# Chieftains tame county rival Mustangs 41-20

It was a perfect night for football as the Friona Chieftains hosted the rival Bovina Mustangs in the 2007 homecoming contest at Chieftain Field. The combination of homecoming, good weather, and Friona's annual Maize Days celebration created a near record standing room only crowd.

With smoke from the Noon Lions hamburger grill drifting across the crowd, 2007's homecoming queen court safely ensconced in their satin covered chairs, and the mighty Chieftain Band in fine form, the stage was set for another Parmer County showdown.

The Chiefs took the opening kickoff and hacked away at Bovina's defense with the final yard being a Dillon Welch touchdown to put the Chiefs up early 7-0 after Rodrigo Vasquez's extra point kick was good. Welch, a 5-10, 203 lb. senior running back, was seeing his first action after being out almost three games with a high ankle sprain.

After an exchange of punts, the Chiefs launched another drive that ended with a 39-yard TD pass from Sawyer Reed to Ryan Schwab. Vasquez was good again and the Chiefs led 14-0 still in the first quarter.

Led by senior quarterback Trent Quintana, the Mustangs narrowed the score to 14-7 in the second quarter on a 4-yard pass from Quintana to James Lara, who also converted the extra point.

The lead was short-lived though as Friona countered with another drive that ended with another Dillon Welch 1-yard TD plunge as the Chiefs took a 21-7 lead into halftime.

The Chiefs scored twice in the third quarter as the defense continued to stall the Mustang efforts. Reed hit Alonzo Rojas for an 8-yard touchdown early in the third. Vasquez missed his only extra point try on the night but the Friona lead increased to 27-7. Later Reed had the

Chiefs on the move again. From the 36 he dropped back to pass but scrambled out of the pocket and took off on a twisting run through the Mustang defense for a 36-yard score. Vasquez, who was 5 of 6 extra points on the night, made the score 34-7 and things were looking grim for the Mustangs.

Bovina managed to score next in the fourth quarter on a 14-yard Quintana pass to Ivan Solis. Lara converted and the tally was 34-14. But the tide turned quickly. On the ensuing kickoff Ritchie Casas took the ball on the 10-yard line near the left sideline, turned right upfield, then zigged back left and outraced the Mustangs down the left sideline for a 90-yard touchdown. Friona 41, Bovina 14.

It was the second game in a row the Chiefs returned a

kickoff for a touchdown as Alonzo Rojas had a 75-yard return last week against Morton.

Bovina had the final score on a 15-yard TD toss from Quintana to Jesus Rocha. Lara's kick was wide and the Chiefs ran out the clock on a convincing 41-20 victory over the Mustangs.

Reed led everybody with 116 yards rushing on 9 carries and completed 6 of 11 passes for 129 yards. His all-purpose total yards were 245. Rojas carried 5 times for 41 yards, Gerald Padilla 5 for 34, and Welch carried 12 for 31 yards.

Rojas also caught 3 passes for 45 yards, Padilla caught one for 14 yards, and Ryan Schwab grabbed 2 passes for 70 yards. Schwab has caught four TD passes and leads scoring with 24 points.

Ricardo Monreal did a standout job on defense with 3 solo tackles, 6 assists, and two interceptions. The Chief defense held Bovina to 84 rushing yards and 145 passing.

Friona's offense total through four games is 782 yards rushing and 560 pass-

ing, a 335 per game average. On defense the Chiefs have allowed only 243 yards per game.

Next up are the Bushland Falcons who are 4-0 and lead the district. The game is Friday September 28 at 7:30 p.m. See you at Chieftain Field. Go Big Red!

## Chieftains forfeit Abernathy win

A paperwork snafu between officials in Sanford-Fritch, Friona, and the district committee has caused Friona to forfeit the opening victory over Abernathy. A senior transfer student from Fritch joined the Chiefs and played in the Abernathy game when he was technically ineligible.

A transfer player must go through the District 2-2A executive committee to become eligible. Coach Bob Ferguson discovered a paperwork error last week and informed the committee who questioned his eligibility and forced Friona to forfeit.

