Participants should register with officials at the community center prior to fishing in order to qualify for prizes. Various prizes for first fish, longest fish, etc. will be given at the end of the competition.

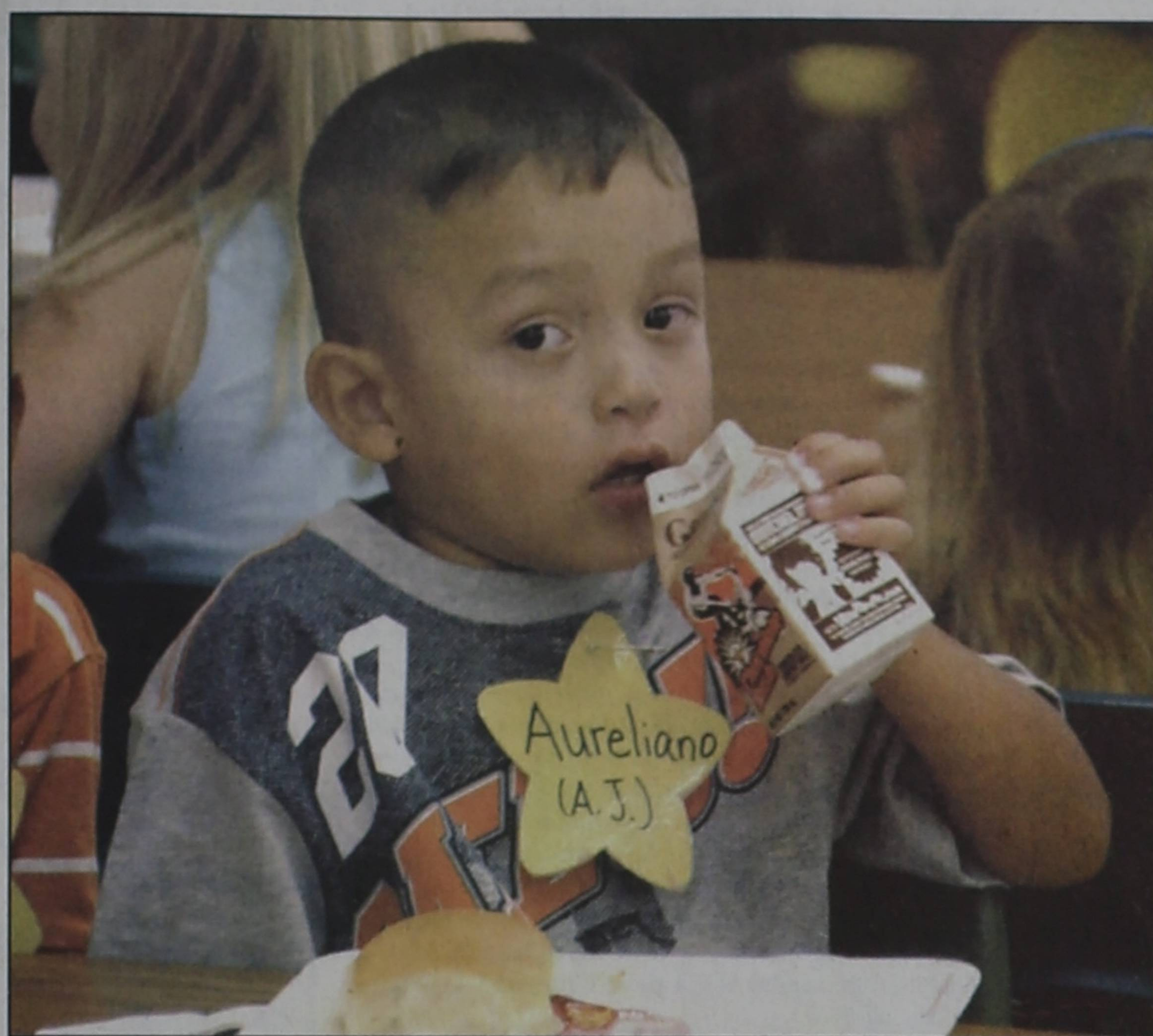
All children will need to be accompanied by a parent or other responsible adult.

# Cap and Trade: a job killer for Texas

As the summer winds down and the fall picks up, the Senate will return to a legislative agenda marked with more massive and misguided proposals being pushed by the Administration and Democratic Leadership. One that all Texans should pay close attention to is "Cap and Trade" legislation. The proposal could level a deeper impact on our state's economy and the financial well-being of Texas families than any bill in recent memory.

The concept of Cap and Trade is based on the idea that total national emissions are capped at a predetermined amount, thereby limiting the amount of greenhouse gases that companies can emit. Emitting companies are provided a set of allowances on an annual basis for every ton of carbon dioxide they plan to release into the atmosphere. Over time, the total greenhouse gas emissions allowed are reduced until the ultimate pollution-reduction goal is met. Businesses whose emissions will exceed their cap in any given year must purchase emission allowances from those who are releasing less carbon and are not utilizing their full allotment.

I am concerned about the impact this bill would have on Texas, which would be disproportionately affected by Cap and Trade

legislation because it is an energy and manufacturing state. In fact, Texas provides the nation with more energy than any other state. It is the leading crude oil-producing state in the nation, as well as the leading natural gas producer. Texas's 26 petroleum refineries account for more than one-fourth of all U.S. refining capacity. Because energy and manufacturing is prevalent in Texas, we have a disproportionately high level of greenhouse gas emissions compared to states that utilize our energy production rather than producing their own. By its nature, the cap and trade system is designed to raise the cost of conventional energy by requiring emission allowances for its usage.

