Fatal accident in Bovina

A two vehicle accident at US 60 and SH 86 in Bovina Friday February 7 claimed the life of a Clovis man. At 7:13 p.m. first responders were called to the scene of the accident. Bovina EMS, Bovina firemen, Sheriff's deputies, and DPS troopers were dispatched.

The DPS report says Cecil Spriggs, 63, of Clovis was driving a 2009 Chevrolet Impala north on SH 86 where he stopped at the intersection of US 60 and SH 86 but failed to yield right of way by proceeding into the intersection. He was struck on the driver side by a 2007 Saturn driven by Armondo Subias, 27, of Clovis and a 3-year-old passenger.

Spriggs was transported by Bovina EMS to Parmer Medical Center to wait for LifeStar but he died in the hospital before the helicopter transfer. He was pronounced dead by Dr. Gary Webb at 8:06 p.m. Subias and his 3-year-old passenger were transported to PMC by Friona EMS who had been called to assist. The two had minor injuries according to the DPS report. All victims were wearing seatbelts.

Water district rule revisions discussed

Proposed revisions to the rules of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) were discussed during a Feb. 3 meeting of the district's County Advisory Committees in Lubbock.

More than 75 participants listened on as the five-member HPWD Board of Directors outlined proposed revisions to Rule 5, including an annual groundwater production rate (APR) of 18 inches of water (1.5 acre-feet per acre), several alternative methods of reporting groundwater use, and clarifi-

cation of the definition of contiguous acres.

Each of the 16 counties within the HPWD service area has an active County Advisory Committee, which serves as a liaison between the district's Board of Directors and residents of their respective county.

"The input of County Advisory Committee members and the public is critical as the Board considers revisions to the district's rules. This is just one of many meetings being held throughout the district in early 2014 to gain input

from all interested parties," said Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo.

A question and answer session on the proposed rule revisions encompassed most of the meeting. Among items discussed were different cropping scenarios under the proposed one irrigated crop certification, water banking, protection of private property rights, and groundwater issues to be discussed during the 84th Texas Legislature.

Tate added that the County Advisory Committee members are the first group

to review and offer comments on a proposed set of revised rules that the Board is working to complete by April 1. The district will conduct rulemaking hearings as required by Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code. The Board anticipates adopting rule revisions later this year to be effective Jan. 1, 2015.

"Nothing is set in stone at this time. The HPWD Board of Directors seek the advice, consent, and support of all stakeholders in the district as we work to develop a more flexible

policy and set of rules that stakeholders can agree to. Once that is accomplished, we can then return to the business of water conservation," Tate said.

Several County Advisory Committee members agreed.

"I appreciate the district's Board of Directors working to achieve the best solution. The one crop certification lets a producer make their own choice—instead of building a bureaucracy to do it for you," said Kevin Riley of Springlake.

"We must be pro-active

when it comes to water issues. It's important that we come together as a family to take care of business here in the Panhandle-South Plains region," said Chris Grotegout of Dawn.

County Advisory Committee members also received an update on past, present, and future district policy goals from Precinct Five District Director Ronnie Hopper of Petersburg. HPWD General Manager Jason Coleman provided an overview of current district work programs and activities.

Council approves upcoming activities

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday evening to attend to a lengthy schedule of items that included hearing from the public on the proposed dedication of one

side of US Highway 60, upcoming elections and the 2013 Audit Report.

The meeting opened with Mayor Rick White asking for public comments on the proposed dedication. As

there were no citizens on hand to discuss the proposal, the hearing was closed.

The meeting continued with the council approving a special warranty deed from the Friona Economic

Development Corporation. The deed allows for the new right of way on Main and Hwy. 60 to be landscaped.

Texas Department of Transportation Area Engineer Stevan Perez was on hand to update the council on the planned right of way.

"We are right on schedule. Construction will begin in July and should be finished by November," stated Perez.

The council voted unanimously to hold elections for city officers on May 10, 2014. The Mayor, two at-large Aldermen positions and one special election position are up for election.

The council accepted a resolution to authorize the Mayor to sign a joint election agreement with the Friona Independent School District in the upcoming elections. City Manager Patricia Phipps clarified that the school district will

hold their own early voting but the city will take care of the election on May 10, 2014.

