Council will adopt budget and tax rate

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday September 8 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The first business items on the agenda will be to hear comments from the public on the proposed city budget and proposed tax rate. See the public notice elsewhere in this Star.

After public comments the council will consider and take action on the city budget for the

fiscal year beginning October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2015. Budget for the Friona Economic Development Corporation will also be considered.

Approval of an ordinance adopting a tax rate of \$0.7992 per \$100 valuation for the fiscal year will be discussed and action taken.

Other items on the agenda:
-- change the October meeting date to October 20 because the second Monday is a holiday.

-- hear a report from the Friona police department regarding budget, expenses, personnel, and upcoming activities.

-- consider and take action on the accounts payable and August financial statement.

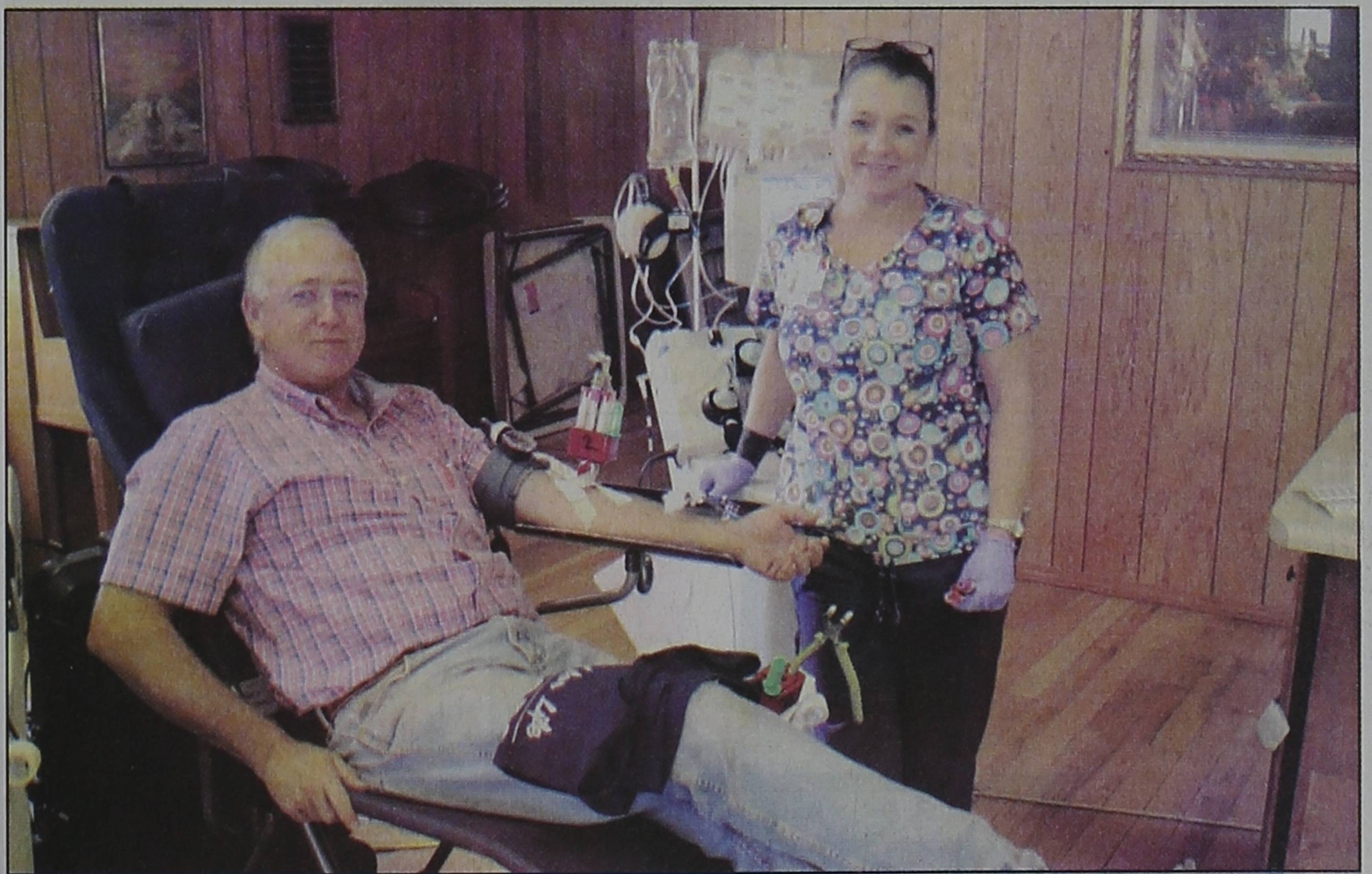
-- approve closing city hall on September 30 for year-end procedures.

