#### Senator Cornyn goes batty.....!

All of us community newspapers receive weekly emails from our U.S. Senators John Cornyn and Kay Hutchinson. Most of their correspondence is dry and boring but we run it anyway. It is an obligation thing plus most of us weekly newspaper types are always concerned with filling space. Politicians take up a lot of space.

The odds are pretty good that neither senator actually writes the weekly columns. They may read them or sign off on them but they have ample staff whose job it is to turn out volumes of emails. If either one of the senators send articles that are remotely interesting and topical we run

This week the topic from our United States Senator John Cornyn was about bats. He felt a need to tell us constituents that the Mexican freetail bat loves to eat corn ear moths and flying ants and the city of Austin calculates its annual bat tourism revenue at \$10 million thanks to 1.5 million bats under the Congress Avenue bridge.

While the bat stats are interesting we can get those on the Discovery Channel or by Googling bats. In reading the senator's latest offering it occurred to us that we would rather have our Republican U.S. Senators, who are on the taxpayer payroll for about \$200 grand a year each, focusing on how they plan to repair the damage to the Republican



Unknown persons in your neighborhood. Never open the door to anyone you do not know. Verify who they are by telephoning the company they represent and asking why they were sent to your home.

Property being taken from a business or home by someone you do not recognize. You could be witnessing a burglary. Contact law enforcement officials.

Parked or slow moving vehicles with no apparent destination or lights. This could be a thief waiting for an opportune time to rob one of your neighbors.

Anyone being forced into a vehicle or a stranger talking to a child. You could be witnessing an abduction. Call 911.

Families clung close when depression struck, When the wars came, the whole nation did too. The man driving by in an old pick-up truck, Tipped his hat to say "Howdy" to you.



Mango-pineapple relish sounds tasty

This relish recipe was included with a miso seared Hawaiian fish recipe in a recent Lubbock-Avalanche Journal. The recipe was for Kona Kampachi (seared and baked or grilled) with the relish spread on top. Miso is described as a fermented paste of soybeans, salt, rice or barley used to flavor soups or sauces. In this recipe it is used as a marinade rub for the fish.

I'm not sure if you can get Kona Kampachi fish anywhere around here but the relish sounded pretty tasty by itself. The combination of fruit, bell pepper, and onion is interesting. Probably be good with most any type of fish dish.

Mango-Pineapple Relish


- 1 C mango peeled, chopped
- 1 C pineapple peeled, chopped 1/2 C yellow bell pepper chopped
- 1/2 C red bell pepper chopped
- 1/2 C red onion chopped
- 1/2 C fresh cilantro chopped
- ½ tsp. lime juice

½ tsp. (or to taste) fresh hot chile minced salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl and refrigerate. This relish can be made 1-2 days ahead of time and stored in the refrigerator.

If you do prepare baked fish, place the hot fish fillet in the center of the plate and top it with the chilled mango-pineapple relish, about 1/4 cup per fillet.

Try drizzling Ponzu Sauce (soy sauce flavored with citrus) and hot red chile oil around the outside of the fillet for a dramatic presentation.


