Randy Field of Randal L. Field, P.C., in Muleshoe, the city's audit firm, gave the lengthy report. The net result was Field told the council that revenue exceeded expense in all of the city's fund types. He complimented city staff for their cooperation in preparing the audit. The audit was accepted and approved by the council.

The council also discussed the December, 2010, financial statements and accounts payable and approved the minutes of the December meeting.

January is School Board Recognition Month

Governor Rick Perry has proclaimed January 2011 as School Board Recognition Month. Districts across the state will use this opportunity to show their appreciation of the critical role elected boards of education play in their local schools and communities.

"The biggest challenges facing the education system can also be among its greatest strengths. For example, during a time when state and national mandates rightly place more emphasis than ever on setting the bar high for education, it remains important for each community to retain control of its own educational system," Governor Perry said.

"Balancing the need for local control with directives coming down from larger governmental bodies is a difficult and oftentimes unappreciated task, but for over two centuries, American school boards have risen

to such challenges. School boards also deal with issues such as the rapidly expanding role of technology in the classroom, the challenge to keep our children both well-educated and physically active, and—as always—the difficulties inherent in dealing with budgetary priorities.

"The people who make up these boards volunteer their time because they care about their communities and their schools. Each year, the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB) designates January as School Board Recognition Month, to emphasize the importance of the services these dedicated men and women provide to the schools and students of Texas. At this time, I urge all Texans to recognize the invaluable contributions realized through the work of our school boards," he said.

"More than 7,000 locally elected school board members serve a crucial role in our communities and schools. These dedicated men and women strive to maintain the health of every district and serve as strong advocates for our kids. In a time of financial uncertainty, they are willing to step forward to face the critical challenges facing our public schools,"

said James B. Crow, TASB executive director.

"We hope every community will say thanks to these board members for their commitment and offer support as they voluntarily tackle the important task of governing school districts. Local trustees tirelessly work with parents and educators to develop sound education policies and set high standards for student

success. We applaud them for shouldering enormous responsibilities and making the time to share their vision and voice about the future of Texas schoolchildren," Crow said.

Campbell wins collegiate bass championship for Tarleton State

Thirty six teams from eleven universities throughout Texas met at Belton Lake October 23, 2010, to contest the inaugural Texas Collegiate Bass Championship hosted by Texas State University and Sam Houston State University.

The team of Friona graduate and Tarleton State senior Stephen Campbell and Tanner Morgan led the effort for Tarleton State that resulted in the school claiming three of the top ten spots. Campbell is the son of Holly and Danny Campbell of Friona.

As reported on the website FishingWorld.com, Campbell and Morgan concentrated on shallow, wind-blown points in the mid-lake area that offered a mix of large rocks and timber. A watermelon/green pumpkin Stanley jig produced three of the four keepers including a 4.97 pounder that claimed big bass honors. Campbell and Morgan claimed the victory by more than a 2-pound margin with 12.75 total pounds.

A team from Baylor University won 2nd place and Stephen F. Austin claimed 3rd place. Numerous prizes were provided to the top seven teams by Cabela's, Columbia, frog toggs, Sperry, American Rodsmiths, and Big Bite Baits.

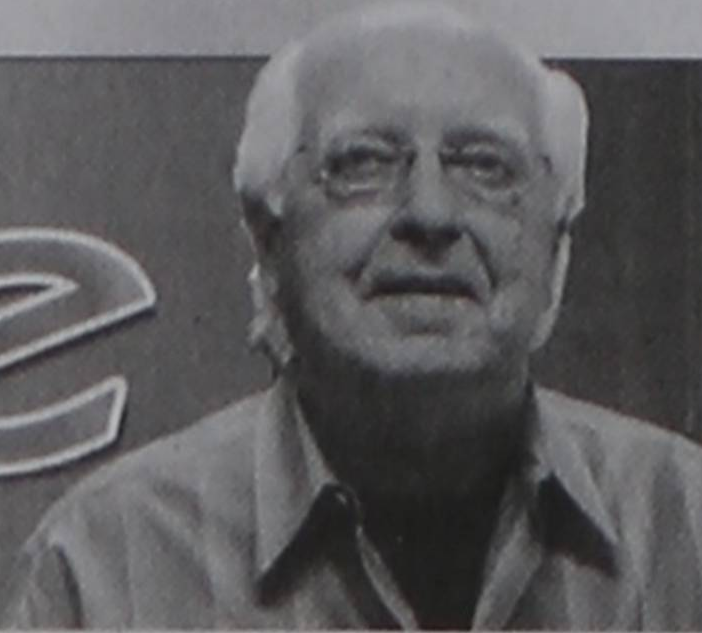

Innocent until proven guilty. That is the American basis for justice but sometimes it seems ridiculous. No doubt many people have been falsely accused and later proven innocent. That is not the case with Jared Loughner, the vile unstable young man who murdered six people in Tucson and wounded 14 others.

Is there doubt in anyone's mind that he is guilty? Should we consider him innocent until he is officially declared guilty? I don't think so. I certainly don't consider him innocent and there are many folks that were in that Tucson shopping center who would agree.

The Tucson shooting tragedy sparked a flood of finger pointing and blame across the political spectrum. Pima County Arizona Sheriff Clarence Dupnik was blaming the right wing, the media, and radio talk shows for the shooting within hours of the incident.

Sheriff Dupnik went on national TV more than one time to point fingers at the volatile political atmosphere in America as the cause of the shooting spree. Of course he had no evidence to substantiate his claims. He declined to appear on Fox News though. Hmmm! It is probably time for Sheriff Dupnik to retire.

It is not the duty of any sheriff to politicize crime sprees. Their duty is to apprehend the criminals and investigate the crime. Catch the bad guys, provide facts to the media, and shut up.

More than one commentator took up the mantra of blame, pointing to Sarah Palin, Rush Limbaugh, Bill O'Reilly, and the Tea Party as causes of the violence. Columnists from the New York Times and Washington Post wrote stinging editorials in essence blaming Republicans and "right wing radicals" for provoking people like Jared Loughner. You can look it all up on the Internet.