-- authorize city manager to solicit re-bids for an agriculture lease on land located east of the sewer plant. This will be a dry land lease of 72.253 acres.

-- consider and take action on election of places 1-4 of the board of trustees for the Texas Municipal League Intergovernmental Risk Pool.

-- update of the Friona EMS Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) disaster response plan.

These items make up the tentative agenda for the council meeting and are subject to change. The final meeting agenda is posted on the front window of city hall 72 hours prior to the meeting.

Xcel Energy to increase rates Oct. 1

The growing costs of improving the regional power grid to sustain the region's growing economy, along with higher fuel costs, will cause an increase in bills for Texas customers starting Oct. 1.

Xcel Energy, Public Utility Commission staff and key customer groups have reached an agreement in Xcel Energy's pending Texas rate case that allows Xcel Energy to raise its overall Texas retail revenues starting in October by \$37 mil-

lion on an annual basis, or 3.5 percent. This increase is less than the \$52.7 million, or 5.8 percent, revenue increase Xcel Energy originally sought in a January 2014 proposal to the Public Utility Commission and 80 Texas municipalities in which the company provides electric services.

Under the settlement rates, the typical 1,000 kilowatt-hour residential bill will rise on Oct. 1 by approximately 6.3 percent, or \$6.58 per month. The rates will

be implemented on an interim basis until a final order is issued by the PUCT and the municipalities take final action on the rate settlement. The settlement also allows for collection of the new rates retroactively to June 1, the original effective date of the rate change. Xcel Energy will file a temporary surcharge in the fall that will recover the difference between the old and new rates for the period of June 1 through Sept. 30.

Also, Xcel Energy asked the

Public Utility Commission for authority to add a temporary surcharge on Texas bills to recover past under-collections of fuel costs. If approved, the surcharge would increase a typical 1,000 kilowatt-hour bill by \$2.70 per month, or 2.4 percent, starting November 1. The surcharge is planned to expire on April 30, 2015. Fuel costs are pass-through charges that rise and fall based on the cost of coal and natural gas used to generate power at area generating sta-

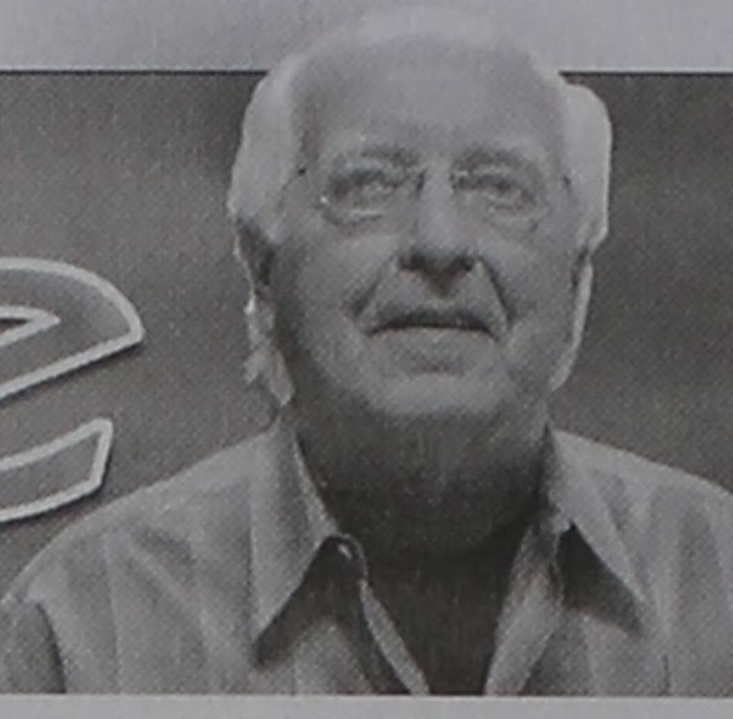
tions. Xcel Energy does not earn profit on fuel costs.

"These two increases are unrelated, but necessary changes to allow us to recover the higher costs of capital investment and fuel," said David Hudson, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company. "The fuel cost surcharge is temporary, but the base rate increase is to pay for increased costs associated with investment in the regional power grid."

