

CHIEFS NOW 6-0 IN DISTRICT **Chiefs Bring Home Scalp Number 9 From Perryton**

The Chieftains won the toss, and took the wind rather than the ball. It turned out to be a good decision

It looked as though Friona would drive for a touchdown on their first possession, which would have been the seventh time in nine games. Matthew Kendrick had four good runs, including a 12-yard burst around right end with a pitchout, to set up a first and goal for the Chieftains at the Peryton three. Here, the team discovered that their opponents had come to play for the title as well. Two cracks at the line

Two cracks at the line yielded no yardage, and then on the third down play Friona was flagged 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct. One of the Chiefs' linemen had performed a head-butt on his opponent, and it didn't go unnoticed. The penalty moved the ball back to the 18, and Angel Vega lined up to kick what would ordinarily have been an easy, although 34-yard field goal. Vega was the first to learn that the gusting wind would cause the ball to act very strangely. Although plenty long enough, the wind blew Vega's kick just wide to the left. The team learned the hard way that they might as well go for the yardage on close calls on fourth down. The Rangers used the break to drive 48 yards in nine plays for a touchdown. Big Allan Adkison took a pitchout and then bulled his

The Ranger kicker's PAT kick went wide, and Friona held onto the lead at 7-6. On Friona's next possession, the Chieftains faced another fourth and one plays from their own 29. Kendrick burst up the middle, found himself in the open, and only a TD-saving tackle by Perryton's Brian Gibert saved the day for the Rangers. The score at the half stayed 7-6. Friona fumbled on their second play of the third quarter, and Perryton had a golden opportunity at the Friona 29. However, good defensive plays by Rudy Torres (50), Cecil Cooper (68) and Luis Ramirez (55) forced Perryton to try a field goal. 

Beet Growers Eye Bumper '97 Crop

Sugar beet harvesters are lifting high yields from fields as north as Dalhart, as far south as Plainview and west all the way to Clovis, New Mexico. And with harvest about one-third completed, growers and Holly Sugar Corp. feel this year's crop could be one of the best in recent years.

Corp. feel this year's crop could be one of the best in recent years. The Kenneth Frye of Hereford, president of the Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association headquartered in Hereford, says approximately 18,000 sugar beet acres will be harvested in the Pan-handle-Eastern New Mexico oregion this year by some 350 growers. That compares to about 14,000 acres harvested in 1996. Dennis Printz, agricultural manager for Holly's Hereford processing plant, adds that when harvest is completed, yields are expected to averae in the 21 to 25 tons range. Sugar content is anticipated to finish in the 14 to 15 per cent range, he says. "We have seen an increase in production in the area," says Frye. "Farmers in Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman counties will harvest about 6,000 acres of beets this year, compared to about 1,500 acres in 1996. We expect those numbers to increase substantially for the 1998 crop. And we also anticipate an increase in production throughout the remainder of the region."

Reasons behind the increase in beet acres include the fact that sugar beets can be grown using less water than other irrigated field crops. "Our work with growers and studies by the Texas Agricultural Extension Station in Bushland indicate that by using LEPA (low energy precision application) irrigation, growers can obtain good production using 30-40 per cent less water," says Printz.

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Frye says more and more sugar beets are an ophic fits into corn, cotton, grain sorghum and wheat availability of new over-the-by herbicides for use on weed control measures we've ever that before," he says. Efforts are also underway to produce higher quality sugar beet seed hybrids which have greater disease resistance. "Joint efforts by Holly Hybrids and Hilleshog division of Novartis seed are aimed at developing hybrids specifically for our production area," says Printz. Seedex, another sugar beet seed company, has also seen promising results in its regional seed research.

Sugar prices still remain strong this fall and area growers will receive an 80 per cent initial payment from Holly. Overall payments to regional growers from Holly will be in the \$15 million to \$20 million range for this vear's crop.

\$20 million range for this year's crop. "Sugar beets offer us as strong of a return per acre as any crop we produce," says Frye, "plus we have a guaranteed market for the crop through Holly. Those are other reasons why sugar beets are a good alternative crop."

Other Economic Benefits Holly processes beets into refined sugar sold under the Holly and other food manufacturer names. Major customers include Gerber, General Mills and other large food manufacturers which demand the high quality sugar that Holly produces in Hereford.

Every year Holly pays about \$700,000 in school, county and hospital taxes. It spends about \$16 million on materials needed to operate the plant, and much of that is with area businesses.

Texas is the only state that produces both sugar beets and sugarcane, grown in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. Overall, the sweetener industry provides more than 13,200 Texas jobs. With the addition of the corn sweetener industry, there is \$876 million in economic activity from the industry in Texas.



Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B). The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay. Influenza and pneu-mococcal vaccines will be available. The vaccinations are available at the WIC Office, 704 Main St. in Friona, on Friday, November 21 from 10 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3:45 p.m. Vaccinations will also be administered at the EMS Office, 109 Third Street in Bovina on Monday, November 10 from 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

week, clean them with an enzyme solution. Kinse with distilled water, never tap water. More fragile soft lenses must be cleaned each day with a surface cleaner especially designed for soft lenses. Disinfect them either daily with a disinfecting solution or every other day with heat. Once a week, apply an enzyme treatment, rinse with saline, and disinfect to neutralize the enzyme.