It is a sad state of affairs when the lunatic fringe of either party begins to

play politics with events like the Tucson tragedy. The Loughner lad was a nutcase who managed to get a gun and create chaos on a Saturday morning at a Safeway Grocery Store in Tucson. I do not know how society prevents such events from happening.

Now politicians are dreaming up more regulations to provide security for all 535 members of Congress when they go out into the public. Perhaps they will decide not to make public appearances. Can't see that as any big loss.

I've often said it would not take a huge terror event to create chaos in America. They need not devise bombs to blow up huge buildings or down airplanes. Just show up at some public event somewhere, explode a bomb or start shooting, and all the politicians will go into a frenzy of new laws and regulations.

Jared Loughner is guilty and he should go on trial next week. We don't need a lot of evidence or psychological background work. Just try the guy and give him the death penalty. There are plenty of witnesses willing to testify. Should be ample forensics and DNA to seal the verdict. Whether he is psycho- or schizo- shouldn't matter. He did it so get on with it.

None of that will happen of course. This is America. We pride ourselves on law and justice so the trial of Jared Loughner will probably not happen until sometime in 2012 and it will drag on and cost millions. That's a shame. The families of the victims deserve better.

Many psychiatrists and lawyers will earn big bucks analyzing the defendant in this case over and over. Maybe he is crazy, maybe not. Doesn't matter. He murdered six people in cold blood in public view. He has already been proven guilty in the minds and hearts of those present at the shopping center last Saturday.

You can feel sorry for him because he is nuts if you want. I feel sorry for people like Sheriff

Dupnik, who should apologize to the families and to the public for diminishing the lives that were lost by playing politics. Shame on everyone who is playing the political blame game.

To add to the vitriol, the Westboro Baptists of Missouri planned to protest at the funeral of the 9-year-old girl victim. Hats off to the Arizona legislature

who quickly passed a bill requiring them to stay over 100 yards away from the funeral. They are sick, sick folks.

It's not my fault, or your fault, or Sarah Palin's fault, or the Tea Party's fault that the cuckoo bastard killed a bunch of folks.

Shame on you if you think so.

NOTICE To Parmer County Taxpayers

January 31, 2011, is the deadline to pay all personal and property taxes in Parmer County. Checks must be postmarked by January 31, 2011, or penalty and interest will occur.

If you turned 65 years old as of January 1, 2011, you need to sign up for the "65 and older" Homestead Exemption. This is a permanent exemption so if you have already signed up for it you do not have to reapply.

If you have purchased a home since you signed up for the Homestead Exemption you need to reapply for the exemption.

Agricultural use exemptions are available for all who have purchased agricultural property. If you purchased ag property during the past year you need to apply for the exemption.

Vehicle exemption forms for those who qualify are available online at www.parmercad.org or come by our office to apply.

Shrimp, capers, lemon, & feta

The name of this recipe from Relish magazine is Shrimp for a Small Kitchen. Don't know why they call it that but it is catchy. It is a quick and easy recipe from the cookbook In the Kitchen with a Good Appetite by New York Times columnist Melissa Clark. This recipe serves two.

This is a healthy meal with a lot of the spicy stuff I like such as garlic, capers, and cilantro. I'm a big shrimp fan too. For more healthy stuff on salmon, heart health, and omega-3s, go to relishmag.com/salmon. Enjoy!

Shrimp for a Small Kitchen

Serves 2

- 2 tbsp extra-virgin olive oil
- 3 garlic cloves minced
- 1 lb large shrimp peeled
- 1/3 cup crumbled feta
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 1 to 2 tbsp capers
- 1/4 tsp coarse salt
- Fresh ground black pepper
- 2 tbsp chopped cilantro or basil, plus additional for garnish

1. Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add garlic and cook, stirring, until fragrant but not browned, about 1 minute. Stir in shrimp, feta, lemon juice, capers, salt and pepper.

2. Continue stirring over heat until shrimp become just opaque and sauce begins to thicken, about 2 minutes. Add cilantro or basil and stir to combine.

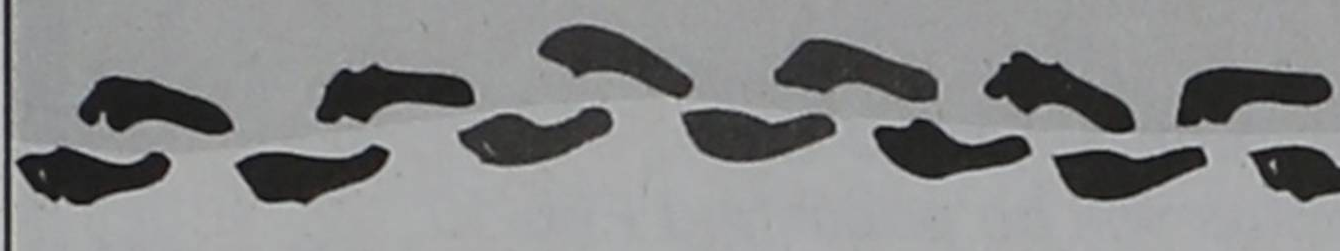

New corn hybrids will save water without damaging economic growth

The announcement that new water-conserving corn hybrids will be available this year marks the beginning of a new era that will dramatically change the outlook for conserving the Ogallala aquifer without damaging the economy of the Texas High Plains region, said David Gibson, Executive Director of the Texas Corn Producers Board.

"A new generation of water-conserving crops is no longer just theoretical; it's a reality," Gibson said. "The development of new, water conserving crops will enable us to conserve the Ogallala without the need for severe pumping restrictions that will harm the economy and eliminate jobs."