When manufacturers face excessive costs for the right to produce their goods (ie, run their plants), they will have to pass those costs down to consumers. Every time a consumer switches on a light, turns on the air conditioner, or runs a load of dishes, he will feel the residual effects of taxes on the energy industry for producing this power. If Cap and Trade becomes law, it is estimated that the average Texas household income will shrink by \$1,136 a year in 2012, the year the legislation would take effect, due to increases in utility bills, groceries, transpor-

tation costs, and more. This could result in a total potential cost of nearly \$7 billion for Texas families.

The legislation is also a job killer because some American companies will not be able to maintain operations under the Cap and Trade system's cost burdens and stringent regulations. Studies show that Cap and Trade would result in the loss of two million U.S. jobs. The jobs will move to other countries, thereby increasing our dependence on foreign energy supplies (which already is 60 percent of all the energy America needs). In our state, up to 277,000 Texans could lose their jobs in 2012. By 2030, the number of lost jobs in Texas could rise to 400,000.

While reducing greenhouse gases is an important goal, a better approach is to reduce carbon emissions while simultaneously creating jobs and growing the economy. One way is to expand emission-free nuclear energy. Nuclear energy is clean, safe, reliable, and cost-effective. Today, we have 17 applications at the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for 26 new nuclear reactors. Congress must work to get these reactors online and in production.

Another technology we should be pursuing is Carbon Capture and Sequestration

(CCS). This technology holds great promise for reducing pollution because it sequesters carbon, thus preventing its release into the atmosphere. It will also help increase oil production through Enhanced Oil Recovery. In Texas, we are already working on some of America's largest CCS projects. We can lead the nation in commercializing this innovative technology.

These are just a few examples of how we can do something positive for the environment without hurting the economy. We can put America at the forefront of technology development, while creating jobs and stimulating the economy. Moreover, we can move America forward rather than subject it to a competitive disadvantage to countries such as China and India that do not impose pollution mandates on their businesses and manufacturers, thereby making their products cheaper on the global market.

I believe the goal of carbon reduction through the development of technology is one that we can achieve. But we must be wise in how we choose to meet the challenge.

first tie-breaker. It happens. It is a total point tie-breaker so write in how many points will be scored in the game, adding together both teams.

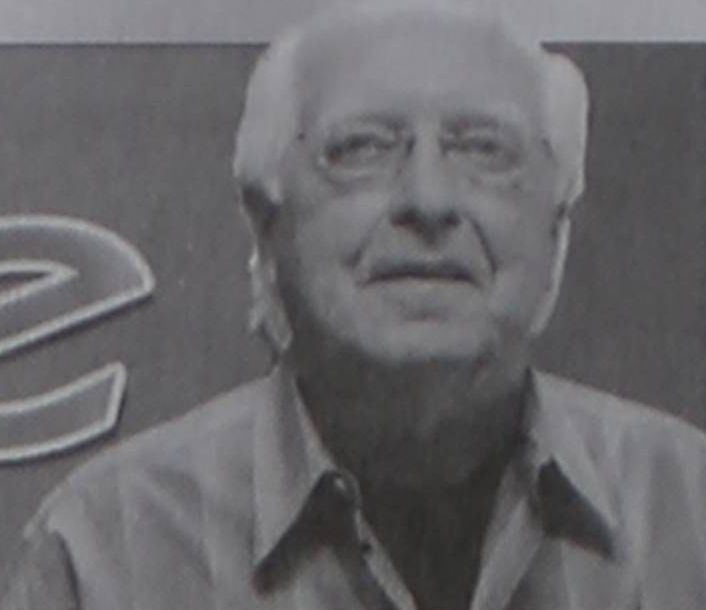

## Melon drama on a stick

You can get almost any kind of food on a stick these days, especially at a fair. Kabobs are popular but most folks don't create them at home. Here is your chance with a fish and watermelon on a skewer on your backyard grill.

This recipe from a recent Relish Magazine says that grilling watermelon concentrates its natural juices. I'm not sure what that means but it sounds pretty classy. Better try this one while watermelon is still in season and it's nice enough to cook outside. Don't forget to buy some wooden skewers.

### Curried Fish & Watermelon Kabobs

Serves 5

- 1 lb watermelon
- 1 1/2 lbs mahi mahi, swordfish, tuna, or other firm fish
- 4 garlic cloves chopped
- 2 tbsps olive oil
- 1 pinch turmeric powder
- 1 tsp cumin
- 1 tsp coriander
- 1 tsp chili powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- Lime wedges

1. Prepare grill. Soak wooden skewers in water for 5 minutes.
2. Seed watermelon; cut into 2-inch chunks. Cut fish into 2-inch chunks. Thread fish and watermelon alternately onto skewers.
3. Combine garlic and oil; brush on fish and watermelon. Combine spices; sprinkle on fish and watermelon, turning skewers to cover evenly.
4. Place skewers on grill rack. Grill about two minutes on each side. Serve with lime wedges.

