### How's that? Republican votes

Q. Can all Republicans in Howard County vote in the primary run-off?

A. No, County Clerk Margaret Ray said. Because there are no statewide races in the GOP run-off, only those persons in County Commissioner Precinct 3 — voting precincts 301, 302, 303, and 304 — will be able to vote in this election. The only race on the ballot is a choice for the party's commissioner nominee for that precinct between incumbent Bill Crooker and challenger Clayton McKinnon. All Democrats in the county will be able to vote, even if they are not in Precinct 3 or the Justice of the Peace Precinct 1, Place 1, because there are three statewide races on the ballot, Mrs. Ray said.

## State probes dealer's taxes

The state comptroller's office is investigating possible tax abuses by Anthony "Tony" Ginnetti, a former Big Spring car dealer now wanted by law enforcement officials for his possible involvement in a bank fraud scheme.

According to records in the comptroller's office, Ginnetti owes \$2,200 in state sales tax, and \$550 in sales tax to the city.

"We are conducting an audit on that individual," said John Moore, director of public information for the state comptroller's office.

Moore would not comment any further on the audit into possible abuses of payment of state taxes, but confirmed that two employees of the state comptroller's office, an auditor and an enforcement agent, are working on the audit at the county courthouse.

Law enforcement officials still do not know the whereabouts of Ginnetti, who is suspected of using

fake car titles in a fraud scheme that may cause a potential loss of \$250,000 to the Coahoma State Bank, bank officials say.

FBI agents from Abilene have filed a fugitive flight warrant against Ginnetti, claiming he is fleeing to avoid criminal prosecution. In addition, three Texas county warrants — two from Howard County — have been issued against Ginnetti charging him with felony theft of at least \$20,000 in each warrant.

According to other employees of the state comptroller's office, who spoke on the condition they not be identified, the agency periodically audits car dealers because of the potential for abuse in that area.

Texas Ranger Charles Brune said he and Richard Doan, an enforcement official from the Odessa state comptroller's office, are investigating "every aspect of Ginnetti's dealings" and "would follow it up wherever it leads."

## Governor calls special session

AUSTIN — Gov. Mark White on Friday ordered Texas lawmakers to attend a special legislative session June 4 to address what he called "a rising tide of mediocrity in our schools."

"At this time in our history we face a clear and present danger in our society," White said. "In part it has been created by a rising tide of mediocrity in our schools. The signs are all about us."

White said legislators also are being directed to develop a finance package for funding educational improvements and resurrecting the state's deteriorating highway network.

But White's priority in the session was made crystal clear. "Education will come first," he said.

Other legislative topics may be added during the special session, he said, but not "until progress is achieved on education."

He said the leadership in the House and Senate "has indicated to

me that they are ready to act." White admitted, however, "there will be disagreement over certain aspects of the education reform proposals and we are likely to hear different opinions over the means to finance these reforms."

White, who took office in January 1983, has called legislators to Austin for special business only once before — in June 1983 following the Legislature's regular session.

The sessions are limited to 30 days and legislators may consider only what White allows. There is no limit on the number of special legislative sessions he can call.

Asked Thursday night on "The Governor Reports" television program whether legislators can finish the business in 30 days, White indicated they should have little problem. The issues have been studied at length and are clear-cut, he said.

White's proposal for funding highway and education im-

## Phone rates reduced

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers who rely on the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. to handle their interstate long-distance calls received one of the first tangible benefits of industry competition this morning — an across-the-board reduction in long-distance rates.

Effective at 12:01 a.m. today, AT&T cut its regular long-distance, WATS and international calling rates by a uniform 6.1 percent, complying with a May 10 order of the Federal Communications Commission.

That was the good news. On the minus side for some customers, that same FCC order allowed AT&T to begin charging a 50-cent fee for long-distance directory assistance calls after the first two such calls each month. And business customers with more than one phone line will have to start paying a monthly "access fee" to their local phone company.

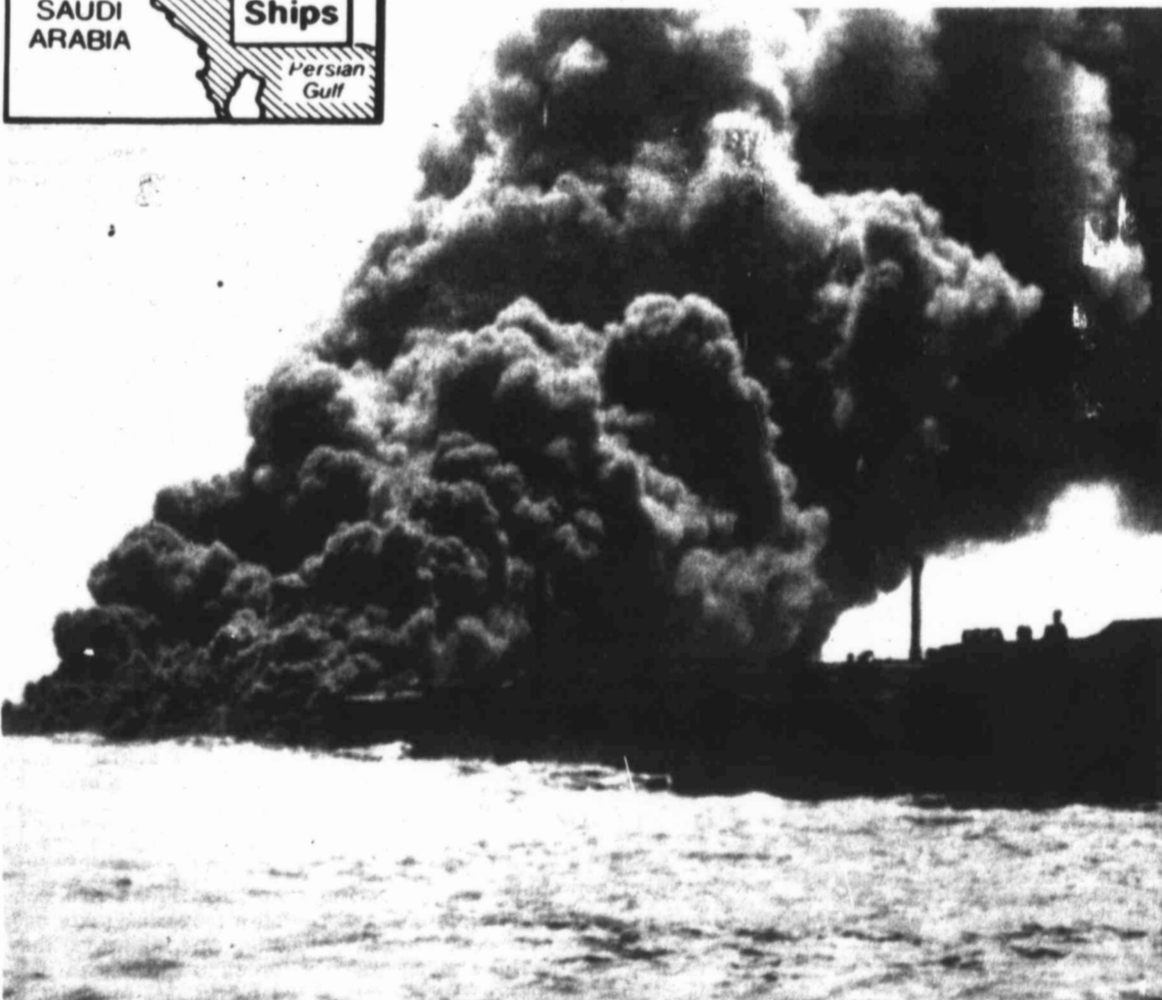
All of the changes stem from a new rate structure the FCC gradually is introducing to reflect the fact that AT&T is now facing strong competition for long-distance traffic. While the company still handles slightly more than 90 percent of all interstate long-distance calls, competitors like MCI Communications and GTE-Sprint are growing rapidly at AT&T's expense.

