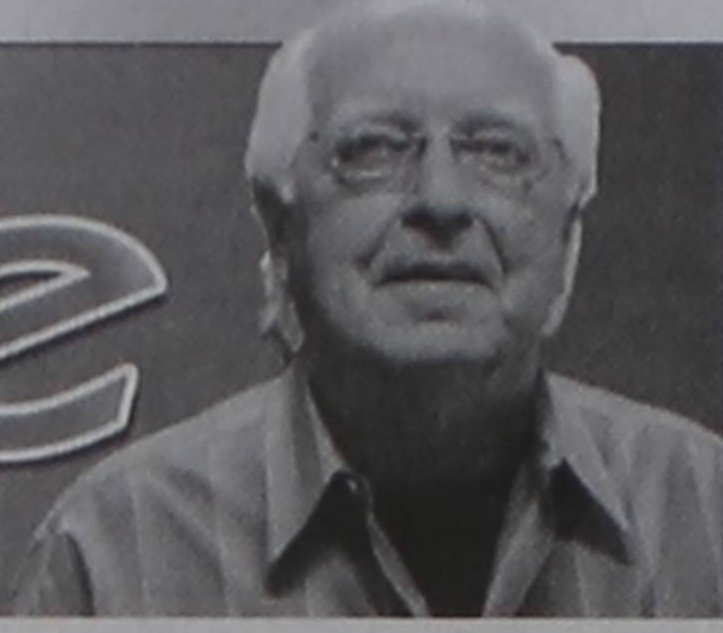

madder than a wet hen

I've heard the expression since I was a kid.

Over the weekend my mother was having trouble with a task that her old fingers can't quite master any more. In a fit of frustration she said, "This just makes me madder than an old wet hen."

Chickens are excitable creatures. As a child visiting my great grandpa's farm in Wylie, us youngsters would get a running start and scatter chickens all over the land. They would go half-flying, flapping wings, kicking up dust, and clucking across the coop. It was a crazy kind of hop and flap routine. They might have been scared, mad, or excited. We didn't care though.

Don't ever remember getting a hen wet except when Granny Allen would wring their neck and put them in boiling water to make it easy to pick the feathers off for fried chicken dinner. I'm thinking it was the neck wringing, not the boiling water, that made those hens mad.

I tried to find the origination of the "madder'n a wet hen" saying. It is an idiom, which means an expression that doesn't make sense except to certain people. For example, the online Urban Dictionary said it is

used in common phrases by rednecks and white trash. Ouch!

I found a small book titled "Mad as a Wet Hen and Other Funny Idioms" for sale on the Internet. It said the book is for ages 5-9. Not sure why kids would be studying funny idioms. I didn't order it. If it's for ages 5-9 it would likely be above my intelligence level.

In another site I found this fancy explanation: "Madder than a wet hen is an Americanism that derives from the behavior of a chicken that has found its way into a river or lake.

Because chickens cannot swim and do not fly well, their efforts to extricate themselves can best be described as furious."

Other fowl idioms are "Scarce as hen's teeth" and "Walking on eggshells" both of which are self-explanatory. You may remember some others. Here's another explanation I found. The first version of "Going to hell in a handbasket" was actually "Going to heaven in a handbasket" but through the years 'hell' seems to have taken over.

After my experience chasing chickens at grandpa's house it is easy to see

why folks would think hens get mad. At some point long ago maybe a mischievous grandchild threw an unsuspecting hen in a water tank and mistook the flapping panic as the hen getting mad. Grandpa perhaps scolded the youngster not to do that anymore because it makes the hens mad and so the legend grew.

Who knows? Doesn't seem anyone is for sure where the saying came from but I did not look through the entire 4-million Internet search results. This I do know.

"Madder than a wet hen" is not a pleasant place to be.

Let's Try Lynn's Mexican Food

The Panhandle has its share of Mexican food restaurants. Burritos abound hereabouts. Who doesn't like an excuse to hop over to Muleshoe and chow at Leal's. Here in Friona, Hernandez, Los Arcos, and Becky's Burritos keep local Mexican food appetites in check.

So I thought I would share a recipe from the Scrubs and Grub cookbook which has recipes submitted by members of our local medical community. This particular recipe is not for a specific Mexican food like tacos, enchiladas, or chalupas.

It is simply called Lynn's Mexican Food submitted by Lynn Nelson, RN. Lynn is a veteran nurse at our hospital well known to most of us. Here is her Mexican food recipe. Be sure to follow the layer instructions. Enjoy.

- Corn tortillas
- 1 (8 oz) can tomato sauce
- 1 can cream of chicken soup
- 2 (15 oz) cans pinto beans
- 1 lb lean hamburger meat
- 1 can enchilada sauce
- grated cheese
- 1 can stewed tomatoes
- 1 can whole green chilies

Lynn's Mexican Food

Layer in a greased 13x9x2 pan in this order: corn tortillas to line the pan, crumbled hamburger meat (uncooked), enchilada sauce, tomato sauce, beans, cream of chicken soup (undiluted), and grated cheese. Cover the top with: corn tortillas, grated cheese, stewed tomatoes, and whole green chilies. Pour tomato juice from the stewed tomatoes over the casserole. Bake uncovered at 350 for 1 hour 15 minutes. Let stand for 15 minutes.