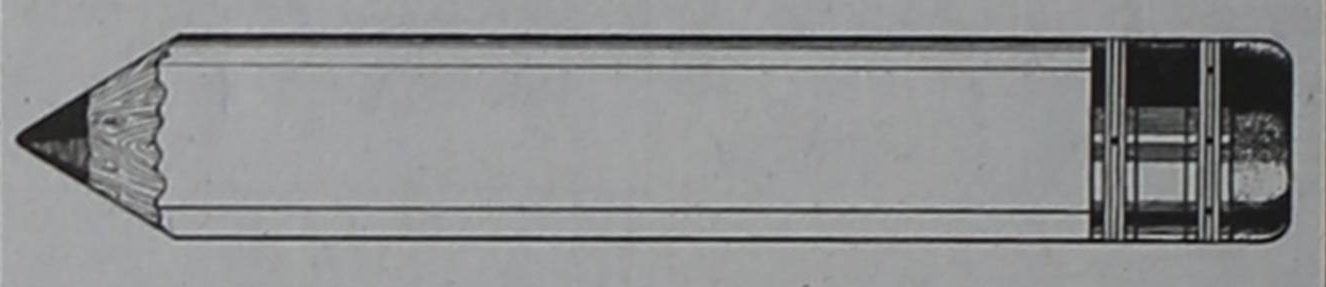

He was preceded in death by a son, David Steelman May 27, 1981, and a great granddaughter, Katie Steelman, March 1, 2005.

