## Man Escaped from Callahan County Jail Sunday Night

Claborn Weldon McPeak, 29, who escaped from the Callahan County jail some time Sunday night or early Monday morning, was still at large at last report. McPeak, who faces possible revocation of his parole from the state prison, was being held here to face a new habitual check swindling charge.

The six-foot six-inch man was convicted in Abilene Oct. 21 for habitual check swindling; and was convicted of auto theft in Abilene Nov. 20, 1959. He received two years in the penitentiary on the check swindling charge, and three years for car theft.

He was released from the state prison last month on parole.

He was arrested in Baird on a drunk charge, pleaded guilty and was fined \$5 and court costs of \$27.80. He gave Sheriff Homer Price a "no-account" check on an Abilene bank and obtained his release.

He was being held in the city jail in Abilene on another drunk charge by the time the check bounced.

McPeak got out of the Callahan County jail by working loose one of three bars sawed and bent in a March 12, 1956 jailbreak, then wriggling through the bars and onto the roof of the east porch of the jail, from where he dropped to the ground.

Sheriff Price discovered the jailbreak at 8:30 a. m. Monday.

# County Bond Issue Election July 15

Callahan County Commissioners on a meeting Monday authorized a \$50,000 bond issue election set for July 15.

The bond issue election includes two propositions; one for \$35,000 to repair the County courthouse, and for \$15,000 to fix up the County jail.

After a 42nd District Court grand jury recommended that the county build a new jail, last May 12, commissioners called in engineers to make recommendations.

## Jimmie Walker Killed in Crash

Funerl services for Jimmie Weldon Walker 22, killed instantly when a car he was driving went out of control, following what was believed to be a blow-out last Saturday night at 8 p. m. near Burnet, was held at Johnson City at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday.

Bro. DeSpain, of Austin, conducted the service at the Johnson City Church of Christ, with burial following in the Johnson City cemetery.

Walker was accompanied by Marvin Weed of Baird at the time of the accident. Weed received only minor bruises and cuts about the face and was released from the hospital after treatment.

The car, a 1958 Oldsmobile, is said to have rolled over several times, striking trees and a fence. Both boys were thrown from the car.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hoyt Walker of Johnson City; a grandmother, Mrs. Chester Boles of Clyde. He was a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Jaggars and Mrs. Medford Walker of Baird.

## Local Men Appointed On State Committee

Randall Jackson, member of the State Democratic Executive Committee from the 22nd Senatorial District, and Charles Walker of Baird have been appointed on the Statewide Steering Committee for the newly-formed "Citizens for Fair Taxation," it has just been announced by J. E. Connally of Abilene, chairman of the organization.

Representing the state's 31 Senatorial districts, the steering panel includes several members at large.

"We are preparing to launch an extensive campaign at the grass roots to build support for a compromise of conflicting views when the Legislature reconvenes on July 10," Connally stated.

Connally said the Citizens for Fair Taxation would seek an equitable revenue program including a natural tax pipeline tax; a franchise tax on interstate corporations on the same basis as wholly domestic corporations; an abandoned property-estate enforcement bill; and limited sales or excise taxes that avoid taxing basic necessities such as food, medicine, low cost clothing and farm supplies.

The engineers said that the county courthouse is settling, and that it is urgent that the basement slab of the courthouse be replaced, or the courthouse walls will begin to crack. Drainage problems, and a high water table are causing the slow settling of the courthouse, engineers report.

The courthouse was built in 1929 at a cost of \$125,000. Engineers estimate the building would cost \$2 million to replace.

Judge Lester Farmer said the county, which currently has a balance of \$25,000 in its permanent improvement fund, is just \$3,000 away from paying off the original \$125,000 bond issue which paid for the courthouse. That \$3,000 payment is due next year.

The commissioners said that although the county faces dwindling revenue from oil and gas taxes, the bond issue for July 15 will not necessitate an increase in taxes. Bonds authorized by the election, they said, will be retired from money earmarked for the permanent improvement fund out of present taxes.

Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price thinks that the \$15,000 won't be enough to repair the jail. Monday, he called the jail "an eyesore and a disgrace," and said that the commissioners would have done better to tear the old jail down and build a new one. He said that spending \$15,000 on the present jail would "just be throwing money away."

