Council approves bond refinance plan

The Friona city council met in regular session Tuesday October 12, 2010, in council chambers at 619 Main St. Mayor J.B. Douglass presided.

Sam McIntosh addressed the council during the public comments item on the agenda. McIntosh expressed concerns about a recent incident when Friona police did not respond to a call and enforcement of the junk vehicle ordinance.

The Friona Star was ap-

proved as the official newspaper for the city in posting of legal notices, public notices, bids, etc.

Approval was given for city manager Patricia Phipps to pursue a non-matching funds grant to purchase an oil recycler at the city barn to be used for oil disposal by the public.

The major portion of the meeting was spent discussing a plan to refinance two bonds issued in 2002 and 2003. The plan, to be ad-

ministered by Specialized Public Finance, Inc. of Lubbock, would save the city more than \$80,000 in interest payments over the next 10 years.

Vince Vialle, Managing Director of Specialized Public Finance, addressed the council about the specifics of the refinancing of the \$2,540,000 in bonds. The refinance plan includes the remaining \$415,000 general obligation bond of Prairie Acres issued in

2003 and \$1,945,000 water and sewer bonds issued in 2002.

In separate actions the council approved Specialized Public Finance as financial advisors to the city, approved the Underwood Law Firm of Amarillo to act as bond counsel to the city, and authorized Specialized Public Finance to proceed with the lower interest refinancing plan based on improved market conditions.

After reviewing the ac-

counts payable and monthly and quarterly financial statements, the council went into executive session to discuss employee evaluations. When the council returned from executive session, no further actions were taken and the meeting was adjourned.

The next meeting of the city council is Monday November 8, 2010, in the council chambers. All city council meetings are open to the public.

License plates available at Friona chamber office

As of October 18, 2010, the Friona Chamber of Commerce will again be issuing license plates. Last February the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles ruled that county subcontractors couldn't sell license plates.

Parmer County Tax Assessor Bobbie Pierson said, "At the June tax assessors-collectors conference I voiced my concern for the need to help our county residents on this issue. I explained the mileage situation our residents have to deal with, as well as the importance of customer service."

Upon renewal of registration, new license plates are issued every seven years. If your registration hasn't expired you can renew your vehicle license at the Chamber of Commerce office. For additional convenience you can mail renewals to Farwell or renew registrations online at txonline.com.

Early voting begins October 18-October 29

Early voting for the November 2 election will begin October 18 and end October 29. Voting by personal appearance will be available at the courthouse in Farwell daily during regular business hours.

Early voting dates in Friona will be October 21 and October 28 at Friona State Bank during the bank's business hours. Early voting in Bovina will be October 21 at 1st Bank

and in Lazbuddie at the Methodist Church on October 26.

The last date the clerk's office can receive a request for a ballot by mail is October 26. All voters should bring their voter registration cards or a valid picture ID.



Out Here

Today the average American household is forced to spend more on transportation each year than food.

Our infrastructure is crumbling. Other nations are going all-in on their infrastructure. As a percentage of GDP America invests less than half of what Russia does in their infrastructure and less than one-third of what Western Europe does.

China is building thousands of miles of new roads and plans to build dozens of new airports. Everywhere else they are thinking big. Our shortsightedness has come due. We can no longer afford to sit still.

All of the above words are from remarks made Monday by President Obama on rebuilding America's infrastructure. The nations mentioned: Russia, China, and Western Europe, could invest their entire GDP on improving infrastructure and still be years behind America. Yet our President puts forth another negative view of America.

There is no doubt that some of the country's infrastructure needs attention. Sometimes gas and water pipelines break. Levees have broken causing flooding. A bridge collapsed in Minnesota.

County roads have to be graded, highways develop a few potholes, airports are often crowded, and if you live in a big city, the traffic jams can be

maddening, especially for the impatient world of today.

There is no answer to traffic jams in big cities. Expand the highways to 10 lanes and there will still be jams. It will never be a perfect world.

