## SHOT BY A POSSE.

### Little Girl and a Man Killed Near Shenandoah, Pa.,

### AND A NUMBER ARE WOUNDED.

#### The Sheriff and His Men Were Endeavoring to Quell a Disturbance and a Fight Was the Result.

Shenandoah, Pa., Sept. 23.—A sheriff's posse fired on a crowd of riotous men near here Friday afternoon, killing two persons and wounding seven others.

Sheriff Toole and Deputies O'Connell and Brennemann were called to Shenandoah to suppress the mobs that threatened mine workers and colliery property. At quitting time the three sheriffs and a small posse whom the sheriff had summoned on the ground went to the Indian Ridge colliery of the Reading company to escort the workmen to their homes. The colliery is located a short distance from Shenandoah. The workmen left for home shortly after 6 o'clock. They walked up the middle of East Center street and reached the Lehigh Valley railroad station. Here had gathered a large crowd of Poles, Slavs and Hungarians, men women and children, who lined both sides of the street. A shot rang out from a saloon. This was followed by a shower of stones. Many of the crowd had picked up sticks and stones and were acting in a threatening manner. Seeing what had come to pass the sheriff who had previously cautioned his men to keep cool and not to use their firearms, commanded them to fire. The order was obeyed with terrible results. The crowd pursued the sheriff and his posse to the Ferguson house, where they took refuge. Sheriff Toole shortly afterward telephoned to Harrisburg and asked that a detachment of troops be sent here.

Following is a list of the killed and wounded:

Mike Yuckavage, shot in the eye.  
A little girl, name unknown, shot in the back of the neck.

Wounded, so far as can be learned:

Edward Coyle, aged 50, bullet wound near the heart.

Michael Seanlan, shot in the arm.

John Wudickey, aged 40, shot in the hand.

Peter Stalmocovich, 28, shot in the shoulder.

Mike Sazitska, shot in shoulder.

Anthony Axulgee, shot in the left side, serious.

Up to the 22nd Philadelphia had raised \$67,000 for Galveston.

There was a three-inch rainfall at Dallas on the night of the 20th.

### Progress.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 23.—At a meeting of the relief committee reports of progress were received from each of the ward chairmen. Arrangements were made for supplying ice through the several section committees.

Chairman McVitie announced that the general store had a large stock of clothing on hand, and he renewed instructions for ward chairmen to distribute it from their stores.

Letters of sympathy for Galveston have been received at Washington from the president of France and emperor of Germany.

It is estimated that 3000 houses went down in the storm at Galveston.

### Bridge Completed.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 23.—The Galveston bay bridge is completed, and the first train to arrive since Sept. 8 pulled into the union depot at 6:25 o'clock Friday. It was Santa Fe train No. 5, due here at 9:05 Thursday night. Full passenger train service has been resumed by all the lines entering the city, via Virginia Point. The Gulf and Interstate, which enters via Bolivar Point and the ferry, will not be in shape for several days yet. The five lines which cross the bay bridge operate thirty passenger trains daily.

### Policy Decided Upon.

Washington, Sept. 23.—The United States government has decided upon its policy relative to the Chinese situation, and its position communicated to the powers.

This was the official announcement authorized. Out of courtesy to the powers the decision of the government will not be made public until the communications embodying the statement of the American position have time to reach those to whom they are addressed.

### Trusts to be Discussed.

Syracuse, Neb., Sept. 23.—In his speech here Mr. Bryan announced that in his speech at Nebraska City next Wednesday evening he would discuss the trust question because of the presence here of the starch combination. He said that the Democrats believed as much in tariff reform as they had in 1892, as much in the free coinage of silver as they had in 1896, but neither of these was the issue of supreme importance now.

### Rumored Consolidation.

New York, Sept. 23.—Rumors in connection with the proposed consolidation of the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies were discussed by Russell Sage, the largest stockholder in the former company. Mr. Sage said that reports of such a combine had been in circulation a long time. Up to the present time they had been talked over by the directors informally, but there had been no definite or written proposition presented by either side.

