Emergency farm loan applications accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, excessive heat, high winds and wildfires occurring January 1, 2011 and continuing are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Farwell.

Parmer County is one of 213 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses re-

sulting from the drought, excessive heat, high winds and wildfires.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 100% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agricultural business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suf-

fered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until February 24, 2012 but farmers should apply as soon as possible.

Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S.

citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations, or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding majority interest.

The FSA office in Farwell is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Additional information regarding disaster assistance programs may be found online at <http://disaster.fsa.usda.gov>.

For people with diabetes, maintaining healthy blood glucose levels is a matter of life and death. One way for people to better control their glucose levels is to eat healthful meals and snacks at regular times each day.

To help local residents learn how to plan and prepare meals that can be enjoyed by people with and without diabetes,

the Texas AgriLife Extension Service is planning a four-part series of cooking classes called Cooking Well with Diabetes.

Come join Shana Fleming for the classes that will be held at 6:30 p.m. November 1, 8, and 15 and a Reunion Meeting December 13, at the Bo-

vina EMS building. The total cost for all classes will be \$25.

The series will include cooking demonstrations as well as discussions of research findings on diabetes. For instance, recent research has shown that people with diabetes can enjoy a wide range of foods, including sugars, in moderation.

Years ago the term "sugar diabetes" was in common usage because it was thought that eating too much sugar caused diabetes. In those days people with diabetes were advised to avoid sugar all together.

Those days are gone. Research has shown that moderate consumption of sugars and fats can still be part of

a healthful diet for people with diabetes, as long as they keep their blood glucose at healthy levels.

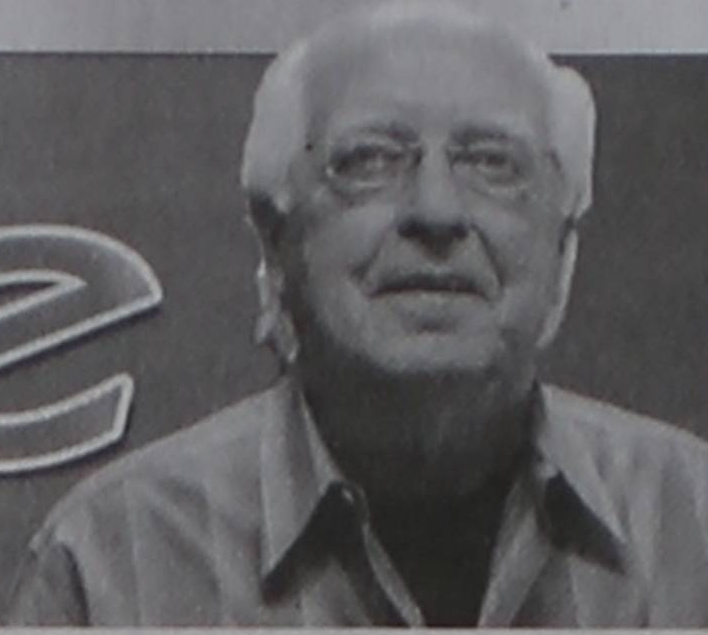

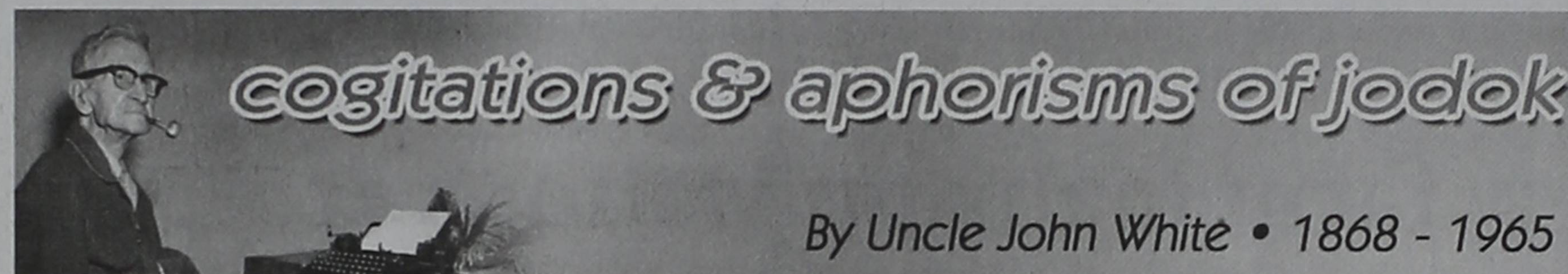

Printed from the April 19, 1935 Friona Star. After the dust storm we had Monday afternoon, we found this account from 1935 about what appears to have been another mighty big blast of dirt. Here is the account, as Uncle John saw it.

