McCormick, Masons, Johnson show grand champions, sale tops \$108,000

The 2011 Parmer County Junior Livestock Show was held January 19-22 at the Friona community center. The 4-H and FFA youngsters exhibited 25 goats, 60 lambs, 141 barrows, and 21 steers, plus two heifers and 10 gilts. A total of 140 animals made the premium sale held on Saturday.

The Saturday auction brought in a record total of \$108,125. By comparison the total at the 2010 premium sale was \$88,000, before "bumps". The final 2011 total will be even higher once all "bumps" are received and counted. Show officials were very pleased with the overall success of the show and especially with the results of the sale.

the building, "Heritage Society spokesperson Nancy Edelman said.

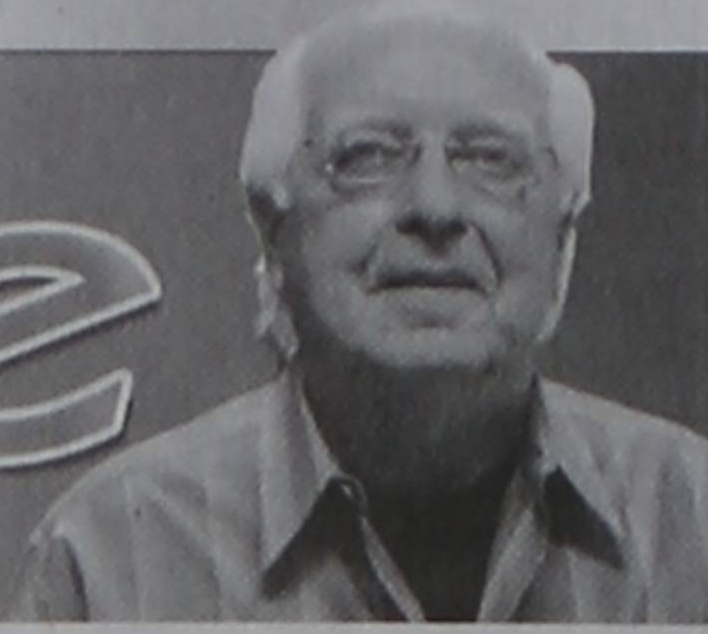

Was reading your article about the Lakeview School (on the Friona Star website frionaonline.com) and thought you might enjoy my little input.

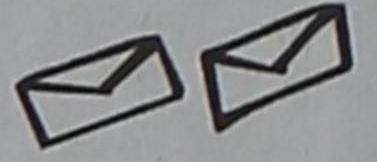
This school house was located across the road and just north of the house that Pa (Ira) and Ma Miller built. That house was built using one of the Syndicate floor plans, the same being the house that Johnny and Beulah Miller now live in.

My mother and daddy, Bruce and Grace Parr, drove the school bus. We lived in the little teacher's house on the same property. I have memories of living in that house. One, I remember awaking and a glass of water beside the bed being frozen solid. Two, I remember awaking in the night and looking to the north and seeing the white door on the loft of Hand's red barn and being frightened.

After the school building was moved to Friona (it was moved to just across the street from where Ma and Pa Miller lived in the Ray Landrum house) it was used for the band hall and Johnny and I had band classes in it.

The high school band needed extra members so they let some eighth graders be in the high school band. In our senior year (1959) Johnny and I had five bars on our band jackets.

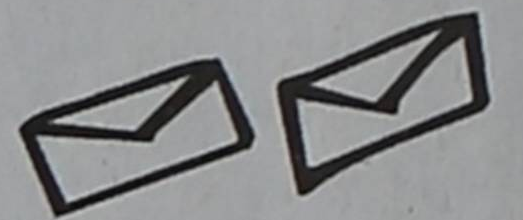

neugebauer goes after fannie and freddie

Around the Star office we call him Neugie.

Saying goodbye to a great friend

We were "best buddies" for 48 years, Annie and I. It was a giant relief for both of us when I said goodbye to her last Sunday evening, January 16, 2011. Life was such an ongoing struggle for her these past few years; it was difficult to watch the Parkinson's slowly drain the life from this exceptionally bright, imaginative lady, with her smart and sassy wit.

Anne Spring was diagnosed with Parkinson's 24 years ago, shortly after the death of her husband Dr. Lee Spring in 1987.

We first become friends while working on the yearbook for Friona's Progressive Study Club back in the mid-1960s. We were not aware of it at that time, but both of us had married our respective spouses just two weeks apart in December 1958. Later, we both gave birth to our second little offspring three weeks apart in 1964 at PCCH.