### West in Command.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 23.—General headquarters have been established in Central park, with the two battalions camped in the park and in Ball High School square. The third battalion is camped on the beach near Tremont.

Gen. Scurry delivered the troops to the command of Col. West. The regiment was drawn up in line in front of Gen. Scurry's headquarters, at the telephone building, where the general delivered them a brief address.

Negroes at Corsicana, Tex., who refused to work were arrested, charged with vagrancy.

### Fate of Four.

Ponchatoula, La., Sept. 23.—Four negroes were lynched here who were suspected of burglarizing the house of Henry Hatfield, in Tangipahoa parish. The victims were:

Isaiah Rollins, aged 18.

Charles Elliott, aged 20.

George Bickham, aged 22.

Nathaniel Bowman, aged 47.

It is stated there has been an epidemic of burglaries in the lower section of Tangipahoa parish.

At Houston it is claimed that thousands of persons need help in the coast country.

## INSURGENTS SLEW

### Twenty-Four of Our Troops, Also Wounding Numbers.

### A REPORT SENT BY GENERAL.

#### McArthur Communicates the Particulars to the Authorities at Washington and Estimates the Filipino Loss.

Washington, Sept. 22.—A dispatch has been received from Gen. MacArthur, which confirms the report cabled to the Associated Press from Manila regarding the activity of the insurgents. The blank spaces are words which could not be deciphered. The dispatch is as follows:

Manila, Sept. 19.—Adjutant General, Washington: Considerable activity throughout Luzon. Fighting reported vicinity Carig and Estella, Isabella province. Insurgents estimate 500, probably much exaggerated, but sufficient force to make in district heretofore quiet. In the Ilocos provinces Samuel B. M. Young (brigadier general) reports numerous small and lively affairs and has called so emphatically for more force that Kingsbury's squadron, Third cavalry, and Borden's battalion, Fifth infantry, have been sent him, other battalion, Fifth, same destination upon arrival. Country north Pasig, including all of Bulacan, very much disturbed, and numerous contacts with small parties throughout that district south of Pasig, including Tayabas province (Luzon) same conditions obtain, which activity has been anticipated and reported upon in letters Aug. 23 and cable Aug. 31. Sept. 16 David Mitchell (captain Fifteenth infantry), ninety men, company L, Fifteenth infantry, from Siniloan, Laguna province, attacked insurgent General Cailles, who had 800 men in position at Mavilac, same province. Desperate fight ensued, which was pushed from the front with great pertinacity by Mitchell across causeway and through water waist deep; attack under George Cook (captain) with forty men, company K, Fifteenth infantry, and ten men, company B, Thirty-seventh volunteer infantry, could not reach enemy's position because of high water in arm of lake, which could not be crossed; entire country was afloat in consequence of recent rains; this very much impeded our southern section. After an hour and twenty minutes' fighting, command withdrew to Siniloan. Upon renewal of operations the Eighteenth found that the insurgents had escaped from Mavilac the previous night, most of them, no doubt, going back into contiguous barrios to appear for time being or until called into the field again as peaceful amitches. Casualties all occurred in Mitchell's command, consisting of 130 men and four officers, twenty-four of them being killed. Thirty-three per cent is a profoundly impressive loss and indicates stubbornness of fight, fearless leadership of officers and splendid response of men. MACARTHUR.

### Red Cross Work.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 22.—Miss Clara Barton has established a temporary home for the orphans of the city and is co-operating with Mr. H. L. New, representative of the Children's Aid society of New York. Mrs. Lucy Mills of the board of managers of the Galveston's orphans' home is at work collecting the orphans and turning them over to the Red Cross society, which will take care of them until the Children's Aid society finds homes for them.

### McMinn Chosen.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 22.—There has been some little confusion in regard to what did actually occur between the Populist and Republican committees which met to consider the fusion of forces for the state campaign. It was claimed by some that the failure to agree came about through the refusal of the Populists to consent to pull down their electors and substitute Republican electors instead. Now that the conventions have adjourned, the truth comes out. Both committees in the presence of each other agreed that the discussion as to fusion really never extended any further than the governorship. True, some remarks were made about other places on the ticket, but the official and serious discussion was confined to the matter of the governorship. That was taken up, and as there was no agreement on it no other negotiations were made.

