty/callback, coupled with the Dimmitt interception had resulted in a

*Friona has outscored eight opponents, 93-10 in the first quarter, and 116-33 in the second, for a total score at the halftime of 206-43 (an average of 26-5).

*The 8-0 start ties the best ever at FHS. The 1963 Chieftains ran up an 8-0 mark before losing to Muleshoe and Olton in their last two games. Friona has never had a 9-0 season mark, and neither have they had a 10-0 regular season record.

14-point swing, as the score could have been FHS 26/7, DHS 7.

The Chieftains didn't let this rattle them. They set out on a 81-yard drive, sparked by gains by Kendrick (9, 3, 4, 14 and 4), Cuevas, 15, King, 12, and a 13-yard pass from King to tight end Quint Ellis.

Kendrick got the TD on a four-yard slant, and Vega's kick gave Friona a 27-14 lead with just 2:09 left in the half. Time enough for scores by both teams.

King made up for his interception a few minutes earlier by stepping front of a Buckley aerial at his own 45, and running it back 40 yards to the Dimmitt 15. On first down, Kendrick broke three tackles and crossed the goal-line standing up. Vega's second kick gave Friona a 34-14 lead with 1:06 left on the clock.

Friona might have started their halftime celebration a bit early, as Buckley hit a streaking S. Sutton for a 59-yard TD play. Ellis looked to be ready to hit Buckley, but somehow went past the QB who then delivered the strike. That tightened the game back up somewhat, 34-21 at the half.

The Chiefs came out in the third quarter with their same "mind set" as they started with in the first quarter. The defense forced a punt, and the punt rush caused a high kick only to the Friona 46.

Friona drove to the Dimmitt 12, but a holding penalty helped stop the threat. Dimmitt used another long pass to cut into the lead, but it was too little, too late.

Texas Alcohol Awareness Program For Minors Amended

Alcoholic Beverage Code 106.115 (amended) Attendance at Alcohol Awareness Course, License Suspension Effective 09/01/97

It's 10 p.m., do you know where your children are? was a popular saying a few years back. To parents of teenagers it could be an inconvenient, expensive thought.

Parents, all adults, and teens need to be aware of stricter amended laws concerning the possession or purchase of alcohol by minors, according to Police Chief Randy Gerries and Municipal Judge Eddie Mays.

The entire analysis of changes to the alcoholic beverage code adopted by the 75th Legislative Session covers some six pages.

Both Chief Gerries and Judge Mays emphasized that a renewed and stricter enforcement of the laws governing minors and alcohol is in effect in Friona.

Here are key highlights from the amended laws:

***Sale of alcohol to a minor** is a class A misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed \$4,000; confinement in jail for a term not to exceed one year; or both such fine and confinement.

***Consumption of alcohol by a minor** is a class C misdemeanor for the first and second offense.

1st Offense-fine up to \$500, 8-12 hours community service related to education about or prevention of misuse of alcohol, 30-day license suspension and attendance in a TCADA approved alcohol awareness course.

2nd offense-fine up to \$500, 20-40 hours community service related to education about the prevention of misuse of alcohol, 60-day license suspension and alcohol awareness course optional at discretion of court.

3+ offenses-fine from \$250-\$2,000, confinement in jail up to 180 days, 180 day license suspension and alcohol awareness course optional at

discretion of court.

The minor is not eligible for deferred adjudication if he has been convicted two (2) or more times.

It is now an affirmative defense that the alcohol was consumed in the visible presence of the minor's adult parent, guardian, or spouse.

***Possession of alcohol by a minor** is a class C misdemeanor for the first and second offense.

Punishments for 1st, 2nd, and 3+ offenses for possession are the same as those above for consumption.

The punishment range for 3+ offenses in both categories applies to a person under 21 years of age and is 17 years of age or older and has been previously convicted at least two times for an offense under the section.

Persons under the age of 17 who have been convicted at least twice for an offense under the section would be adjudicated under the Family Code.

***Purchase of alcohol for a minor; furnishing alcohol to a minor**, is a class B misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$2,000, confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 180 days; or both such fine and confinement.

***Driving under the influence of alcohol by a minor:** A minor commits an offense if the minor operates a motor vehicle in a public place with any detectable amount of alcohol in the minor's system.

Punishment under this violation range from \$500-\$2,000, 20-60 hours community service related to education about or prevention of misuse of alcohol, and jail confinement up to 180 days.