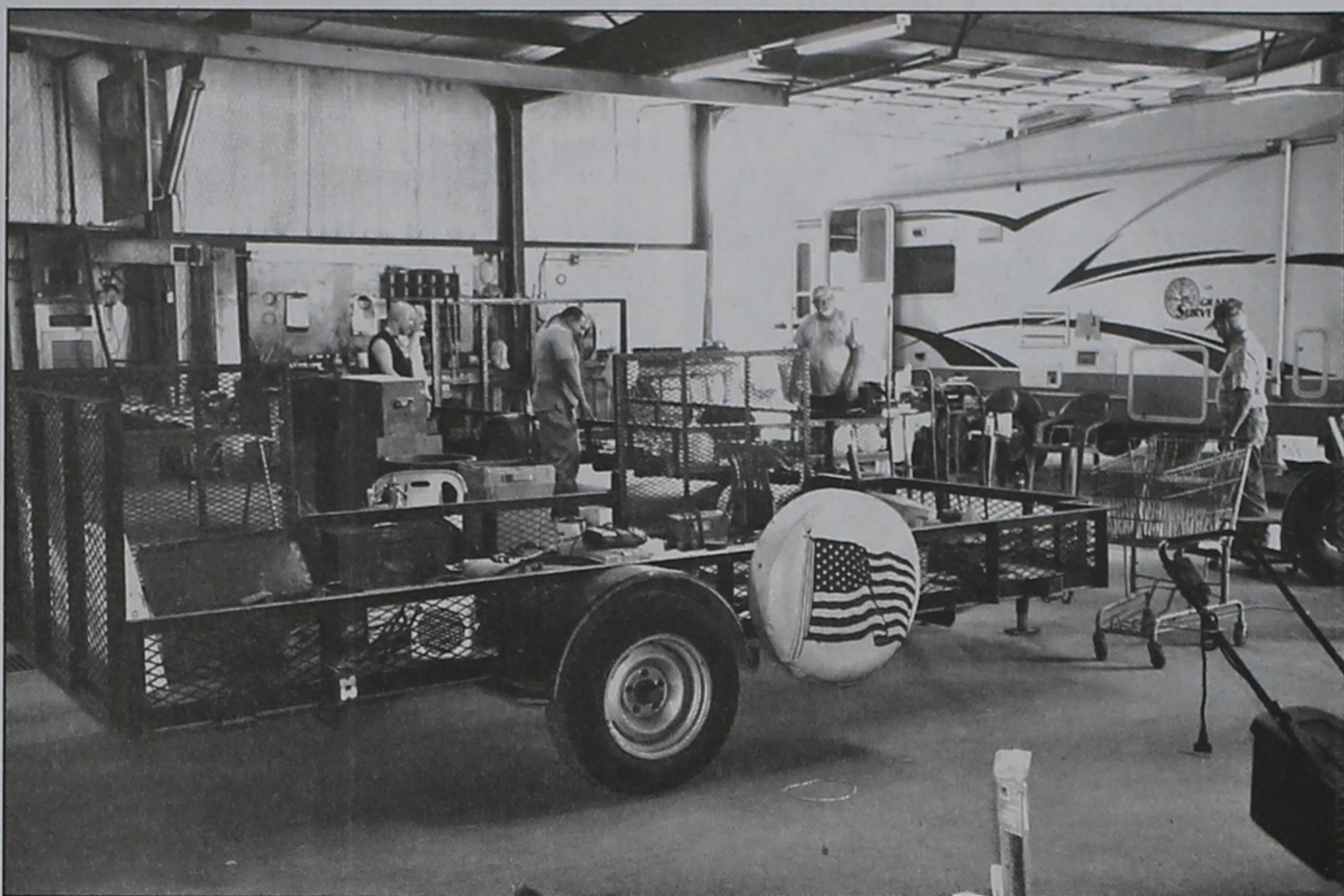

Sims, is in the Heart Hospital in Amarillo for tests. We send out thoughts to Jonell and the family.