DuPont Pioneer Hi-Bred, a major producer of corn seed, announced Wednesday that it will launch, for planting this year, a new generation of corn hybrids developed to deliver higher yields with less water. According to Pioneer, the new hybrids show a 5 percent yield advantage over current leading corn hybrids in water-limited environments after 223 trials from 2008 to 2010 in Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska and California.

"The water savings from this first generation of new crops is significant, but is just the beginning of a trend that will produce huge reductions in irrigation by the end of this decade," Gibson said. "Researchers have conducted field trials in the past year that showed up to 40 percent water savings while producing the same amount of corn as current hybrids."

"Water savings of that magnitude will have enormous implications for groundwater policy. Through research and development by private companies and universities, we will be able to meet or exceed groundwater conservation goals without resorting to severe, government-imposed regulations that would harm our economy and produce job losses," Gibson said.

(The Texas Corn Producers Board is a state-wide board funded by a voluntary half cent per bushel checkoff program. Checkoff funds are used for research, education and promotion to further the corn industry in Texas, and to create better marketing opportunities for producers.)

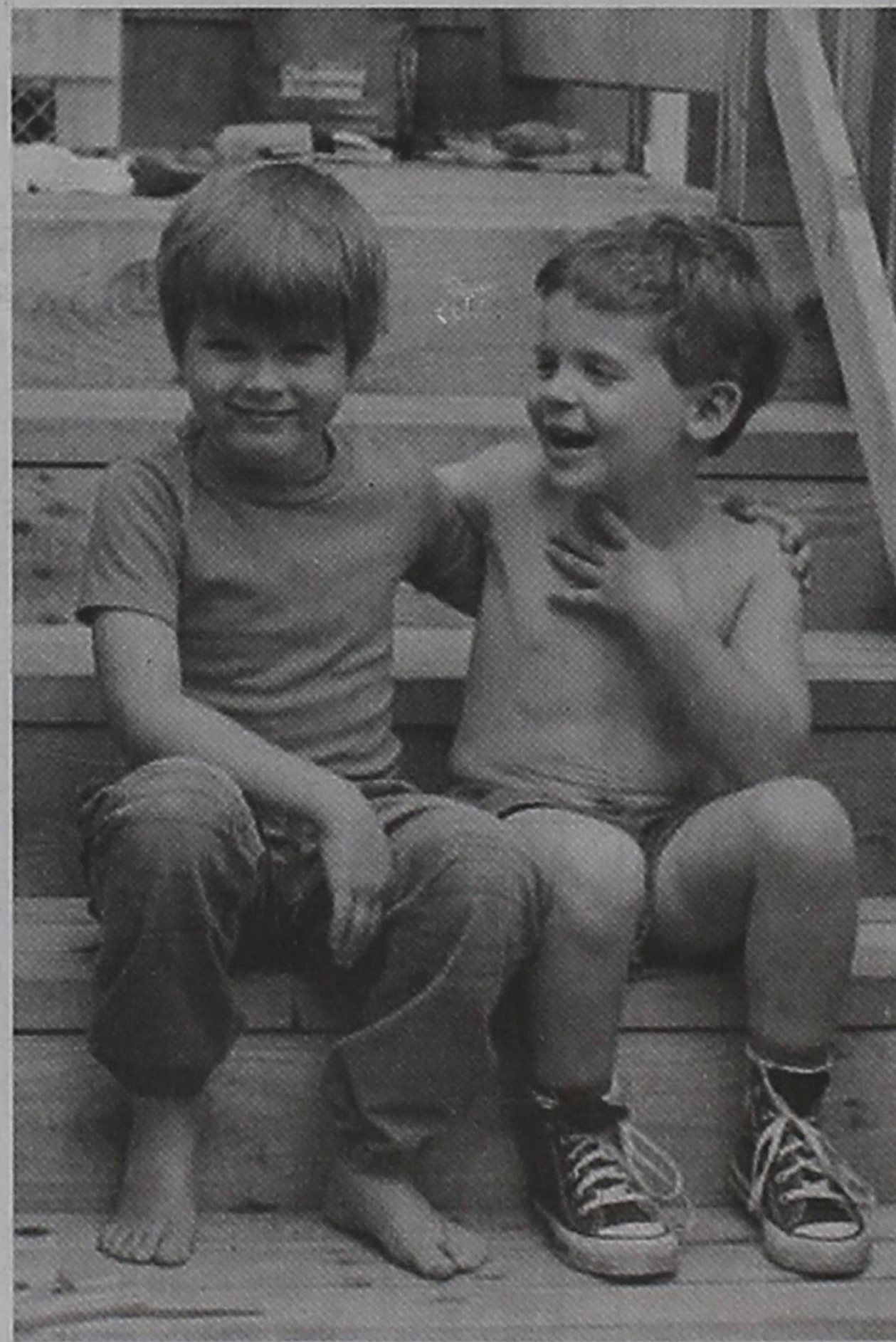

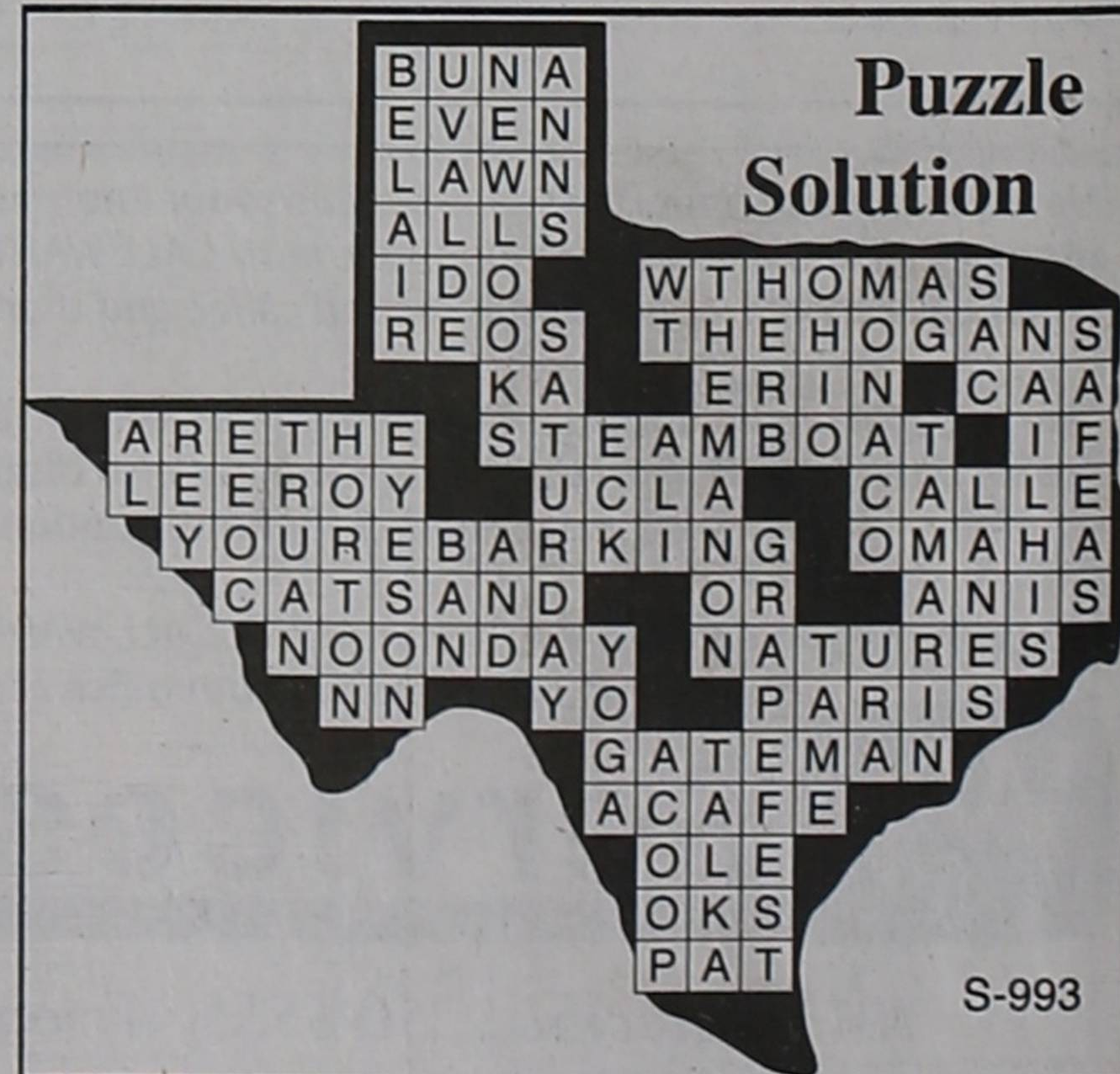

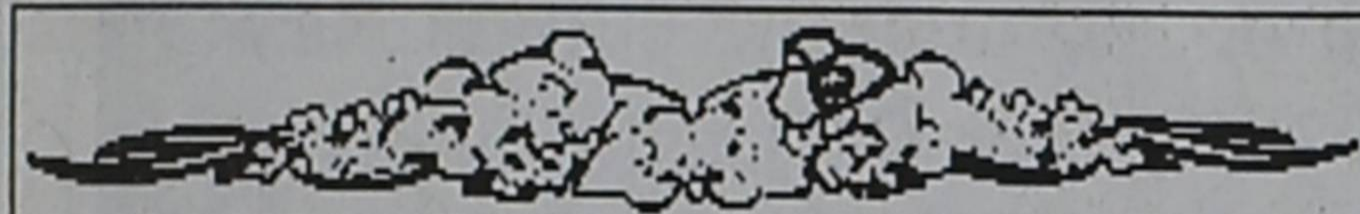

Rescued from sin

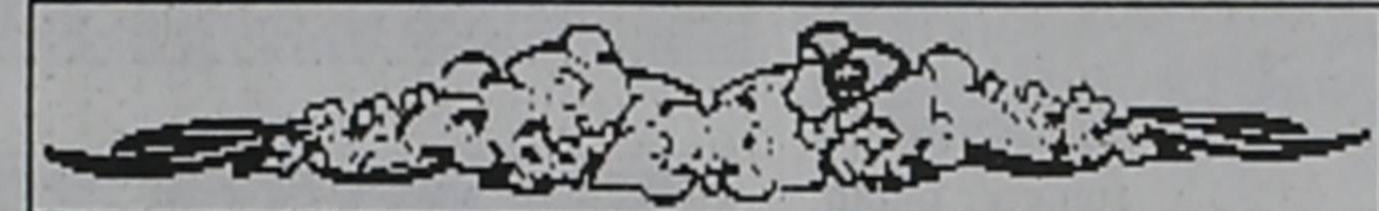

Although we tend to see David as a perfect picture of godliness and sincerity, 1 Samuel reveals some problematic lies and compromises that David makes in his life. In 1 Samuel 27, he is living a lie, and in chapter 29 those lies place him in a war against his own people the Israelites. As the Philistine army that David and his men are enlisted with is marching to battle, God rescued David from the sinful predicament he got himself into.

You see, David had been lying to the Philistines regarding his loyalty to them, which has now led to him going to battle against his own nation, seeking to kill his king. Thankfully, God rescues him from his sin, although God is not obligated in any way to do so. God rescues David from the situation his sin has led him into, by not giving David favor among almost all the Philistine commanders, who demand that David leave their army.

Did you know God still rescues from sin? First and foremost, Jesus Christ is the only hope to find complete forgiveness from our sin before God and be reconciled to him. When Jesus died on the cross he was our substitute as he bore God's just judgment against our sin. The forgiveness of Christ is applied when you come to the Lord in faith and repentance, in which you are born again and adopted as a child of God.