Ferguson said, "I take the responsibility. He was eligible but I didn't dot all the I's and cross all the T's." Instead of a 3-1 record the Chieftains are now officially 2-2 on the season.

Booster activities and fundraising support the band during marching season and UIL and state solo/ensemble competitions.

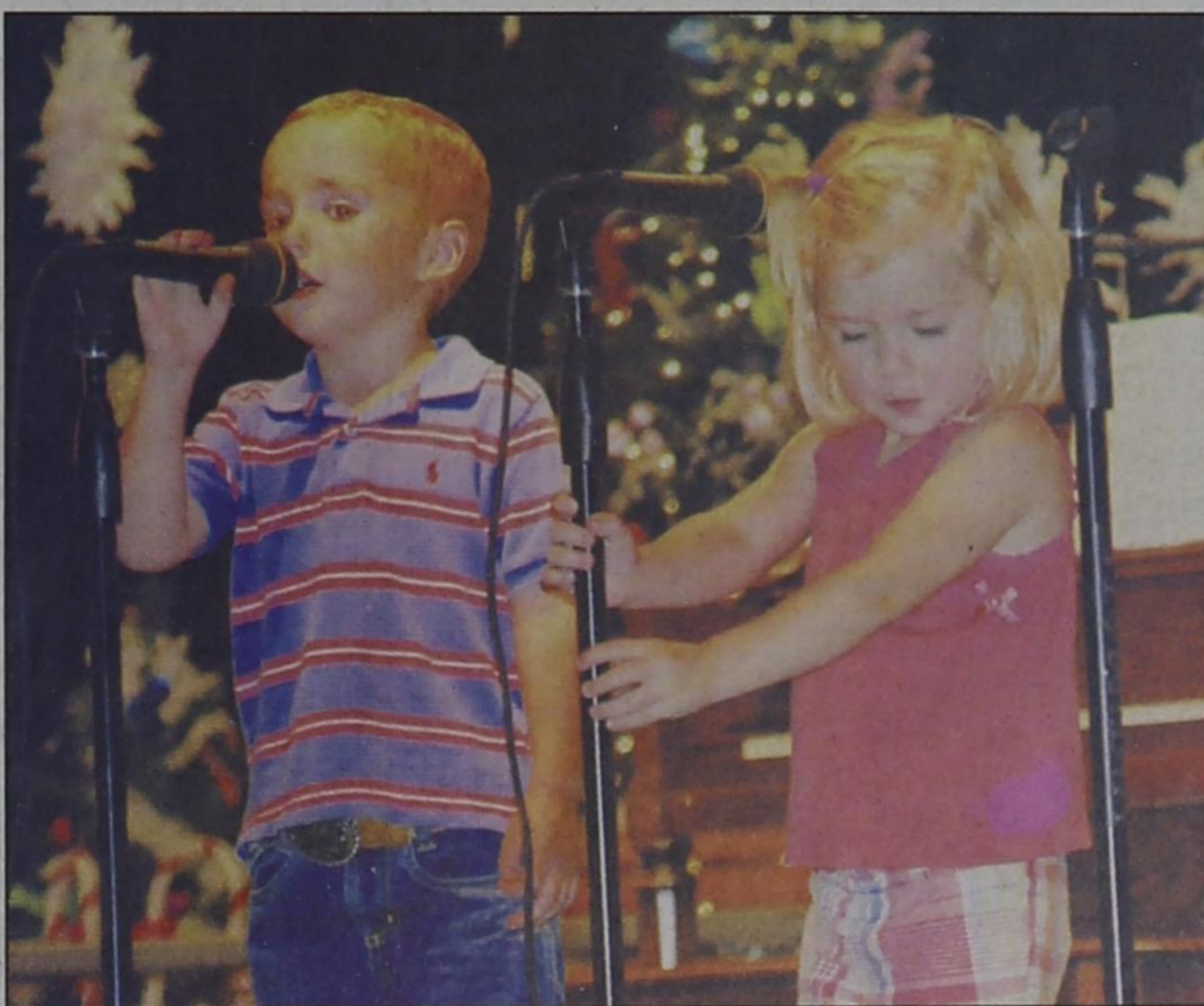

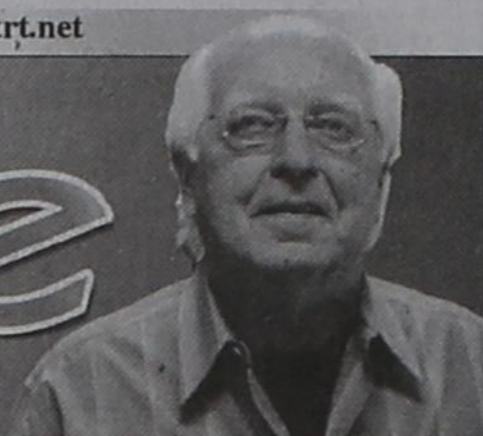

# Out Here

## old photos at the library

Over the weeks and months ahead you will want to drop by the Friona library. You or someone you know might be there.

Here's the deal. We have thousands of photos in tubs, shoeboxes, and envelopes in our dusty old archives. Some of them date back to the 50s and 60s, all the way through the 90s. With the cooperation of Darla Bracken and the library staff we are going to give them back to you. Many of them were never published in the newspaper.

For you folks in Bovina, there are also many Bovina photos left over from the Bovina Blade days. You'll want to come over and look through the photos too.

Back in the day of film we would shoot several rolls of 24, develop them, then use a few in the newspaper. The rest sat in files and boxes. We want you to look at them and take them.

We have photos that you brought to us and never picked up. These include weddings, engagements, anniversaries, graduations, school pictures, little league, and on and on. In the old days our customers had to leave these photos at our office and the printing plant copied them for use in the paper. You never came back to get them. Today we scan your photos while you wait.

The days of accumulating boxes of photos are past. It is, the digital and electronic age. We no longer make prints of all the photos we take.

We store them in a folder on an external hard drive and post them on our website. If you want copies you can order only the ones you want. No money wasted on prints you didn't really want.

