

USDA low income home loan meeting in Friona

A meeting for eligible low and very low income individuals or families with acceptable credit will be held in Friona Saturday May 21 at 10 a.m. at the city council chambers, 619 Main St.

The loan program meeting is offered by the USDA Rural Development and sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce. Applicants may obtain 100% financing to purchase an existing dwelling, purchase a site and construct a dwelling, or purchase a newly constructed dwelling located in eligible rural areas. Mortgage payments are based on the household's adjusted income.

Persons attending the meeting should bring the following with them: a list of all debts, proof of employment, proof of home and mailing address, and a photo ID.

The loan limit for Parmer County is \$119,400. Income limits are set based on number of persons in the household. For more information visit the Income and Property Eligibility website at http://eligibility.sc.egov.usda.gov.

The USDA describes the low income loan program as the ultimate mortgage for eligible applicants to purchase a home in a rural area without a down payment.

Coins for the Cure collection kicks off at primary/elementary

Hey buddy, got any spare change? The Parmer County Cancer Coalition, an offshoot of the Relay for Life, will be starting a Coins for the Cure program at Friona elementary and primary schools.

Due to a shortage of active participants and a desire to keep cancer cure donations at a more local level, the Parmer County Relay for Life was changed to the Cancer Coalition. A percentage of donations are still sent to the American Cancer Society but most of the donations are used at the local level to sponsor grants that are given to county residents under a doctor's care for cancer treatment.

Each elementary and primary class will be challenged to collect coin donations. An ice cream party will be given for the class that raises the most money. Buckets will be placed in the hall by each grade for teachers to put their coins collected by their students. Checks made out to PCCC (Parmer County Cancer Coalition) will

also be accepted. The program is set to begin Wednesday May 11. The ice cream bars will be served to the winners on Tuesday, May 23. Parents, grandparents, and friends are urged to contribute coins to the students to take to school.

them to wear shoes.



If you know what that means then you too have Fellow potential.





DPS warns of door to door alarm sales

The Texas Department of Public Safety is urging Texas residents to make sure that any alarm salesperson, company of alarm installer that they hire is licensed by the DPS Regulatory Services Division.

Some alarm salespersons have aggressively marketed their services to residents in municipalities-primarily going door to door in neighborhoods. DPS is working with the alarm industry trade associations to provide information to citizens regarding licensed companies and individuals.


"If someone offering alarm-related services shows up at your door unsolicited, ask them for their DPS Private Security pocket card, which will also have their picture," said Assistant Director RenEarl Bowie of the DPS Regulatory Services Division. "Do not accept any other form of identification as proof you are dealing with a licensed salesperson or installer."

Alarm companies and installers must be licensed to operate legally in the state of Texas. The licensing process includes a criminal background check to help insure the safety of the public.

"Beware of aggressive tactics, or of someone trying to push you into making a decision immediately," said Bowie. "We S1 T3S R3E. have had numerous reports of substandard work and broken promises in these situations."