More remarks from BHO: "Tens of thousands of projects employing hundreds of thousands of workers are already underway across America. We're moving forward with projects that connect communities across the country to broadband internet and connect 31 states via a true high-speed rail network." He didn't name any of the 31 states. Google "high speed rail 31 states" if you want to know about the proposed project. (Editor's note: Friona is not among the proposed high speed rail cities.)

All of the government's infrastructure plans will be fully paid for, he says. (HA!) One of the plans to pay for it all is this government-speak quote: "It will establish an infrastructure bank to leverage federal dollars and focus on the smartest investments." What does that mean exactly. Don't know. Guess you will be able to open an account at the infrastructure bank. Perhaps Barney Frank will manage the investments.

Here's more. Obama actually said this today: "We want to cut waste and bureaucracy by consolidating and collapsing more than 100 different,

often duplicative programs." What? The current administration is going to cut waste and bureaucracy? That's funny.

Could this be strictly election talk? Democrats and the left are confused and disoriented in the face of the November 2 election. They will be saying words they think voters want to hear in order to steal a vote or two. Few of them are campaigning on the success of the healthcare bill.

If you doubt this was a campaign speech, try these statements made at the conclusion of his remarks: "these investments.....will create good, middle-class jobs right now. This is a season for choices, and this is the choice: between choice—between decline and prosperity, and between the past and the future."

Key election words: middle

class, jobs, right now. Those are buzz words directed at angry voters. Choice is another disguised word for vote. Decline and prosperity, i.e. Republican (decline) and Democrat (prosperity), and the past (Republican) and the future (Democrat).

I'm not concerned about the outcome of the November 2 election. No matter who wins it will be government as usual.

I'll end with this quote from an article written by Mark Halperin, senior political analyst for Time Magazine and a liberal journalist: "The White House is in over its head, isolated, insular, arrogant, and clueless about how to get along with or persuade members of Congress, the media, the business community, or working class voters."

Old fashioned cookies

I received a recipe from Clara Trowbridge in Hereford. It was handwritten on a 3x5 card. On every inch of the 3x5 card. Reminded me of letters I used to get from my grandmother back in the day when people wrote letters. A challenge to read but written with lots of love.

Clara sent along a cookie recipe. I think I was able to read all the ingredients and instructions accurately. I'll bet she has made a bunch of these over the years. You'll need some Post Grape Nuts cereal and some other stuff.

Sounds like a good holiday recipe. Cookies and Christmas. Doesn't get much better. If you make a batch, bring me a couple, will you.

Grape Nuts Oatmeal Cranberry Cookies

Makes 5 dozen

1 1/2 cup flour
1 tsp soda
1 1/2 cups (3 sticks) margarine
2/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar
2/3 cup granulated sugar
1 egg
1 tsp vanilla
2 cups Post Grape Nuts cereal
2 cups quick cooking oats
1 cup dried cranberries (or raisins)

Heat oven to 375. Mix flour and soda in a small bowl. Beat margarine in a large bowl with electric mixer on medium speed to soften and gradually add sugars, beating until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Gradually add flour mixture, beating well after each addition.

Stir in cereal, oats, and cranberries by hand. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheets. Bake 8 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool one minute. Remove from cookie sheet. Enjoy.


Letters to the Editor

I say thanks again to you Cargill employees. We appreciate your efforts for trying to improve things at the cemetery.




A big thank you to the Cargill employees and those responsible for the hard work and time spent cleaning and clearing the cemetery west of town.



ber 9 here vs. Bushland. But Bushland and Friona girls are headed to the volleyball playoffs so the basketball schedule is subject to change.






Lions Club News







Chiefs lose to Bushland, head to Muleshoe

The Chieftains scored the first and last touchdown against the Bushland Falcons Friday night at Chieftain Field. But the Falcons sandwiched 47 points in between to hand the Chiefs a 47-33 district loss. The Chiefs will take a 1-2 district record on the road to Muleshoe Friday October 15.