In a way digital has taken the fun and suspense out of picture taking. Remember the feeling of anticipation you had when you went to the drug store to pick up your envelope of pictures and you stood there at the counter looking at them in hopes they came out good. Did they turn out okay? That was the moment of truth.

Or you got to hear this: "I'm sorry, I don't know what happened but none of your pictures were any good." They were all too dark, or too light, or out of focus. Oh well, there goes another batch of Christmas pictures.

Those days are gone. We all have some sort of digital camera. Not that a digital camera is a guarantee of good photos either. There is a saying: "Cameras don't take pictures, people take pictures." Most folks don't take time to learn about their digital cameras. Take it out of the box, point it, and shoot. Here is some advice. Read the book. Learn the adjustments, when to use a flash, what is white balance, what is ISO. Get closer to your subject, fill the frame, shoot a lot of pictures. That is how you learn.

I am intrigued by good photos because they capture a split second of life and can

be preserved and displayed and cherished for eons. Old photos can bring an instant smile, or renew a moment of sadness. They are memories in color or black and white.

Photos are personal. We all have favorite photos of our kids, or grandkids, or of our grandparents. They don't mean much to anyone else but they mean the world to us.

So here is what we are going to do. We are sorting through the boxes of Friona Star photographs. We will take them a few boxes at a time to the library where they will be available for you to look through. You are free to take as many as you find.

We will make an announcement in the Friona Star when we take a new batch over. If you find photos of friends that you want to send to them, please do. If you recognize folks that no longer live here and you want to send photos to them, please do. You don't have to have a good reason to take one of the photos.

We have also invited our museum curator Wendy Carthel to look through the files and take any historical photos for display at the Historical Museum.

