Emergency CRP grazing

Parmer County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Curt Miller announced that in response to drought conditions the Texas FSA State Committee authorized emergency grazing use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres for 92 Texas counties effective November 1, 2011 for the fiscal year 2012 winter/spring period.

"The 2012 CRP emergency grazing period begins November 1, 2011 and ends January 29, 2012," Miller said. "CRP land previously hayed or grazed, either managed or emergency use, during the previous 12 months is excluded from the 2012 grazing authorization."

Parmer, Castro, Bailey, and Deaf Smith counties are among the counties qualifying for the emergency grazing. The FY 2012 CRP emergency grazing authorization permits grazing only, not haying. There will be a 25 percent CRP payment reduction on the 2012 annual payment for CRP acres used for grazing.

Producers can use the CRP acreage for their own livestock or grant another producer use of the acreage. Producers who wish to participate must first request approval. For information on emergency grazing of CRP acres contact the Parmer County FSA office at 806-481-3311.

Advisor/teacher Gayle Murdock said, "The class would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who purchased tickets from them. They would also like to thank the fire department for all they do for our community."

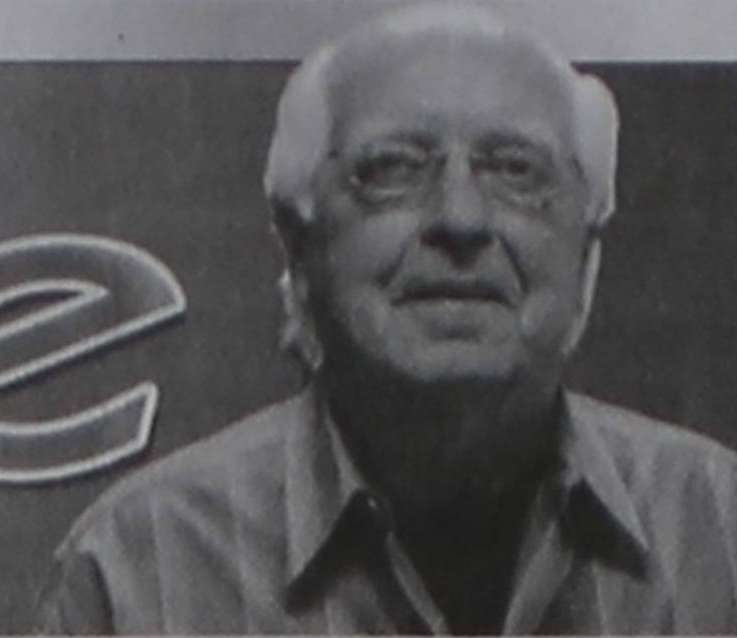
After being slowed down by several traffic jams across Oklahoma, tired but happy travelers arrived back in Friona at eleven o'clock on Saturday night, Oct. 15.

Hold-up men take \$964 at Friona Bank

So said the front page headline from the Friday, July 3, 1936 Friona Star. Many old-timers around here may have heard the story of the bank robbery that happened in Friona on June 29, 1936. Here is Uncle John's account of the robbery as reported in the Star. Remember he typed this story on a manual typewriter. The bandits were captured the next week in Ft. Worth. Orma White (Flipping) was a bank employee too. It all happened at what is today 5th and Main St. The Maurer building and house are still there.

On Monday afternoon about 3:30 o'clock, while the officers and employees of the Friona State Bank were about their usual business of getting ready to close business of the day, they received a visit from two unknown armed men who robbed the bank of \$964.

Charlie McLean, cashier and Mrs. McLean, who is assistant, were at the teller windows busily engaged with their respective parts of the work, when one of the men stepped within the inclosure and pointed a gun at them, bade them lie down, which command they obeyed.

Hugh Lee, a customer, who was at the small table in the front part of the lobby, was accosted by the other stranger and quite rudely ordered to move to the back. Mr. Lee was reading a deed at the time and thinking it was some of his friends who has thus jokingly accosted him, at first paid no attention to the fellow's demands, but when another large automatic pistol was pushed in front of his face and jabbed against his ribs, he concluded it was no joking matter and proceeded to obey instructions, being rudely kicked by the man with the gun as he moved along. Mr. Lee said, "He kicked me like a dog."

On reaching the rear-end of the inclosure he was

bade to enter and lie down with Mr. and Mrs. McLean.