Even with the increases, electricity costs in the Texas Panhandle-South Plains region served by Xcel Energy remain below the national average, Hudson said. Customers can manage the higher costs by taking advantage of energy efficiency programs offered by Xcel Energy. 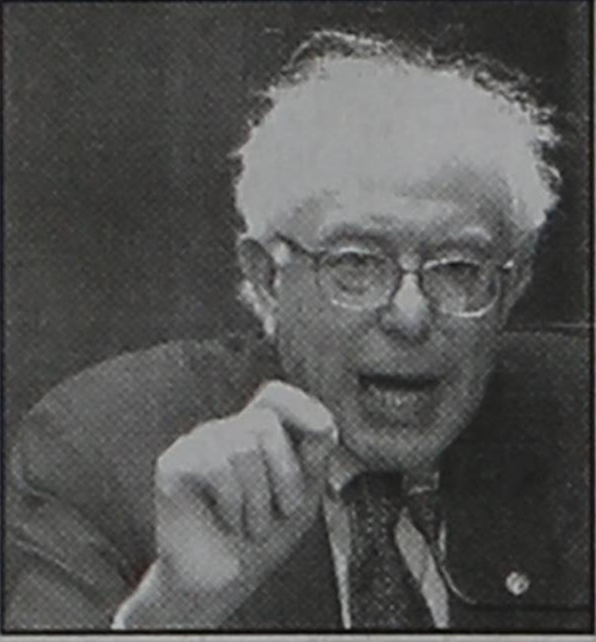