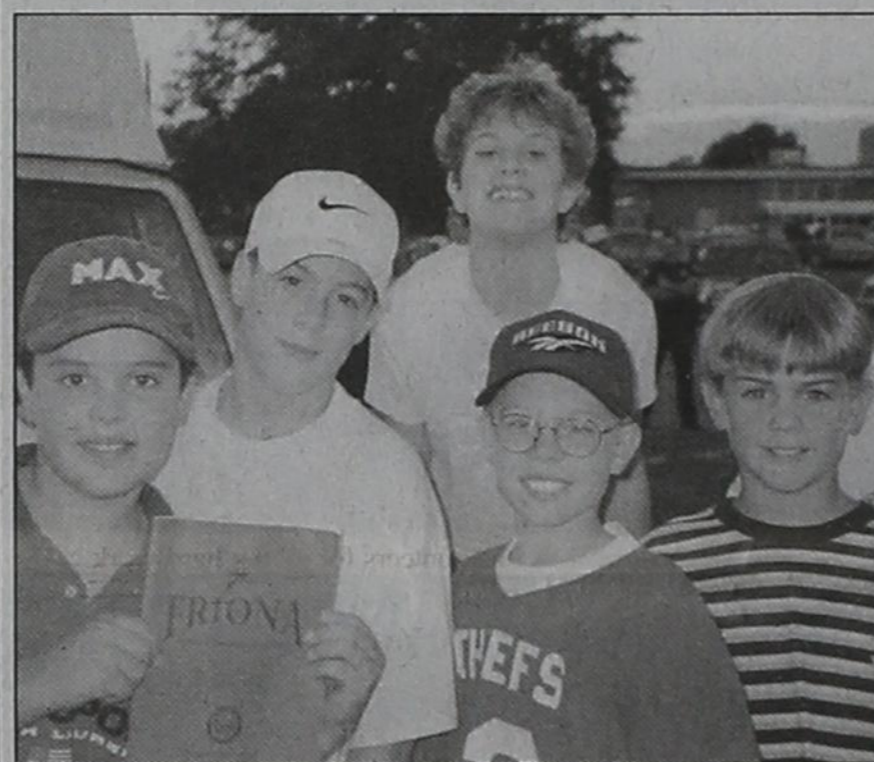
We are taking them to the library in batches because we have way too many for you to look through at one time. Plus the library has limited space and we have too many photos to put in a single pile. There is no big hurry. Time is on our side.

There are many photos that were never returned to their owners. There are photos taken by Bill Ellis and the Friona Star staff that were never published. There are even a bunch that I took during my earlier days here at the Star.

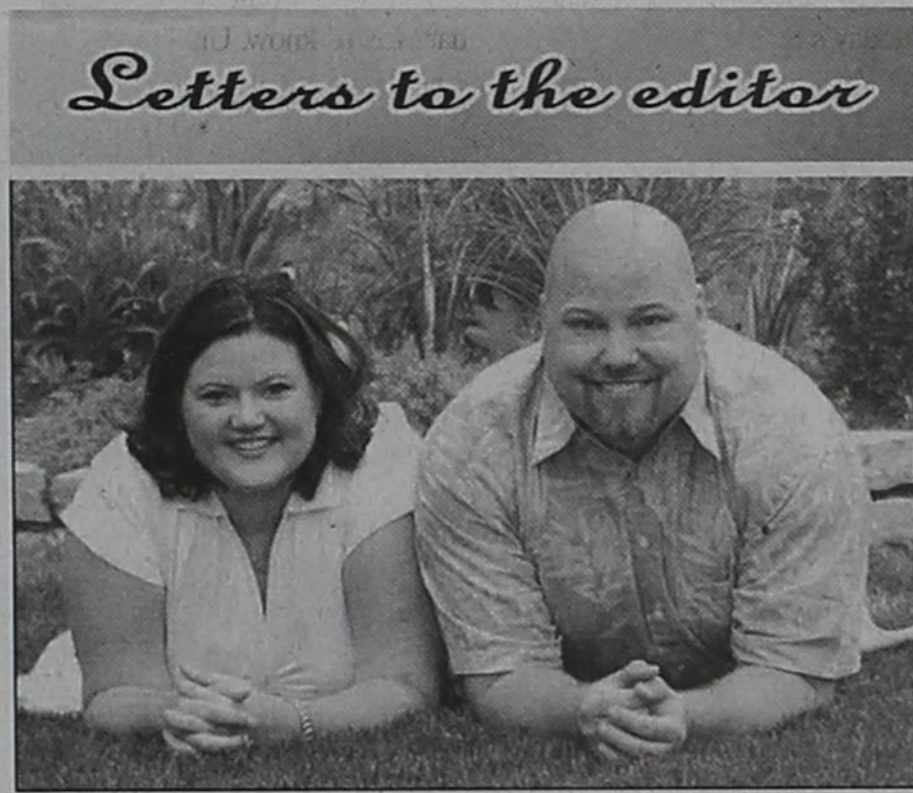
If nothing else you will have fun looking through the photos. I'll bet you will find more than one to take with you. I've printed a couple of examples of what to expect on this page.