Lee Spring discovered an attractive young nursing student named Anne Moore in Burnley, England just after the end of WWII while he and some buddies were taking a sight seeing tour of the countryside before heading back to the 'states'. A long distance romance and courtship grew across the miles and across the years. When Lee completed his medical training, he brought his lovely

Anne to America to become, of all things, a Texan; but she never completely lost her English accent.

Anne was born in England on the Fourth of July, the very day that America celebrates independence from England. We got such a kick out of planning red-white-and-blue birthday parties for her, with British and American flags in abundance.

Then there was a Spring-Ellis Christmas party every year; an especially memorable two-family trip to Ruidoso in the snow of 1975; picnics in Palo Duro Canyon in the Fall; and oh those great shopping trips!

Every year on the first day of school, Anne hosted a "Happy Mother's Day" party at the Spring home, just across the street from the school. Everyone was invited to pop over for brunch after dropping the youngsters off.

I learned a lot from Anne, but she did fail at teaching me to play bridge and I failed at teaching her to paint. I dare not mention some of the tricks we played on each other

through the years. In our filing cabinet is a large manila envelope chock full of hilarious 'letters to the editor' signed by "Theirate Subscriber", aka Anne Spring. The letters never made it into print. But, she enjoyed writing, was a good writer, took some creative writing classes at WT, and won some awards from the Panhandle Pen Women's organization (now known as Panhandle Professional Writers).

Every time the ribbon on her typewriter ran out, she called me to come over and install a new one for her. I would yell, "Don't take the old ribbon out 'till I get there so I can see how it's supposed to fit." Too late! She always took the old one out of the machine before calling me.

Anne and I were both involved in genealogy. In 1990, the two of us made a trip to Salt Lake City to do some family research there. She worked for several years on the history of the Spring family and put together a wonderful collection of charts and family stories going all the way back to the 1600s in England.

Through the years, Dr. Lee, as he was known by Friona folks, took Anne and daughters, Gigi and Sandy, on many trips back to England to visit their relatives on the 'other side'. Her last trip to the homeland was made in June 1994, when she was accompanied by her good friend, Nancy Edelson. The following year, Anne, Bill and I took an autumn tour of the Ozarks including a trip to Branson, Missouri with a group of Amarillo folks. She loved to travel and wanted to see everything possible before the Parkinson's disease got so bad she went on three of the bus tour trips sponsored by Friona State Bank. A long time friend came over from England to see her and they went on the scenic train ride tour across Canada.

By 2000 she was beginning to weaken. Her pal, Claire Blanco, stepped in as caregiver. Later, her daughter Gigi came back to Friona to look after her mom during the final difficult months and days. A couple of years ago her daughter, Sandy Fuentes and her family, also moved back to Friona to look after Anne.

Anne's ashes are buried next to Dr. Lee Spring in the Friona Cemetery.

To Anne: I hope you enjoyed your 53 years in Friona as much as we all enjoyed having you here. We miss you.

Not your momma's meatloaf

Raisins, ground turkey, curry powder, and grape tomatoes in a meatloaf?

Found this recipe in a magazine. It is called Moroccan Meatloaf. There was a photo with it that looked nothing like momma's meatloaf but I am always curious about 'weird' dishes. Give it a try and amaze your family.

Moroccan Meatloaf

Prep time 35 min - Serves 4

- 1 1/2 cups raisins
- 1 sm red onion chopped
- 1/2 cup couscous uncooked
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 tsp curry powder
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 lb ground turkey
- 1 egg lightly beaten
- 1 pint grape tomatoes

1. Preheat oven to 425. In large mixing bowl combine 1 cup of the raisins, half of the onion, the couscous, salt, curry powder, and 1/2 tsp of the cinnamon. Pour 1/4 cup boiling water over mixture; cover. Let stand 2 minutes. Add turkey and egg; mix well. Pat mixture into a foil lined greased 8x8x2 inch baking pan. Bake in the top third of oven for about 20 minutes or until cooked through (165 F).

2. Meanwhile, for chutney, in saucepan combine the remaining 1/2 cup raisins, half of onion, remaining cinnamon, tomatoes, and 1/4 cup water. Cook covered over medium high until tomatoes pop. Lift meatloaf from pan with foil. Cut into slices and serve with tomato chutney.

Happy birthday Sheriff Randy Geries. He hits the BIG 5-0 next week. Thanks to everyone for reading the Star. We'll be back. Until then!