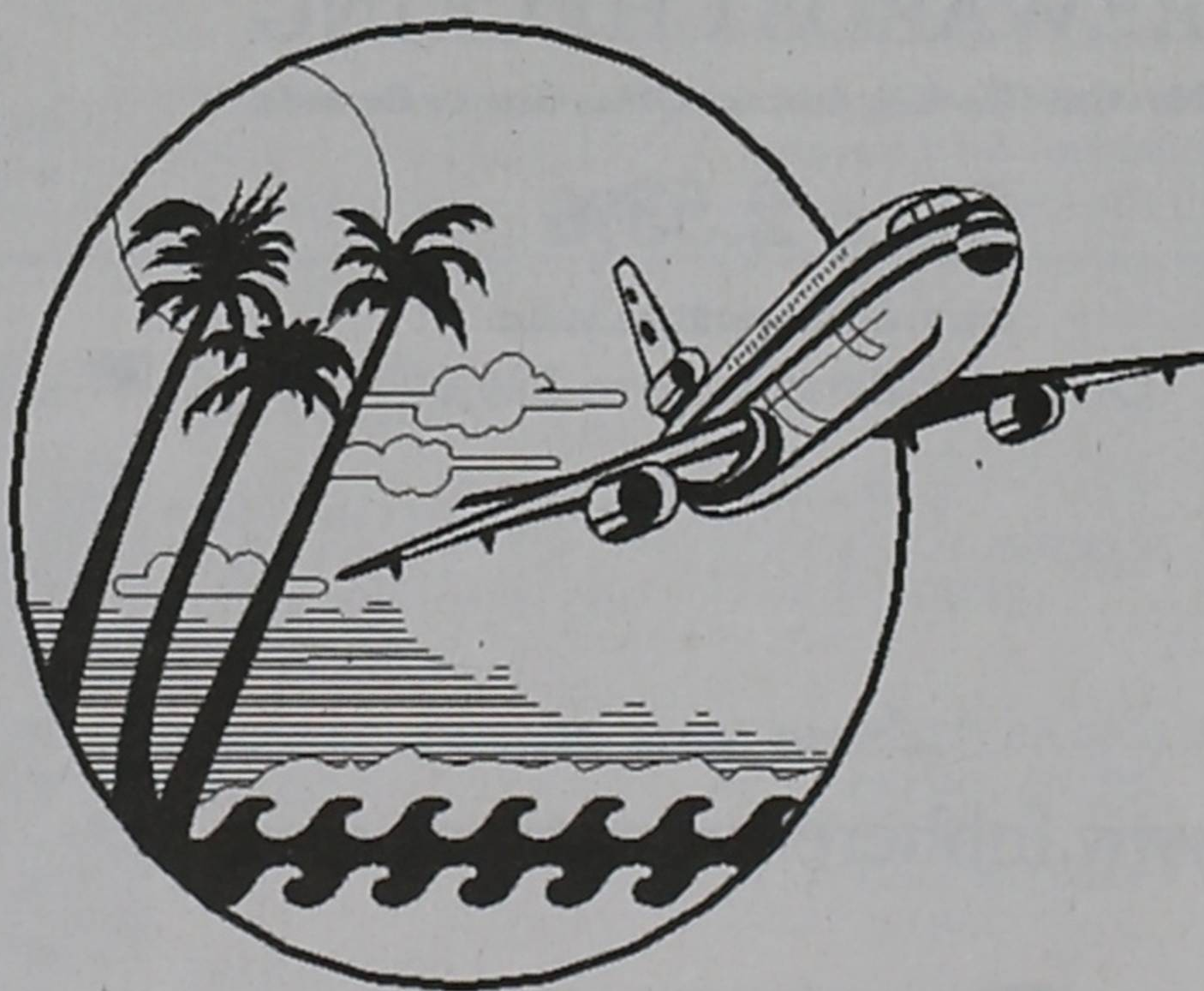

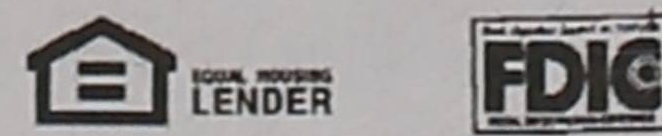

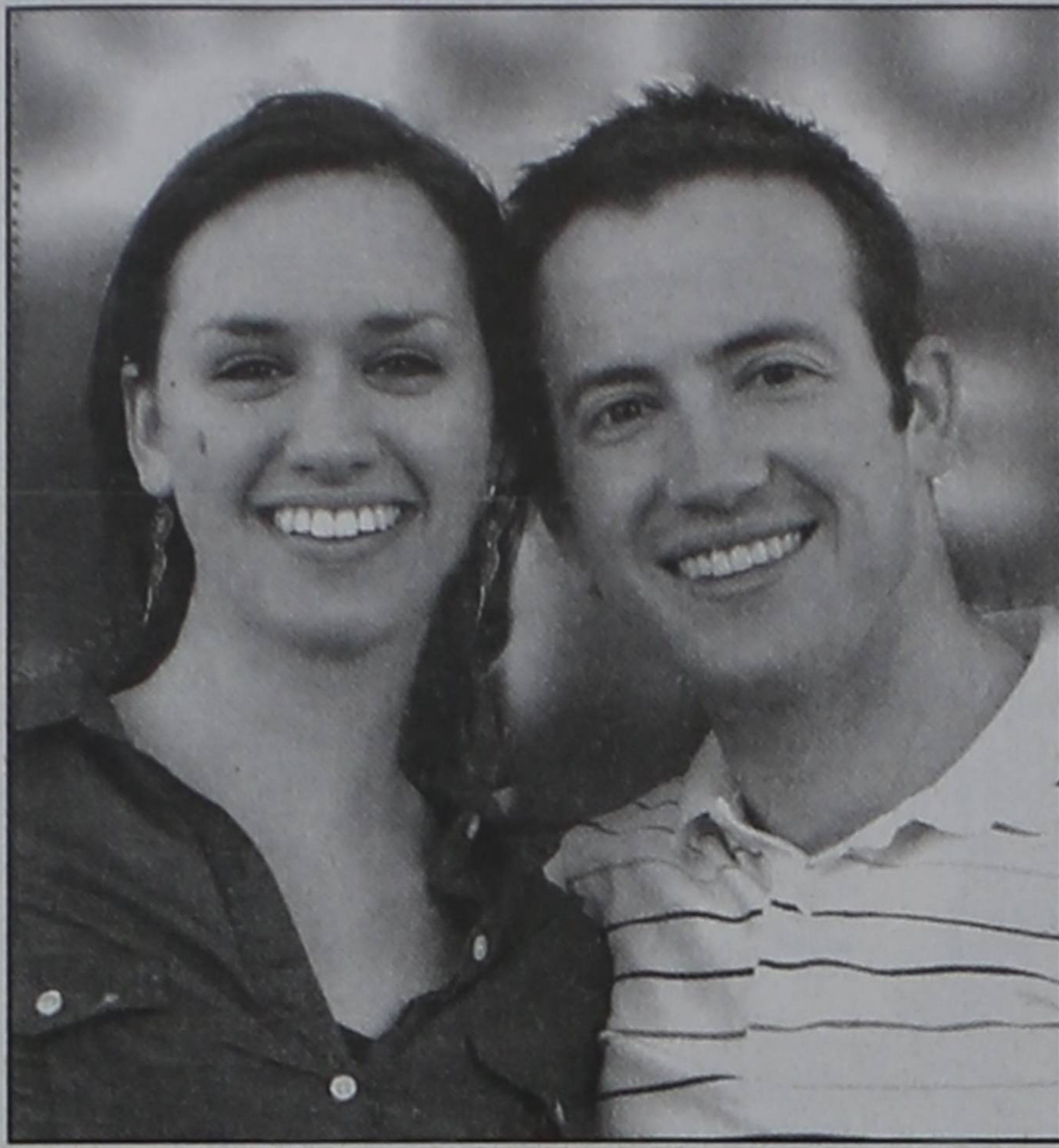

Hope, a 2008 graduate of Mansfield Christian High School, and a current student at Boyce College, is studying Worldviews and Apologetics.

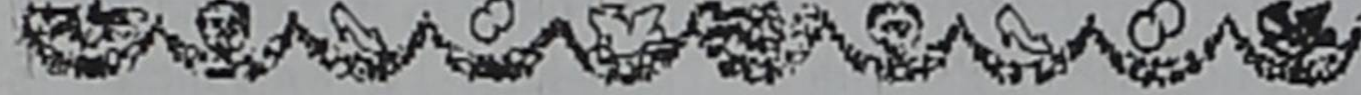

DPS conducts safety inspections of commercial vehicles

During the 72-hour Roadcheck 2011 program last week, DPS and other Texas law enforcement agencies inspected 7,993 commercial vehicles. Of the vehicles inspected, 26.5 percent were placed out of service for safety violations.

Throughout Roadcheck, DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforcement troopers, noncommissioned inspectors, and specially trained Highway Patrol troopers and officers from other agencies inspected safety equipment and checked driver logbooks, driver licenses and endorsements. They also looked for possible drug or alcohol use.

Officers placed 212 of the drivers (2.6 percent) out of service for reasons ranging from not properly tracking their hours of service, to suspended, expired or cancelled driver licenses. Four drivers were placed out of service for drug or alcohol infractions. Troopers issued 17 tickets for seat belt violations.

DPS warns of telephone scams

Scammers have been calling Texans in various parts of the state, demanding that residents immediately pay for overdue red-light tickets.

The most recent incident was reported in Cleveland, Texas, where police say that residents have received calls from someone claiming to represent DPS and demanding payment on a red-light safety camera ticket. The scammers say that an arrest warrant will be issued if the person receiving the call does not provide a credit card number, as well as Social Security numbers and other personal information.

The Texas Department of Public Safety does not collect traffic fines or oversee red-light cameras. "You should never give out personal information over the phone when someone else initiated the call," said Steven C. McCraw, director of DPS. "If you receive a call like this, you should write down any contact information from the Caller ID, if available, and then contact your local law enforcement agency."

DPS also reminds Texans that the department does not call requesting charitable donations. "The Department of Public Safety will never solicit financial contributions from private citizens. DPS is funded by tax dollars and our employees will never call your home or business to solicit donations," McCraw said.

DPS advises citizens not to give money to these groups as the funds may not go to the causes that are claimed. Some groups include in their names the terms, "Texas Rangers", State Troopers", "Texas Highway Patrol", or "Department of Public Safety".

While some current or former employees may be members of some of these associations on their own time, these organizations are not affiliated with the DPS nor do they represent the department. Many of these organizations provide only a small percent of their donations for good causes, with the majority of the donations going to administrative and operational purposes.

Some of these organizations suggest that official looking decals resembling official DPS affiliation placed on personal vehicles may somehow keep the individual from receiving a traffic citation from law enforcement. There is also a lack of public accountability and transparency by many of these organizations.

