


used in common phrases by rednecks and white trash. Ouch!

DPS warns of telephone scams

Scammers have been calling Texans in various parts of the state, demanding that residents immediately pay for overdue redlight tickets.

The most recent incident was reported in Cleveland, Texas, where police say that residents have received calls from someone claiming to represent DPS and demanding payment on a red-light safety camera ticket. The scammers say that an arrest warrant will be issued if the person receiving the call does not provide a credit card number, as well as Social Security numbers and other personal information.

The Texas Department of Public Safety does not collect traffic fines or oversee red-light cameras. "You should never give out personal information over the phone when someone else initiated the call," said Steven C. McCraw, director of DPS. "If you receive a call like this, you should write down any contact information from the Caller ID, if available, and then contact your local law enforcement agency."

DPS also reminds Texans that the department does not call requesting charitable donations. "The Department of Public Safety will never solicit financial contributions from private citizens. DPS is funded by tax dollars and our employees will never call your home or business to solicit donations," McCraw said.

DPS advises citizens not to give money to these groups as the funds may not go to the causes that are claimed. Some groups include in their names the terms, "Texas Rangers", State Troopers", "Texas Highway Patrol", or "Department of Public Safety". While some current or former employees may be members of some of these associations on their own time, these organizations are not affiliated with the DPS nor do they represent the department. Many of these organizations provide only a small percent of their donations for good causes, with the majority of the donations going to administrative and operational purposes. Some of these organizations suggest that official looking decals resembling official DPS affiliation placed on personal vehicles may somehow keep the individual from receiving a traffic citation from law enforcement. There is also a lack of public accountability and transparency by many of these organiztions. If you are contacted by a group you believe is misrepresenting itself as part of the Texas Department of Public Safety, contact the Consumer Protection Division of the Texas Attorney General's Office at 1-800-621-0508.

DPS conducts safety inspections of commercial vehicles

During the 72-hour Roadcheck 2011 program last week, DPS and other Texas law enforcement agencies inspected 7,993 commercial vehicles. Of the vehicles inspected, 26.5 percent were placed out of service for safety violations.

Throughout Roadcheck, DPS Commercial Vehicle Enforce-

Of the vehicles that were inspected, 26.5 percent were placed out of service because they were found to have serious enough safety violations to be removed from service until repairs could be made, including issues with the braking systems, tires, lights and safe loading. 1 1 1 2 2 3 3 3 3 3 7 7 7 8 The annual Roadcheck program, which stretches from Mexico to Canada, is designed to reduce commercial vehicle highway fatalities through increased vehicle safety. The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA), which sponsors Roadcheck, reports a significant decrease in the commercial vehicle crash rate Vehicles passing inspection received a CVSA decal exempting the vehicle from inspection for a 90-day period, unless they have an obvious safety defect. Troopers issued 2,515 decals during Roadcheck 2011.


Lions Club News


Panhandle Parables Deep & Wide







(From the Northwest Plains Pest Management News.) Very hot and dry conditions with substantial winds continue to tax crop production in the Northwest Plains. Wind speeds have subsided from those experienced in May and crops have responded remarkably well. Corn, cotton, and sorghum which is well established is growing rapidly but is requiring substantial irrigation to maintain normal growth and development. Crops are requiring

1.25 to over 2 inches of moisture per week to sustain current growth and development.

To compound that the hot and windy conditions make sprinkler irrigation systems much less efficient; the amount of irrigation water pumped, in most cases, is significantly less that the actual usable moisture applied.

In a significant number of irrigated and all dryland fields, crop establishment has failed despite continued efforts of








Jennifer will represent Friona ISD at the Region 16 Teacher of the Year banquet to be held this fall.