The Chiefs won in all areas except the scoreboard as they rolled up 452 yards of total offense, 318 rushing and 134 passing. Bushland had 170 rushing yards and 190 passing for 360 total yards.

Senior running back Zack Fair had 155 yards on 17 carries and

three touchdowns before leaving the game in the 4th quarter with a wrist injury. X-rays later determined Fair had three broken bones in his left wrist. He underwent surgery Wednesday and is expected to be out for the season.

Other rushing stats: Diego Licerio was 20 for 89 yards and a touchdown, Brenner Barnett carried 9 times for 55 yards, and Ernesto Monreal was 4 for 15 yards.

Barnett completed 10 of 21 passes for 134 yards and one interception that was returned 70-yards for a touchdown. Caleb Monroe had 4 catches for 81 yards including a 42-yard touch-

down. Monreal caught 3 for 29 yards and Fair had one catch for nine yards.

The Chieftains will travel to Muleshoe Friday night October 15 to challenge the 5th-ranked Mules. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m. Muleshoe is 2-1 in district play with their loss coming from Bushland.

The Chiefs will be without two senior running backs. Duncan Welch's broken ankle from the Lubbock Roosevelt game and Fair's wrist injury have sidelined the duo for the season.

Squaws 4-1, heading to playoffs

The Friona Squaws hosted district leader Denver City Saturday at Friona gym. The freshman and JV Squaws each won their matches in three game sweeps.

In the varsity match the Squaws got off to a great start, played tough, but eventually lost to the Fillies 18-25. According to Coach Bryan Masse in game two the ladies ran out of emotion and went flat as Denver City pounded out a 9-25 win. In game three the Squaws fought hard in a good battle but Denver City, the #2 state ranked team in 2A, won

21-25.

Coach Masse said, "We proved we can play with some of the best, now we need to go to work and improve on some of the small things and get better. If we can continue to improve a little bit every day we can be a pretty good volleyball team."

The Squaws improved their district record to 4-1 Tuesday night against the Tulia Lady Hornets. The freshman girls won easily 25-9, 25-10. The JV girls won in two games.

The varsity Squaws again beat

the Lady Hornets 25-16, 25-19, 25-19. The win gave Friona a 21-12 overall season record. "The girls played relaxed and had fun and we worked on some new wrinkles," Masse said. 

Coach David Towner said:


"The boys played well with many of them playing for the first time at the junior varsity level. This was a game with two contrasting offenses. Bushland







One of the scariest realities faced today is that religion may allow someone who is evil, wicked, crazy and far from God to attempt to claim the name of God in justifying their actions. This is no doubt the case with violence regarding muslim fanatics, and it is also the case with King Saul in the Old Testament. In following Saul and David through 1 Samuel, it is abundantly clear that Saul has been rejected by God as king, is stubbornly sinful and bent on his evil agenda, which focuses on destroying David. In 1 Samuel 23:1-14 the Bible shows David, seeking the Lord, rescuing the city of Keilah, and then remaining there for a time. When Saul gets word of David's location Saul says, "God has given him into my hand," then he gathers his army to go find and slaughter David. Saul is so quick to claim the name of God to justify his actions, but he absolutely lives a lifestyle that refuses to seek and follow God's direction.

There are far too many Saul's today as well. Those who think that God is just some benevolent grandpa in the sky, who never judges your actions, but only seeks to affirm and comfort you when things may not be going your way are who I'm talking about. If the last time you prayed was at a funeral, Christmas, Mother's Day or Easter this may be you. The Bible teaches us that God is jealous for His glory, and says "For the Lord your God is a consuming fire, a jealous God" (Dt 4:24). In other words, God is passionate for His glory, and everything in your life is to be done for His glory (1 Cor 10:31). Our problem, though, is we seek to fulfill every selfish desire and try to stamp God's name on it. The question then becomes, do I live for God's glory, or simply for my good?