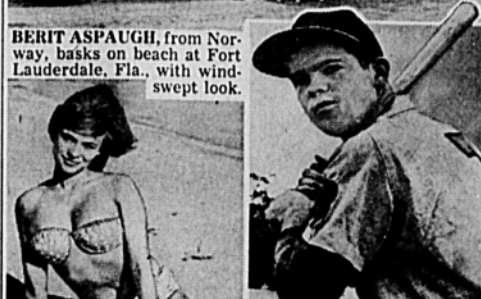

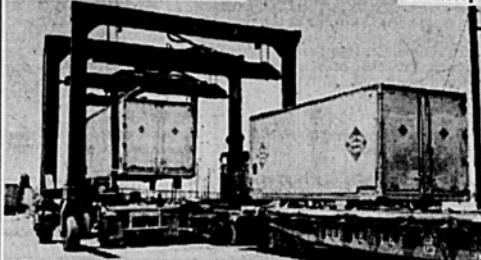

## Grandma's Lemon Cream Pie

Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add milk gradually and stir until smooth. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened throughout, about 10 minutes. Stir a small amount of hot mixture into egg yolks, stirring constantly. Combine with remaining hot mixture. Continue cooking, stirring constantly, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Add butter, lemon rind and juice; blend thoroughly. Set aside while preparing the meringue.

**Meringue:** have egg whites at room temperature. Add salt and lemon extract or juice to whites and beat to coarse foam. Add sugar in 1-tablespoon portions, beating constantly until stiff and glossy. Pour filling into baked pie shell. Pipe meringue on filling, sealing to edge of crust and swirling top. Bake at 350° F. (moderate) until golden brown, 12 to 15 minutes. Cool before cutting. Makes one 8-inch pie.

**I Give You**

**Texas...**

**By BOYCE HOUSE**

The great stretch of Texas from Corpus Christi to the lower Rio Grande Valley now has many oil fields, ranches, farms and orchards of oranges and grapefruit trees, but here is the way the region appeared when Second Lieut. U. S. Grant traversed it some 115 years ago as the army of Gen. Zachry Taylor marched to what is now Brownsville (as related in Grant's "Memoirs").

"The distance from Corpus to Matamoras is about one hundred and fifty miles. The country does not abound in fresh water, and the length of the marches had to be regulated by the distance between water supplies. Besides the streams there were occasional pools, filled during the rainy season, some probably made by the traders, who traveled constantly between Corpus Christi and the Rio Grande, and some by the buffalo. There was not at any time a single habitation, cultivated field, or herd of domestic animals between Corpus Christi and Matamoras."

"It was necessary, therefore, to have a wagon train sufficiently large enough to transport the camp and garrison equipage, officers' baggage, rations for the army, and part rations of grain for the artillery horses and all the animals taken from the North, where they had been accustomed to having their forage furnished them. The army was but indifferently supplied with transportation. Wagons and harness could easily be supplied from the North; but mules and horses could not so readily be bought."

"The American traders and Mexican smugglers came to the relief. Contracts were made for mules at from eight to eleven dollars each. The smugglers furnished the animals, and took their pay in goods of the description aforementioned. I doubt whether the Mexicans received in value from the traders five dollars for the animals they furnished, and still more, whether they paid anything but their own time in procuring them. Such is trade; such is war. The Government paid in hard cash to the contractor the stipulated price."

"Between the Rio Grande and the Nueces there was at that time a large band of wild horses feeding; as numerous, probably, as the band of buffalo roaming farther north was before its rapid extermination commenced. The Mexicans used to capture these in large numbers and bring them into the American settlements and sell them. A picked animal could be purchased at from eight to twelve dollars, but taken at wholesale, they could be bought for thirty-six dollars a dozen. Some of these were purchased for the army, and answered a most useful purpose. "The horses generally were very strong, formed much like the Norman horse, and with very heavy manes and tails. A number of officers supplied themselves with these, and they generally rendered as useful service as the Northern animal; in fact, they were much better when grazing was the only means of supplying forage."

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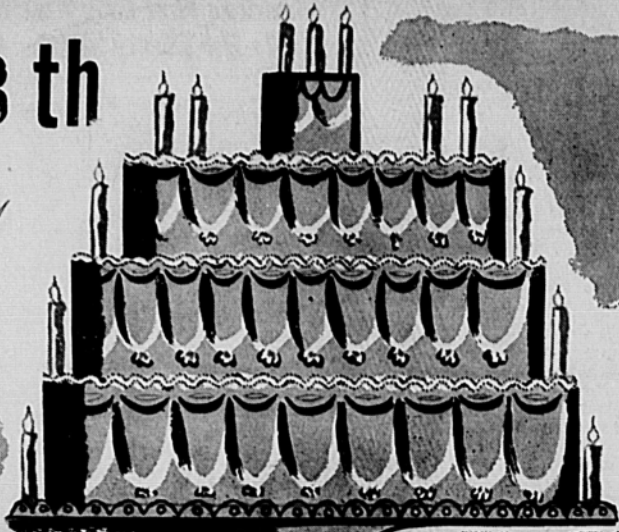

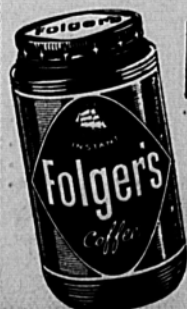