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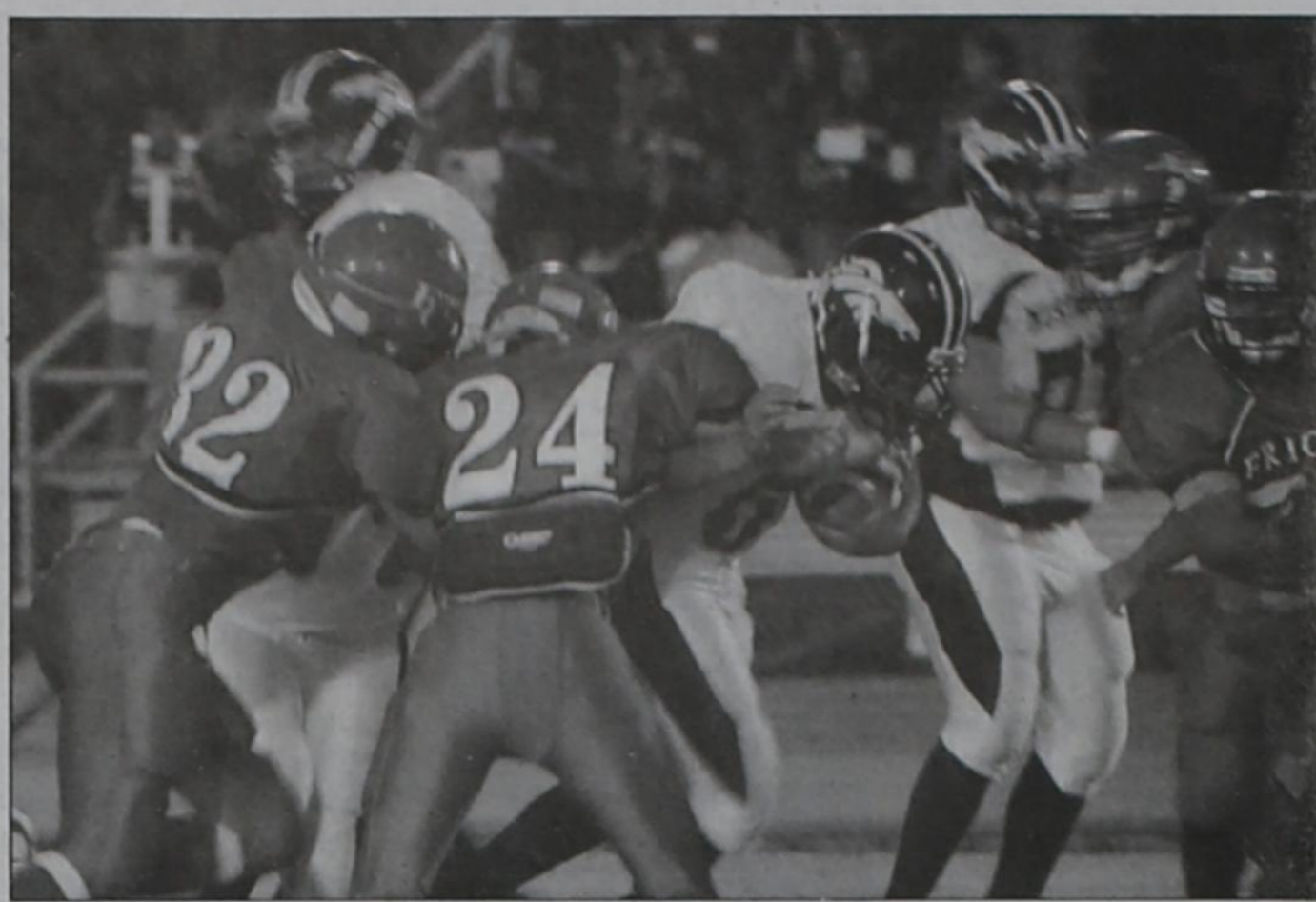