In regard to these dust storms, they are becoming entirely too persistent, too dense, and too frequent to be any longer the source of flippant jest or rude joke, and I have ceased to consider them in such alight, and neither do I hear any of my friends making them the butt of their jokes. Apparently, they are no longer a joking matter, but have become intensely serious.

In all my more than twenty years experience on the plains country I have never seen any such manifestations of intimacy between the air and the earth, as has been demonstrated during the past several weeks.

True, we have had many windy and dirty days almost every year, and the drier the season the more dirt bearing winds we have had, and on most of

these occasions it has appeared rather that the wind had a spite at the dirt and was seeking its vengeance by violently whipping it along and chasing it from place to place.

But in those ominous storms that we have been having this present season, it appears rather that the wind, as he goes rollicking along, just stoops down and gathers the dust up in his arms and goes diving aloft and onward for a great big romping frolic—a kind of excursion, so to speak—but woe unto those who have failed to get under cover before he arrives.

So completely did he annihilate visibility during his escapades here Sunday night that all car lights, street lights, and house lights were completely obscured and could not be seen for a distance of only a few feet.

Here is the way Uncle John described the dirt storm that hit town in 1935 in a front page news story.

The worst dirt storm that has ever visited this locality that there is any record of, struck Friona about 8:30 Sunday

evening and continued its intensity for a period of two hours or more. Only a few minutes elapsed between the time of its first appearance on the horizon until it had struck us in all its fury.

So dense was the cloud of fine dry dirt that visibility almost instantly became zero or lower and those who were unaware approach and were caught out in it found themselves in Etygian darkness so dense that the lights on their cars would not pierce it more than just a few feet, barely enough to discern the ditch at the side of the road or street.

The fine powdery dust forced its way into the most tightly closed room and within a remarkably short time everything therein was covered with a heavy layer of it and the floors were soon so deeply covered with it that no sound was heard as one walked across a room, and by the light of the morn was seen a heavy chocolate colored covering over everything.

Many have expressed the wish that since it had to come, it might have arrived in day time so that its grandure may have been seen more clearly.

I was a mere 7 years old when Elvis Presley died, so I can't say I was ever influenced much by the "Blue Suede Shoes". I was always curious, however, that it was important to note his departure from a building.

The truth is, Jesus has left the building, church building that is. You look throughout his ministry and you find he never was much on buildings. Yes, he taught in synagogues, visits to the temple, but he was less on building and more about people.

He walked with the lame and made them walk too! He gave sight to those who could not see and vision to those who could, and were willing to see. He taught the teachable, gave hope instead of despair and provided refuge for those needing a safe place to rest. Yet most of this was done on the hillsides and back alleys of the small towns dotting the landscape of the "Promised Land" of his heritage.

If we would watch where He went each week after services, we might be surprised to find him holding the hand of someone dying in hospice with no family, or sitting on the bathroom floor with a drunk hoping to give him something other than another bottle.

We might even find him down at the local jail whispering in the ear of someone just given a life sentence as that inmate opens the Word of God for the first time. Yes, Jesus has left the building. Where did he go? Where he has always intended to be, with those who need Him most.