This morning's rate reduction is expected to save long-distance callers almost \$1.8 billion



## Convoy attacked

### Iraqis claim 6 ships destroyed

Iraq said its jetfighters and warships today attacked a convoy of ships in the Persian Gulf off Iran's coast, "hitting and destroying six of them."

An Iraqi military spokesman, reading a communique over Baghdad state radio, said the six unidentified "navy vessels" were attacked near the Iranian bay of Khor Moussa at the north end of the gulf.

Iraq's official news agency described the action as "a violent and surprise attack." No further details were given about the identity of the vessels, and there was no independent confirmation of the report.

Roger Lowes of the Lloyd's of London shipping intelligence office, which collects information on shipping incidents worldwide, said his office had "nothing at all from our own sources" about the purported Iraqi strike.

Lloyd's, the major insurer of ships, today announced it was increasing insurance premiums by 150 percent for oil tankers calling on Iran's Kharg Island.

The reported Iraqi attack came just hours before the U.N. Security Council began an emergency meeting to consider action to discourage attacks on commercial ships in the gulf.

Kuwait's foreign minister, Sheikh Sabah al-Jabar al-Sabah, told the 15-nation body that further escalation of the 44-month-old war between Iran and Iraq threatens to

## Absentee balloting

More than 100 county residents had cast ballots in the primary runoff elections by 9 a.m. today, according to Howard County Clerk Margaret Ray.

Twenty Republicans and 89 Democrats have voted absentee in the clerk's office, Mrs. Ray said.

In addition, her office has mailed 45 ballots to Republicans and 38 to Democrats, of which six Republican and three Democratic ballots have been returned, she said.

The clerk's office will be open from 2 to 8 p.m. Saturday, Mrs. Ray said, but will be closed on Monday for Memorial Day.

Republicans will decide a county commissioners race (Clayton McKinnon and Bill Crooker), and Democrats will vote on a commissioner race (Joneil Smallwood and Bud Nichols) and a justice of the peace runoff (Doyle Lamb and China Long).

In addition to the local Democratic races, the primary ballot will include three statewide races.

# Weather

## Rain falls in West Texas

Small amounts of precipitation were reported throughout West Texas early today from thunderstorms that moved through the region after forming Thursday evening in eastern New Mexico.

Midland recorded .25 of an inch during the early morning, while Lubbock received just under that amount.

Low clouds and light fog developed in the moist air along the coastal plains. The low clouds moved inland into portions of South Central Texas. Skies were mostly fair across North Texas.

Winds were southwesterly at 15 to 25 mph in the Panhandle and South Plains in advance of a cold front entering the northwestern part of the state. Elsewhere, winds were light and southerly.

Temperatures were mostly in the 70s this morning except for some readings in the upper 60s in West Texas. The range across the state was from 66 degrees at El Paso to 79 degrees at Wichita Falls.

The National Weather Service said isolated showers and thundershowers were likely throughout the day, particularly in West Texas.

Severe thunderstorms buffeted a broad section of the nation's midsection today after spawning several tornadoes in eastern Colorado and rattling northwestern Iowa with hail.

A severe thunderstorm watch was in effect through mid-morning in northern Kansas, southern Iowa, northwestern Missouri and portions of adjoining states.

A tornado spawned by the storm system destroyed a home in Wiggins in eastern Colorado. Other twisters touched down near the towns of Weldona and Flagler. No injuries were reported.

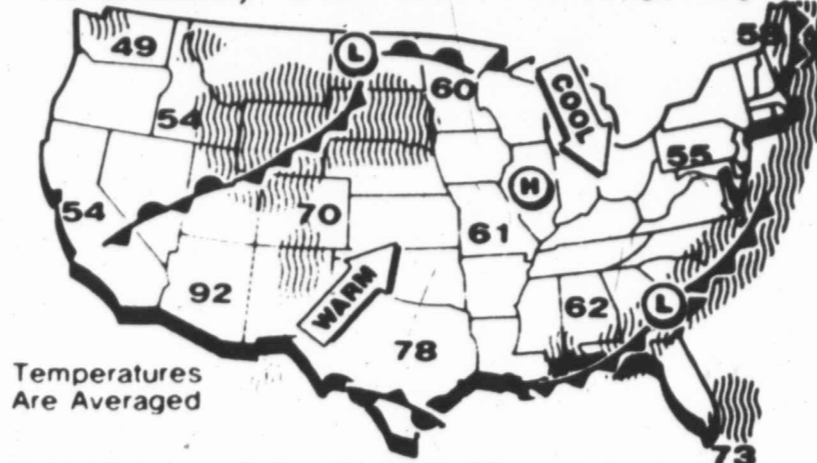

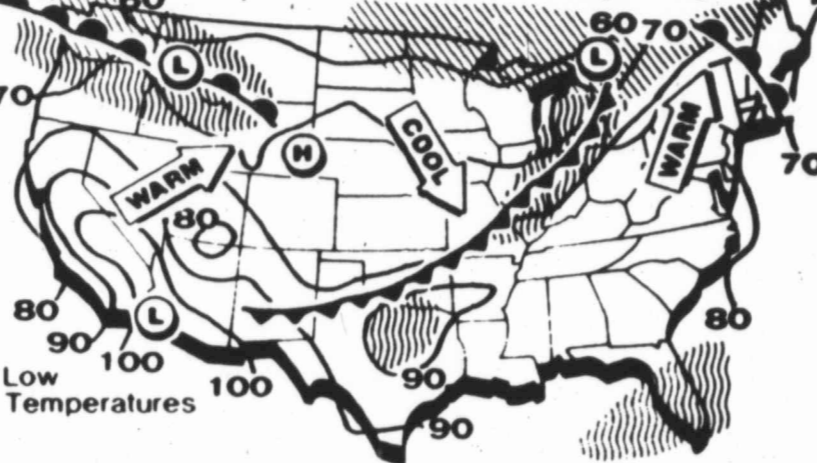

MONROE, La. (AP) — A Mississippi engineering firm says it will hold a meeting next week with officials from three states to gauge interest in developing Amtrak passenger rail service from Dallas to Meridian, Miss.