## Harvest-Aid guide can help producers

Plains cotton producers preparing for harvest have an updated harvest-aid guide available to help them make the most of this year's delayed crop, said a Texas Cooperative Extension agronomist.

"We have updated the High Plains and Northern Rolling Plains Cotton Harvest-Aid Guide," said Dr. Randy Boman, Extension cotton agronomist based at Lubbock. "The guide is available online at <http://lubbock.tamu.edu> under the 'What's New' heading, and in the Cotton Section of the website (<http://lubbock.tamu.edu/cotton/>). "Weathering considerably reduces the dollar value of cotton lint unless producers take steps to protect both yield and quality potential. Even in a normal year, producers who use harvest-aids can speed harvest of a mature crop and protect lint quality and yield potential."

To date, 2007 has not been a normal year for Plains cotton producers. Rains at planting and the cool, rainy weather that followed, helped defray irrigation costs, but put the crop slightly behind its "normal" pace of growth. "Many fields are later this year due to later planting dates and a cooler growing season than what we've had for some time," Boman said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's September 12 crop report projects this year's Plains cotton crop at

4.5 million bales from more than 3 million harvestable acres in the region. If this holds true, 2007 could supplant 2006 as the third largest crop said Boman. Even so, producers will need good open weather in September and October to properly finish many fields, he added.

Regardless of weather, there are several factors that affect the usefulness and performance of harvest-aids from season to season. "Warm, calm, sunny weather increases harvest-aid performance," Boman said. "Soil moisture should be relatively low, but sufficient to maintain active plant growth without moisture stress. Soil nitrogen levels should be relatively low, and plant leaves should be actively growing and uniformly expanded. "Plants should have little or no secondary growth, a high percentage of open bolls in the cutout stage and they should have shed some mature leaves."

At the other end of the spectrum, these field conditions can reduce the performance of harvest-aid chemicals:

- Application under cloudy skies at temperatures below 60 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Prolonged wet weather following application.
- Plants still in the vegetative stage of growth, with low fruit set.
- Moisture-stressed plants with tough, leathery leaves.
- Rank, dense foliage and delayed maturity caused by high soil moisture and high nitrogen levels.
- And poor spray coverage, incorrect sprayer application or the wrong application rate.

The 2007 harvest-aid guide explains how to determine crop maturity and discusses desiccants, defoliants and boll openers. It also provides tips on selecting and applying these chemicals, late-season insect management, harvesting a treated crop and ways to prevent sticky cotton and other lint contamination.

The guide also includes a treatment table that can help producers select the right treatment or combination of treatments, based on crop maturity, yield potential and expected weather conditions.

"We have also received a few calls about how to estimate cotton yield," Boman said. "Estimating cotton yield is a very risky endeavor, but there are two publications available online for those who want to try it."

"Field Estimation of Cotton Yields, takes a fairly simple, user-friendly approach. A more complicated, thorough treatment of yield estimation is available in an older publication by Dr. Will McCarty, former Mississippi State University Extension cotton specialist. Links to both publications are in the August 31 edition of *Focus on South Plains Agriculture* newsletter." That newsletter is online at <http://lubbock.tamu.edu/focus/>

- \* Oops! CRAYON MARKS on wooden furniture? Mayo will make them disappear. Using a clean rag or finger, rub a dab of mayo on the spot. Wait a minute or two, then wipe with a damp cloth.
- \* Suffer no more from SUNBURN! A bit of mayo smoothed over the affected area will help relieve the pain and moisturize your skin.
- \* To remove a TIGHT RING on your finger, cover the finger with mayonnaise and then gently pull the ring off.



