Loads restricted on Deaf Smith bridge

Trucks with axle or tandem axle weights over 17,500 pounds are restricted from legal use of the Frio Draw Bridge on US 385 south of Hereford. The bridge is load-restricted for axle or tandem axle weights over 17,500 pounds. Department of Public Safety troopers will issue tickets to overweight vehicles using the bridge.

Vehicles with axle or tandem axle weights over 17,500 pounds should detour around the bridge by using FM 2943 east of Hereford.

The bridge is scheduled for replacement with a structure meeting current design standards. A contractor has been selected and work could begin as soon as this fall. The work involved will restrict traffic to a one-lane bridge during construction, managed by a temporary traffic signal.

Burn ban partially lifted as of May 1

At their regular meeting Monday, April 27, county commissioners lifted the burn ban for most of the county effective May 1.

Commissioner Kirk Frye said a burn ban will remain in effect until further notice for an area north of Highway 60 between FM 2290 west from Bovina and Highway 214 north from Friona to the county line.

Parmer County wind farm announced

If you build it they will come. Bovina plans to build it and build it big.

Monday evening, April 20, local farmers and wind farm hopefuls, gathered at the Bovina Senior Citizen's Center to hear plans for a Parmer County wind farm.

Harald Dirdal and Ketil Reed Asagaard of Havgul Clean Energy, and an associate, Klas Gustafsson of Sweden, stressed a desire to be transparent and open as they revealed plans to develop a 1,200 megawatt wind farm. This is based on the placement of about 400 turbines, each producing a maximum of three megawatts.

This was the second trip to Bovina by representatives of Havgul Clean Energy of Norway and Alpha Wind of Denmark. Their visit was a combination of actual placement plans of the wind turbines and communication with landowners.

There are four phases of building a wind farm: feasibility studies; development; construction; and operation. Bovina is now entering the development phase which consists of gathering land owner leases, easements, building permits, and other required paperwork. This phase lays the foundation for funding to build the project.

It was suggested at the meeting that landowners join together to form their own limited liability corporation (LLC). Members would choose a board to represent the LLC in communication and negotiation with the developers.

One of the biggest challenges for any potential wind farm developer in Parmer County is the distribution and sale of the power generated. The county currently lacks both the physical transmission lines and necessary market to sell the energy from such a large project.

Harvul Clean Energy and Alpha Wind says the bigger the project the more attention it will demand from politicians and grid

developers, the 'if you build it they will come' idea. Dirdal and his company told the gathering that energy independence is coming to America and it is going to make a huge impact on the High Plains. Building grids is as much a part of the future as building wind farms.

Brisket 101 for dummies

Out here in the Panhandle if you don't know how to cook a brisket you must be 'all hat and no cattle' as they like to say. Folks have their own method and secrets for cooking brisket so we are in dangerous territory publishing a brisket recipe.

This brisket recipe was in an issue of Relish Magazine. It is from a San Francisco Restaurant called Max's On the Square. Whether you smoke, baste, braise, sauce, boil, or roast a brisket, low and slow cooking times are the key for a tender and flavorful piece of meat. Fat and patience can be your friend when cooking brisket.

Brisket of Beef

Serves 12

- 1 5-lb beef brisket
- 12 oz tomato sauce
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- Coarsely ground black pepper
- 1 lb coarsely chopped onion (about 4 med onions)
- ¼ cup diced garlic (about 12 cloves)
- 1 (750ml) bottle burgundy wine
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tsp dried thyme
- 1 tsp fresh rosemary
- ½ cup low-sodium soy sauce
- 2/3 cup water
- 4 slices crustless rye bread, cubed (optional)

Add to the wine gravy during the last 30 minutes of cooking.

- Preheat oven to 350
- Heat oil in a large skillet until hot. Add meat and sear over high heat until lightly browned.
- Rub brisket with tomato paste, salt and pepper.
- Place onions in a large roasting pan. Place meat, fat side up, on top of onions.
- Combine garlic, wine, bay leaf, thyme, rosemary, soy sauce, and water. Whisk. Pour over brisket.
- Cover and bake 2 ½ to 3 hours, basting often with pan juices. Uncover, add rye bread if desired and bake 30 minutes, until brisket is fork tender.





Texas driver's license and ID gets makeover

DPS is unveiling a redesigned Texas driver's license and identification card with a new look and enhanced security features.

"The change will give law enforcement improved resources for verifying the authenticity of Texas-issued driver's licenses and identification cards, while combating counterfeiting, photo swapping, tampering and other types of fraud," said DPS Director Col. Stanley E. Clark.

The licenses and ID cards contain numerous security features, which DPS will not discuss publicly. Production of the new cards began April 15 for customers receiving new, renewal or duplicate licenses and ID cards. The vertical format for customers under 21 will continue.

Current driver's licenses and ID cards are still valid and will be phased out as they expire. The last redesign took place in June 2001. DPS is sending out information to Texas law enforcement agencies, financial institutions and other state agencies to educate them on these changes.