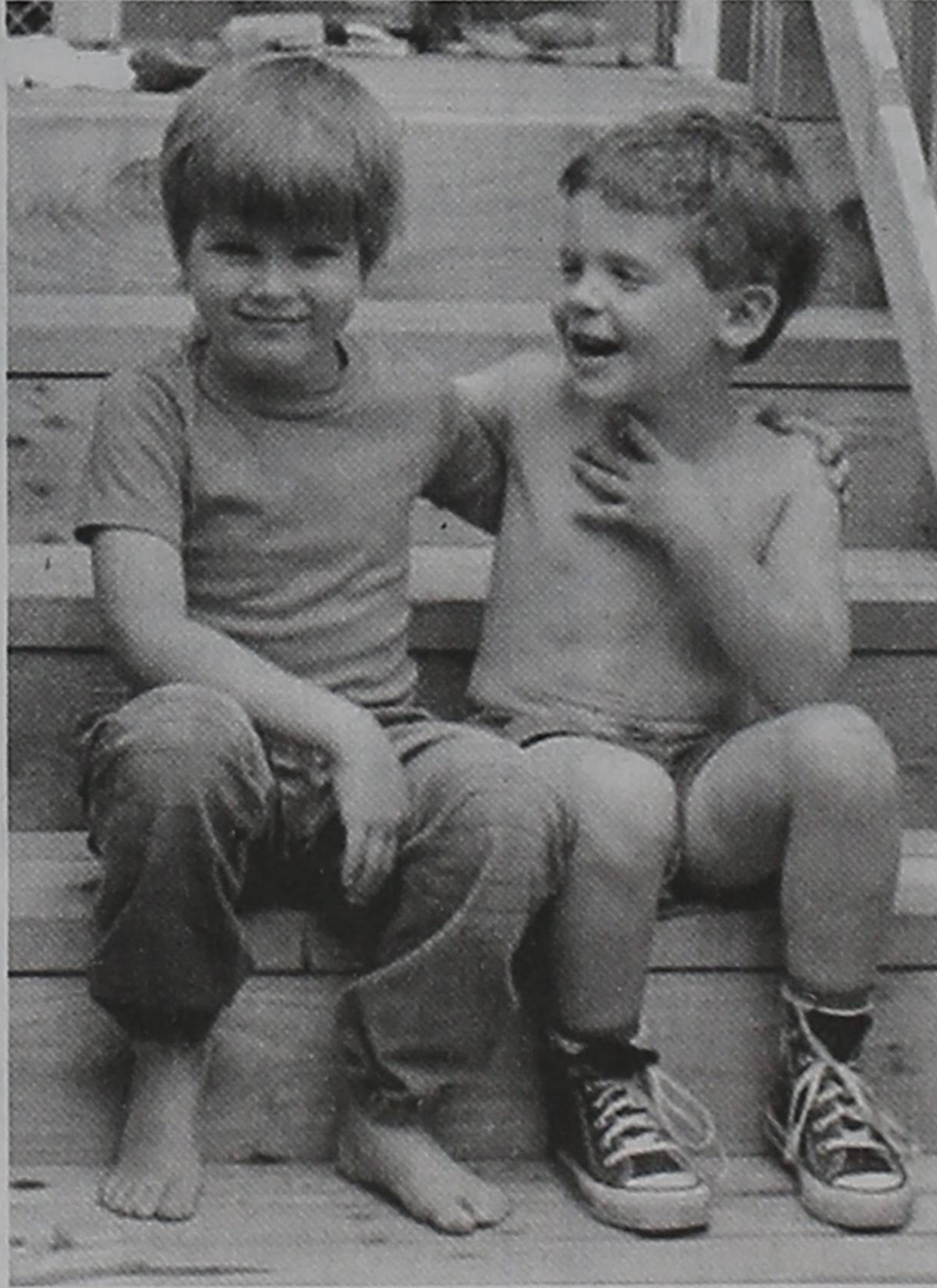

A few weeks ago a team of fourteen people from First Baptist Friona went to Joplin, Missouri to help with the relief effort there. We worked with Samaritan's Purse International Relief by aiding homeowners clean up their property, sort through the remains of their belongings, and minister to them through prayer and encouragement. The devastation in Joplin was unlike anything we had ever seen, and taught me a few things.

We were able to meet many of these needs, but our focus was also to help people spiritually too. Physical needs can overshadow spiritual needs that reside in the depths of our hearts, but as believers we seek to help physically and spiritually.

I can help rebuild a home, but only Jesus can prepare a place for you in heaven (John 14:1-6). I can give you a helping hand, but only Jesus can give you unshakable hope, peace and joy (John 14:27; 15:11). I wonder if all your belongings were wiped away, would your hope be on Jesus Christ?