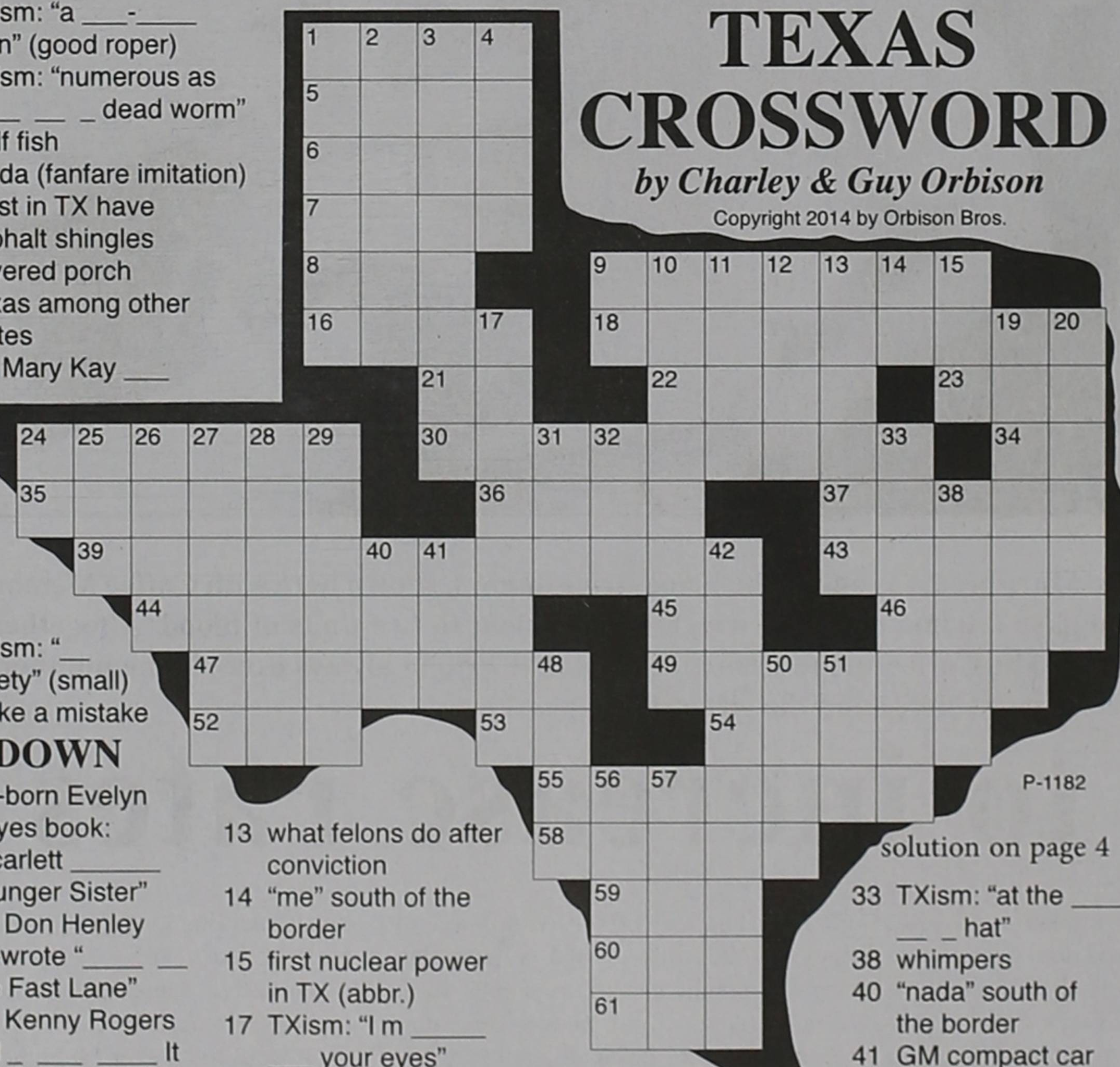

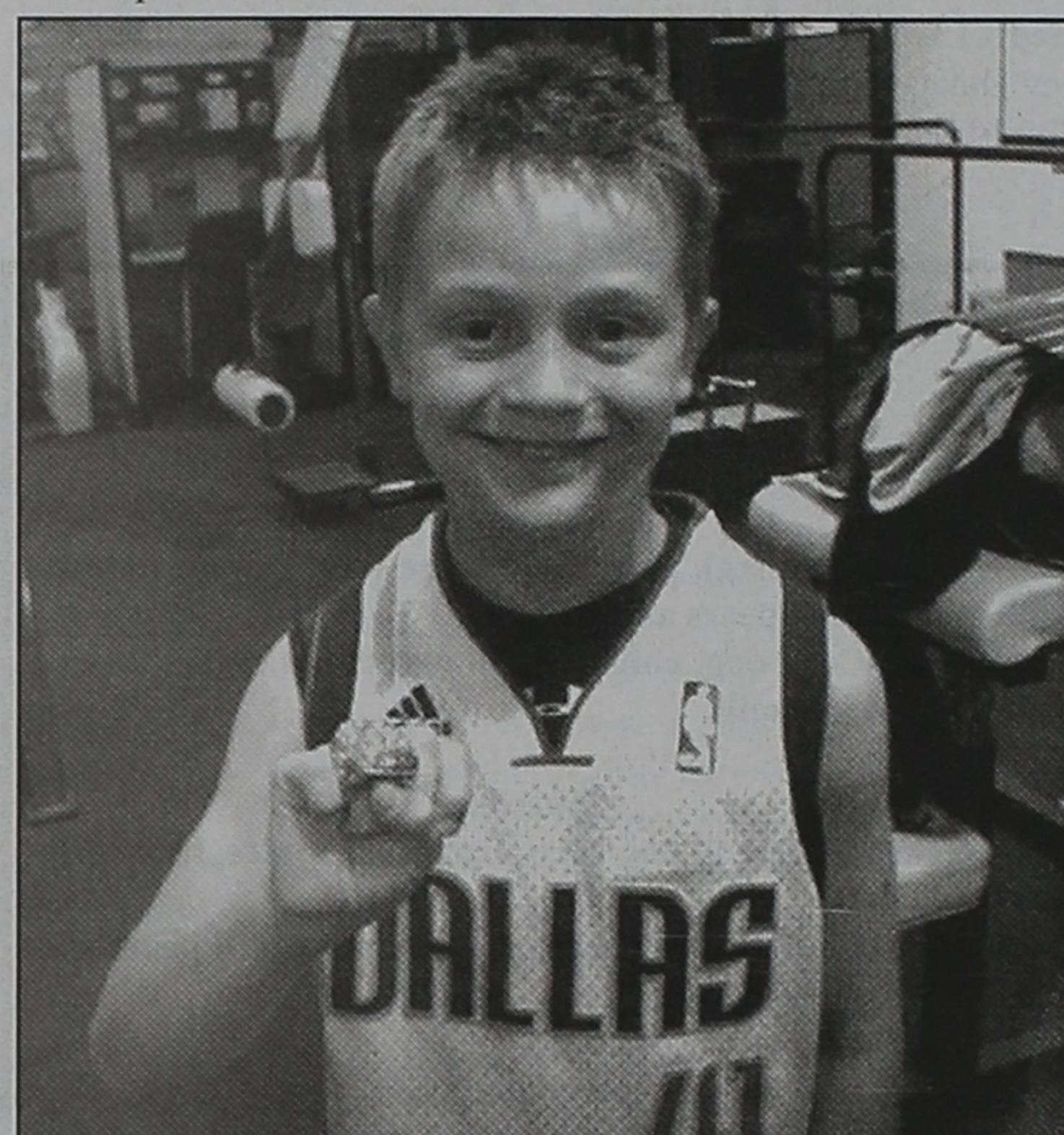

Swatting??