Miss Orma White, another assistant in the bank, was in the bookkeeping department of the room doing some posting, and as the man and Mr. Lee passed her, the man with the gun said "And you too young lady." Whereupon she slid from the stool she was occupying and passed into the inclosure with the others of her companions. She was also ordered to lie down but declined to do so, but did eventually sit down where the others were lying.

Having thus corralled all in the bank, the men told them, "they would not harm them in any way if they remained quiet. They then proceeded to rifle the cash drawer of its contents, then bade Mr. McLean to go into the vault and get all the money it contained.

This he did but the money had been placed there in the morning by Miss White, who had distributed it to various places within the vault and Mr. McLean was unable to find all of it, and after getting all he could see he told the bandit it was all he could find. There was in the vault what the people of the bank called their "dummy" bag, which was a bag in which money is shipped, and was filled with packages of worthless papers which from the outside conveyed the impression it was filled with packages of greenbacks.

This bag was handed to the robber by Mr. McLean and was carried away by the two men. Having gotten all they could see they ordered all the bank force and Mr. Lee into vault and attempted to close the door, but the bolts of the door were already thrust out so that the door would not latch, and after slamming it three times the men told the inmates of the vault to remain there until they had time to get away from the building and with their loot they hurriedly left the building by a rear side door.

When those who were in the vault heard the door of

the room slam they puched the vault door open and rushed out in an effort to get a glimpse of the robbers and if possible learn which direction they took when departing. Mr. McLean told Miss White to get her keys and they got into her car, and supposing that the robbers had gone westward they drove hurriedly toward Farwell for a few miles but seeing no sign of their assailants, they turned back to town.

Within a very few minutes the sheriffs of the adjoining counties were notified of the robbery as well as police departments in Amarillo, Clovis, Plainview, and Lubbock who immediately covered all roads of approach to the various towns but no trace was found of the robbers.

Just before the robbery occurred a new V-8 Ford car was seen parked on the opposite side of the street from the bank in front of R.H. Kinsley building and Mrs. Carl C. Maurer, whose home is directly opposite the Kinsley building saw two men get out of the car, leaving another man in it. These two men came across the street and onto the sidewalk in front of the Maurer building, which is immediately south of the bank building. They stopped and talked to her little son who was playing there on his tricycle, and being asked if they wished to see her husband they replied in the negative with some casual remark, and in a few minutes passed on up the street and entered the bank. This seems to have been the last seen of the men or the car by Mrs. Maurer or any other person in town, and in just a few minutes it was learned that the bank had been robbed.

Parties at Black, seven miles east of Friona had seen what was supposed to be the same car that was parked across the street from the Maurer building which came on west toward Friona after having received a supply of gas and oil at the Black fill-

ing station, and in a short while the same car passed Black again, this time going eastward at a high rate of speed, and this is supposed to be the car that carried the robbers.

After Mr. McLean and Miss White returned to the bank they began making a check of the funds in the bank in order to ascertain how much had been taken by the robbers and it was found that \$964 had been taken. An amount of over \$5,000 in bills had been overlooked by the robbers, there had also been a group of travelers checks taken.

No one was hurt and within a remarkable short time reporters from newspapers of neighboring cities were here getting the details of the robbery, and finger-print men from the J. Edgar Hoover force were here before the bank closed, which was about eleven o'clock.

The local agent who placed the bond, wired the state agency Monday evening of the robbery and estimated loss, and adjuster for the company arrived here shortly after noon Tuesday to make the adjustment of the loss.

This is the third time within the past ten years this bank has been robbed. The first time the robbers got very little for their trouble, but were never caught. The second time a larger haul was made but both men were eventually caught and sent to prison. At this writing there has been absolutely no trace found of those who robbed the bank yesterday.

The two men who did the work were neatly and cleanly dressed in khaki work clothes and were without coats. They were described as being rather good looking men of medium size and apparently about 30-years of age. One was light of complexion and light hair and blue eyes while the other was rather dark and somewhat heavier.

Next week: The bandits are captured.

Fall lawn care tips

As we are getting deep into fall across Parmer County many homeowners want to put their yards to bed for the winter. Care of your lawn in the fall is as important as in spring and summer.

Regular care is the key to an attractive and healthy lawn through the fall and winter months. Here are a few things you can do to help your lawn survive the winter and recover vigorously in the spring.