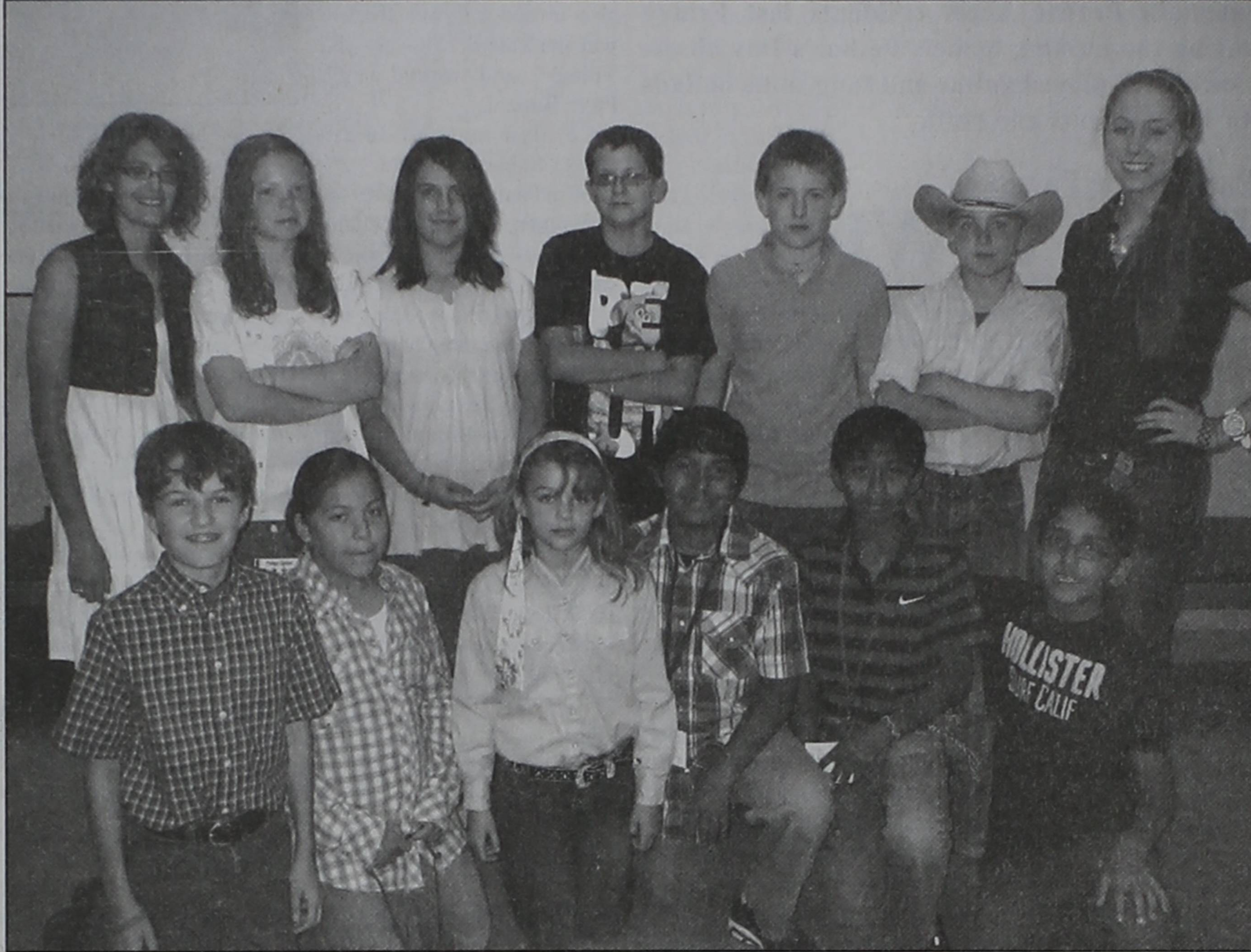
be watching them and that they may be a hero to someone.

Hot, dry conditions tax crops

Very hot and dry conditions with substantial winds continue to tax crop production in the Northwest Plains. Wind speeds have subsided from those experienced in May and crops have responded remarkably well.

Corn, cotton, and sorghum which is well established is growing rapidly but is requiring substantial irrigation to maintain normal growth and development. Crops are requiring

1.25 to over 2 inches of moisture per week to sustain current growth and development.

To compound that the hot and windy conditions make sprinkler irrigation systems much less efficient; the amount of irrigation water pumped, in most cases, is significantly less than the actual usable moisture applied.

In a significant number of irrigated and all dryland fields, crop establishment has failed despite continued efforts of

producers. Portions of some crops have already been abandoned and abandonment is being considered on many others.

The area corn crop ranges from just emerged to over 24 inches in height. As corn development continues its moisture demands will rapidly increase. Spider mites continue to persist in most corn fields. Current environmental conditions are favorable for mite development so a preventative mite management plan may be appropriate

especially in a field with a history of mite problems.

Thrips continue to infest most area cotton but infestation levels have been lower than expected. Spider mites that were observed infesting some cotton fields have crashed for the most part. Large numbers of leaf miners have also been observed in some area cotton. This is not abnormal but they do appear to be persisting longer into the growing season than in the past.