You can 'swat' flies. As a child, you can get a 'swat' on the behind for doing something wrong. You can have your hand swatted for taking an extra piece of cake or candy. You can even call the SWAT team if the occasion calls for it. However, I learned a new definition of 'swatting' over the weekend.

It was brought to my attention that a 15-year-old boy had been convicted and given a 25-year prison sentence for 'swatting'. According to the report, the boy, from Louisiana, had become angry with a fellow gamer and retaliated by calling in a terroristic threat on another boy, from California. The report stated that the SWAT team entered the home of the boy in California and found no threat only after the father of the boy was roughed up. Because of the threat, the boy in Louisiana was arrested and charged.

I did not quite understand why he received such a harsh penalty but I did a little research and found out the report was a hoax. Nevertheless, I continued to dig to find out that this 'swatting' thing was a real and serious situation.

I googled 'Swatting' and the hoax story was the first to pop up followed by a Wikipedia entry.

This is what I found.

Swatting is the tricking of any

emergency service (via such as a 9-1-1 dispatcher) into dispatching an emergency response based on the false report of an ongoing critical incident. Episodes range from large to small, from the deployment of bomb squads, SWAT units and other police units and the concurrent evacuations of schools and businesses to a single fabricated police report meant to discredit an individual as a prank or personal vendetta.

Swatting found its beginning in prank calls to emergency services. With the advent of more sophisticated techniques being employed, notably attempts to direct response units of particular types causing SWAT teams to be dispatched to a particular location spawned the term swatting.

Typically, the caller places a 9-1-1 call using a spoofed phone number with the goal of tricking authorities into responding to an address with a SWAT team to an emergency which does not exist.

In 2013 there were a number of celebrities that became victims of swatting pranks. Some of those celebrities were Sean Combs, Ashton Kutcher, Tom Cruise, Miley Cyrus and Clint Eastwood.

Due to these swatting pranks, the state of California passed a

law that would make it possible for authorities to require pranksters to bear the "full cost" of the response, which can range up to \$10,000.

According to reports, in May of this year, a 16-year-old in Ottawa, Canada was arrested for having made thirty fraudulent emergency calls across North America, leading to sixty charges including uttering death threats, conveying false information with intent to alarm, public mischief and mischief to property.

In one case of swatting a young man pled guilty to charges of conspiracy including "involvement in a swatting conspiracy" and attempting to retaliate against a witness. He was sentenced to over 11 years in a federal prison.

What has this world come to when bored people find themselves without anything to do but terrorize and, in some cases, cause bodily harm to someone thousands of miles away?

I miss the days when we would tell our parents we were bored and they would give us chores or send us to our rooms to read a book. We might have even done a few prank calls.

Has anyone figured out how to get Prince Albert out of the can and how to stop the refrigerator from running away?