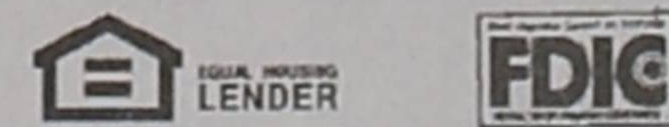

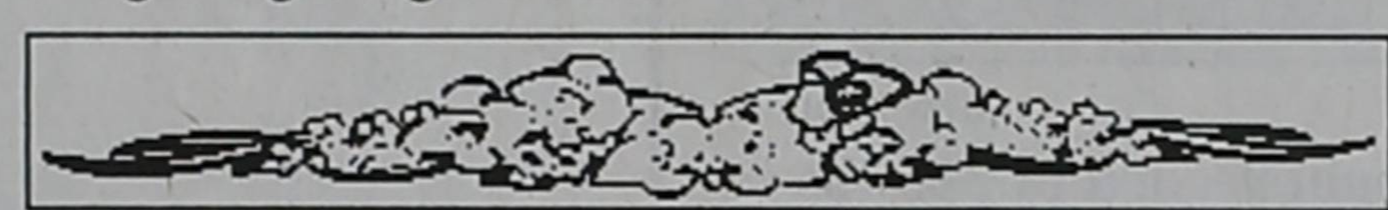
Antonio Reyes Ramirez

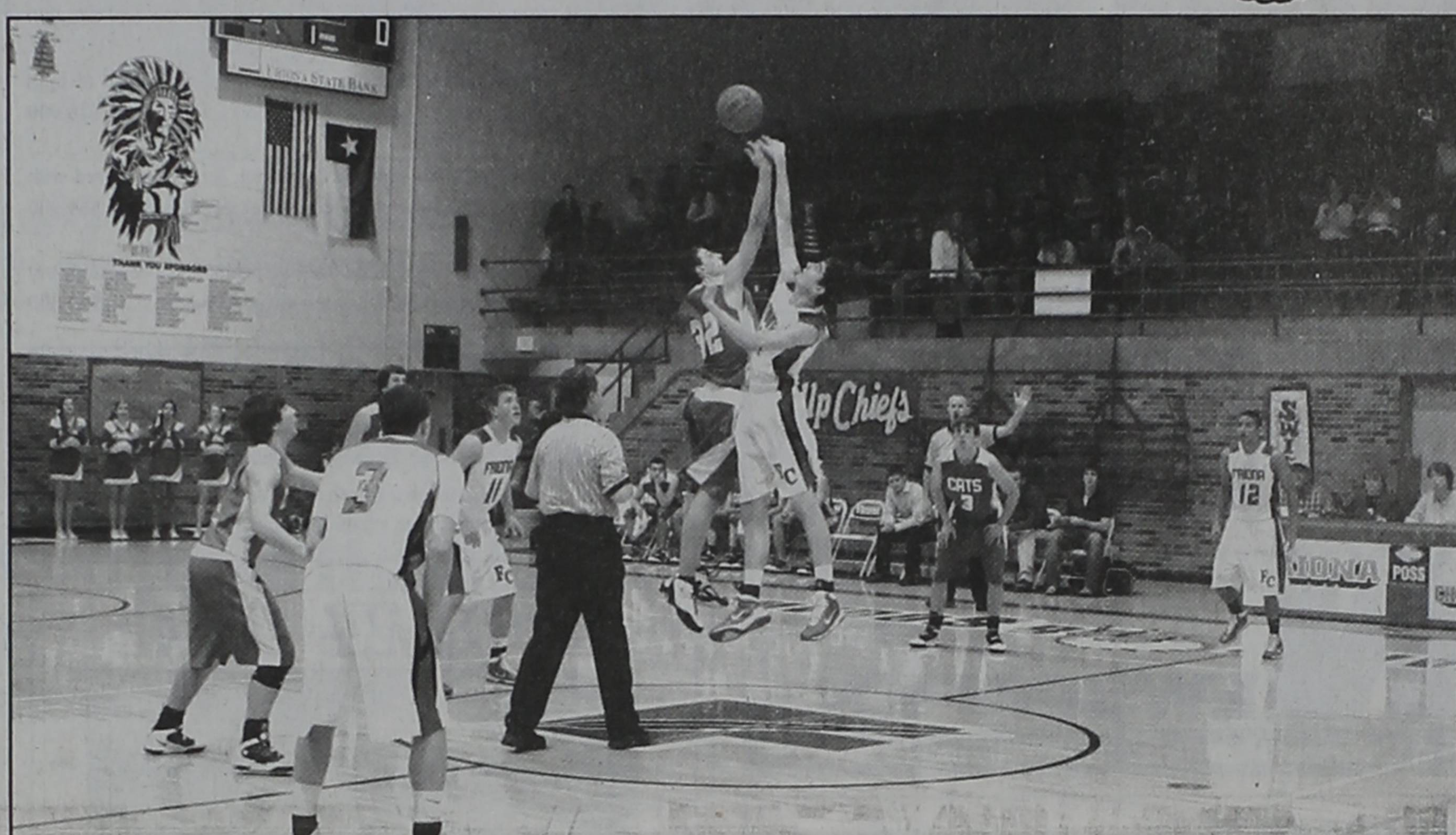