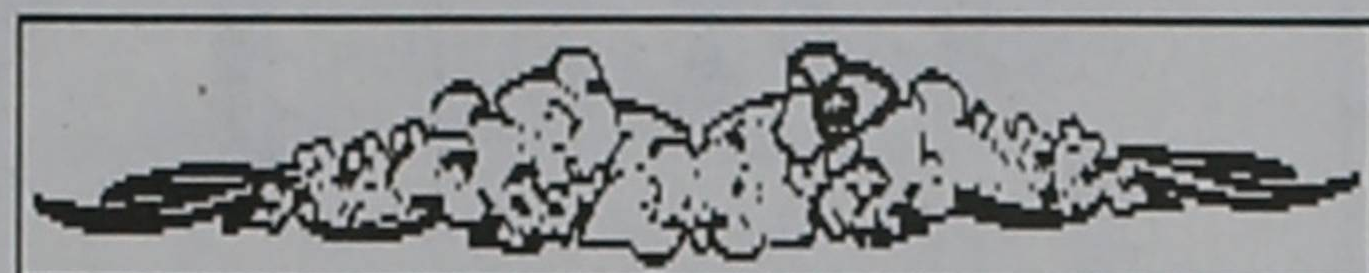

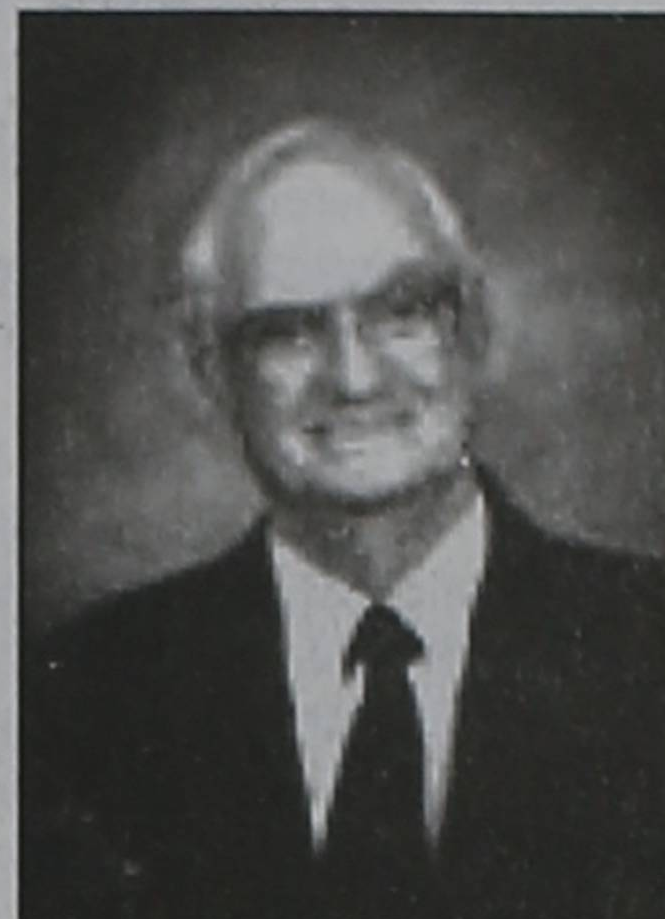