Gannett Fleming Engineers and Planners of Gulfport, Miss., and the city of Monroe have invited mayors and officials from towns

Neither local nor state employees of the comptroller's office would comment on exactly what taxes were being audited, but Ginetti, the former owner of Car City Auto Sales & Service, Inc. at 1506 Marcy, had permits for at least three kinds of taxes, public records show.

According to the state comptroller's office, Ginetti still has a state sales tax permit. His business, a domestic corporation, remains "in good standing," although he "does owe money for the first quarter," an official with the office said.

According to comptroller's office public records, its officials made a final determination of liability against Ginetti June 11, and found he owed \$2,200 in sales tax to the state and \$550 to the city of Big Spring.

To dissolve his business, Ginetti would have to file a 1984 tax report by June 15, according to the comptroller's office.

The state can be cheated of sales taxes if persons agree to report a lower sale price for a car on affidavits, Tax Assessor-Collector Dorothy Moore said.

And state revenue also can be lost if persons sell cars without

paying title or transfer fees, she said.

The ex-car dealer also had a dealership license on file in the Howard County Tax Assessor-Collector's office, according to Mrs. Moore, but the license is in the process of being cancelled, she said.

The Odessa office of the State Department of Highways, and Public Transportation sent out a letter of cancellation Thursday, according to office manager Donna Varley.

The license enables a car dealer to transfer cars to other dealerships without paying title fees, according to Ms. Varley.

"It's a standard procedure" when the dealer no longer qualifies for the license, Ms. Varley said. Ginetti no longer has a phone listing, an office, or a dealership, all state requirements for dealership licenses, she said.

Ginetti has 15 days to request a hearing on the cancellation. Otherwise, the license will be cancelled on June 8, Ms. Varley said.

Ginetti would also be liable for a franchise tax because he is registered with the secretary of state's office as a domestic corporation, according to records.

improvements, including a long-promised teacher pay raise, hinges on a 1-cent sales tax hike along with increases in motor fuels, motor vehicle sales, alcohol and cigarette taxes.

Under his tax plan, \$1.3 billion would be raised for the fiscal year beginning in September. Those tax hikes would bring in an extra \$3.5 billion during the following two fiscal years.

But some legislators are concerned that if they raise taxes now for education and highways, they may be forced to approve an additional tax bill in 1985 to maintain other state needs.

The state's petroleum-related income from sales and severance taxes has been leveling off. At the same time, the state's growth creates a demand for more state services.

draw other nations into the conflict.

On Thursday, an Iranian warplane attacked a Liberian-registered tanker in the gulf in retaliation for attacks earlier in the day by Iraqi warplanes on two ships south of the Iranian oil port of Kharg Island, U.S. intelligence sources said.

The 31 crew members were rescued by a Saudi Arabian naval vessel. Shipping sources in Bahrain today said 10 of the crewmen were hospitalized with injuries and the ship, set ablaze by a single missile, was out of danger.

John Boven, a spokesman for International Transport Contractors in the Netherlands, said a company tug reported from the gulf that fire swept through all storage areas of the ship, but the abandoned Chemical Venture was not seriously damaged.

"The engine room is intact, so the damage, I would say, is not very serious," Boven said.

Hughes said Saudi planes chased the attacking plane, without making contact, but the Saudi Defense Ministry today denied its planes were involved.

The reported attack came about six hours after Iraq said its warplanes hit two "big" naval targets south of Kharg Island—the first air action since an Iraqi plane hit a Panamanian freighter last Friday.

An Iranian F-4 attacked the tanker Chemical Venture on Thursday, U.S. State Department spokesman John Hughes said in Washington, quoting intelligence sources in the gulf region.

She said she talked to him by telephone yesterday, and she said he plans to resume an active life as soon as possible.

She said he would probably try to plant a cotton crop, "but only if it rains."

## Newscope

### Pets may be hazardous

HOUSTON (AP) — Two physicians at the Baylor College of Medicine say people risk danger of allergies, respiratory problems and even birth defects in newborns just because they keep pets around the house.

"Frequently patients will put up with a lot of misery to keep their pets," Dr. William Shearer, an allergy specialist, said Thursday.

An infectious disease specialist, Dr. Ralph Feigin, said 10 percent of all children admitted to hospitals have diseases or injuries transmitted or caused by animals.

The doctors said the best way to avoid most of the ailments is for pet owners to wash their hands after handling their pets. In addition, animals should be given regular examinations and vaccinations and be kept outdoors.

Feigin said strep throat, a fairly common illness, may be caused by a pet licking a child on the mouth.

Other more severe problems blamed on pets like hamsters and parrots are typhoid, diarrhea and prolonged high fevers and pneumonia, Feigin said.

### Collin County DA indicted

MCKINNEY (AP) — Collin County District Attorney H. Ownby has been indicted on charges he lied to a grand jury investigating his handling of sexual harassment allegations against a Plano justice of the peace.

The grand jury's action followed a two-month investigation into wide-ranging allegations of wrongdoing in Collin County government.

The panel also indicted the justice of the peace, Jim Stecki, for allegedly agreeing to accept a bribe from a defendant in a hot check case.

Both Ownby and Stecki denied

any wrongdoing. Ownby surrendered Thursday afternoon on the aggravated perjury count and was released on a \$750 personal recognizance bond. Stecki, accused of conspiracy to commit bribery, was released on a \$1,500 bond.

The grand jury charged that Ownby did not testify truthfully about one of the provisions of an unusual contract he negotiated between Stecki and three county employees who had accused the peace justice of sexually harassing them.

Stecki had resigned, citing a better job offer, but is demanding reinstatement.

### Dog attacks bogus tax man

AUSTIN (AP) — A man who city officials say is posing as a tax collector and trying to shake down Travis County residents got nowhere when he sought \$22.28 from Eida Lorraine Bosebark. She turned loose her Great Dane on the man, who fled.

"We don't have anyone going door to door collecting money," said Bill Aleshire, county assessor-tax collector.

"We want the taxes paid, but we want to make sure that they get paid to this office and not to some crook," he added.

Aleshire said a 240-pound man, apparently familiar with the tax rolls, appeared at the woman's door on Thursday and demanded the money "right then, or he was going to have her phone taken out of her mobile home and her two cars towed away."

After turning loose her dog to chase the man away, the woman called Aleshire to complain. He called the sheriff.

The woman told Aleshire she planned to send him a check for the taxes.

### General counsel appointed

AUSTIN (AP) — Leslie Benitez, the assistant attorney general who has handled several key Texas death penalty cases, will replace Myra McDaniel as general counsel for Gov. Mark White.