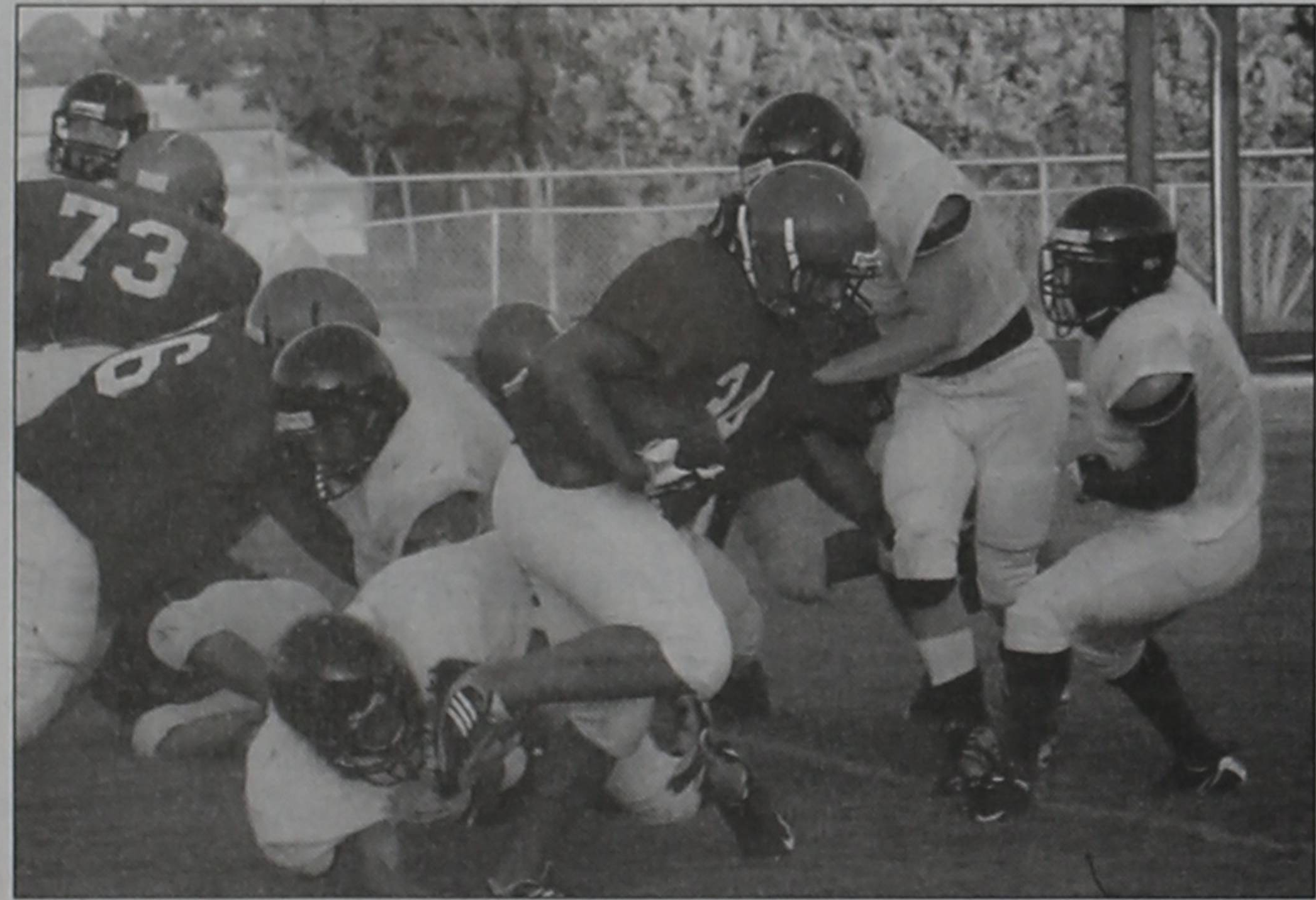

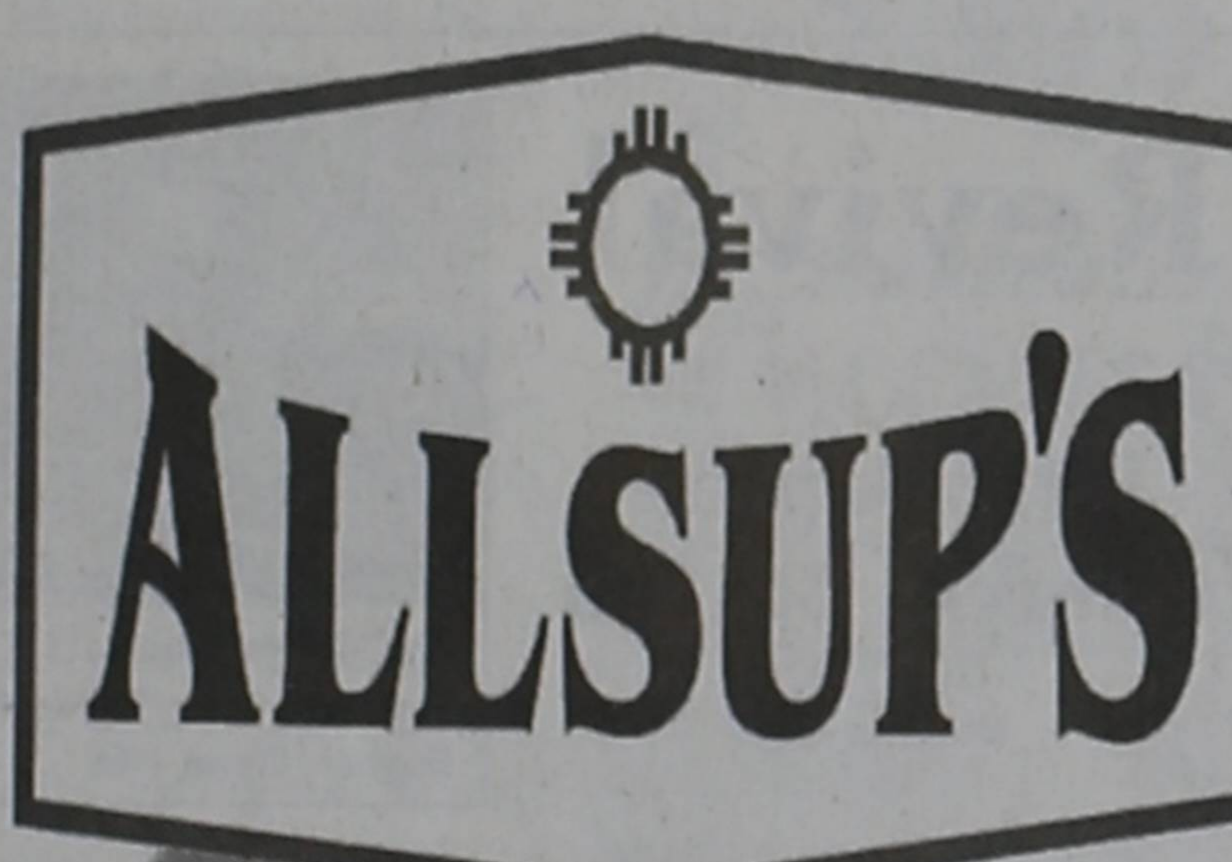
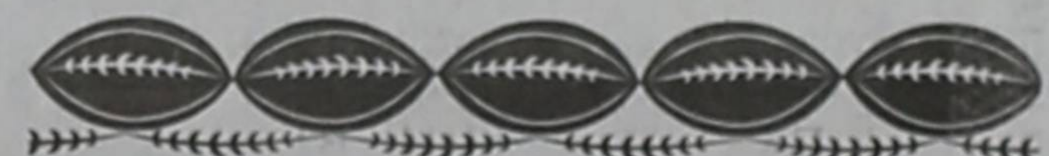
## Chieftain football replay Saturdays

This week's season opener is Friday at Abernathy and will be broadcast Saturday August 29 at 10 a.m. on Channel 76.



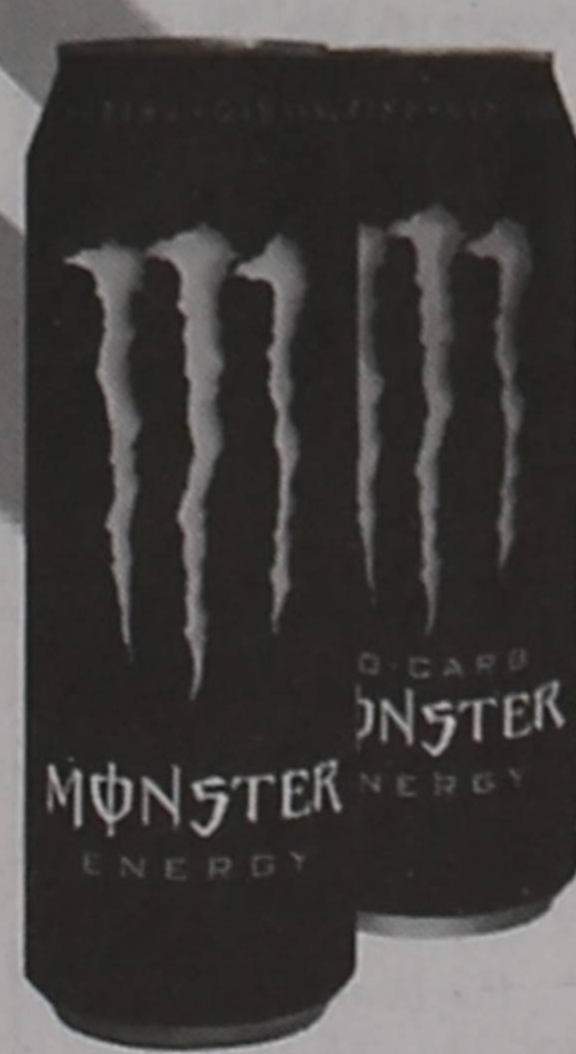

## Communion

**BY REV. BUCK MALONE, Congregational Church**

Christians acknowledge Jesus as the Holy One of God, who through grace brings a new birth, words of hope, and another home beyond. Few want to hear more than that, but scriptures exist that show people wandering, lost in the wilderness, which fewer will admit.