C. Nelson Coon

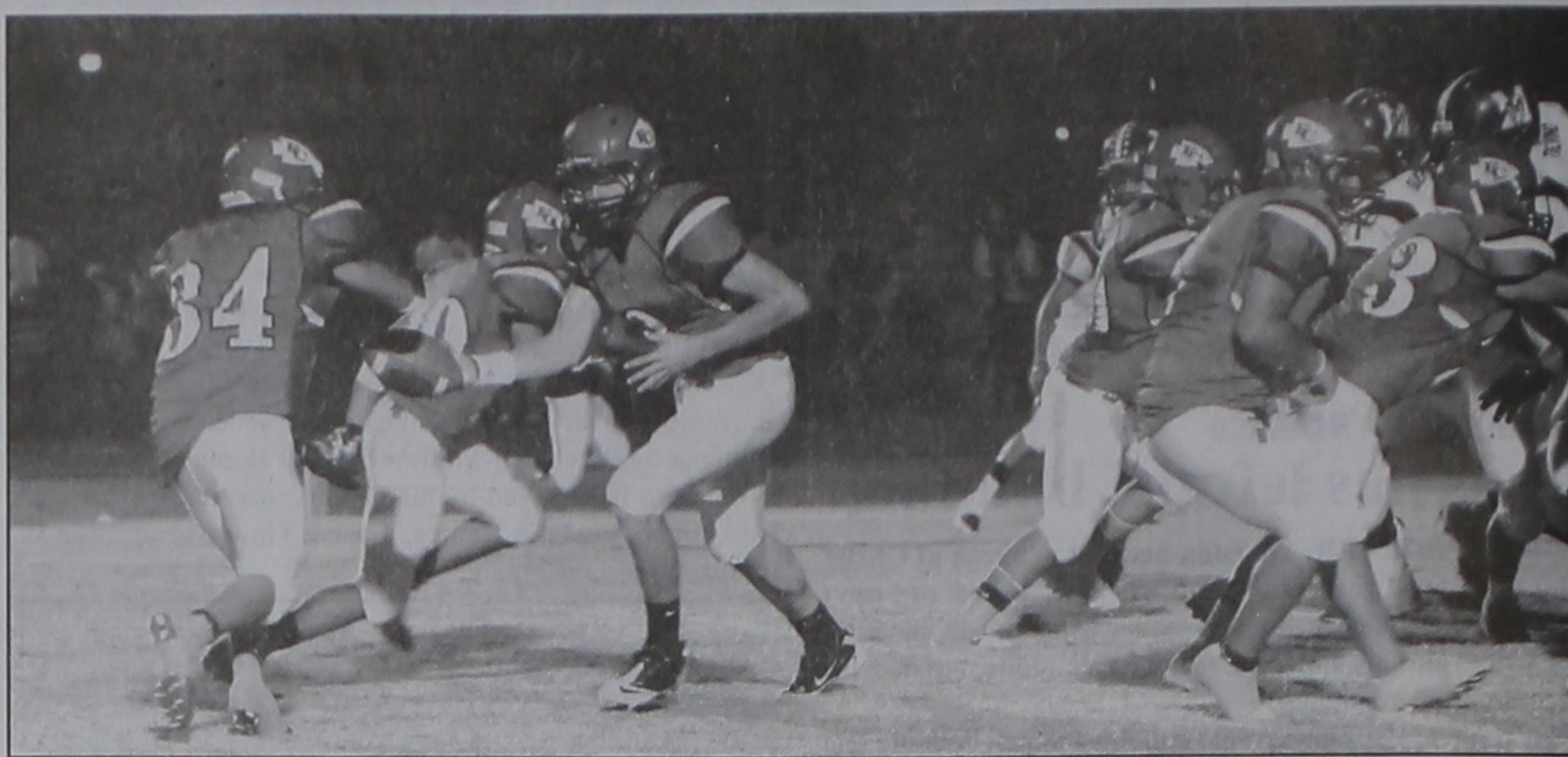