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# Library receives new computers from Gates

For those of you who may have missed our Open House during Maize Days last week, we would like to announce that the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has furnished the Friona Public Library with two more new Public Access Computers (PAC). This brings their total donations to our library to six PACs and a combined value of \$7,500 since October of 2000.

Our community has had the benefit of having a total of five PACs since October of 2000, in addition to the three planned PACs furnished by the Panhandle Public Libraries TIF Grant, awarded in October of 2000. The TIF grant also furnished a server PC, router and wiring to establish our Local Area Network (LAN) so that all

of our computers could be networked. We have continued to upgrade the LAN with Loan Star Direct Aid Funds from the State of Texas. The Gates Foundation also provided excellent training for librarians in the state of Texas and across the nation as part of their grants.

This hardware upgrade is the final stage in the Gates Connection Grants. Originally, one of our two Gates PCs was Spanish. Friona Public Library had kept the Gates PCs upgraded so that we were able to use them until July of this year. The Texas State Library and Archives Commission has worked closely with the Gates Foundation and has served as administrator for the Gates Grants.

# Winning in Iraq

Our mission in Iraq is among the most important in our nation's history. As the central front in the Global War on Terror, Iraq is where the forces of freedom, tolerance and democracy are fighting to defeat the tyranny and oppression of Al-Qaeda and radical Islam. We know from our troops in the field that if we allow the terrorists to win in Iraq, they will surely follow us home. This war has been costly for America in both lives and dollars, but the consequences of failure would be catastrophic.

On September 10<sup>th</sup>, Congress received a revealing report from General David Petraeus, commanding officer of the international coalition in Iraq. General Petraeus led the 101<sup>st</sup> Airborne with distinction and served in Iraq for three years before he was unanimously confirmed to this position by the U.S. Senate. His report detailed en-

couraging signs of progress and offered clear, achievable goals. But, as our military success continues, we will increasingly rely on Iraqi political leaders who have thus far failed to make adequate progress.

Earlier this year, our generals on the ground proposed, and President Bush approved, a surge of 30,000 troops deployed to Iraq. These expanded forces shipped out with the objective to stabilize Baghdad and embattled regions, and return home. As General Petraeus reported, he is now able to recommend a drawdown of the surge because conditions on the ground merit such action.

For example, Al-Anbar was once an Al-Qaeda stronghold. Thanks to the renewed focus of the surge and cooperation with local sheiks, progress in this province is reported to be remarkable. Young Iraqis, once disillusioned

and eager to join the ranks of the insurgency, are now enlisting in the national army. In Baghdad, the number of violent civilian deaths has fallen by 80 percent, and nationwide, car bombings are down 50 percent. As General Petraeus said in a letter to the troops, "We are, in short, a long way from the goal line, but we do have the ball and we are driving down the field."

Despite clear progress, some of my Senate colleagues continue to disregard the advice of our military leaders and call for precipitous withdrawal of our entire force. We've seen many challenges in Iraq, and mistakes have been made, but our goal of a stable Iraq that can be an ally in the Global War on Terror must not be diminished. We cannot endanger American security because of political expediency. Instead, we can now keep our commitments with

fewer American forces, because the surge provided a safer environment for the training of Iraqi troops. President Bush recently announced that 5,700 American service members should be home by Christmas, and tens of thousands more by next summer.

The achievements outlined in Gen. Petraeus' testimony demonstrate that our military strategies must be determined by events in theatre, not timetables set by micromanaging politicians 6,000 miles away.

While the security improvements are apparent, more must be done to achieve long-term political reconciliation. The U.S. Ambassador to Iraq, Ryan Crocker, also testified last week, and described a somewhat fractured and ineffective Iraqi government. As we aid in the establishment of stable leadership, we must recognize the cultural and sectarian divisions that have existed in Iraq for 14 centuries. We should allow Iraqis to create semi-autonomous federal regions, sharing in national oil revenues, and each responsible for local law enforcement, commerce, security and education. Such a solution helped to stem the tide of violence in the Balkans in the 1990s, and would facilitate peace in Iraq. We should also expect more constructive involvement from neighboring countries in the region, which have a large stake in a stable Iraq.