Why? Because it challenges us at our deepest levels, and when a pastor speaks of his or her travails and exile, it gives some a funny feeling. But, I hope you know that if Jesus faced temptation and travail, so will we.

Communion is many things, but it definitely is a bridge of grace. Quoting Fr. Michael Hardin, "Yes, it is difficult for us to acknowledge ourselves for what we are: a killer species, the species with a death wish. There is not another species trying to wipe out the entire planet, except us. This is what we are acknowledging every time we are offered that bread and that cup. We are openly confessing that we bring death every day in our thoughts, in our anger, our resentment and our bitterness.

In our relationships these thoughts create moods and feelings that become words that sting and are meant to wound. And sadly, sometimes the words are embodied in physical conflict. . . In the Eucharist, we reverse the effects of the scapegoat mechanism". For Fr. Hardin and other theologians' work, it's absolutely amazing to read the scriptures and see how many, if not most, of the stories contain, at their base, a scapegoat.

Culture and humanity are based on what Terrence McKenna once said, "We are a history of people who climb ever higher, stand on each other's shoulders, and try to kick the teeth out of the one right below us".

It is in and through the Eucharist, the Communion, we surrender, we give ourselves away to love, not the opposite. In Jesus' life we see our own, we see grace being more than attainment, prestige, and thrills. Through his death we see transformation, not just alteration or change, but a new beginning no matter what we have done. So I leave you with a word-play from a philosopher named, Wittgenstein. What do you see in the word, Godisnowhere?

You can see "God is nowhere", or you can see "God is now here". What was your first impression? How we see is more than what we see, and that's the meaning of grace, of how transformation takes place within our minds and hearts. Only when we take Jesus' words personally, "To the least of these you have done it to me", will we better understand grace.