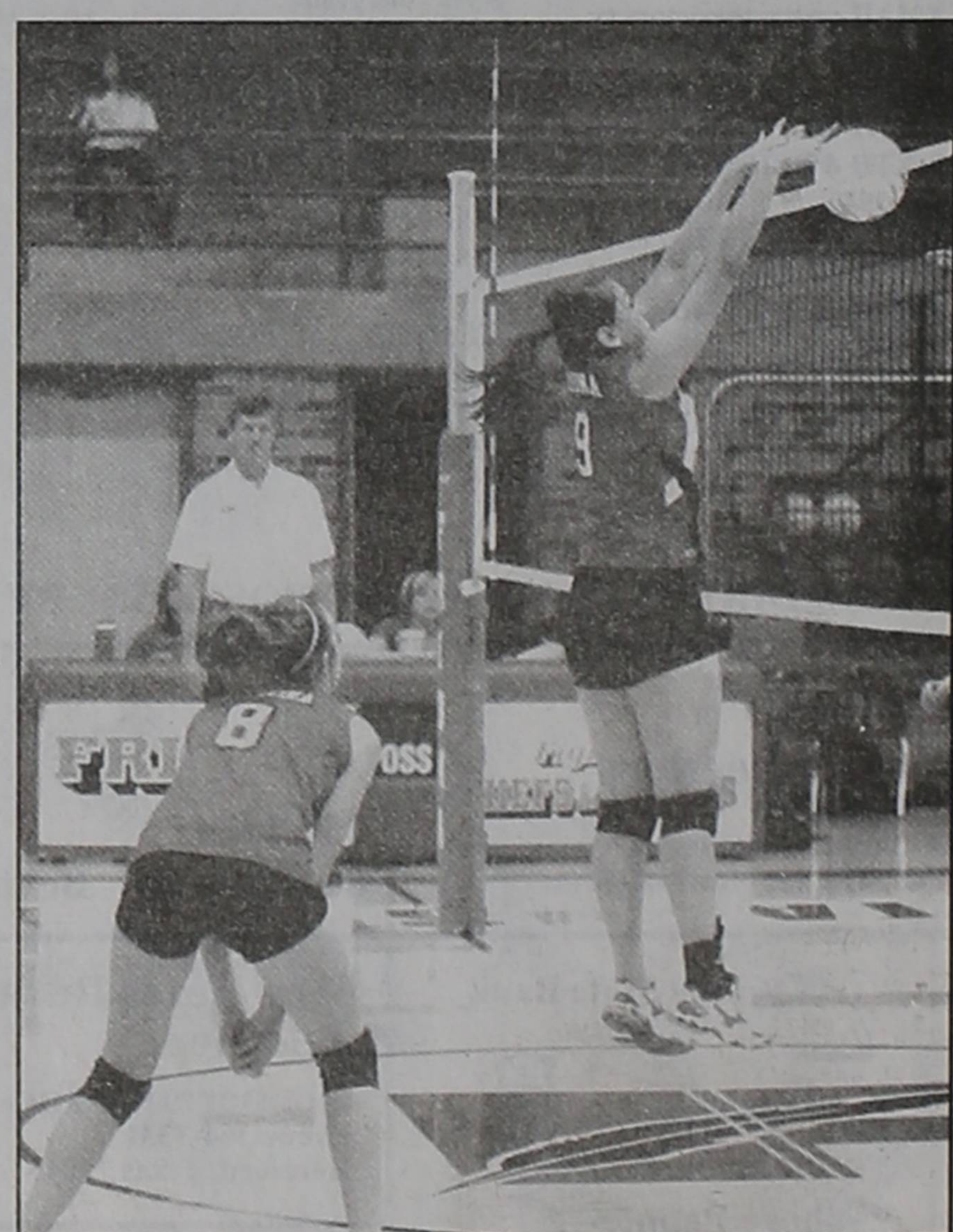

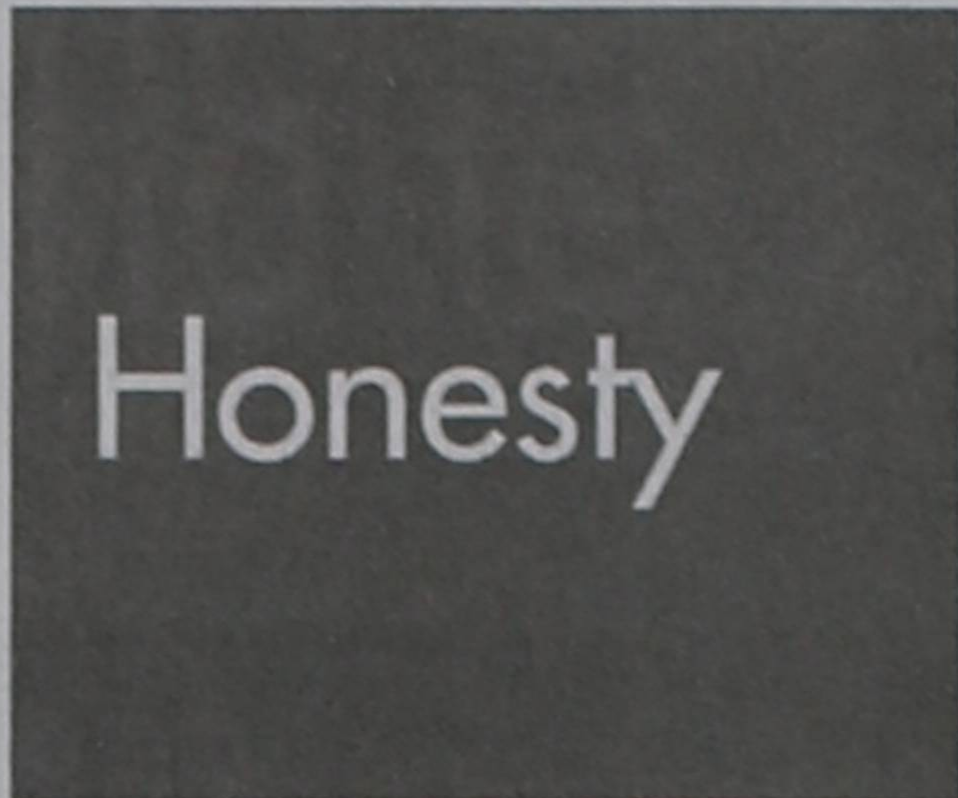