The 2014 seal coating project was unanimously approved with an agreement for professional services from Brandt Engineering to oversee the project.

Douglass Field of Randall Field, P.C. delivered the audit report for the fiscal year of October 1, 2012 to September 30, 2013. After review of the report with the council he stated, "Everything is good." The council unanimously approved the report.

Friona Police Chief Frank Mooney reported on the 2013 Friona Police Department's Racial Profiling findings. He stated there were no complaints detected. Mooney explained that that the report is a comparison of the last seven years, traffic contacts and then compared to the current census data.

"There are no inconsistencies with the Friona Police Department," stated Mooney.

Chief Mooney went on to discuss the current issue with a School Resource Officer by saying that they have sent off four more applications in addition to the current three applicants.

The Friona PD is in the process of changing a number of their computer programs that will make obtaining an accident report easier on the public.

Mooney stated that he is looking into building a CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) team that will enable the community to handle any emergencies that may occur.

The council voted unanimously to approve the January 2014 accounts payable and financial statement before adjourning into closed session. No actions were taken during the closed session.



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Mayor's Minutes

I wanted to communicate this month some projects that the city will be completing this fiscal year.

I mentioned last month the 1,000,000-gallon water tank, located northeast of Friona is in need of repair. The top of the tank will be replaced and the inside of the tank to be repaired and repainted. This project will begin on February 17 and will be completed in approximately 6 weeks, depending upon the weather. The cost of this project will be approximately \$445,000.

Each year the city seal coats a certain amount of streets across the city.

The city places this job up for bid so I cannot tie a dollar figure to this project. Once the city completes the bid process, a map of the city will be posted in the Friona Star to illustrate the areas of the city that will receive the seal coating. There are approximately 40 blocks that will receive the seal coating.

The city will purchase a new police car. The city has six police cars, the oldest of the six will be rotated out, and the new one placed in service. The car rotated out will be evaluated and if in decent condition, it will be painted and used in the EMS department.

Otherwise, it will be auctioned off. I was amazed to learn that we put 15,000 to 20,000 miles per vehicle and these are in town miles not highway miles.

The city will be placing a new roof on Prairie Acres and Heritage Estates. Due to the recent hail storms, these roofs are in need of repair. The city does have insurance money to cover the cost of the new roof.

The city will be placing a new roof on the Library. The roof will be open for bid later on this year so I do not want to discuss any cost factors due contractors making bids on this project.

EMS: Had 22 runs:

11-911 calls, 3-transfers and 4-no transfers. We collected \$8,278.58, however, we wrote-off \$20,494.54 in payments not collected. The write-off deals with money not collected through Medicare. For example, we bill out \$1,000, Medicare will pay approximately 40% of the total bill. The city cannot change the way Medicare pays out. It's something that we have lived with and will continue to live with. The city will continue to write off the unpaid balance from Medicare every month.

Court: Judge Campbell had 72 new cases last month. There were eight

new Juvenile cases filed and Judge Campbell collected \$7,908.20 in fines.

Fire: The Volunteer Fire Department responded to seven fire calls last month. There were several small grass fires, a vehicle rollover, and a couple of calls where smoke was detected but fortunately there was no fire.

Water: The city pumped 9,882,000 gallons of water last month and billed out \$52,085.56. The city sold 12,008,100 gallon of water.

Police Department: The police responded to 170 calls in the month of January. There were four arrests made: 2-Narcotic, 1-DWI, and 1-public intoxication. There were 54 warnings issued. The new police car has arrived and Lt. Jimenez is driving this vehicle.

Chief Mooney is working to implement a CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) Program. Basically, it is a team

of approximately 10 individual volunteers in the community that will be trained in different emergency responses. To name a few: first aid, natural disaster response, fire suppression, medical treatment, and triage. We will have more information concerning this opportunity in the near future.

Lastly, this is not a city issue, but more of a community concern. People have been asking me about the status of the Friona Golf Course. I can report that I have had several conversations with Dee King and at the present time no decision has been made to close the golf course. Our conversation has been centered around discussing different options to try to keep the course open. However, at this time no concrete decisions have been made. I will be able to discuss in more detail in the near future.

As I sat and pondered what the perfect gift would be I couldn't help but think


that maybe we need to just show our loved ones how much we love them every minute of every day.