The Populists say that the utmost good humor and courtesy marked the conference, that they went to San Antonio at the suggestion of the anti-Green and Green elements. After they got there the Green element invited them to meet a committee of Republicans, but no such invitation was extended them by the anti-Green element. After the efforts had failed the Republican committee of the Green element met. It unanimously offered the nomination for governor to Mr. Atwell, but he declined. The ticket as it is now constituted was then made up. Mr. George Green of Dallas was elected as a member of the executive committee from the Dallas district and Judge S. H. Lupkin of Meridian, Bosque county, was nominated for congress, Dr. A. M. Cochran of Dallas was nominated for congress by the Green wing at Hillsboro last March. The action of the anti-Green wing places two Republicans in the field for congress from the sixth district unless one of them withdraws.

### Fort Worth Inundated.

Fort Worth, Tex., Sept. 22.—A heavy rain fell here all night Thursday night, amounting to 7.5 inches in thirteen hours.

Culverts, streets and sewers were greatly damaged.

The Trinity river has raised 21 feet and is within eighteen inches of the highest ever known. The West Fork has not begun to discharge its volume of water yet.

Many families lost all their belongings and barely escaped with their lives from the houses in the river valley.

The Texas & Pacific bridge across the Sycamore is dangerous.

The Polytechnic street car bridge over that stream has gone, as is the wagon bridge over Clear Fork.

Cars are abandoned on that and Arlington Height line.

The stock yards line is suspended as water is over all the tracks.

### Dallas County Flooded.

Dallas, Tex., Sept. 21.—Later reports of the storm in the county show a worse condition than was thought to be the case early yesterday morning. The damage to cotton is enormous and many washouts have occurred to wagon and railroad bridges. The Katy flyer met a washout this side of Lancaster and come into Dallas on the Central track. Every stream in the county is out of its banks and still rising.

### Said to be True.

Washington, Sept. 22.—Lieut. R. P. Hobson appears to be correct in his statement that Spanish officers sunk their own ships at the battle of Manila. Officials hold that it does not detract from Admiral Dewey's victory. Hobson has been ordered to duty at New York navy yard.

The report from Guam to the surgeon general of the navy says conditions on the island are improving.

Populist Nominee for governor, McMinn, says it is his intention to make an active canvass all over the state.

## NAMED NOMINEES

### Did the Hawley Republicans in City of San Antonio.

### R. E. HANNAY PLACED AT HEAD

#### Of Full State Ticket, While Cecil A. Lyon of Sherman Was Chosen Chairman of Executive Committee.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 21.—In the Hawley convention a committee consisting of one member from each congressional district in the state was selected by the respective congressional delegations for the purpose of formulating a state ticket to be nominated by the convention. They reported the following ticket, which was unanimously nominated:

For Governor—R. E. Hannay of Waller county.

Lieutenant-Governor—John B. Schmitz of Denton county.

Attorney General—J. McCormick of Dallas county.

Treasurer—C. K. McDowell of Dickens county.

Comptroller—John C. Gibbons of Lamar county.

Land Commissioner—C. G. Brewster of Webb county.

Superintendent of Public Instruction—David Abner of Gaudalup county.

Railroad Commissioner—C. B. Peck of Harris county.

Marion Williams' proposition to fuse with his (Populist) party was not agreed to.

Prof. David Abner of Gaudalup county nominated Hon. Cecil Lyon for chairman.

Nat. Q. Henderson nominated Hon. Webster Henderson.

Maj. C. B. Peck of Harris nominated Hon. H. F. McGregor.

Seconding speeches were made on behalf of each candidate.

Mr. Lyon was elected.

Election of secretary was referred to the executive committee.

Mr. Lyon appeared on the stage and was greeted with wild enthusiasm. He stated that his policy would be not to decapitate county or senatorial chairmen simply because they differed with him. He said he and his committee were "going to camp on the trail of the other outfit until they had their hides nailed on the fence."