Whatever course our continued progress in Iraq takes, it must not include abandonment of our principles, nor disregard for the gains already made by our armed forces. Our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, and Coast Guards have sacrificed greatly to keep us safe and free, and we must support them as they complete their mission. Although some may call for surrender, I remain dedicated to winning the Global War on Terror, so that future generations may experience the same freedom past generations gave to us.

# Pimiento cheese is southern comfort food

A recent issue of Relish Magazine said this about pimiento cheese: "There are few things in life that are perfect but pimiento cheese may well be one of them."

Relish says sensible southern cooks know the best pimiento cheese is also the simplest: the whole point is the balance between good, sharp cheese and pimientos.

Some add a dash of garlic juice or Worcestershire, some add green onion or use hot sauce instead of cayenne, but that is as far as any sensible person will go, Relish says.

They suggest you spread it thickly, or trim off the crusts and cut into triangles, or to warm up a cool day brush the bread with butter and grill it.

### Classic Pimiento Cheese

- 2 cups finely shredded extra-sharp cheddar
- 1/2 cup finely grated Parmesan cheese
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise, divided
- 1 small garlic clove crushed
- 1 tablespoon grated shallot or yellow onion
- 1 (4-ounce) jar diced pimientos, drained but liquid reserved, roughly chopped ground cayenne pepper
- English-style dry mustard

1. Combine half the cheddar and half the Parmesan cheese in a large bowl. Mix together lightly. Knead in 4 tablespoons of mayonnaise until mixture is creamy and very smooth.

2. Work in remaining cheese, garlic, shallot, pimientos, 1 tablespoon of reserved pimiento liquid, a dash of cayenne, and a small pinch of dry mustard. Knead just enough to mix well; it should still have plenty of texture. Add remaining mayonnaise, if necessary—just enough to make it spreadable.

3. Let stand 30 minutes. Serve cool or at room temperature. Makes about 2 1/2 cups.

# Tech enrollment near record

Preliminary numbers show Texas Tech University's fall 2007 enrollment at near-record levels and freshman enrollment at an all-time high.

Total enrollment stands at 28,408 as of the 12<sup>th</sup> day of class, which is the second highest number for the preliminary counting date. The highest number was 28,549 reported in 2003. Freshman enrollment is 4,524, a record number in Texas Tech history. Graduate enrollment slightly increased to 4,579 students.

Enrollment is not considered final until the 20<sup>th</sup> class day and can fluctuate. The final enrollment for fall 2006 was 27,966. The 12<sup>th</sup> class day enrollment for fall 2006 was 28,154. Freshman enrollment was 3,926. Graduate enrollment was 4,488 in the fall 2006 semester.

International student enrollment is at 1,030, an eight percent increase over last fall, including 55 freshmen, up from 28 – a 96 percent increase.

The university also is showing steady gains in the diversity of the freshman class. Hispanic freshman enrollment is 571 compared to 463 in the fall 2006 semester, an increase of 23 percent. African-American freshman enrollment is 223, up from 155 last year, an increase of 44 percent. Asian-American freshman enrollment is at 170, up from 115, an increase of 48 percent.

"We continue our commitment to achieving quality growth, to attracting quality students who will graduate," said Texas Tech President Jon Whitmore. "The university continues to enroll more fresh-

men each year, and those students are graduating in record numbers."

In 2002-03, 4,836 undergraduate and graduate degrees were awarded. In 2003-04, 5,347 degrees were awarded. In 2004-05, Texas Tech awarded 5,861 degrees. In 2005-06 the university graduated 5,923 students.

Texas Tech Provost Bill Marcy points to Texas Tech's Graduate On Time program as an incentive for students to follow their degree plans and graduate in the prescribed time.

"We guarantee our entering freshman students that courses will be available in the sequence they need for them to graduate in the time prescribed if students complete at least 30 hours of course work each calendar year," he said.