Next up is Tulia Friday night there and a return match with the Dimmitt Bobcats Tuesday February 1 at Friona gym.



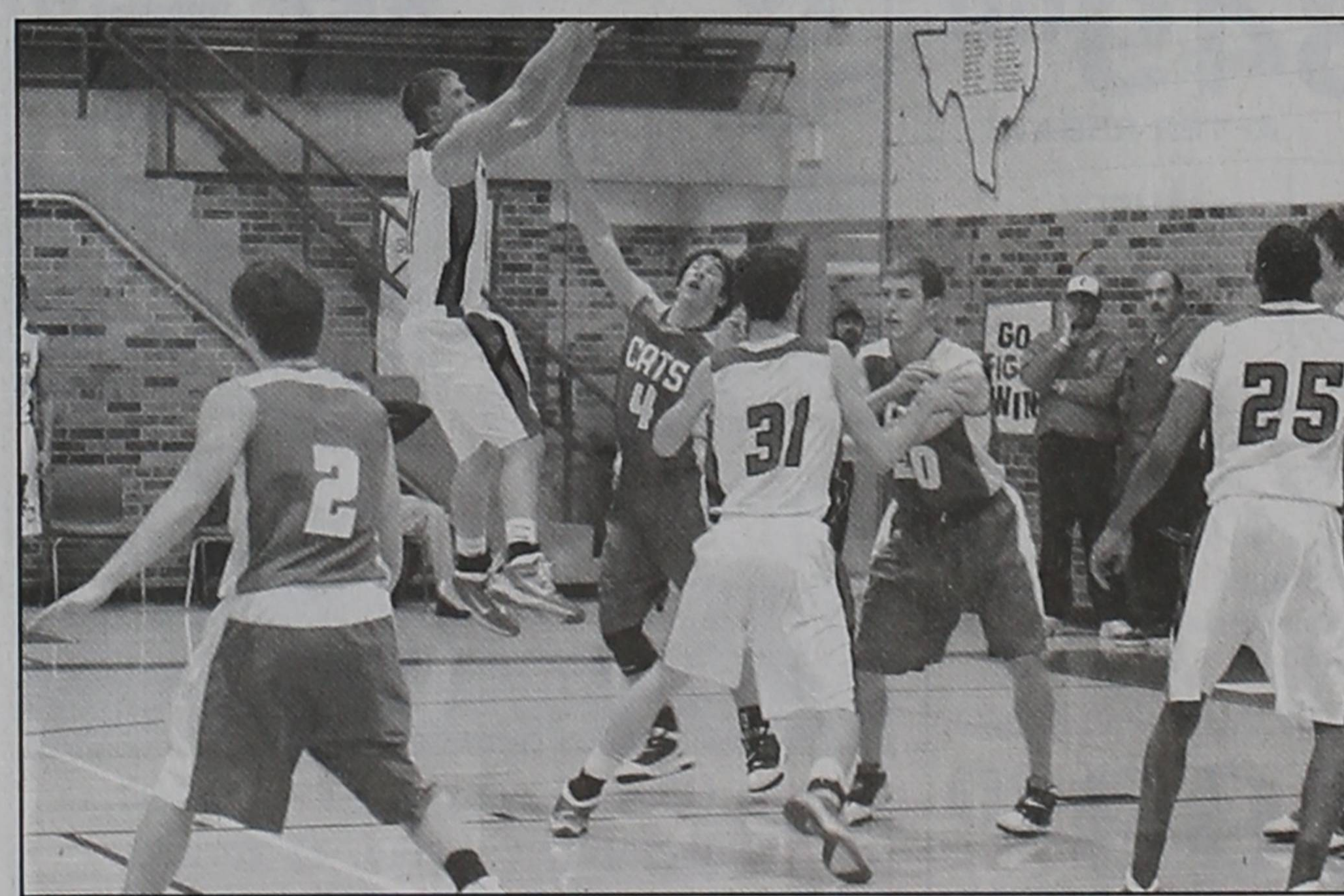