After the presentation and adoption of the usual resolution of thanks the convention adjourned sine die.

The platform declares trusts to be the pets of Democratic leaders.

### Formally Opened.

Merida, Yucatan, Sept. 21.—The railroad from Merida to Peto, which has been under construction for twenty-one years, was formally declared finished.

The president of the republic, the governor and a party of prominent gentlemen made a trip from Merida to Peto in a special train which at all points along the line was received with great enthusiasm.

### Galveston's Dead.

Galveston, Tex., Sept. 21.—The good weather has been a God-send and sanitation is being improved. Two hundred and seventy-three dead were recovered Wednesday and it is now believed that the ruins in the east, south and west ends contain no less than 700 corpses.

With next Saturday supplies will be denied all men at work and earnings money. This will restore the retail business in part. Widows, orphans, sick or crippled men will continue to receive support, but direct food and clothing relief will be confined to only those of need is investigated.

Mr. Bryan says he will debate with Senator Hanna, provided the latter is regarded as the Republican nominee for president.

### Governor's Statement.

Houston, Tex., Sept. 21.—Gov. Joseph D. Sayers wired the following in part, under date of the 19th:

"The situation to-night is as far as known to me, is improved and will, I believe, should we have fair weather, continue to improve. The method of distributing the benefactions of the people has become systematized and has been reduced to the lowest expense possible, and in this I have had the hearty and voluntary assistance of the railway, express, telegraph and telephone companies, all of whom have promptly and without charge transmitted supplies and messages, besides contributing to the relief of the sufferers. Galveston is being managed by its own municipal authorities, supplemented by the assistance of committees composed of the best citizens, and also by the aid of Gen. Scurry. I am also informed that United States Marshal Dr. Grant has rendered and is rendering most valuable aid.

"The state revenue agent, Mr. Jameson, has also been sent to Galveston and will assist in the pending work. Judge Talliferro of Houston, a gentleman of integrity and experience, has taken charge of Brazoria county and the mainland of Galveston county, and I have already transmitted to him quite a large sum of money to be used for supplying that particular district, besides having previously shipped to Angleton, Alvin and Velasco a very large quantity of flour and bacon. The county judge of Fort Bend county has charge of supplies for that county. He has already been furnished with a large shipment of flour and bacon. The sheriff of Waller county has been directed to organize the suffering committee in that county, and so soon as I am notified of the perfection of organization in Waller county supplies will be rapidly forwarded.

The governor also thanks the people of the United States for their kindness.

### Missionaries Murdered.

Washington, Sept. 21.—The war department has received the following:

Pekin, Sept. 17.—In further reply to your number 38, the following is accepted here as reliable: Two daughters of Atwater and twenty-six others were murdered at Tayuan, July 9th, Clapp and wife and four others murdered at Taikan, July 31st, Atwater, wife and two children and six others murdered by their escort near Pen Chow Fu, August 15th, in San Si province. The same message reports that six persons, Dixon and wife, Oeurren and wife, and a single gentleman and single lady, as having escaped from a mission.

### Distress at Hitchcock.

Hitchcock, Tex., Sept. 21.—Distress in this vicinity is appalling. Everything was wiped out. Buildings not only blown down but were washed away. The town had eight feet of water to contend with. It is surrounded by dead cattle, telegraph poles, railroad wreckages and bales and sacks of cotton. Fifty per cent of the buildings in the coast country we destroyed. The main dead in this section will number five hundred.

Wash Lively, colored, was stabbed to death at Dallas, Texas, and Hattie Turner, also colored, severely cut. The latter's husband was jailed.

The Woodmen have given Galveston over \$3000.

A negro was shot at Galveston while trying to burglarize a house.

**To Clean and Polish a Piano.**

In cleaning and polishing a piano go over the woodwork with a cloth wet with paraffine oil, being generous with the oil where the woodwork is very much soiled. Let this remain two or three hours; this is to soften the dirt. Then wash with soap and water and a soft cloth, being careful not to let any water touch the works inside the piano. **Extortionate Prices.**

"Paris is more rapacious than ever," indignantly declares a business man just back from the French capital. One hundred and forty francs a day (\$28) for a hall bedroom five flights up and one meal is rather steep, according to my idea. The proprietor declared he was ruined, and I hope he is."