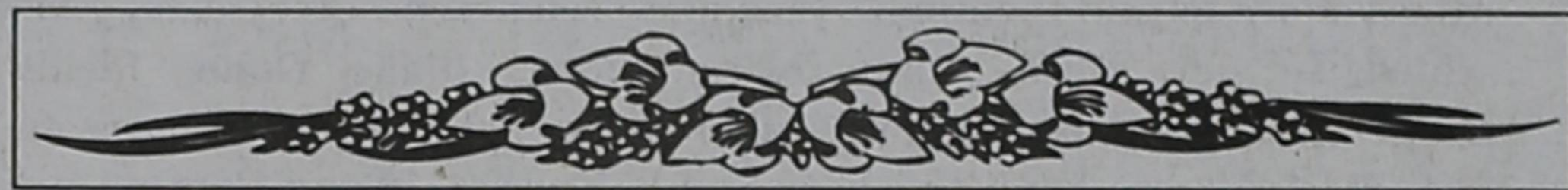
Christy Nichole Thatcher

She moved to Friona 75 years ago from Bonham, Texas. She was a homemaker and a member of the Calvary Baptist Church in Friona.

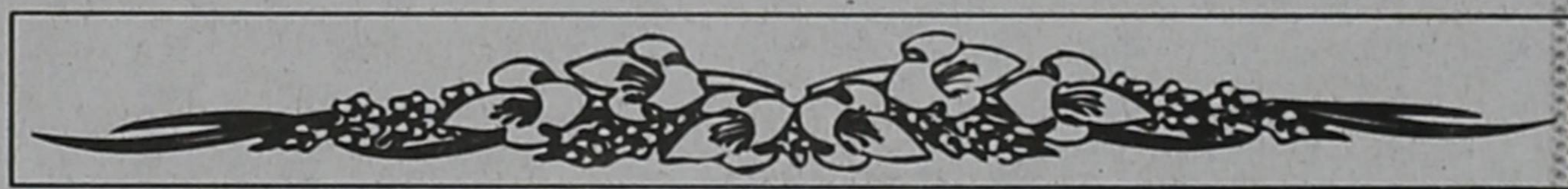
She was also preceded in death by two

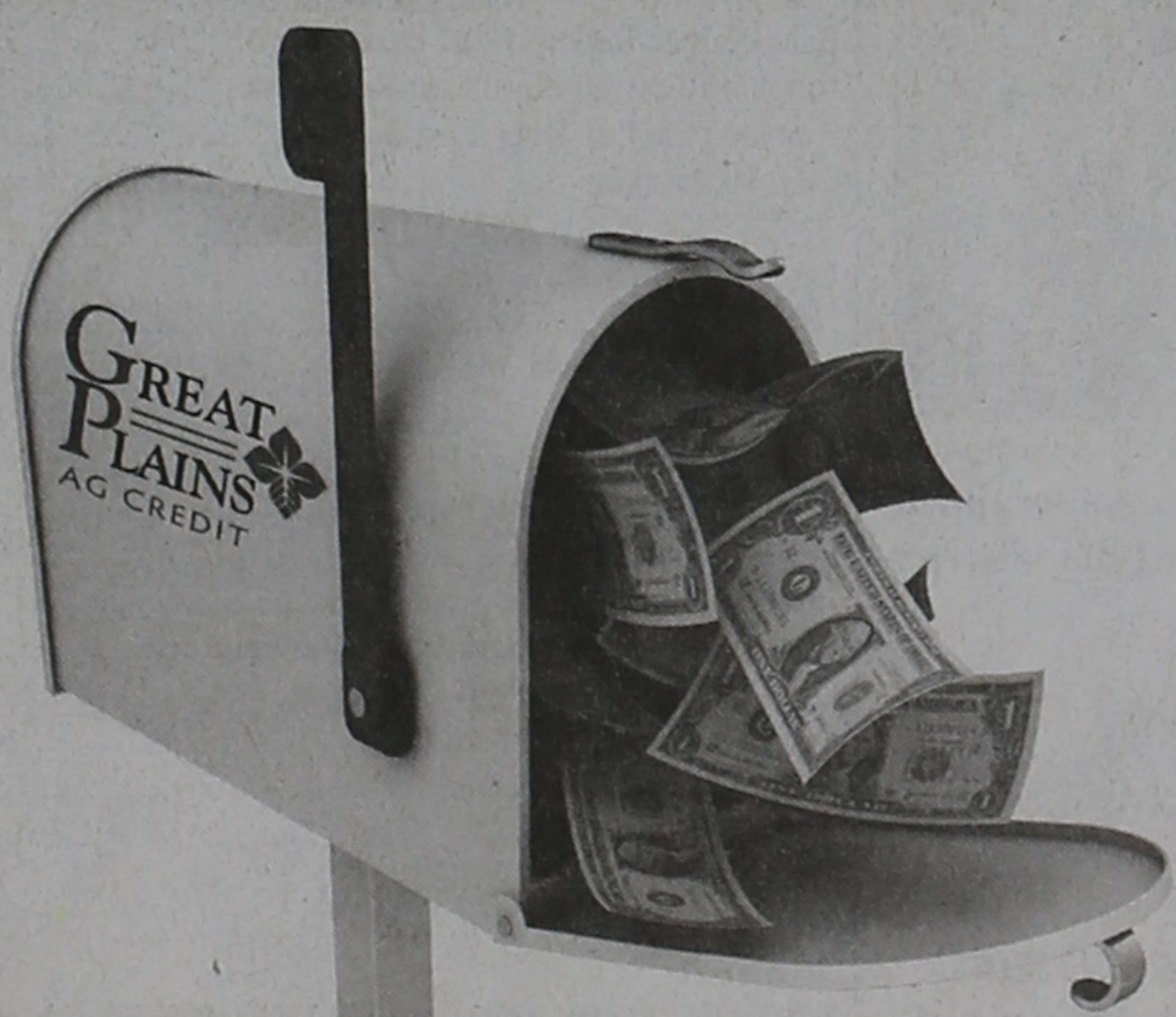

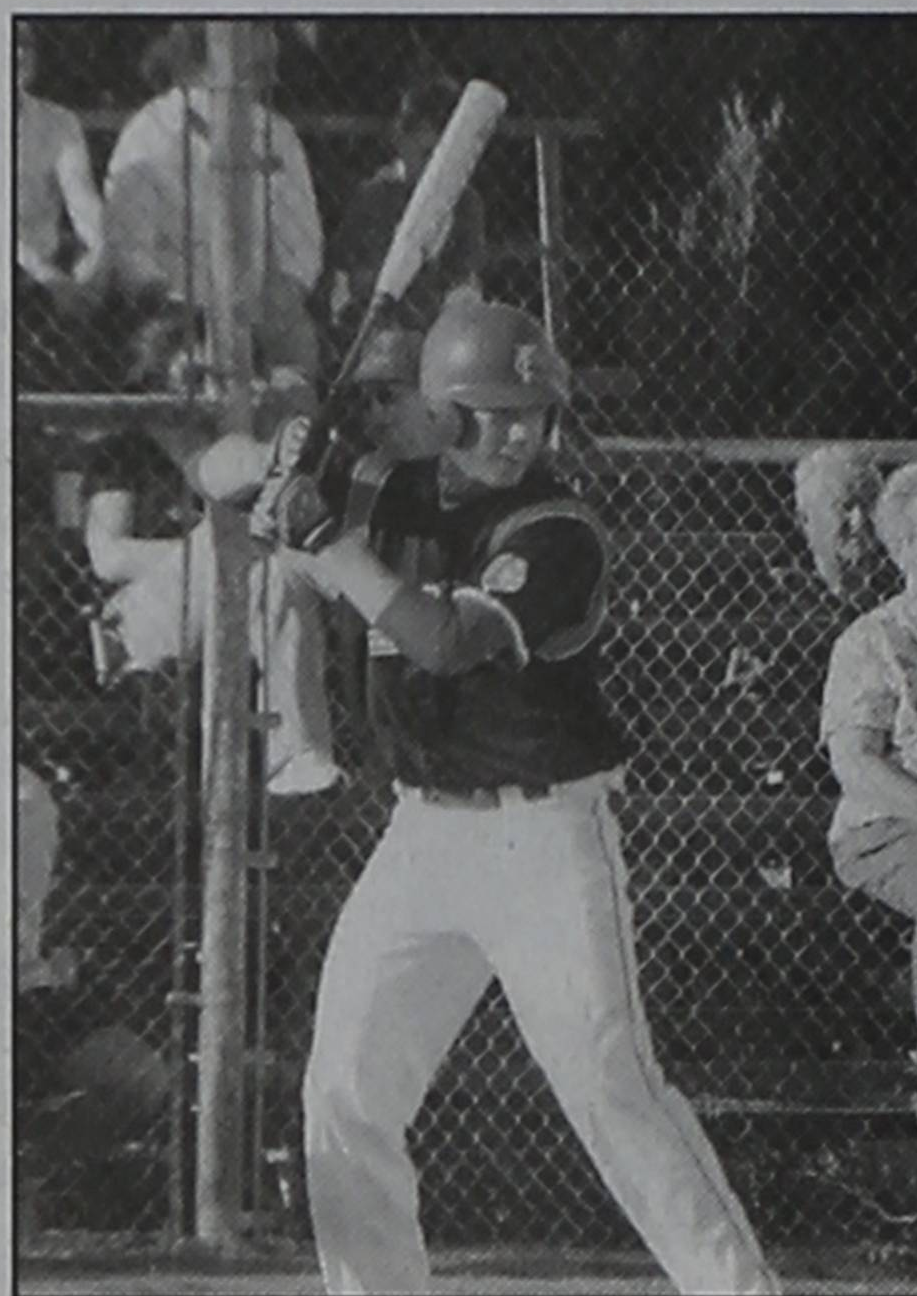