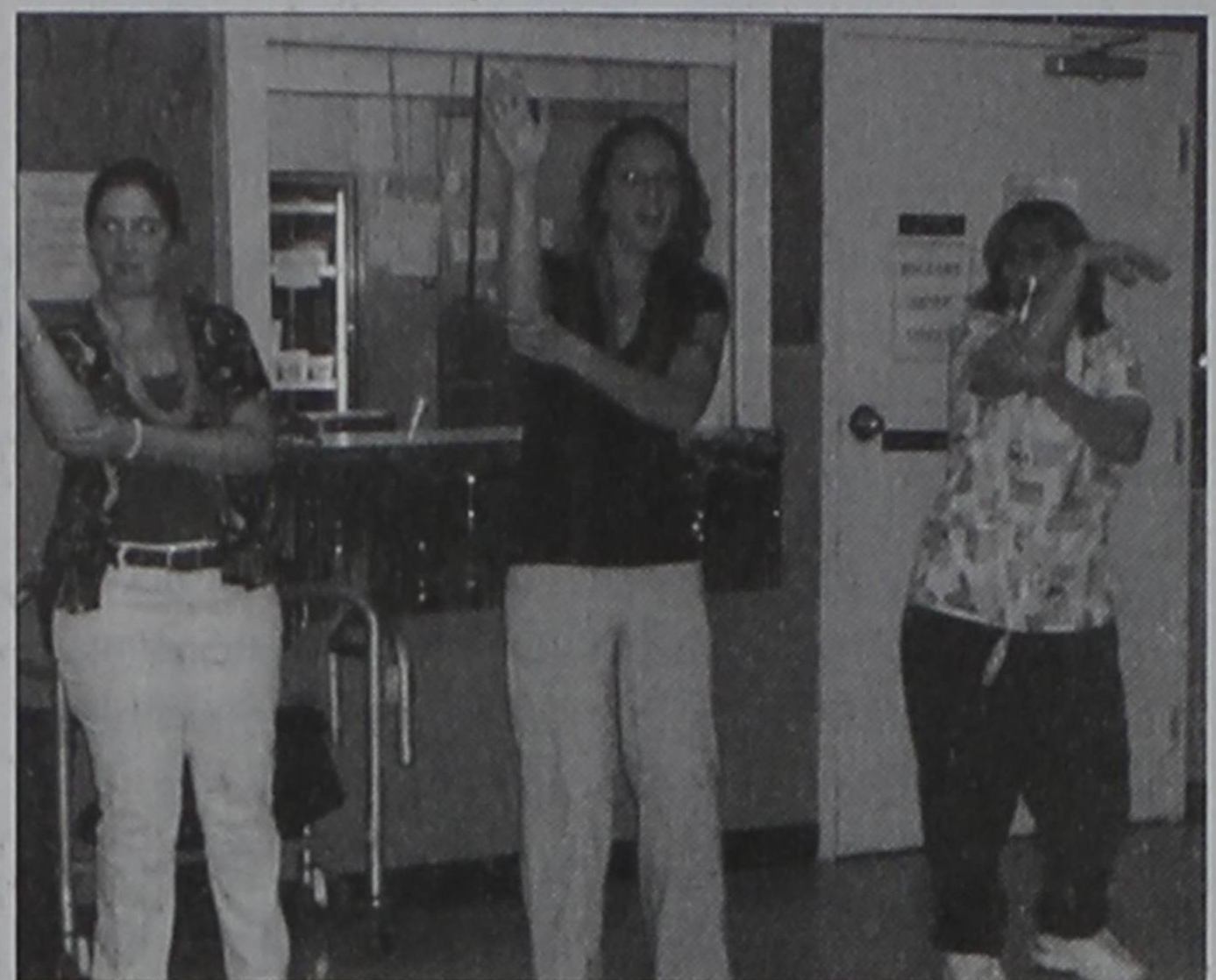

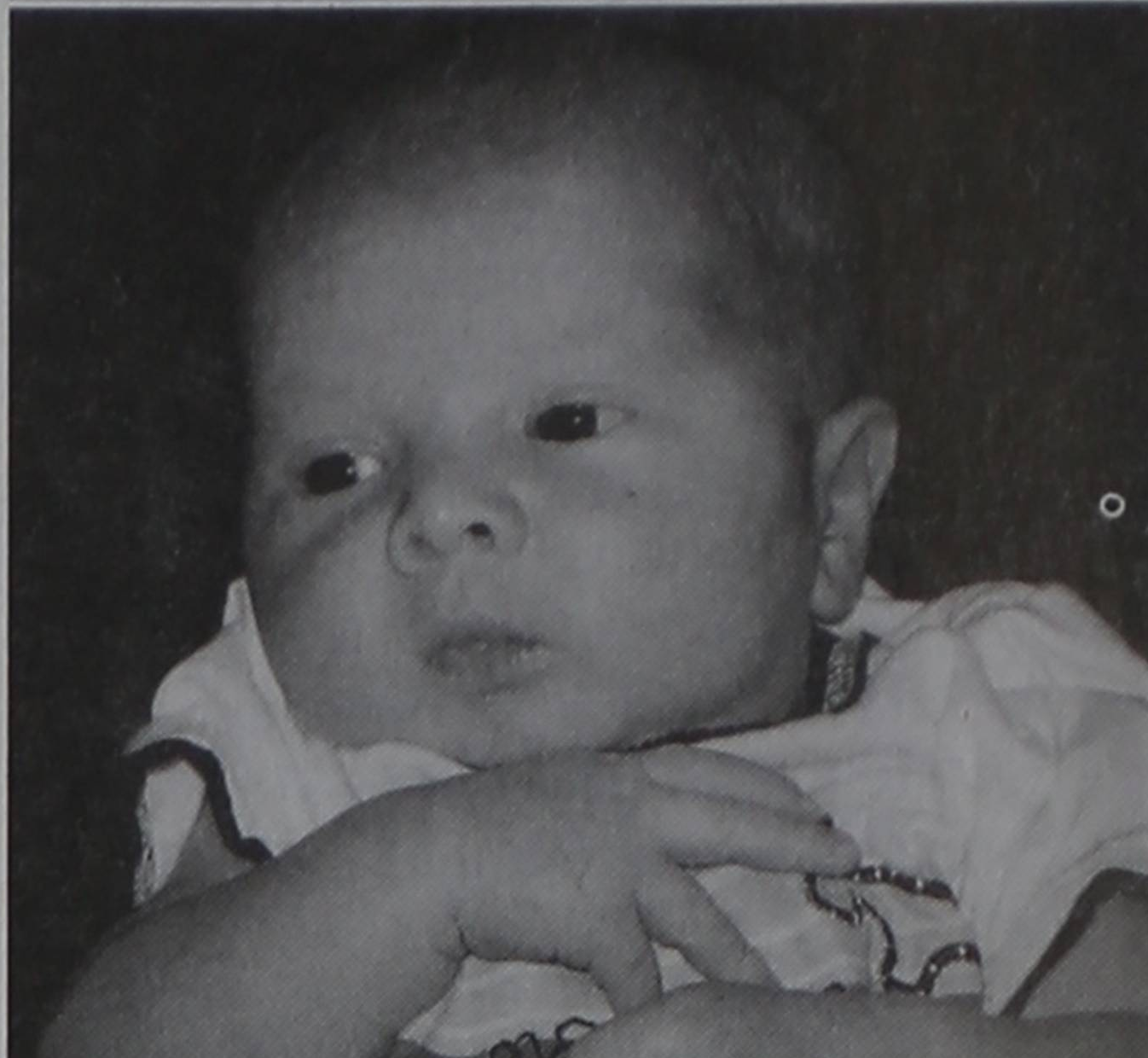

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in CITY OF FRIONA last year was \$55,887. Based on last year's tax rate of \$0.790000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was \$441.51.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in CITY OF FRIONA this year is \$56,983. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.771400 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$439.57.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.790000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$450.17.

Members of the public are encouraged to attend the hearings and express their views.