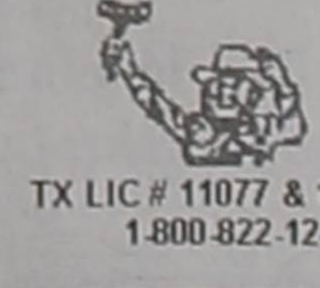

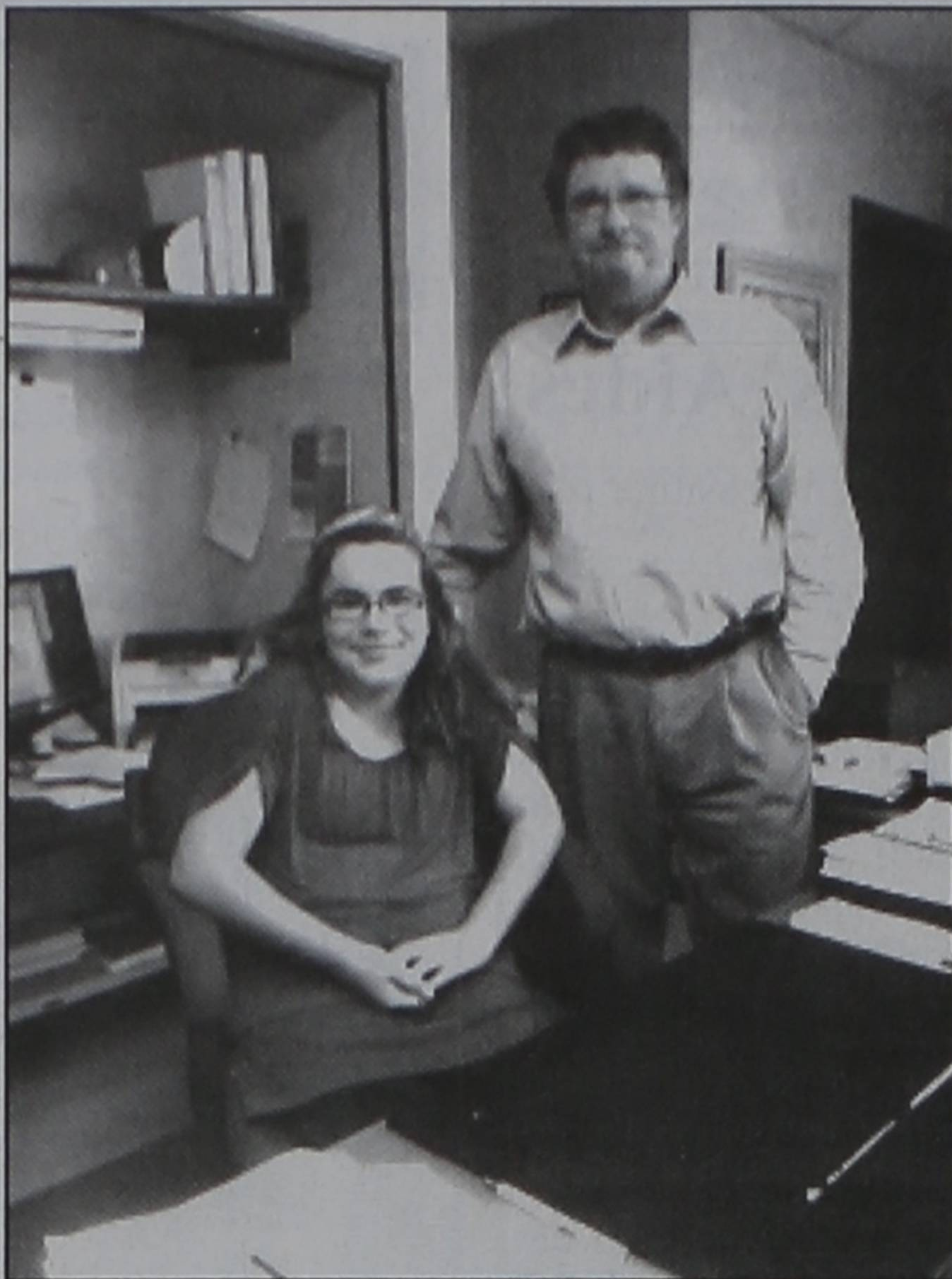

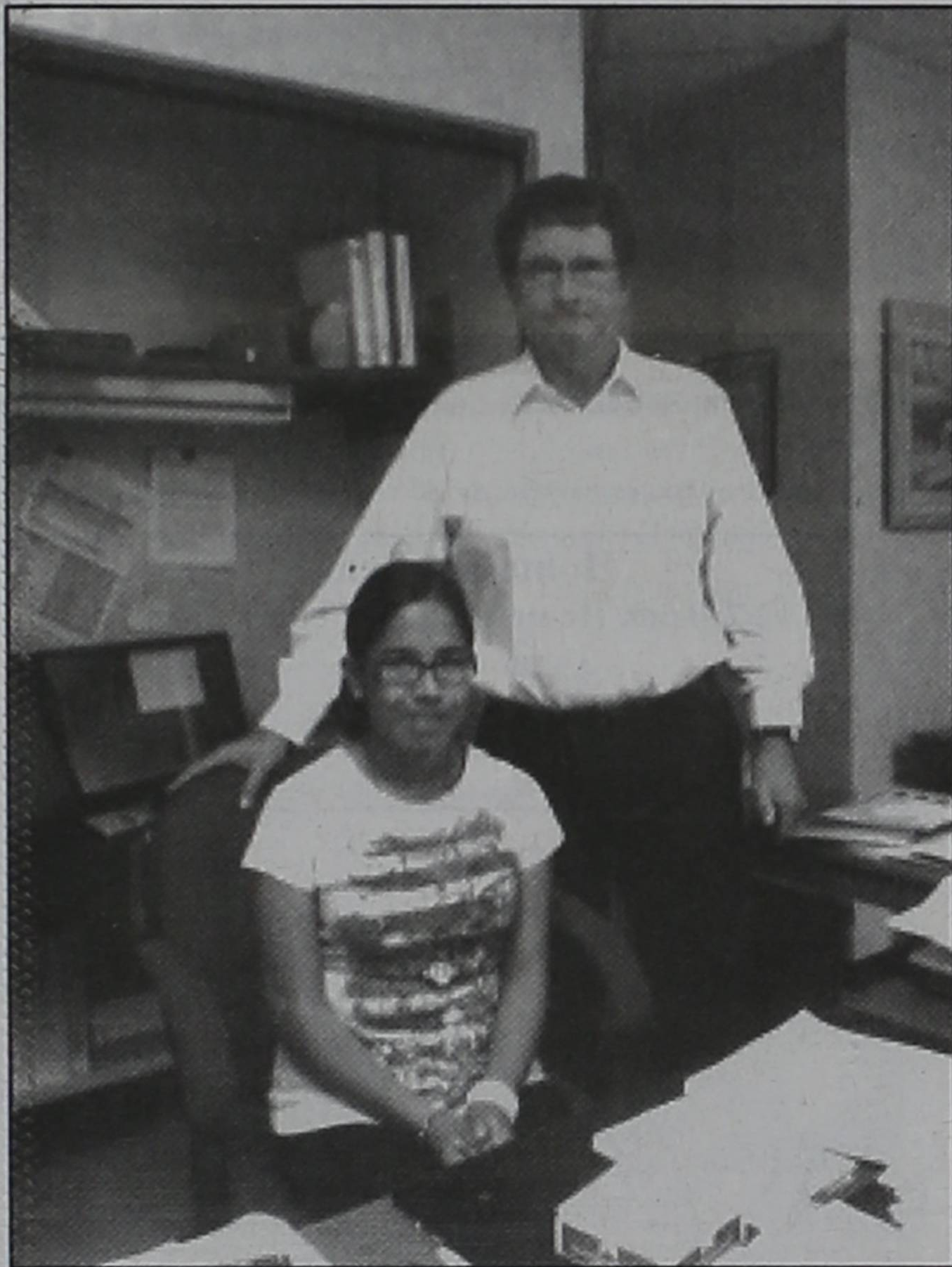
grade, 3rd grade, 5th grade, and Reading Recovery. She has mentored new teachers and allowed student teachers to work in her classroom.

