Accident kills Muleshoe woman

Texas DPS reports that October 30, 2011 at about 6:30 a.m. Ernestina Ann Bara, 29, of Muleshoe, was driving a 1999 Ford SUV northbound on FM 1731 approximately 9 miles south of Bovina.

The vehicle veered to the right onto the shoulder of the roadway, then overcorrected back to the left causing it to cross both north and southbound lanes. The vehicle then rolled 1 1/2 times coming to rest on its top. Bara was partially ejected and was pronounced dead at the scene. According to the report she was not wearing her safety belt.

Bond sale important to the community

Tuesday, November 8, 2011, is an election day. In Texas voters will cast yes Friona, voters will vote yes or no to approve a \$4 million school bond sale.

Typically, in an off-year election where only amendments are voted on, the turnout is usually very low. If you vote, and we hope you will, vote no on amendment 6 and yes on all the rest. On the school bond issue, we encourage you to vote yes. In either case, exercise your right to vote.

The Friona Independent School District has 234 employees and a monthly payroll of almost \$800,000. It is the second largest employer

in the county. Cargill is the largest.

budgets. Here in Friona, teachers/employees resigned or retired at the end of last year and were not replaced. So far FISD seems to be in good shape under the current budget restraints.

The Board of Trustees has identified improvement projects with an estimated cost of \$5,574,000. To pay for them they propose using \$1,400,000 from the Parmer County permanent school fund, \$250,000 from a local maintenance investment fund, a \$9,000 donation, and the \$4,000,000 bond sale.

\$4,000,000 depending on the final number and cost of proposed projects. It is estimated that the bond sale would increase property tax from 0.07 to 0.12 cents per \$100 in valuation. Trustees estimate a ten-year payoff on the bond issue.



Friona Bank Robbery Suspects Captured

From the July 10, 1936 Friona Star. Last week's report of a bank robbery at the Friona State Bank was followed the next week with Uncle John White's detail of the bank robbers being captured in Ft. Worth. One of the men was previously charged with murder. The Sheriff of Parmer County was Earl Booth. Was there a third robber? Some said so. Imagine Friona in 1936.

Word was received here Monday from the sheriff's office at Farwell to the effect that the men, believed to have robbed Friona State Bank of \$964 had been taken into custody by the police at Ft. Worth.

It appears that Sheriff Earl Booth had been busy all last week running down clues and inspecting the "rogues galleries" of nearby cities, and comparing pictures of men therein with the descriptions of the men who robbed the bank, with the result that he felt assured that two men who had escaped from the state prison at Huntsville, were the guilty parties and had sent instructions to all police departments of the state to be on the lookout for them and if discovered, to arrest and hold them for possible identification. The prison authorities were also on the lookout for them, all of which resulted in their arrest when

From all reports obtained it appears that the Fort Worth police were in hot pursuit of the men, when the bandits' car ran off an embankment and turned over, seriously wounding one of the men and detaining them until the officers were upon them.

The men proved to be escaped convicts, who had been at large since June 14 and were Herbert Stanley and T.C. Britton. Britton's chest was severely crushed and he had received a lascerated ear and internal injuries. He was taken to a hospital and held under guard, while Stanley was placed in the city jail, and the Sheriff's office at Farwell was notified of the capture.

Sheriff Booth had just started for Friona a short while before the word was received and head deputy J.C. Wilkison hurried to Friona to intercept him and deliver the message to him, arriving here a short time ahead of the sheriff, who had come by another route.

As soon as Sheriff Booth received the word he got in telephone connection with the Fort Worth police department, and it was learned that the men, when captured, between them something over \$600 in cash and practically all the travelers checks that were taken from the Friona bank, the numbers on the checks corresponding exactly with the stolen checks.

Both men have criminal and prison records, showing that they have been connected with various crimes. Stanley was serving a 99-year sentence for his participation in what is known as the "bathtub" or "torch" murder in Ft. Worth in 1930. His wife is said to live in Amarillo.

Britton is alleged to have cursed and kicked Mr. Lee while he was herding him in behind the inclosure at the bank on the day of the robbery.

It is reported that there is little hope of Britton's recovery from the injuries received in the car crash, and that Stanley refuses to talk. Sheriff Booth and C.E. McLain, cashier of the Friona bank, departed Tuesday morning for Fort Worth to make a personal identification of the two men, and probably to make arrangements for bringing them to Farwell for trial in the Parmer County District Court, which convenes there next week.

It was commonly believed that there were three men connected with the robbery here, but if that was the case no word has been received concerning the third man thus far. People at Black identified the car that stopped there for a supply of oil and gas on the day of the robbery as the same car that passed there a short time afterward going toward Hereford, but say there were three men in it as it went west and only two in it as it passed back east at a rate of possibly 70 miles an hour.

On the afternoon of the robbery and shortly after the time it occurred, B.C. Day, a farmer living southeast of town was hoeing weeds out of his crop in a field south of the railroad, when he saw a black car driving southward along a by-road at a furious rate of speed, with one man in it. He was dressed in kahki and bare headed. It is thought by some that the robbers had two cars and that they separated after getting out of town, one going south and the other two continuing east.



She was the calf (seriously). Mom did not approve of roping her head, so I had to rope her feet. There were times that my "A" game showed up at the whole roping thing. I could catch her feet pretty quick. This was when it no longer was a game, now if my sister got hurt, then it was another story, I would stick around to convince the calf (my sister) not to tell mom. We didn't heed the warnings. We act surprised that sin has a consequence and the "fun" is over. God takes sin very seriously, giving the life of His only Son. Vessels God Uses

Jonah is often used as a biblical punching bag, regarding what not to do, and we often forget that God used Jonah as His vessel to bring about the greatest mass repentance in all the Bible. Obviously, chapter four of Jonah, highlights major biases and racism in his life, but Jonah 2:10-3:10 gives principles regarding vessels God uses. First, God uses those who are surrendered to His will. Jonah fought, ran, disobeyed and finally gave up his vain attempts to go against God's word. Sinful living will make you weary, worried and wasted, but surrendering to God breathes life into weary souls and purpose into wasted lives. For example, Jonah is living proof that God can even use fish vomit to do great things, when that fish vomit is surrendered to God's will.

Second, a vessel God uses is commissioned. Jonah 3:1-2 is God's second commission to Jonah to preach to Nineveh. God has purpose for His vessels, revealed in scripture and through the Holy Spirit, and His vessels press in, and pour out their lives for God's glorious purposes. Thirdly, a vessel God uses is obedient. Jonah surprisingly obeys God and goes to Nineveh. It is impossible to be used of God if you are not obeying His word and direction for your life. Being obedient to the Lord is not accidental, but is intentional. Even when the task is difficult, you can obey God because obedience is about faith in Him to do hard things.

Finally, a vessel God uses is an exhibit of God's power and grace. Obviously, Jonah doesn't exhibit this very well, but Paul in the New Testament does, and wrote "But we have this treasure in jars of clay, to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us," (2 Cor 4:7). May you be a surrendered, commissioned, obedient vessel for the Lord today!


The local lodge granted a scholarship each year at the FHS awards assembly. With the consolidation, the existing members de-