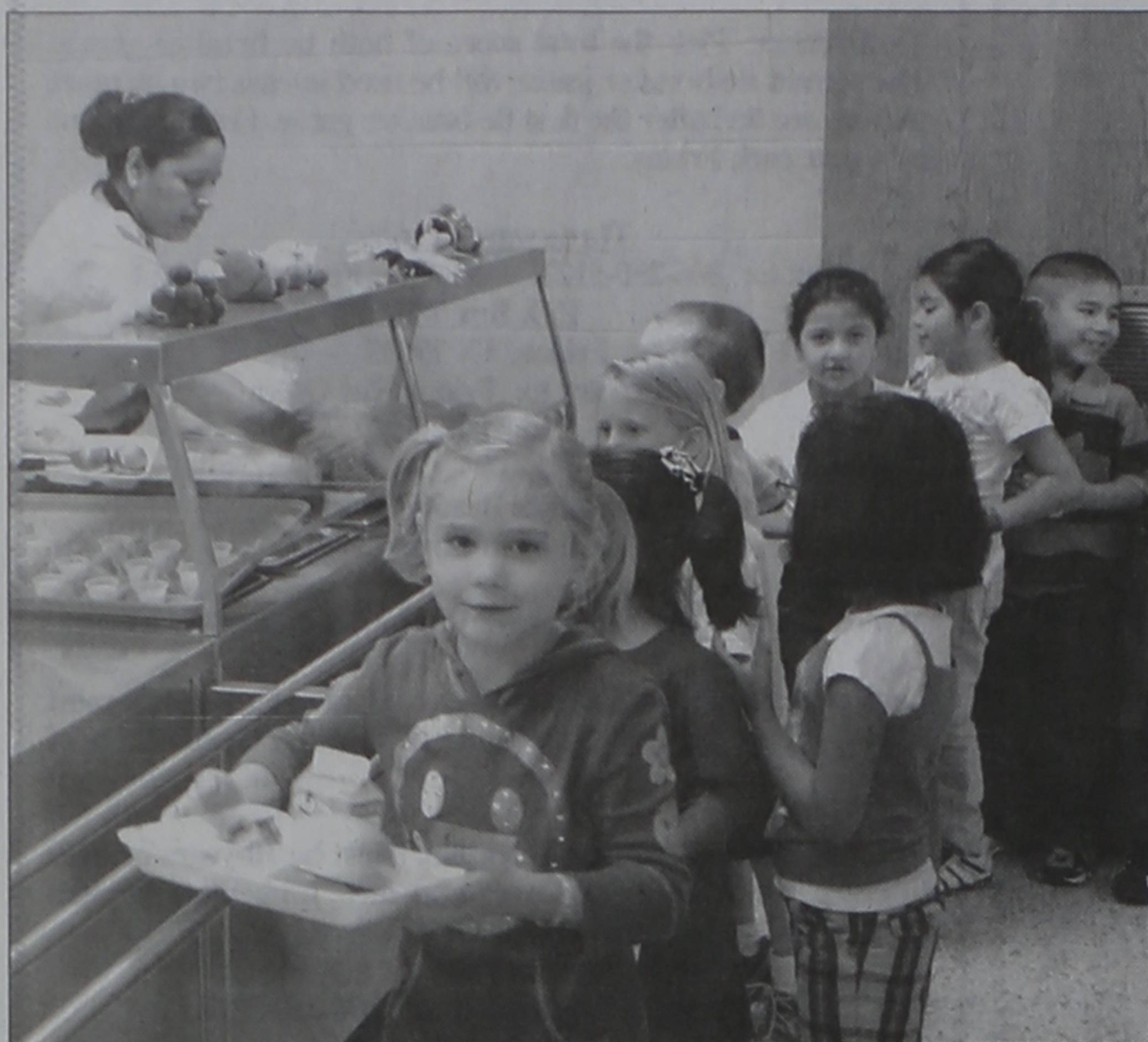