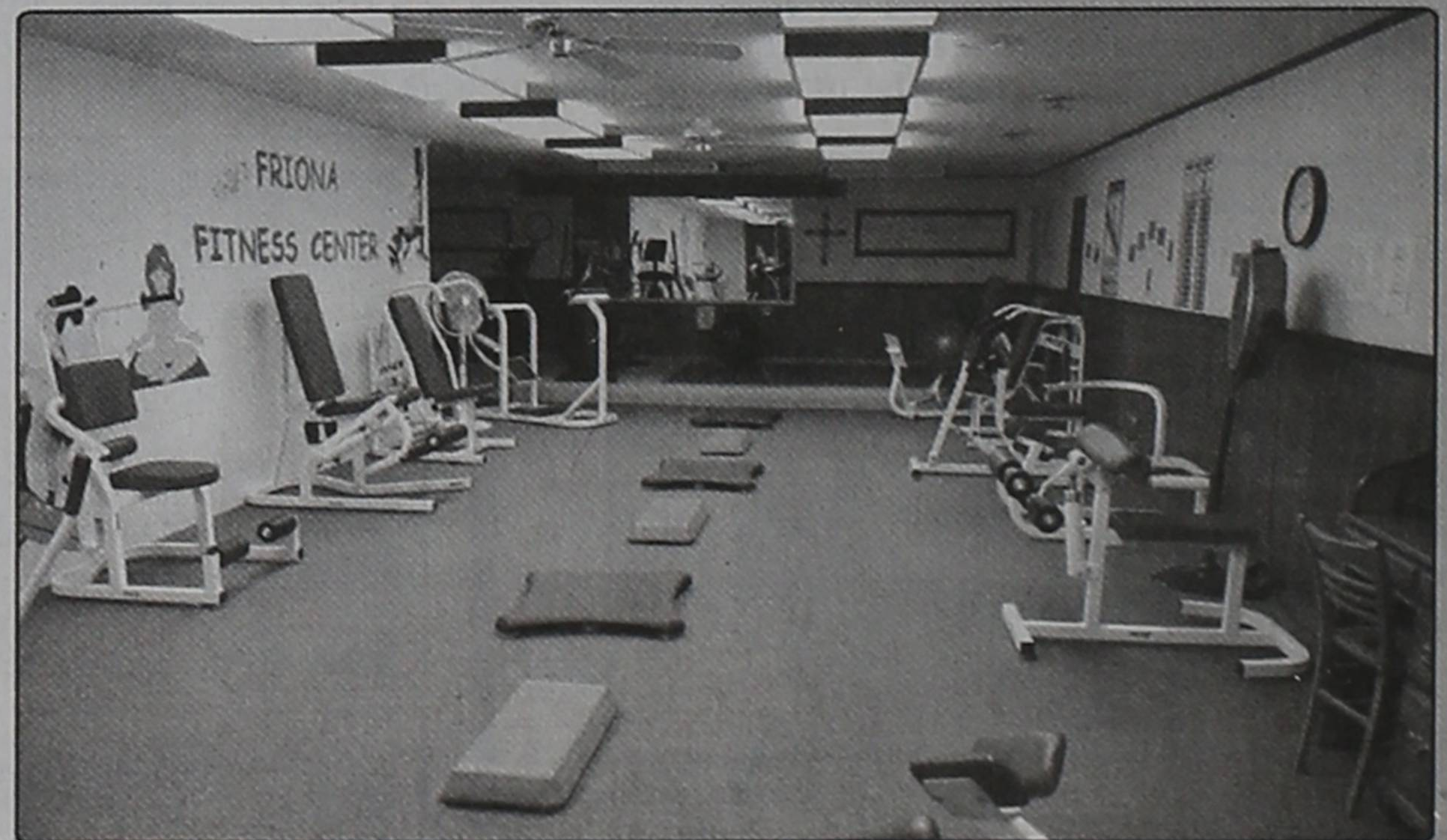