Ms. McDaniel resigned this month to take a job with an Austin law firm.

Ms. Benitez, 31, accepted the job on Thursday but will remain chief of the attorney general's enforcement division for 30 days before moving to the governor's office.

As the state's lead lawyer in

death penalty cases, Ms. Benitez argued several precedent-setting cases which helped break the logjam of capital punishment cases that crowded the state appellate court dockets.

As general counsel, she will advise the governor on giving clemency to inmates sentenced to death.

A University of Texas law school graduate, Ms. Benitez worked as a law clerk for Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W.C. Davis before moving to the attorney general's staff in 1980.

### Judge grants execution stay

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals today refused to stay the executions of Jay Kelly Pinkerton and Andrew Lee Mitchell, but a federal judge later granted a stay to Mitchell.

Both were scheduled to die before sunrise Thursday.

Court spokesman Thomas Lowe said the judges voted unanimously against Pinkerton's request. Lowe said he was uncertain of the vote on the Mitchell decision.

Pinkerton, 22, was convicted of capital murder in the 1979 murder of an Amarillo woman during a burglary at her home.

About 11:40 a.m. today, U.S.

District Judge William Steger of Tyler granted a stay to Mitchell, 40, who was sentenced to die in the 1980 slaying of a 31-year-old Tyler missionary killed during a robbery.

Mitchell refused to talk to reporters during a Wednesday interview session at death row.

But Pinkerton said he was not responsible for the death of the Amarillo woman. He also said he did not think the Thursday execution would happen.

"I have nothing to be afraid about. If I thought this was really it, I probably would be scared, but it's not," he said.

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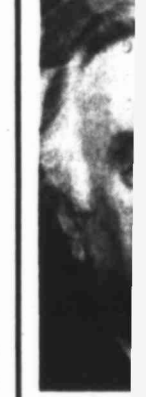

Moore described Thursday how his own car was rear-ended July 19 on the Santa Monica Freeway in a wreck that claimed the life of 21-year-old David Reuther, who was a passenger in the other car.

Reuther's friend, Steven Elliot Sanders, 21, is charged with driving under the influence of alcohol, causing injuries to another person, driving with more than 0.10 percent blood alcohol and vehicular manslaughter, all felonies, said Deputy District Attorney Debra Starr.

"The man lost his best friend," Moore said after testifying. "It's really sad that he has to go through this on top of that."

Although Moore suffered a slight neck strain in the accident, he said he will not sue Sanders.

## Ford's TV testimony

PHOENIX — Former first lady Betty Ford, who fought a successful battle with breast cancer, sent a videotape to court to testify that she never used a controversial cancer treatment and did not authorize use of her name in connection with the product.

Mrs. Ford's six-minute videotaped testimony was presented Thursday to jurors in the Maricopa County Superior Court trial of Kenneth Lee Anderson, 39, who is charged with conspiracy, fraud and practicing medicine without a license.

Prosecutors said Anderson and Dr. Robert Wickman were selling "nothing more than hope" when they sold Tumorex in \$3,500 programs as a cure for cancer, promising a 98 percent success rate.

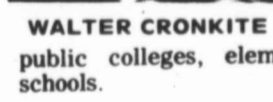
Anderson referred patients to Wickman for Tumorex treatment, and Wickman told the patients that Mrs. Ford had successfully used Tumorex, prosecutors said.

Wickman is awaiting trial. Anderson, who described himself as a nutrition consultant, has said he will call witnesses who have been helped by Tumorex, which he contends is a food substance rather than a drug. Tumorex is not approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

## Drop-out gets a degree

ALBANY — Walter Cronkite, perhaps television journalism's best known college dropout, says he "found formal education particularly ungratifying" and that "watching my children has convinced me that not much has changed over the years."

Cronkite's comments Thursday came as he received an honorary degree during a two-day celebration of the 200th anniversary of the University of the State of New York, an umbrella organization which oversees the state's private and public colleges, elementary and secondary schools.

## Seven injured in political riot


CAIRO (AP) — Seven policemen were injured in a fight with stone-throwing demonstrators after an opposition election rally in a Cairo neighborhood, government officials said today.

They said 23 demonstrators from the New Wafd Party, including a former member of Parliament, were detained for questioning following the brawl Thursday, but were later released on bail.

Parliamentary elections are scheduled for Sunday. Campaigning by the ruling National Democratic Party and four opposition groups, including the New Wafd, began about a month ago.

Government officials said one of the seven injured policemen was reported in serious condition with a concussion. There was no word on injuries among the protesters.

The officials, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said the demonstration by about 250 members of the New Wafd began after opposition leader Fuad Serageddin addressed a party rally.

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# Goodbye, Dorothy Six

It's hard hats off to closed blast furnace

DUQUESNE — Wearing black arm bands, humming "Taps" and fighting back tears, grizzled steelworkers toiled their final shift at Dorothy Six, an award-winning blast furnace whose fires fell victim to the industry's hard times.

"I saw Dorothy being built when I was a kid. She was special to us. She was our bread and butter. It's something you hate to see die. She was part of the family," said Joe Procacina, 43, a steelworker for 17 years.

"There were a lot of guys with tears in their eyes. It's a dead, empty feeling. It's sad. The place is like a graveyard," said Procacina, a maintenance man with a wife and three children but no job.

U.S. Steel Corp., which lost \$1.2 billion last year, shut down Dorothy Six on Thursday as part of a nationwide retrenchment announced Dec. 27. The closing and other cutbacks mean the loss of 1,150 jobs at the Duquesne Works in the ailing Monongahela River Valley east of Pittsburgh.

Until today, Dorothy Six was the biggest and most productive furnace in the valley, boasting a 29-foot hearth. For 21 years, its caldron brewed ore, coke and limestone to cook liquid iron processed into mighty steel.

Just last year, the furnace won a U.S. Steel "Ironmaster Award" by beating pre-set production goals. Workers were rewarded with jackets, patches, citations — after receiving their pink slips.

"This arm band symbolizes the death of a blast furnace, the death of the plant, the death of my job. It's a shame," said Bob Macey, 35. On his final shift, the 16-year veteran played "Taps" over the plant's public address system as his colleagues hummed along.

"My great-grandfather, my grandfather and my father worked in there. That's four generations. It's like losing everything, like losing your family tree," said Macey, the contents of his work locker packed into two paper bags he carried home to McKeesport. "I cried a little bit. I didn't think I would. It's just a hunk of steel."

The furnace got its name from Dorothy Worthington, the wife of a former U.S. Steel chairman. In earlier and less enlightened times, steelworkers gave female names to blast furnaces because they were thought to be unpredictable and temperamental.

Up to the end, Dorothy remained a sentimental benefactress to maintenance man Paul Budai, whose wife gave birth to a son the day the furnace went cold.