Fall fertilization is the key to prolonging fall color and promoting early spring recovery of the lawn. It helps produce a dense turf that resists winter weeds. Fertilizer used in the fall should be higher in nitrogen and potassium and lower in phosphorus. Grasses fertilized this way have shown greater survival during winter months than those fertilized with high phosphorus.

When your lawn goes dormant during winter months it is important to remember the grass is living and needs moisture for survival. During the winter, if it doesn't rain for several weeks, the lawn should be irrigated. Irrigation before a hard freeze is helpful in reducing freeze injury to the grass. It takes much colder air temperatures to lower the temperatures of a moist soil than that of a dry soil.

The application will be available for viewing and copying at the TCEQ central office, the TCEQ Amarillo regional office, and the Friona Public Library, 109 West 7th Street, Friona, Parmer County, Texas, beginning the first day of publication of this notice. The facility's compliance file, if any exists, is available for public review in the Amarillo regional office of the TCEQ.

The executive director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING You may submit public comments, a request for a public meeting, or request a contested case hearing to the Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below. The TCEQ will consider all public comments in developing a final decision on the application. **The deadline to submit public comments is 30 days after newspaper notice is published.**

The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or ask questions about the application. A public meeting about the application will be held if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

If only comments are received on the application, the response to comments, along with notice of the executive director's action on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application.

The executive director will complete the technical review, issue a preliminary decision on the application, and a Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments. If a hearing request is timely filed in Response to this Notice of Application and Intent to Obtain Air Permit, the time period for requesting a contested case hearing will be extended to thirty days after the mailing of the executive director's response to comments.

After the final deadline for public comments following the Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or is on a mailing list for this application.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. **Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application.** A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decisions on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues raised by you or others during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing"; (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. **If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period.** Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.