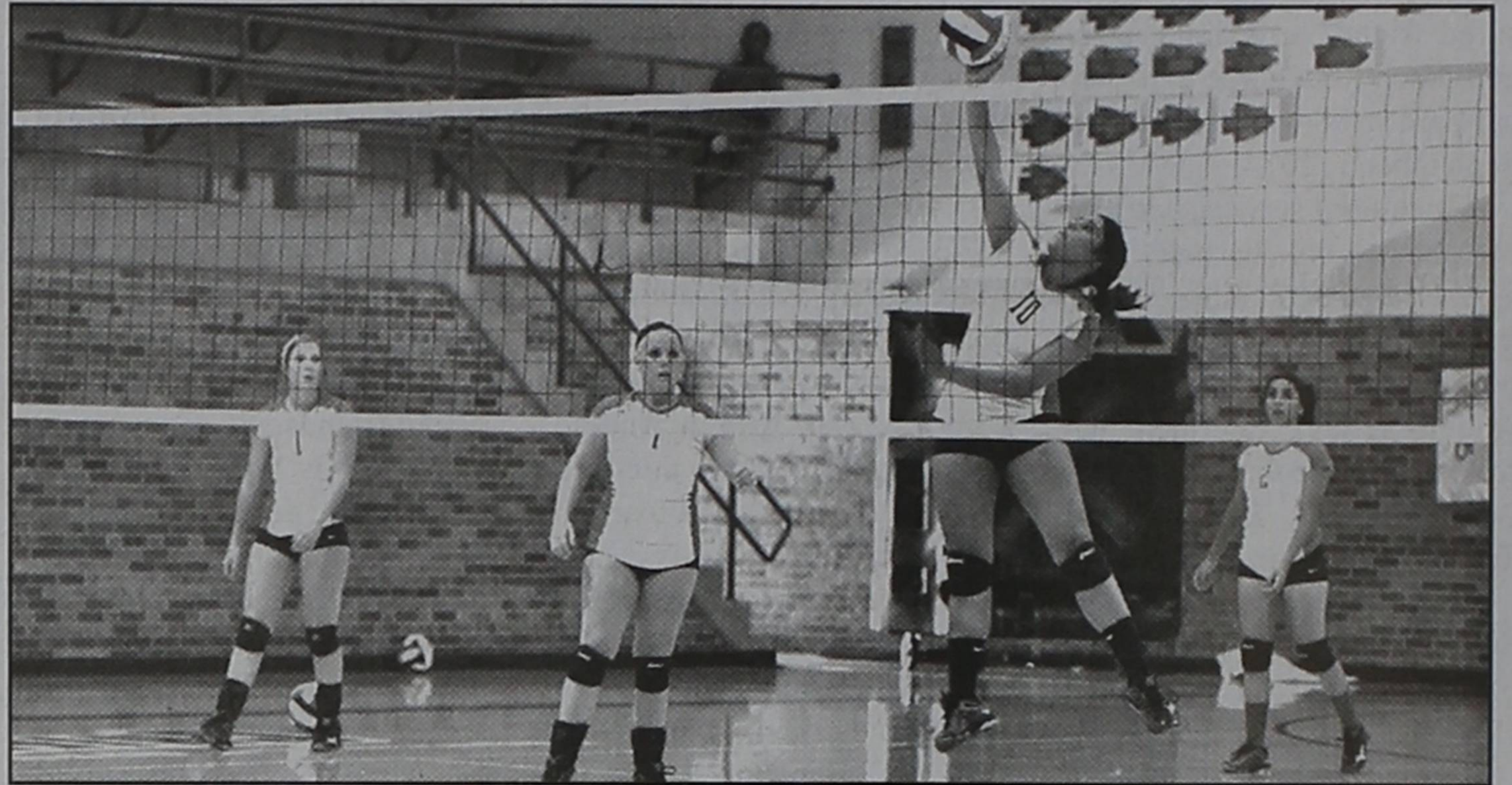

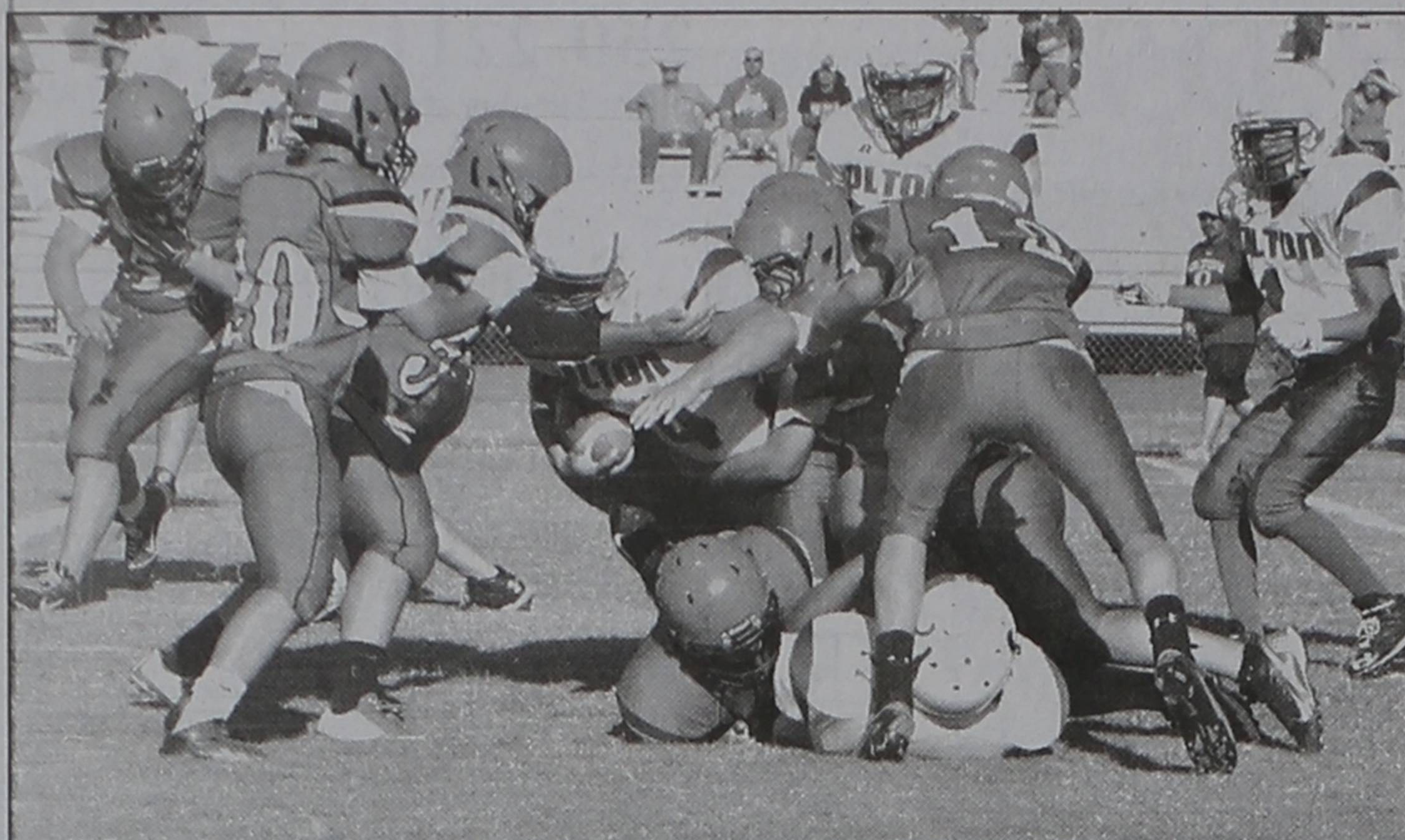

Chiefs beat Olton 23-13

The Chieftains opened the season with a 23-13 win at Olton, matching their win total from last year. There were a few first game mistakes on both sides. On the opening kickoff, the Chiefs bobbled the ball but Gabriel Chico scooped it up and rambled about 80 yards down the left sideline for a touchdown but it was called back on a Chieftain holding penalty. Neither team scored in the first quarter.

In his first start, quarterback Dallin Woods carried 13 times for 70 yards and completed 6 of 15 passes for 35 yards, and scored two

touchdowns. Chico was the leading rusher with 22 carries for 114 yards. Luis Trejo added 12 yards on 6 carries.

Chico had another long run of about 98 yards when he picked up a blocked extra point try and ran the distance to add two points to the score. Defensive lineman John David Haile scored the first Chieftain touchdown of the season by recovering an Olton fumble in the end zone in the second quarter.

The Chiefs rushed for 196 yards and passed for 35 while holding Olton to 179

offensive yards. On defense Jacob Dickson was credited with 5 solo tackles, Antonio Adame 4, and Chico 3. Dickson also intercepted a pass.

