County burn ban reinstated

Parmer County Commissioners met Monday January 23 in Farwell. Commissioners voted to reinstate the burn ban in Parmer County effective February 1 for a period of 90 days.

Transfer of the 911 dispatch center from Friona to the Sheriff's office in Farwell was also approved. The move will begin in February. County Judge Trey Ellis said approval was given by officials in Lazbuddie, Friona, Bovina, and Farwell to make the move. The transfer will be under the supervision of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

A bid to provide medical services for Parmer County jail inmates was awarded to Lacy Meeks of Farwell. She works out of the Farwell Clinic under the supervision of Dr. Sheets of Muleshoe.

In a significant action, the commissioners approved refinancing of a \$2,080,000 bond balance on the bond issued for the construction of the new jail in Farwell. The refinancing of the bond will save the county \$243,000 in interest over the remaining 10-year bond period. Judge Ellis said the papers were signed Monday. Also, he said, Parmer County has received an A+ rating from Standard & Poor's.

Annual pre-plant soil moisture survey underway

Personnel are now in the field gathering data for the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's annual pre-plant soil moisture survey. Data collection began January 16 and should be concluded in three to four weeks, weather permitting.

"Knowing the amount of soil moisture in the five-foot root zone soil profile has always been important to producersbut it is even more important this year as they look at how water used for preplant irrigation affects their Allowable (groundwater) Production Rate (APR) per contiguous acre," said Manager Jim Conkwright.

Meters are used to gather soil moisture data at about 100 permanently-installed monitoring sites within the district's

16-county service area. Readings are taken at six-inch inter-

vals throughout the five-foot root zone soil profile by lowering a probe into an aluminum access tube at the site. These data are later processed to calculate the amount of moisture in the soil (available moisture) and the amount of moisture the soil can still hold for plant use (deficit moisture).

Maps are constructed showing the location of soil moisture monitoring sites within the district and the crop type, irrigation application method, and amount of soil moisture in the upper three feet and upper five feet of the soil at each site.


"This information gives producers an idea of soil moisture trends in their area and they can then make pre-plant irrigation decisions based upon this information as well as their own on-farm soil moisture tests," said Field Data Coordinator Gerald Crenwelge.

The High Plains Water District provides soil moisture information to assist producers with management decisions for the upcoming growing season. Results of the 2012 pre-plant soil moisture survey will be provided to news media and published in The Cross Section.






Grand Champion Goat - Ashton Mason



Statement from Senator Kel Seliger:

"During this time of economic uncertainty, the Keystone XL Project would have provided a significant opportunity for additional stability and security with our nation's energy supply. This decision will not only result in a loss of thousands of much-needed jobs for American workers, but will also send billions of dollars in potential tax revenue out of the United States. This decision is yet another example of the federal government's detest and calculated denigration of the oil and gas industry, and its unwillingness to achieve real energy independence."

Congressman Randy Neugebauer (R-TX) issued the following statement regarding President Obama's decision to block construction of the Keystone XL Pipeline;

"Today, President Obama blocked the construction of the Keystone XL pipeline, determining that the crucial job-creating project does 'not serve the national interest'. This makes no sense. Yet again, the President is proving he does not understand that allowing private industry to work is what our economy needs to get back on track.

The Keystone XL Pipeline would have stretched from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, and would have imported 830,000 barrels of oil per day from our Canadian neighbors to Texas refineries. The project would have been privately funded and approving the permit would have created 20,000 jobs (many of those in Texas), generated millions of dollars in economic activity, and enhanced our energy security. At a time when Americans are suffering from high unemployment and high energy prices, this decision is yet another critical mistake by an out-of-touch Administration."

Ron,

I just completed my seventh session with the Texas Agriculture Lifetime Leadership (TALL) program. This session was concentrated in East Texas around Tyler and Nacogdoches.

It was interesting to learn that although Tyler is the "Rose Capital of Texas" there are very few roses still grown commercially in the area. Instead most commercial roses are grown in Arizona and shipped to Tyler for processing and distribution.

This East Texas area is also known for its wholesale nursery industry. I toured a large nursery wholesaler that had over 75 individual green houses on site with the largest encompassing over 3 acres and having a removable roof. I also saw a hail cannon that was used to break large hail stones into smaller stones as they came through the atmosphere.

The hail cannon was advertised as being efficient over a 6 mile wide area and had an operating cost of \$1,000 every ten seconds. It sounds expensive until you consider the 75 greenhouses containing over 2,800 different plant varieties.

I was allowed to step into a commercial chicken house that contained over 20,000 live chickens and then I toured a Pilgrim's Pride chicken processing plant which processed 3,000 chickens per hour. I was very impressed with the speed, efficiency, and food safety precautions at the plant. It's no wonder that the U.S. has the safest food supply in the world.