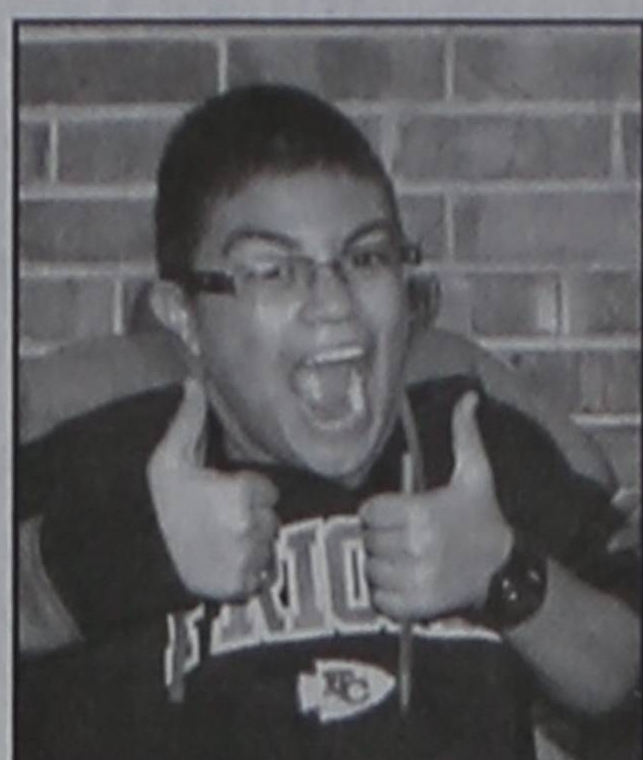

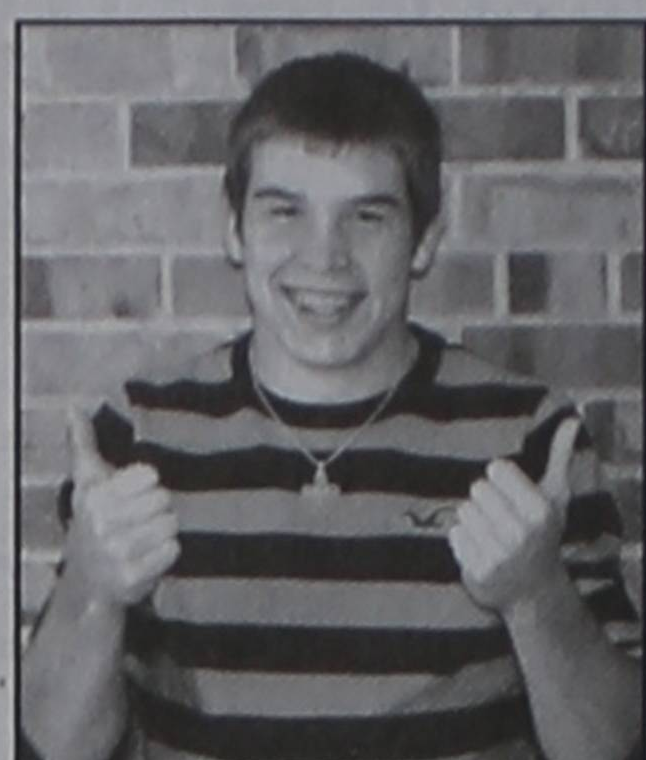

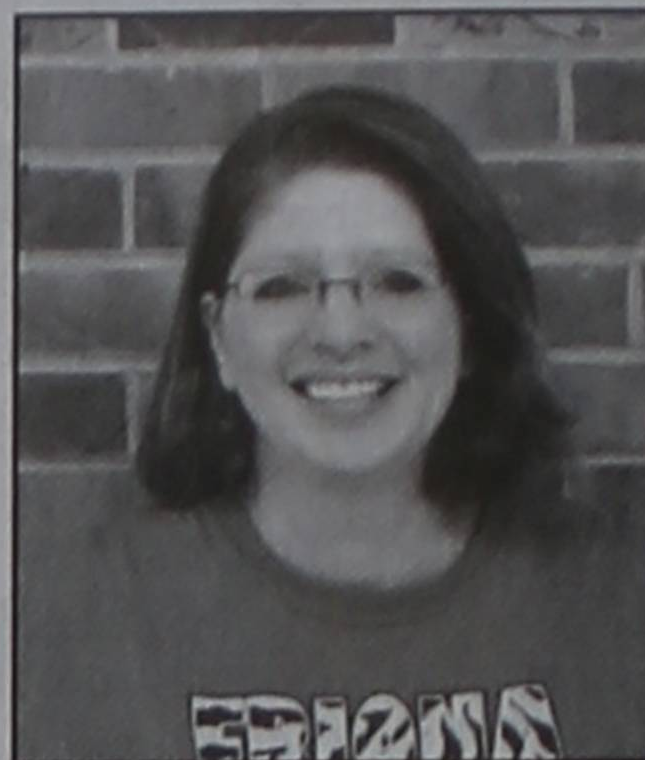

Chiefs lose at Slaton 28-27

In an evenly matched football game at Slaton last Friday, and with a potential playoff spot on the line, the Friona Chieftains lost a heartbreaker to the Tigers 28-27.

The teams matched touchdowns, with Friona leading at the half 14-13 on a missed Tiger extra point. The Tigers scored in the 3rd quarter and converted for two points to make the score 21-14. The Chiefs also had a 3rd quarter score to tie 21-21 entering the 4th quarter.

Slaton scored in the 4th and made the extra point for a 28-21 lead. Late in the quarter the Chiefs drove the field and scored on a 4th and goal with a TD pass from Caleb Monroe to Serafin Vazquez. The extra point attempt by Diego Licerio was wide right. The Tigers proceeded to run out the clock for the 28-27 win.

Monroe was 5 of 9 passing for 41 yards and three

touchdown tosses to Serafin Vazquez, Gabriel Avalos, and Valentin Rocha. Diego Licerio scored and a goal line plunge.

In rushing stats, Monroe led with 141 yards on 17 carries. Licerio was 6 for 44, Eduardo Rojas 6 for 33, and Stephen Dominguez rushed 9 times for 27 yards.

The Chiefs put up 293 yards rushing to 113 for Slaton but the Tigers garnered 145 passing yards. Friona's total yardage was 334 compared to Slaton's 258 total.

The loss gives the Chiefs a 2-3 district record with Slaton and Childress tied for 3rd in the district with 3-2 records. Remaining games for the Chiefs are at Littlefield and at home vs. River Road to close out the regular season. The November 4 River Road game will be senior parents night with introductions starting at 7 p.m. prior to the 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

JV Chiefs 30 Slaton JV 6

The Friona junior varsity Chiefs improved their district record to 3-2 with a nice 30-6 win over Slaton last Thursday.

The balanced JV attack put together 191 rushing yards and 181 passing for a 372 yard performance. Slaton had 273 rushing yards but only 37 passing.