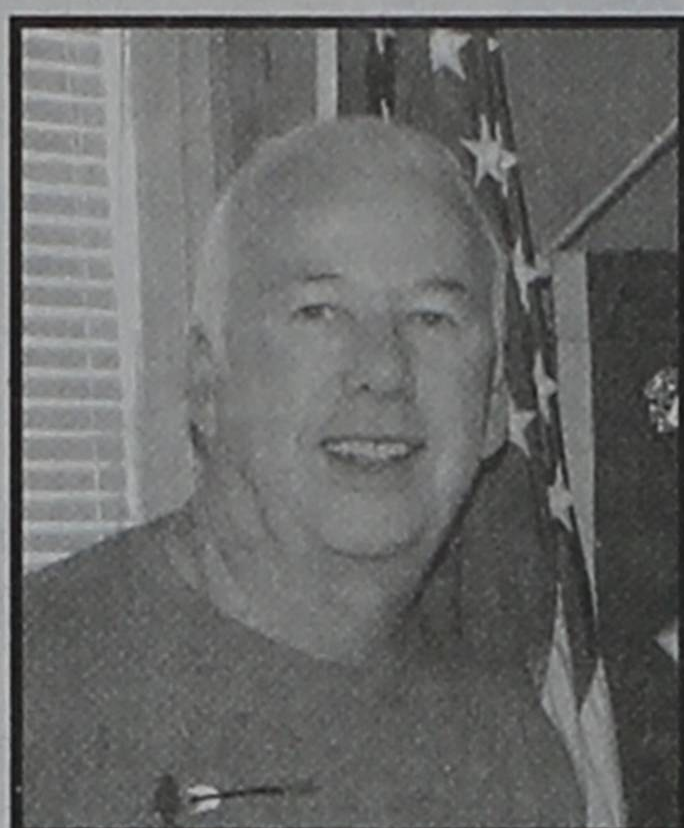

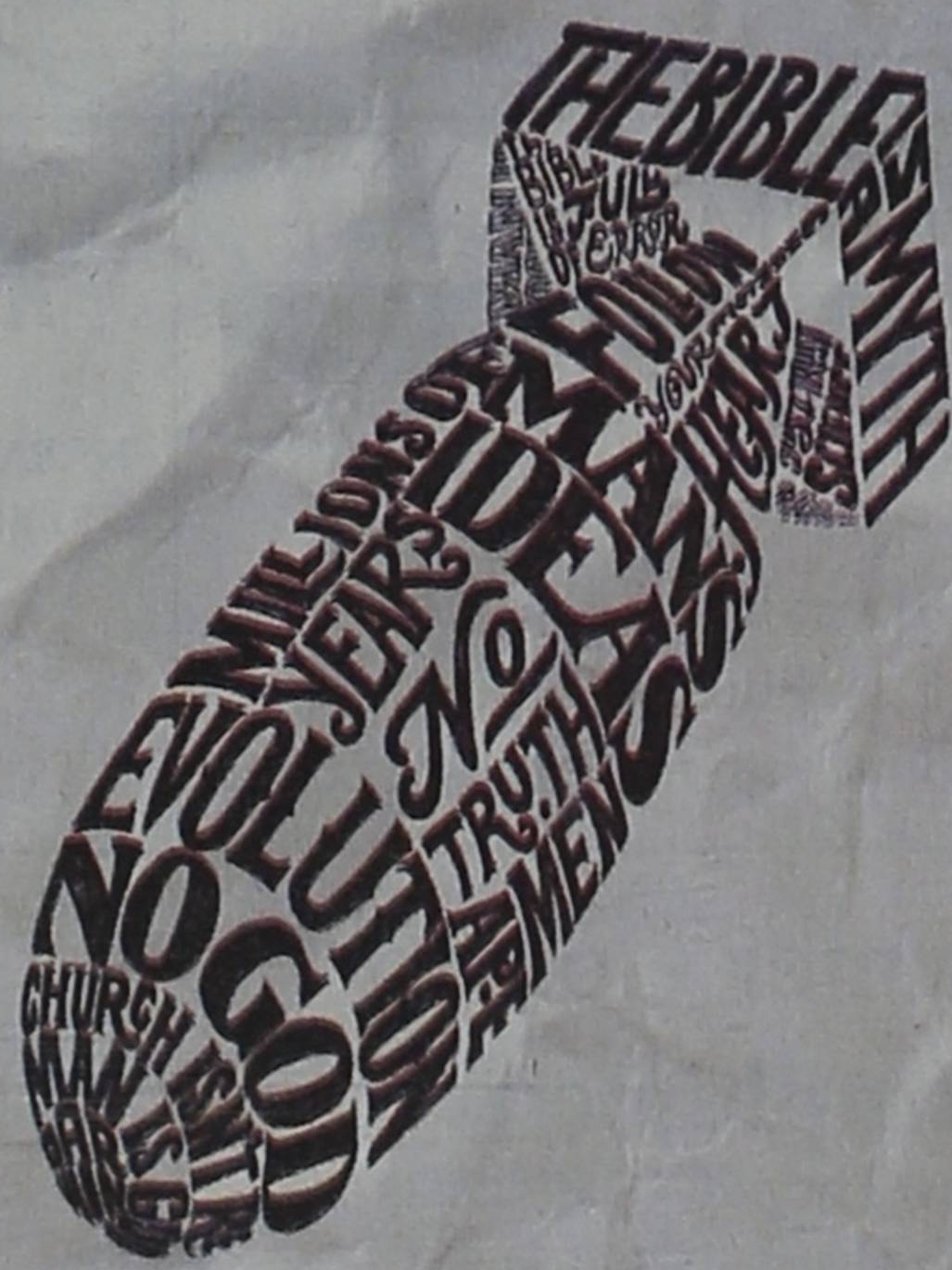