"If it was a girl, we were going to name it Dorothy after the furnace," said Budai, who invested 17 of his

35 years in the mill. "It's going to be rough. This is the first time in my life I've ever been laid off." After being flushed of a final load of iron and slag, Dorothy was filled with gravel to keep a brick lining from falling out. The furnace's unneeded tenders then quietly cleaned out their lockers.

Muscle men filed past the time clock for the last time and shook hands with cohorts they may never see again. Many planned to attend a wake today at a local bar, where a cake shaped like a blast furnace will feature this epitaph in icing: "Goodbye Dorothy, We'll Miss You."

Duquesne will still employ 800 workers at a bar mill and at smaller electrical furnaces processing steel made at another U.S. Steel plant across the river. At its World War II production peak, the mill had 32 open hearths and employed 9,000 workers.

## Couple answers a killer question

NEW YORK (AP) — A Denver couple will receive \$10,000 because they answered the question posed in the title of a best-selling book, "Who Killed the Robins Family?"

Dennis and Nancy Keleher said they would share their prize with three other couples who collaborated on the winning entry.

The book, "created" by book packager Bill Adler and written by Thomas Chastain, challenged readers to determine who killed each of the eight members of the Robins family.

Readers seeking the prize also were asked to figure out when, where, how and why the murders were done.

Adler, in announcing the winners today on ABC-TV's "Good Morning America," said the Keleherhs had answered 39 of the 40 questions correctly.

They correctly said that one character was killed on the Orient Express, but neglected to say that the murder was committed in a tunnel between Italy and Switzerland, according to Adler.

Adler said the Keleherhs had done "a remarkable job."

## Rightist officers leave

SAN SALVADOR — Two top rightist military commanders are being assigned to duties abroad, in an apparent gesture of conciliation towards President-elect Jose Napoleon Duarte.

Both officers have been linked in published reports to El Salvador's rightist death-squads, which human rights groups blame for most of the 43,000 civilian deaths since the civil war began in 1979.

The two have denied the accusations. A military communique Thursday said Col. Nicolas Carranza, director of the Treasury Police, will be defense attache in West Germany and Col. Mario Denis Moran is going to the U.S. Defense College in Washington.

## India death toll hits 210

BOMBAY — Two people were stabbed to death, a bomb exploded near a police station and about 20 huts were set afire early today in continuing Hindu-Moslem violence, authorities said. The nine-day death toll reached 210.

A bomb exploded in the street under the police station in Bombay's Pydhoni section but no casualties were reported, and police said about 20 shacks in the Govandi section of northeast Bombay were set on fire.

## Israeli jets bomb base

BEIRUT — Police said today that two people were killed and five wounded in an Israeli air raid on a Palestinian guerrilla base in the Syrian-controlled Bekaa Valley in east Lebanon.

The raid Thursday was on a base for the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command, a guerrilla organization supported by Syria and Libya, police said. But the police report did not indicate whether the casualties were guerrillas or civilians.

It was the second Israeli air attack on targets in Lebanon within five days and the 11th this year. Israeli jets flew reconnaissance sorties over the valley today, local radio stations reported.

## 21 hurt in court brawl

BELFAST — Police say 29 people were injured in a courtroom brawl that broke out when an informer was jeered during proceedings for 31 people accused of terrorism linked to the IRA.

Tight security was in force at Belfast's Crumlin Road Court today following the melee during Thursday's court session.

A press officer at Belfast police headquarters said 17 defendants and 12 police officers were injured.

## Why all the fuss over appraisal?

A reader wrote on Thursday asking, "Why all the clamor and fuss over the 1984 evaluations?" His point was this: "There are two variables in our tax structure, the property evaluation and the percentage that this evaluation will be taxed — to raise a fixed amount of taxes."

Why the fuss, he asks, "When the bottom line is the same amount of taxes on a given piece of property." He reasoned that "the percentage (tax rate) will be adjusted to provide the same amount of tax dollars."

The simplest answer to the questions is this: The purpose of the property tax appraisals — evaluations — is to set values on property which are equal and just and not above 100 percent of true market value.

The "fuss" over the 1984 appraisals was the preponderance of opinion by property owners that the new appraisals were neither. The complaints were that substantial increases (100 percent and more in some cases) from the last appraisal of two years ago could not be correct in light of what the market has done since 1982.

While it's true that a 20 percent overall increase in appraisal values does not equate to a 20 percent tax increase, it seems likely that higher valuations would tend to make taxing entities more comfortable with larger budgets — since it would imply greater community worth.

Also, if the appraisals do not meet their mandate of reflecting market values, they are not fulfilling their basic purpose. It was the property owners' view, supported by the findings of private real estate appraisers and eventually by the appraisal district board, that the mandate was not satisfied.

### Drop the MX

If there was any remaining hope that Democrats might reject the flawed orthodoxy of the Reagan administration for a new approach to nuclear strategy, the House vote on the MX missile ought to dispel it. The Democrats have chosen to be just like the Republicans, only less so.

Since it was first conceived, the MX — pardon me, Mr. President, I mean the Peacekeeper — has been a weapon in search of a rationale. It serves no purpose but to increase the risk of nuclear war.

All three Democratic presidential candidates want to scrub the weapon. But the Democrats who control the House, fearful of being labeled soft on defense in the coming campaign, grew uneasy at the thought of carrying out the stated policies of their party's leaders. Though they refused to give President Reagan funds for 40 missiles, they agreed to pay for 15 (in addition to the 21 approved last year).

So the MX lives on, this time justified as a "bargaining chip" — the last refuge of needless weapons. In the enormous U.S. nuclear arsenal, the administration could find plenty of weapons to bargain with, if it was interested in bargaining.

To replace our current ICBM force with the MX would cost a huge amount — some \$31 billion for the 100 Reagan wants (and may yet get), according to the Center for Defense Information. What does the money buy? The missile differs from the Minuteman III, the most modern of the existing missiles, in two crucial respects. First, it carries 10 warheads instead of 3. Second, it is more accurate, increasing the probability it will be able to destroy Soviet ICBMs in their silos.

Do those differences confirm that the MX is better? No — just the opposite. More warheads on each launcher means the MX would be a more tempting target. For the same investment in warheads (two per silo), the Soviets could destroy more than three times as many U.S. warheads.

Its own accuracy makes an attack on the MX more tempting still. If the MX can destroy their missiles in the ground, as intended, the Soviets have a strong incentive to destroy it first. It can't achieve its mission unless it's launched first.

That's just the point. For mere retaliation against Russian cities, air bases, factories and the like, the Minutemen are more than adequate.

Only if we want to destroy Soviet ICBMs by striking first do we need a missile as accurate as the MX.

That detail hasn't escaped the Soviets. It's been reinforced by President Reagan's proposal to put the MX in the Minuteman silos, rather than the multiple shelters recommended by Jimmy Carter and, more important, by the development of the submarine-based Trident II D-5 missile, which also is designed to hit silos.