Eddy Garcia had 110 yards rushing on 7 carries and two touchdowns to lead the Chiefs. Esdras Rodriguez was 4 carries for 42 yards. Jose Rocha and Mason Loflin were both 3 for 13 yards.

Loflin completed 7 passes in 11 attempts for 181 yards and two touchdowns, both to Kaydn Hicks who had 139 yards on three receptions. Lito Cigarroa caught three passes for 41 yards.

Jose Rocha was top defender with 7 solo tackles and 10 assists. Hicks and Garcia were also in on ten tackles each.

Comments from Coach David Towner: "This week we played much better than last week. We started out a little sluggish but were able to wake up as the game went on. Slaton was able to move the ball but our defense made stops when they had to. The defense held Slaton to one score and held them on downs four times.

Jose Rocha forced a fumble recovered by Esdras Rodriguez. Offensively we had a few guys step up and make plays. Kaydn Hicks had two TD receptions, each over 40 yards. Eddy Garcia also had two TD runs, each also over 40 yards. Scoring two-point conversions were Lito Cigarroa, Mason Loflin, and Jose Rocha."

The JV Chiefs play their final home game Thursday October 27 against Littlefield at 5 p.m.

LIBRARY CORNER

And he was there...remembering our Dr. Paul

Dr. Paul L. Spring, he was the standard by whom we measured all other physicians in our lives because he was a good doctor and he made us feel better; he was friendly and always kind. Quintessentially, that is what we expect our physicians to do...make us feel better while they go about the process of trying to heal us and make us whole again. Just the sight of him could be so comforting and reassuring in our many moments of fear and joy faced together during his lifetime as our community physician, health officer, neighbor and friend. You know what they say, "pick a young doctor and grow old with them."

As the doctor during my father's young manhood when he was treating everything from an emergency appendectomy combined with an allergy to penicillin to a spider bite with blood poisoning or removing a piece of steel from the eye or and later arthritis—he was there, always kind, always caring. And as the doctor during my mother's pregnancies and births—mine and my younger brother's, and then through our childhoods with everything from organizing the first community wide oral polio vaccine doses to a house call during our illness when we both had the measles and the chicken pox at the same time—he was there, always kind, always caring.

And later when my own children came along—he was there—during a long labor with my son and four years later having to run down the hall when my daughter made a much quicker appearance. As my children grew and after we moved to Dr. Paul's neighborhood, he 'hired' them to pick up apples from under his trees before the mowers came. We grew used to seeing him, not in his familiar white coat and stethoscope, but in his coveralls and garden hat tending to his garden and compost heap. (Wherever my Julie has lived, once people know that she is from Friona, they always asked her if she knew Dr. Paul—'he was the doctor who delivered me!' 'Me, too!' has always been her reply.)

He was there to administer morphine shots when Rex's grandfather was at home dying of cancer. He was there years later when Rex's father died and he came to their home to care for Rex's mother and to help us through the details of a death at home. When Rex was a boy with a broken funny bone, he sent Rex on to a specialist in Amarillo because he wanted to make sure the arm would not be stiff. Later after we were married, he allowed Rex to be at home during a very scary bout with a virus only because he knew we lived as close to the hospital as he did. We expected (and received) so much from our doctors

back then.

He could not be there when my father breathed his last or when Rex's mother passed away or when my grandchildren were born. Times are different now and Dr. Paul was ill himself. From his parents, Frank and Ocie, and their family who came to Parmer County in 1905 establishing their local grocery business to his siblings; another fine doctor, Dr. Lee, a banker, Frank L. and, even a librarian, we know that he came from a long line of public servants. During his lifelong commitment to the community of his youth and his service in hospitals from an army barracks to a community built hospital until the groundbreaking for the new hospital completed in the 21st century in the last years of his life, he was there and we will all miss him very much.

We have been fortunate in our small community to have had some excellent medical personnel through the years and also to have given 'birth' to several excellent physicians and other medical personnel, as well as many other successful natives from amongst our ranks in other chosen fields, and that is a good thing, a very good thing. Many of them have served not only this community but other locations as well. Not a bad legacy for a small town.

P.S. I can barely remember being in the Spring's grocery store, but I do remember his mother and her wonderful orchard at the family home on Cleveland when our Girl Scout troop visited her on a hunt for different kinds of leaves...