The timber industry is also a major employer in East Texas. I visited a logging site where they were harvesting trees, and then toured the Temple-Inland Sawmill at Pineland, Texas. There is a massive amount of technology used in a modern sawmill and there is almost zero waste when sawing logs into lumber. The bark and sawdust are even used to fire boilers to produce steam generated electricity.

My next TALL trip is to the country of India in April. India has the largest irrigated agriculture land area in the world and is quickly becoming a major agriculture producer. I'm sure the trip will be quite an adventure.

He is survived by his wife, Alene Gamble of Friona; a brother, Terry Gamble and a sister, Kelly Grantham, both of



Carthel succeeds with drip irrigation

From Texas Corn Producers

It's no secret that Texas' driest year on record dealt a tough hand for producers. Agricultural producers across the state saw yields cut in half (or worse) due to Mother Nature's extreme heat, high winds and lack of moisture.

However, David Carthel, a Parmer County agricultural producer, found success in using a newly installed drip irrigation system on his 70-acre corn field. Texas Corn Producers followed Carthel's corn field on drip irrigation from planting to harvest, and has documented it in a series of videos, which are now available online at www.watergrowsjobs.org/drip.html.

Carthel realized the need to conserve resources well before tackling the drought-stricken year in order to ensure resources for future crops, while still maintaining or increasing yield. Carthel said drip irrigation was the key to making that happen for his operation.

Carthel knew the greatest hurdle in growing corn with drip irrigation is getting moisture to the seed to initiate growth. With this challenge in mind, he watered his corn field in three separate sections, fully utilizing his water resources in each section to ensure adequate moisture reached the seed. While this created three separate growth stages, it gave Carthel's field the start it needed, and the best chance for survival during the drought through the growing season.

Carthel's corn progressed at a normal pace, while producers with neighboring fields were forced to divert water off crops to concentrate resources elsewhere. Carthel observed this field fared significantly better than his other fields on sprinklers or other irrigation methods. He attributes its success to the drip irrigation's ability to apply moisture directly to where the plant needs it - its root zone, reducing moisture loss to evaporation.

At harvest, Carthel's drip irrigated corn yielded 30 percent better than his fields using alternative irrigation methods. "I can tell by this year, there won't be a year worse, harder and more challenging than this "year to get a crop up," Carthel said, "and my drip proves that you can do it."

It was both my joy and privilege to visit the beautiful mountains of New Mexico this

past summer with my son and his family. I took advantage

of the opportunity to soak

up some of the scenic beauty and to enjoy one of my favorite things-hummingbirds!

In a gift shop in Red River I found these delightful 'advice from' bookmarks representing several of God's creatures, but I was especially impressed with the hummingbird bookmark.

A friend on Facebook shared a video of a baby hummingbird's first flight. How awesome are our technologies that we might be able to witness such an event. You can just see the determination in those tiny eyes as he contemplates the mystery of his first journey.

While in New Mexico I watched the 60 to100 hummingbirds that were dining at the feeders that evening and flying to and fro. I followed them to see where they went when they were temporarily frightened away from the feeders. They flew up into the tall trees nearby and while watching them, I noticed a small brown and orange hummingbird that did not fly away. I thought maybe it was a nesting female.

I studied it and it studied me. Suddenly it flew straight toward me to my perch on the second floor balcony of the ski lodge. It hovered right in front of me less than two feet away-we were eye to eye. What was it thinking? I can only imagine...

Take time to really appreciate our beautiful world and all of God's creatures who live here. Love and appreciate your family, friends and neighbors more. Let them know how much you love and cherish them. Never pass up an opportunity to share the goodness in your heart, it will come back to you twofold and more. Forgive those who wrong you; blessings will follow for you both.

In the Friendship Garden at the library, I have been privileged to see two hummingbirds visiting both our honeysuckle vine and our water fountain. They are truly a gift. I want to say a special thank you to all of you for your prayers, thoughts, cards, and flowers during my mother's recent bout with pneumonia. God's blessings to you all, DB.

Hummingbird Facts from your local library:

Species include the world's smallest bird—the bee at 2 inches up to the giant at 8 1/2 inches.

HB has a forked tongue to bring in more nectar from the honeysuckle and trumpet flowers they frequent, plus they feed upon the tiny insects inside the flowers.


HB build their nests high up in trees and in thorny rosebushes using bark, grass, lichens, cobwebs, and cattail fluff. (Sometimes they steal insects from spider webs!

The tiny nests could fit comfortably cradled in the space between your forefinger and your thumb. Females lay two tiny eggs about the size of a pea that will hatch in two weeks. Newly hatched hummingbirds have no feathers and cannot see.

HB wings can beat as fast as 70 times per second. There are 320 different species of hummingbirds but they are found only in the western hemisphere. The orange and brown hummingbird was a Rufous. The Rufous has the longest migration flight of any other hummingbird in the world. Note: I found this information in our 2011 set of World Book Encyclopedias.