Nutty as it sounded, and horrendously expensive though it was, Carter's basing scheme had a redeeming virtue: it was meant to protect the MX against a Soviet attack. But Reagan, while insisting that the Minuteman silos are vulnerable, now wants to put the MX in them. That makes sense — if he plans to use them before the Soviets can use theirs.

In fact, the nation's land-based missile force should be replaced, but not with the MX. What is needed is a shift to single-warhead missiles ("Midgetman").

These have one major advantage over the MX: They are an unattractive target, because they require the Soviets to use two warheads to destroy just one. So they could be deployed in existing silos without the same implication that they are meant for first-strike use. The Midgetman could also be built with a less advanced guidance system, making it less accurate than the MX.

Thus the single-warhead missile would enhance both deterrence and stability. It would be less vulnerable, warhead for warhead, than either the MX or the current ICBMs, and less threatening to the Soviets' land-based missiles. Unlike the MX, it would discourage the Soviets from starting a nuclear war.

The administration accepted the recommendation of its own commission on strategic forces to begin developing a new single-warhead missile. But it also accepted the lame advice that it couple that development with deployment of the MX. But the Midgetman and the MX are contradictory, not complementary. If one is built, the other makes no sense.

The missile that deserves to be eliminated is the MX. By saving it, the House voted for a more vulnerable America and a more dangerous world.

### Inequities riddle Olympics rules

WASHINGTON — The Soviet bloc's boycott of the Los Angeles Olympics has made all the headlines lately, but there's a fundamental flaw in the Games that will have to be addressed soon if the tradition of amateur competition is to be maintained.

In the past column, I reported that many Olympic "amateurs" make hundreds of thousands of dollars from their athletic prowess, but are still allowed to compete in the Games. Yet others are strictly forbidden from receiving any payment other than reimbursement for the barest expenses. It all depends on the particular sport, since each one has its own eligibility rules.

Old-timers will remember when Jim Thorpe was stripped of his Olympic medals when it was discovered that he had once played semi-pro baseball — a sport that had nothing to do with the events he won in the 1912 Games at Stockholm. Such purity has long since ceased to govern Olympic eligibility.

Some of the more outrageous exceptions to the Olympic ideal of amateurism are described in an unreleased report to the International Olympic Committee from William Simon, president of the U.S. committee. For example:

- "The international cycling federation has a schedule of prize money which may be posted for all races sanctioned by the national federations." So the "amateur" cyclists can rake in cash prizes as long as they're officially approved.

- The international track and field federation has proposed "the approval of a 'trust fund' (in which) athletes competing for monetary prizes may deposit their cash winnings." Simon notes that "these monies are made available to the athletes during their action career, however, to help defray living and training expenses."

- The soccer federation is considering a bizarre new rule for teams hoping to make the Olympi-

cs: "Under the guise of aiding the less strong nations, countries in preliminary rounds would be permitted to use on their teams professionals who had not attained their 23rd birthday."

Pele was once the world's highest paid athlete. He led the Brazilian national soccer team to a world championship when he was 18, and again when he was 22.

"It is my firm conviction," Simon wrote, "that the IOC Eligibility Rule should be a simple one that can be honored by the 151 National Olympic Committees ... and be readily adopted by the international federations."

The simon-pure rule he suggests: "All athletes are eligible, except those who have competed or are competing for pecuniary gain as a vocation." Then they would be ineligible "only in that single sport in which they have professionalized themselves."

If the Olympic barons are unwilling to simplify the eligibility rules, Simon would prefer to throw the Games open to all athletes, amateurs and professionals alike.

JACKSON'S BOOKKEEPING — Charges that presidential candidate Jesse Jackson is too sloppy an administrator to hold high office are based in part on widely publicized government audits of PUSH for Excellence Inc. Jackson was its honorary chairman until last year.

The audits concluded that PUSH EXCEL, as the youth organization is called, might have to give back \$2.2 million of the \$6.5 million it has received in government grants and contracts between 1978 and 1982.

I have just concluded a thorough study of Jackson's role in this apparent scandal. My associate Tony Capaccio has reviewed Education Department audits of PUSH EXCEL.

I found no evidence that Jackson had anything to do with the accounting and bookkeeping. One senior Education Department auditor confirmed that Jackson's role in

PUSH EXCEL "wasn't much in the day-to-day involvement."

During a series of routine audit review meetings with PUSH EXCEL last March, Education Department officials knocked \$1.4 million of the questionable expenditures down to \$708,427 — an amount the organization is planning to appeal.

Here are some of the items that were originally questioned, but were either wholly or partially allowed after the March meetings:

- \$6,000 in consultant fees for a project manager who was holding down a full-time university job. The challenged amount was cut in half.

- \$4,108 in travel expenses by PUSH EXCEL employees attending an Operation PUSH national convention, plus \$74 for a convention banner and \$15 for a parking ticket. After reconsideration, everything but the parking ticket was deemed a proper expenditure.

- \$3,500 for printing 10,000 Christmas cards bearing Jackson's signature and a message from him as president of Operation PUSH. "PUSH for Excellence" was printed on the outside of the cards. In March, the auditors OK'd roughly half the printing cost.

- \$1,450 for football jackets; \$1,080 for awards and the services of referees, a timer and a scorer at a PUSH EXCEL event; \$144 to send two students to a basketball championship; a \$1,500 donation to a Chicago-area girls' basketball tournament; \$190 in travel expenses for a Chicago high school boxing club that went to the National Junior Olympics in Louisville, Ky.; and \$209 for lunches at a McDonald's restaurant in Kansas City, Mo., in connection with an Athletes for Excellence program. In March, all of these challenged expenditures were found to have been legitimate.

## Side effects

Dear Dr. Donohue: In your column you point out that in severe cases of some illnesses steroids are used to quiet the inflammation. I believe it is thoughtless of a doctor to say without mentioning that one side effect of steroids could be superfluous hair on the face. There is not a woman alive who would choose this in order to quiet an inflammation. What excuse would any doctor have for doing that? I would very much appreciate it if one of your future columns could somewhat cover that topic. — R.D.

Facial hair growth is but one of the side effects of high dose, long-term use of steroid medicines. When used for a long time in high doses, steroids can also upset blood sugar, lead to a redistribution of fat to give a moon-like facial appearance, cause bone-thinning, and possibly produce ulcers.

But the point is that there are many times when side effects from any medicine have to be tolerated to bring lethal illnesses under control. I don't condone overuse of steroids or their use for minor problems. But when they are needed they must be used.

I respect your point of view. Perhaps you would temper your statement were you to question a person suffering from a muscle disease that leaves him so weakened that he is unable to raise his head or swallow food. Most feel fortunate to have drugs like steroids

available to help conquer such an illness. They would gladly put up with the unsightliness of facial hair to quiet such an inflammatory illness. And most such side effects are transient, disappearing when the medication is stopped or dosage reduced.