**Warm Welcome for Barrett.**

Mr. John Barrett spoke the other night at Auburn, Me., and the following is the introduction to the account of the meeting given in the Lewiston Journal: "All up for the Hon. John Barrett, late of Salem! A 'hand' for the ex-minister, the pamphleteer, the newspaper correspondent, the student of foreign affairs, the public speaker who held the great audience at Auburn hall spellbound for two hours on Saturday evening. 'A remarkable speech,' 'A convincing speech,' 'Pure history,' 'The conclusive evidence of absolute facts,' These were some of the comments on it."

**Booker Washington Honored.**

Booker T. Washington has accepted the position offered him by the directors of the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian exposition as chief of the negro department. It has been suggested that designs for the negro building be invited from colored architects throughout the United States, it being the intention of the managers and of Mr. Washington that the department shall be entirely the work of the colored man, in order to make the exhibit represent the achievements and possibilities of the race.

**An Electric Fence Protector.**

A peach grower near Georgetown, Del., protected his trees from the depredations of fruit thieves this summer by conspicuously displaying this legend on signs nailed to the fence surrounding his orchard: "Caution! This Fence is Surmounted by a Live Electric Wire!" The wire could be seen on top of the fence, strung on glass insulators and no one attempted to meddle with it, but now that he has marketed his crop the owner of the orchard admits that it was a "dummy."

**To Banquet 15,000 Mayors.**

On the 28th of this month President Loubet will give a banquet and feté in Paris to the mayors of France and the French colonies. There are over 30,000 mayors in France, not including those in the colonies, and all these have been invited. A similar banquet was given by the late President Carnot at the time of the last previous exposition, and it brought together 15,000 mayors. This year a much larger number is expected.

**Bright Young Boers.**

Olive Schreiner says that the children of the Boers carry away all the intellectual honors in South Africa. They fill the schools and bear off the prizes. They are the lawgivers, the magistrates, the successful barristers, the able doctors; and she attributes it to the fact that these Dutch Africans come of an exceptionally able stock, which for several generations lay fallow, drawing strength from the soil, and not exposed to the devitalizing influence of cities.

**Only a Temporary Advantage.**

It is a mistake to suppose that the prohibitionists have elected a governor of South Carolina. Their candidate led in the first democratic primaries the other day, but the State dispensary was represented by four candidates, who divided the dispensary vote. At the next primary the voting will be confined to the two leading candidates, and the prohibitionists will then be beaten probably.

**Settling Land Question.**

"Ah, well," said the collier, squaring up to the earl, "come, and I'll fight thee for it."

**Costly Fly Try.**

Because Armond Smyth put a molasses-smeared pain leaf on his pillow to catch the flies which were worrying his bald head his wife had him arrested and charged him with trying to smother her. They were camping at Lake Winola, Pa., when the trouble occurred. The husband had the fan and molasses method of ensnaring the flies arranged, and his wife turning over her shoulder rolled her face on the fan. She screamed murder, sprang from her bed and rushed into the dark. The molasses got into her mouth and nose and nearly smothered her. She accused her husband, and had him arrested. Alderman Donohue took a week to consider the case.

**No Street Courting.**

The city council of Peru, Ill., has just passed this ordinance: "Whoever shall in said city congregate on or upon any of the streets in the city of Peru for the purpose of courting, making love or spooning, or carrying on courtship shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined not less than \$3 or more than \$100 for each offense." Mayor Hoerner says: "I do not oppose courtship when it is conducted in an ordinary manner. But when it is carried on in indiscriminate and in a style offensive to the public I believe it, like all other nuisances, should be abated. The ordinance will, I think, bring about the desired result."

This engine made the running time of the train between New York and Albany, 143 miles, in three hours and fifteen minutes.

Tennessee provided that persons of color who were competent witnesses in a court of justice against a white man might vote in that state.