For the believer, God may also use His Word (Ps 119:11), His Spirit (Jn 16:13), His promises (1 Cor 10:13, 1 Pet 1:3-5), other believers (Gal 6:1-2), or circumstances (1 Sam 29) to rescue you from sin. God is not limited in his ability to rescue you from sin, the only problem is with us. Too often we do not want to be rescued, because we are so comfy in the compromises we make. This is definitely true for our nation, but is that true of your life also?



Powerlift meet results

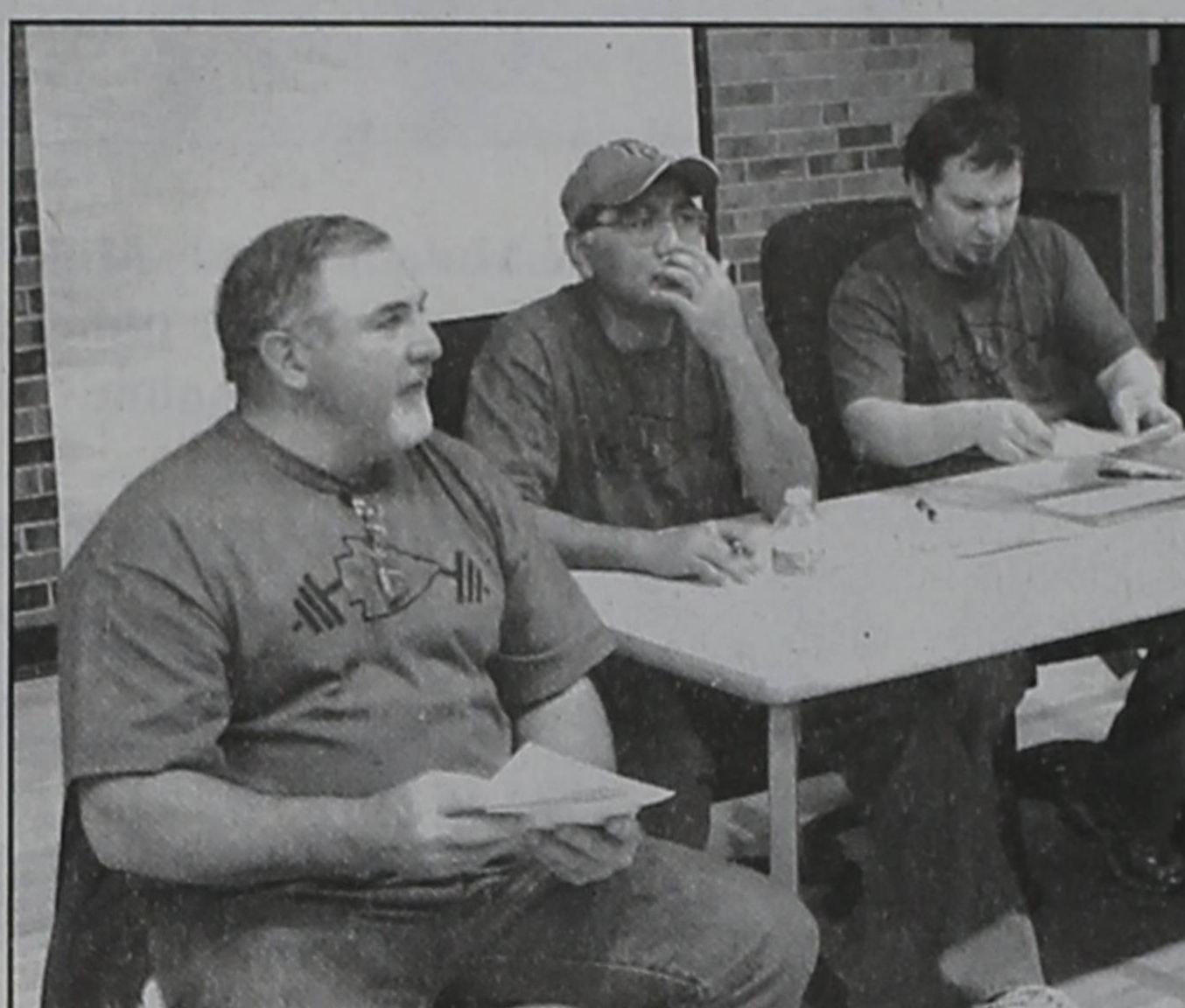

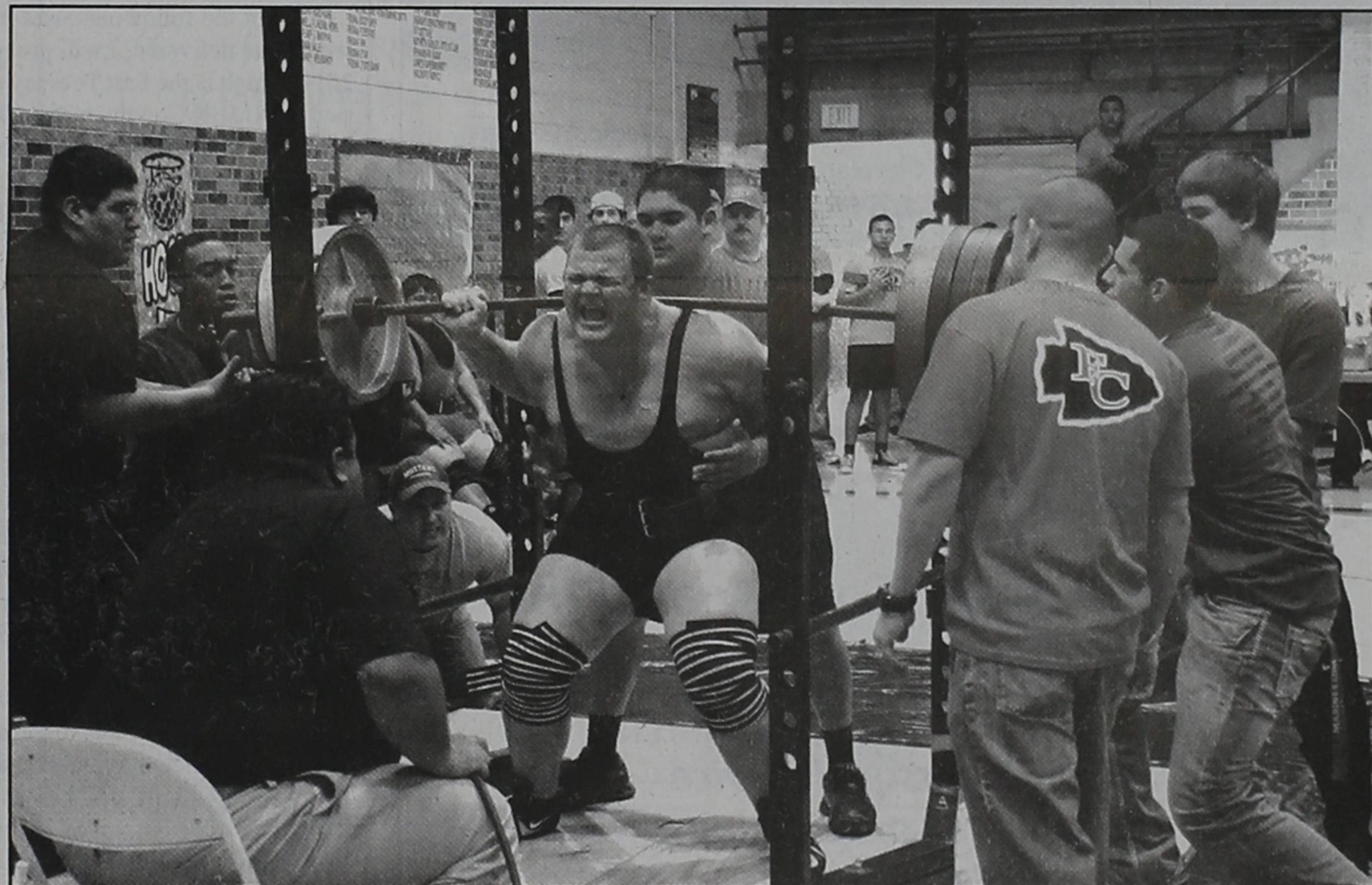