I have noted, perhaps a discomfiting, that just about any drug has its share of potential side effects. When they are needed they are dealt with if and when they appear. The doctor tries to prescribe use of steroids for as short a time as possible and in the lowest possible doses so that the undesired effects will be minimal.

Dear Dr. Donohue: How successful has the putting of fluoride in drinking water been? I think it's been 25 years since they started this. — A.L.F.

The American Dental Association recently released information on this. It is estimated that children drinking fluoridated water from birth have about 65 percent less tooth decay than those who have not drunk fluoridated water.

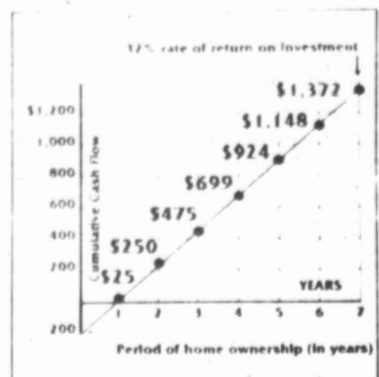

## Keith Ross likes being music minister

"The First Presbyterian Church of Houston is totally different world from the First Presbyterian Church of Big Spring," said Keith Ross, music minister at First Presbyterian Church.

Ross recalls his ministry at the Houston church. "It was a marvelous multi-staffed church. It had 23 people in various ministries, which afforded me many grand opportunities." The church also had 4,000 members.

Although he enjoyed his ministry in the Houston church, Ross said "I sort of felt boxed in. I felt I was being called to do something else."

In Houston, the church had 13 staff members in the music department and 120 in adult choir. "You always had people to do things for you."

The biggest cultural shock Ross has had since coming to Big Spring is the number of people the Big Spring church has involved in its program. The church has four staff

members and a 22-member adult choir. "Here, you are responsible for toting your own."

Ross enjoys his work at the First Presbyterian Church. "I feel very good about what has happened here. I once read one could consider its program successful if 10 percent of its members are involved. Almost 20 percent of the people are involved. We have a long way

to go but we are learning."

Ross has set goals for his ministry. "The goal I have here, and would like to see all other churches in Big Spring have, is for us to become more aware of our musical heritage and to be aware there are differences. Each denomination has its own traditions."

For the church's music program, Ross wants to keep refining because "we should do our best at all times," he said. "The Lord expects us to do our best, and we don't have to be the Mormon Tabernacle Choir to make a worthy offering."

Ross also has some goals for himself. "I want to strive to keep learning and to be here so long as I think this is where the Lord wants me to be. I don't want to ever think that I know it all. The learning process is something we are involved in until we die."

Ross became interested in music as a child. "As a child I sat back and marvelled at the music and choir. I have always been attracted


to beautiful music. I begged, hounded and cajoled my parents to let me take lessons. They made me wait two years until I was six years old."

Ross credits his parents with influencing church work and love for music. "My folks instilled on both their children the important of regular worship. We were always in church on Sunday. They were very good role models about worshipping in the church. Dad and mother are still active. At this time, they are both president of their Sunday School Classes."

"My mother had more of influence musical than my father because she was the musical one. She always said where better to share a talent, if you have it, than in the church."

Ross graduated from the University of Houston and did undergraduate work at Rice University. He wants to get a master's in theology. Ross plays the piano and organ and collects antiques.

## Cassettes selling better than records

NEW YORK (AP) — Music lovers are increasingly buying more cassettes of their favorite artists than LPs, according to a new record industry survey.

Last year, 37 percent of the money spent on music went to cassettes, while 55 percent went to albums, the five-year trend report of the Recording Industry Association of America said.

In 1979, only 7 percent of consumer dollars went to cassettes and 71 percent to LPs. During that same period, purchases of eight-track tapes steadily declined from 17 percent in 1979 to 2 percent in 1983. Singles remained fairly steady: 5 percent in 1979 and 6 percent in 1983.

Cassettes also have increased their share of the direct marketing sector by 11 percent, eclipsing eight-track sales and displacing LP sales. Albums accounted for 48 percent of direct market sales last year, cassettes 43 percent and eight-tracks 9 percent.

Rock music dominates record buying habits, according to the report, going from 34 percent to 35 percent from 1982-83. The second biggest seller, pop and easy listening, has remained steady at 14 percent.

The biggest increase occurred in the so-called blackdance category, jumping from 7 to 11 percent in 1983. The Association said this reflected the commercialism of dance-oriented crossover music — hits that move from the pop and rock charts to the rhythm and blues charts and vice versa, such as Michael Jackson's "Beat It" and "Billie Jean" or Culture Club's "Karma Chameleon."

Country, gospel, classical and jazz music declined, while music in the "other" category — Latin, folk, spoken word, etc. — increased.

Women increased their music spending last year by 1 percent, going from 43 to 44 percent over 1982.

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## For sale: One Irish mansion

LONDON (AP) — Six English ticket-buyers who won a 30-room Irish country mansion in a raffle in February will auction off the property this summer, the owners announced Thursday.

Middleton Park, set in 380 acres of countryside 50 miles from Dublin, was once owned by the trainers of the British queen's horses and was lived in by T.E. Lawrence, also known as "Lawrence of Arabia".

The 140-year-old mansion is valued at \$1.12 million. Its owner, an Irish millionaire, raffled it off at \$196 a ticket; 9,000 tickets were sold, bringing \$1.76 million.

The bear was last sighted Sunday, but officials believe he may still be in the area.



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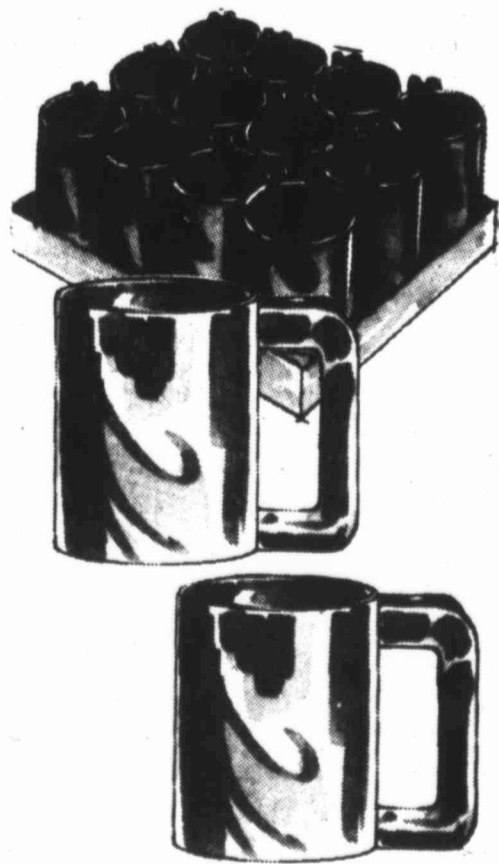
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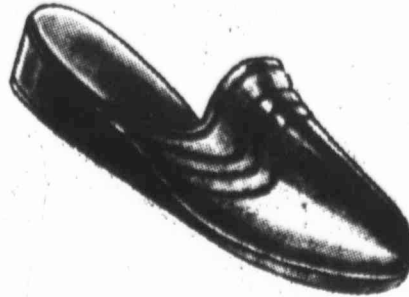

## Suns claim momentum will pull them through

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The Phoenix Suns say they have the momentum but the Los Angeles Lakers have history on their side heading into Game 6 tonight in their NBA Western Conference final.