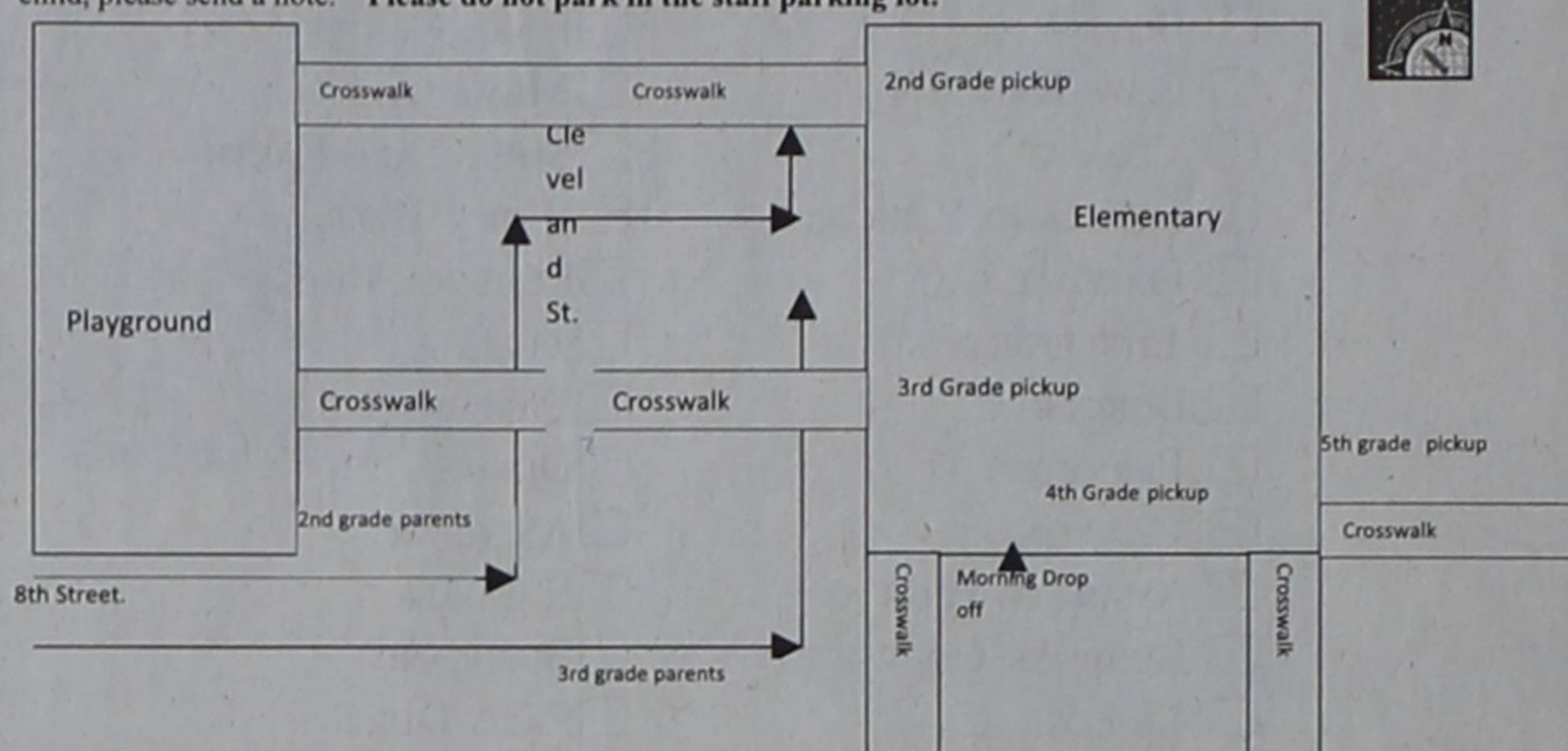

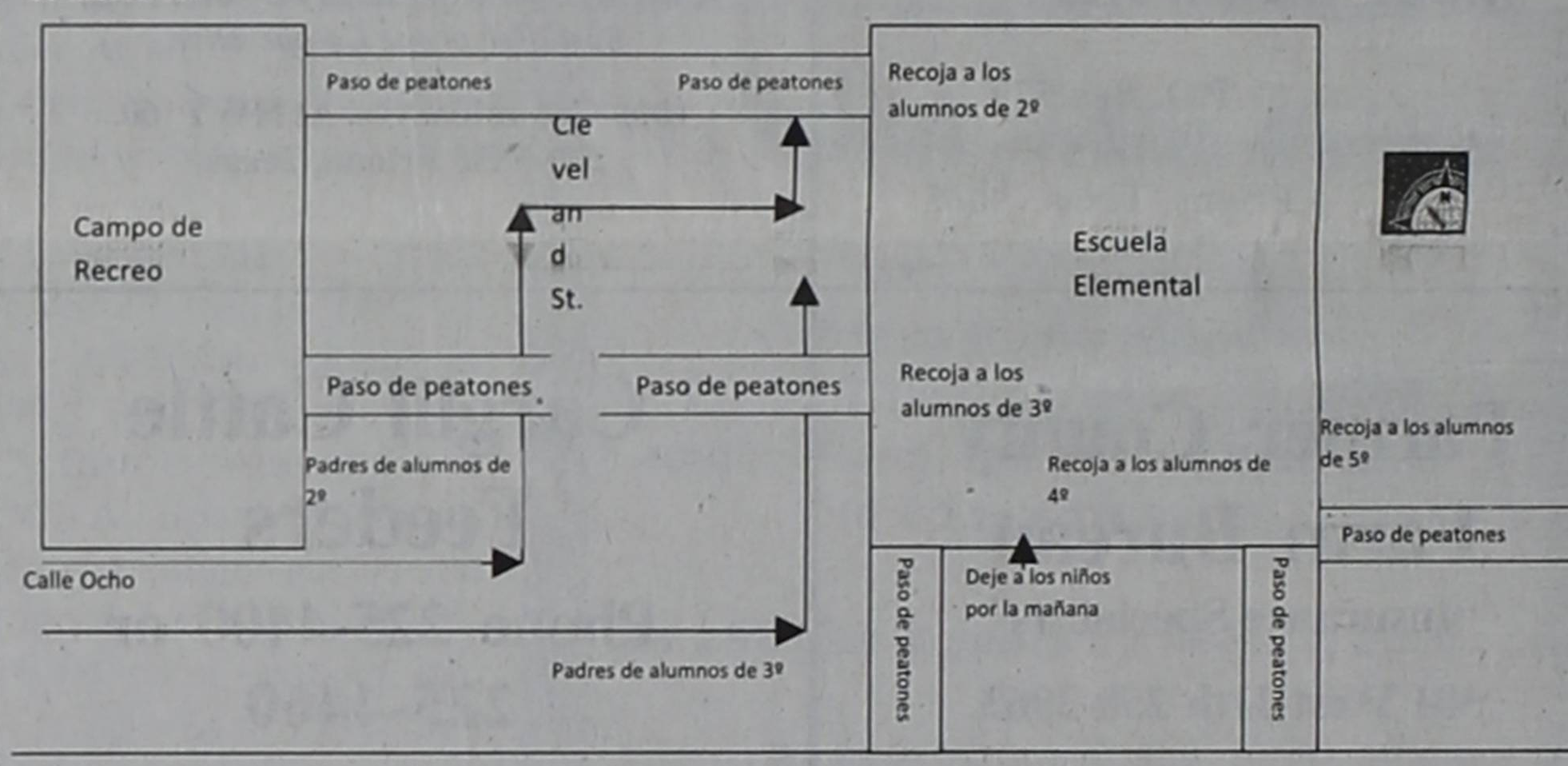