At the present time, alcohol awareness courses are held in Lubbock and Amarillo at a cost ranging from \$30 to \$50.

If the defendant is younger than 18 years of age, the court may require the parent or guardian to attend the course with the defendant.

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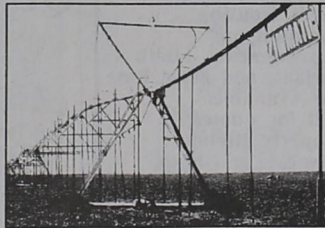
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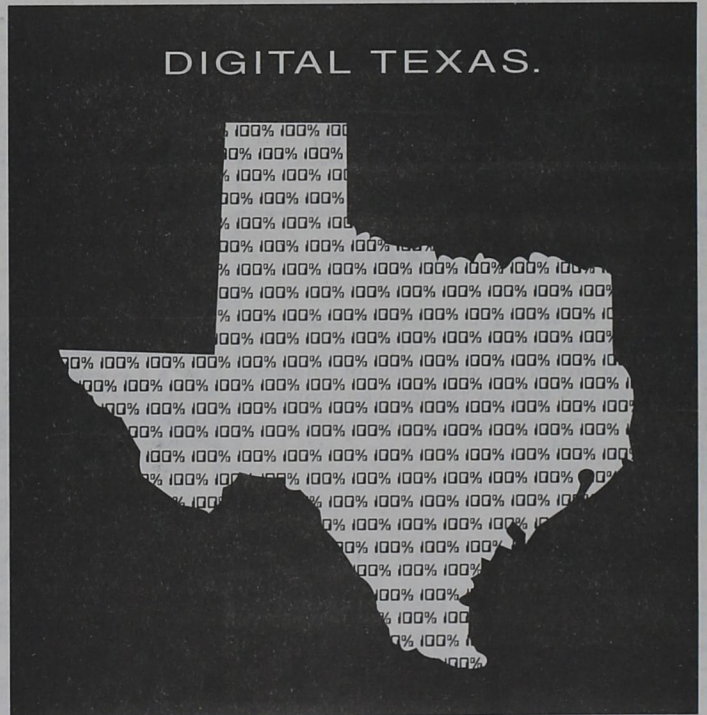

The club members present brought old photographs and told interesting facts about them.

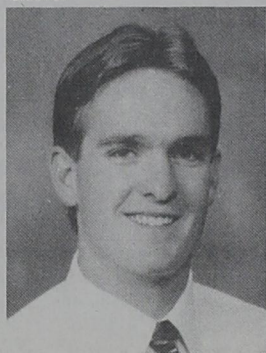

Local EMS Notes Major Changes

According to paramedic director Dana Hendrix, there have been major changes in the rules and regulations pertaining to EMS. One change has to do with public awareness and education.

There are different levels of EMS certification and according to Hendrix, Friona is fortunate to have trained personnel at all major EMS levels on staff and in the community.

The basic entry levels for EMS volunteers are Emergency Care Attendants (ECA) and Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Both are trained in trauma and administration of certain medications. This level requires 120 hours of instruction.

The next level is EMT Intermediate which requires 200 hours of instruction. Training includes admin-

istration of certain drugs, use of an automatic defibrillator for cardiac problems, and use of automatic airway maintenance.

The next and most advanced level is the Paramedic. To reach paramedic certification, EMT's must complete 800-1000 hours of school as well as clinical hours of advanced ambulances and on-site training in hospitals, from ICU to emergency room.

Part of the training deals with advanced cardiac care, administration of most drugs, and reading and interpreting all cardiac strips and EKGs.

According to Hendrix, Friona enjoys community volunteers at all levels of the above certifications as well as modern equipment which allows for advanced care in time of need.

YOUR EYES

Dyslexia

Also known as "Specific Reading Disability," dyslexia occurs in children with normal or superior intelligence. The symptoms usually include difficulty interpreting written language, making reading very difficult.

If by the first or even second grade, your child does not seem to grasp the basics of reading, it will be necessary to have vision, hearing and neurological examinations to discern that the poor reading ability is not due to another disorder. Not grasping the basics of reading could include reversal of letters ("b" for "d") or reversal of words ("saw" for "was").

Your first step should be a visit to your optometrist. That way, if there is a vision-related problem, the eye doctor can treat it with corrective lenses, vision training or a combination of both. Difficulty with reading can be the result of immature eye muscles causing poor eye coordination.