I like Chocolate and I don't think I am alone. If I had a penny for all the boxes of chocolate sold this week, I would have a lot of pennies.




Now I hate to devastate the philosophical genius of Forrest Gump's mother here, but it is a bit scary living as if you don't know what you are going to get. Isn't it?

Passing on the farm; not everyone wants it

While tax laws may have made it easier to pass the farm from one generation to the next, changing times have some families looking at the end of a way of life, according to a 30-year veteran of agricultural estate planning.

Dr. Wayne Hayenga, professor emeritus and Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service specialist from College Station, has traveled throughout Texas for three decades trying to help people pass their agricultural estates on to the next generation.

Hayenga was in the High Plains recently for seven farm and ranch estate planning workshops which attracted about 300 people, most with the same goal in mind.

"Every time there are changes to the tax laws, we see more demand for these workshops," he said. "But the people basically just want to figure out how to keep the business going for one or two of the children and make sure all the rest are still taken care of."

Hayenga said estate tax laws have made that easier over the years. Forty years ago, a person could only pass on \$60,000 worth of property tax free and now that's up to \$5.3 million. Also, even if the property

increased in value either because of inflation or demand, he said, "we don't have to pay any capital gains tax on it now when someone dies."

However, the continually changing tax laws and the dynamics of the agriculture industry itself are making estate planning anything but a one-size-fits-all deal, said the agricultural economist and attorney.

"Thirty years ago, I could throw something out to 10 farmers that seven or more of them would understand and be able to utilize. Now as farming operations have gotten bigger and different, if you have the same 10 farmers, I could throw out something and maybe only three have the business design that could utilize that idea. The other seven we have to come up with a different plan."

Hayenga likened it to the medical world. "When I was a kid we had the family doctor and he took care of you from your scalp to your toenails. Today we have the eye doctor, throat doctor, heart doctor, diabetes doctor, foot doctor and dermatologist. Everything is specialized these days."

And just as the operations have changed, so

have the families. More often there may be no one interested in running the family farm, he said.

"You may have a 1,000 acres at Dumas and you live there and know the tenants and suppliers and everything there. But if you die and give it to three kids, one in Chicago, one in Houston and one who knows where, they don't know people who can properly take care of it for them. So they worry about that. That asset of yours becomes a worry or a liability for them."

Economies of scale for agriculture also have changed the picture, Hayenga said. Farming was a very labor intensive operation in the 1860s when the Homestead Act was passed.

"For a family with a couple mules and some kids, it was a big job to take care of 160 acres of land and raise corn, cotton, oats or whatever. Now with the machinery, equipment, chemical applications and the irrigation systems required, for a lot of farmers, I'd say, it is hard to make a living if you don't have 4,000 or 5,000 acres of land and some may have 15,000 to 25,000 acres.

"And rather than using

a 40 horsepower Farmall M, the most recent tractor we bought had 485 horsepower, which is 10 times bigger. We can plant 300 acres a day; whereas back when I was a child, my father could plant 15 acres on a really good day."

Farms have had to consolidate to stay in business, and as a result, there are not always those one or two children who want to take over such a major operation, Hayenga said.

"The agricultural ladder I learned about back in college was: you start out farming as a hired man working for a parent or neighbor, then you leased the land, then you bought the land and were an owner or operator, and finally you retired to town

and leased to a tenant or let one of your kids take over," he said.

"We don't have that anymore, because particularly in the 70s, a lot of farmers were doing well and they educated their kids - sent them off to college and they got a professional degree. When they were ready to come back in the 80s, it was a terrible economic time in agriculture. And the question became 'Why give up a good job in Dallas to take a terrible job back on the farm?'"

Also, Hayenga said, as more of the farm youth moved away and married someone from the big city, it wasn't as easy to get everyone to agree they wanted to move back to the farm.

"We want our kids to want what we give them, but that doesn't always work," he said. "What I have seen lately is the heirs have started to squabble - they just can't seem to agree. Instead of having land in Dumas, they may prefer a larger retirement plan or to increase the size of their home, and prefer to just sell off the farm."

"We sometimes hear people say they had to sell the farm to pay the estate taxes. But, mostly that's not true; just some people don't want the farm."