The Lakers, clinging to a 3-2 lead in the best-of-seven series, have never lost a playoff series to the Suns — winning in seven games in 1969-70, in five games in 1979-80 and sweeping the 1981-82 set in four straight.

Los Angeles, seeking its third consecutive Western Conference crown and fourth berth in the league finals in the last five seasons, had been 7-0 in playoff games this year on its homecourt.

## National's success story wins again

The breeze was blowing out again in Wrigley Field and the high-flying Chicago Cubs continued to soar along on the 17-mile-an-hour tailwind.

"When the flags are stiff like that, the only thing you can do is hope to outscore them," said Atlanta Manager Joe Torre.

The Braves rapped out 24 hits Thursday, 12 in each game, but it wasn't enough to prevent a double-header sweep by the Cubs. They won the opener 10-7 as Leon Durham smacked a pair of three-run homers and took the nightcap 7-5 as Ron Cey hit a three-run shot.

Jody Davis had a solo homer in each game, helping the Cubs stretch their winning streak to six games. They have scored 42 runs during the streak, all in Wrigley Field's friendly confines.

"We're getting some tremendous mileage out of different people," said Manager Jim Frey, whose surprising Cubs have collected 10 or more hits in 21 of their 41 games and lead Philadelphia by two games in the National League

East. "I don't know how long that's going to last, but we have to take advantage of it as long as it lasts."

In other NL games, the Phillies edged the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-3, the San Francisco Giants nipped the New York Mets 3-2 and the Pittsburgh Pirates downed the Cincinnati Reds 5-1.

The Cubs' sweep was their first double-header success since Aug. 3, 1980. Besides Durham's first-game slugging — giving him 11 homers and 37 RBIs — Bob Dernier went 5-for-5. Chicago built a 9-0 lead after six innings in handing Pascual Perez his first loss. The Cubs scored six runs in the fifth inning, with Durham, Mel Hall and Davis all homering.

Perez, who allowed seven runs and 11 hits in 4-1/3 innings, refused to meet with newsmen after the first game. But Pete Falcone, who was tagged for six runs and nine hits in 4-2/3 innings of the nightcap, said:

Infante and his crew are 4-9 and out of the playoff picture. All they want is to get a victory before 40,000 to 50,000 fans expected.

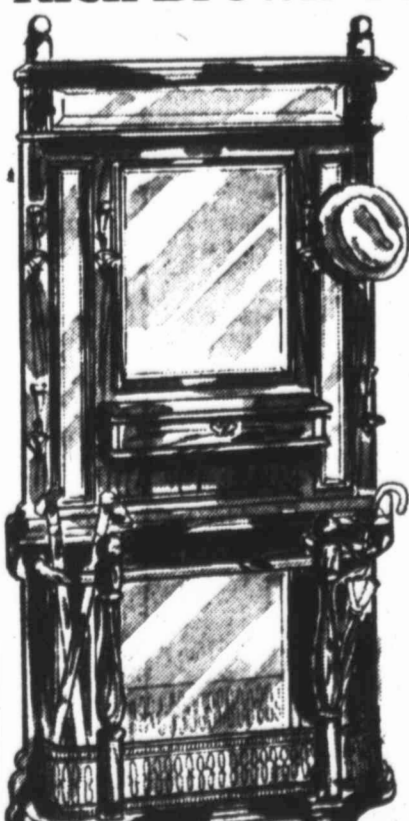

**Bankers accused in embezzlement**

**BARCELONA, Spain (AP)** - Judicial authorities have initiated legal proceedings against the president of the Catalan regional government and 24 other former bank officers on charges of embezzlement and forging documents.  
 The proceedings were begun Wednesday by Spain's chief prosecutor, Luis Antonio Buron Barba, who charged that the 25 - all former officers of the Banca Catalana - had embezzled the equivalent of \$133 million during the 1974-82 period before the bank's collapse.  
 The proceedings began less than a month after Catalan leader Jordi Pujol and his nationalist Convergencia i Unio party won a landslide victory in elections for the autonomous Catalan parliament.  
 The Socialists, who rule at the national level, came in a distant second.  
 Miguel Roca, a spokesman for Pujol's party in the national parliament, said the legal case might be retaliation by the Socialist government of Prime Minister Felipe Gonzalez against the CIU's April 29 victory.  
 Pujol is scheduled to be sworn in May 28 as head of the Catalan government for another four-year term.  
 The Spanish judicial system is independent of the government, although the general prosecutor is named by the prime minister.  
 The Spanish government took over the Banca Catalana after it went bankrupt in 1982. It has since been purchased by another banking consortium.

**Russian volcano spews red lava**

**MOSCOW (AP)** - The Soviet Union's biggest volcano has erupted, spewing out ash, gases and red-hot rocks in a "fiery lava" that melted the snow on its slopes, Tass said Thursday.  
 The volcano on the Kamchatka Peninsula of the Soviet Far East, known as Kluchevskaya Sopka, or sprinkling mountain, lies some 200 miles north of Petropavlovsk-Kamchatski. The 16,000-foot peak is the most active volcano in the Kamchatka range and last erupted in 1983, Tass said.  
 The official news agency did not say when the latest eruption occurred. It said a huge cloud of cinders and red hot ash formed above the mountain's crater, reaching a height of about 1,000 feet, and lava poured down the mountainside, melting snow in its path.  
 No casualties or damage were reported in the uninhabited area.

**Pope blasts movie porn**

**VATICAN CITY (AP)** - Pope John Paul II on Thursday denounced what he called an increase in pornography and warned of the dangers of sex in movies.  
 "Young people and even children are being subjected to the offensive convincing of models of life and behavior which are the polar opposites of the Christian concept of life," the pontiff told a Catholic motion picture group.  
 "The phenomenon of increasing pornography cannot but worry every human being who has in his heart the safeguarding of the dignity of the person and the moral formation of the young generations," he said.  
 John Paul also condemned what he called "degrading use" of motion picture resources for pornographic purposes.  
 The pontiff made his comments to 150 representatives of the Catholic Association of Movie Operators, the group responsible for showing films under the supervision of Italy's Catholic parishes.  
 "You know the persuasive force of messages transmitted by modern means of social communication," he said, speaking in Italian.  
 "You know how many types of attacks they carry out continually against every system of values, against life, against morality, against truth and justice, against the fundamental social institutions, especially the family," he added.

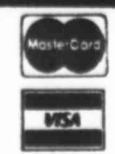