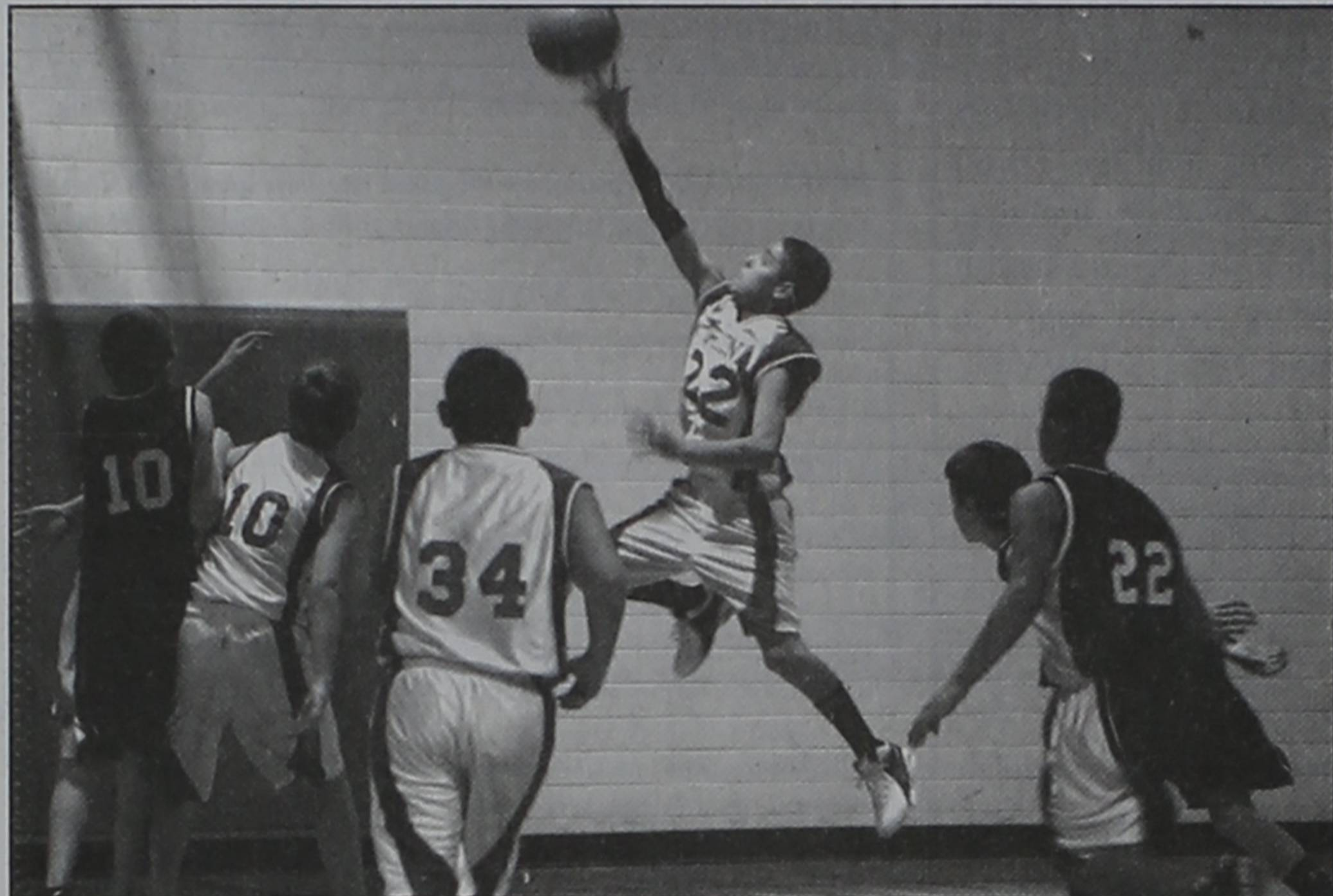

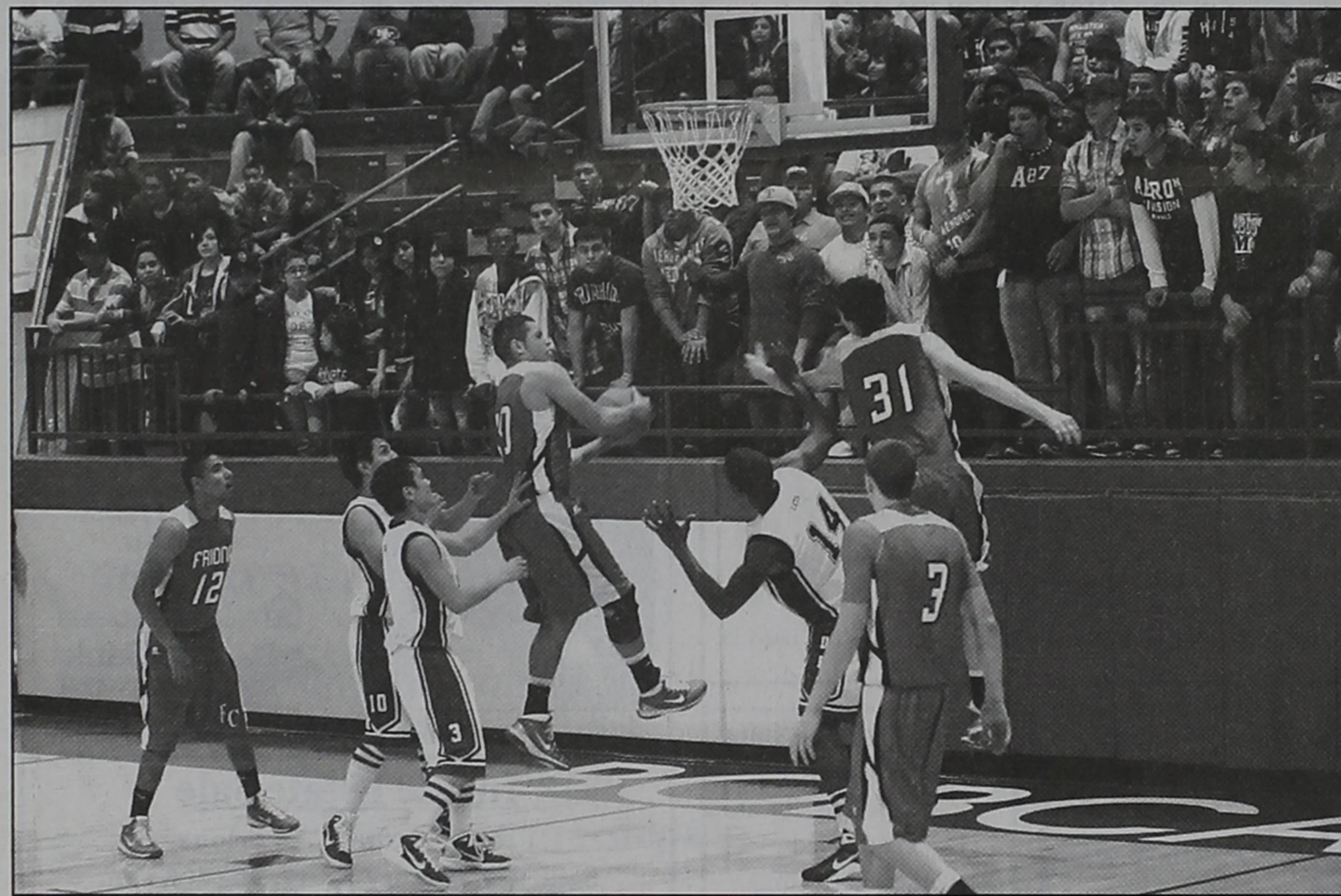

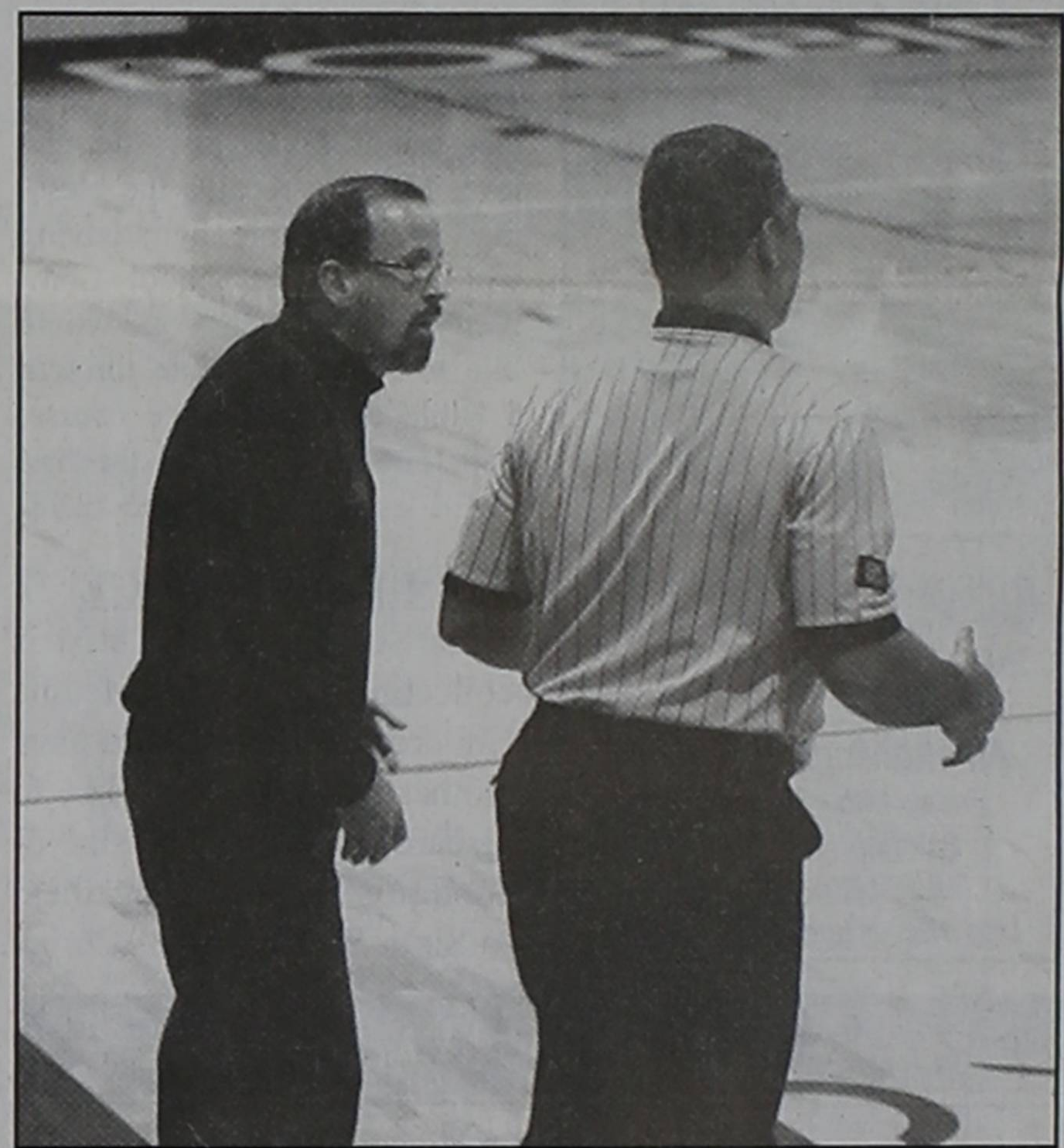

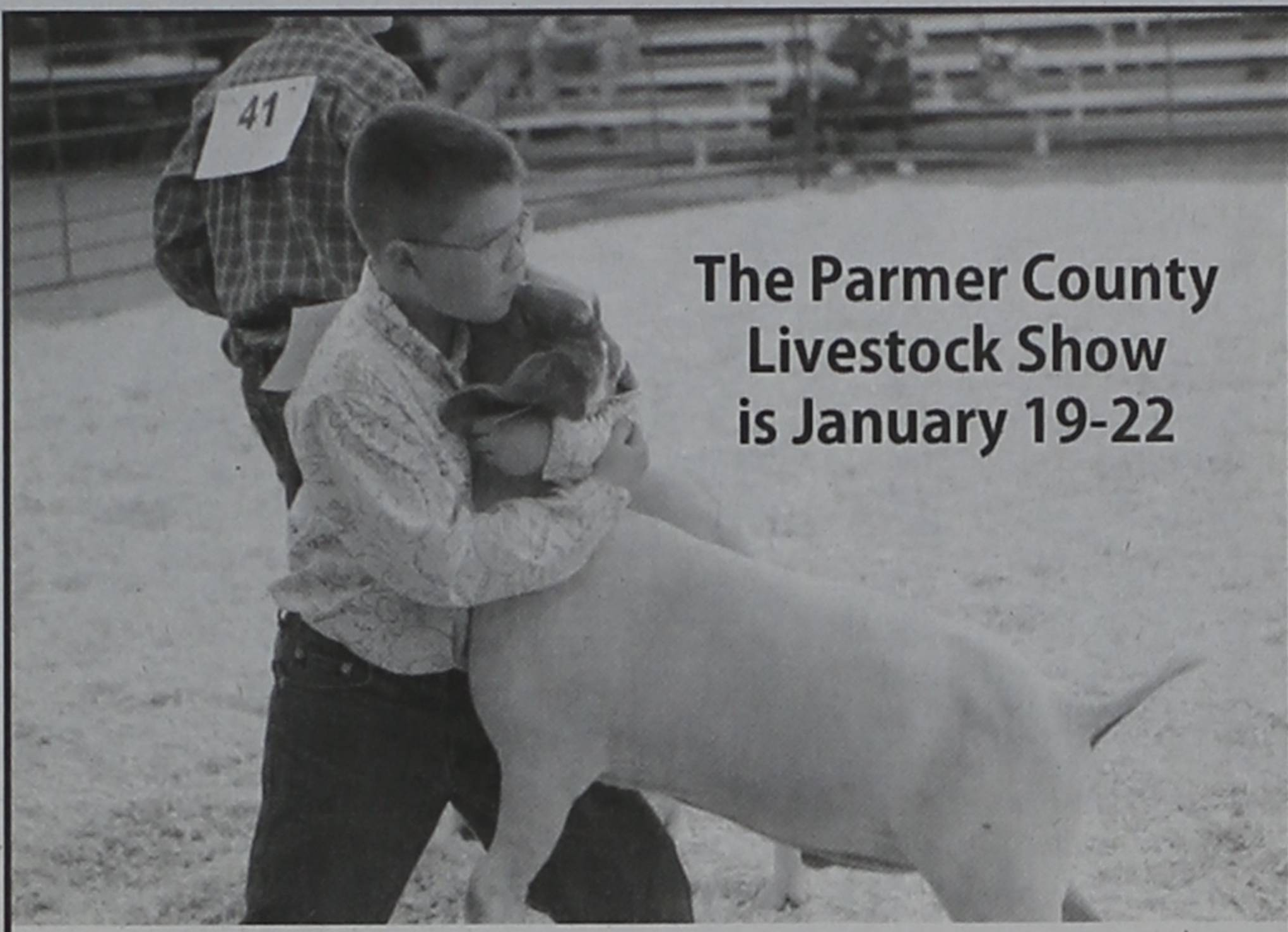
