Unless a write-in candidate shows up by Monday, the council will consider a resolution to cancel the city officer's election scheduled for May 7 The council has three openings coming up and the three cumbents are the only candidates to file so there will be no need for a city election. The three incumbents that filed for re-election are Jim Atwell, Terry Sharrock, and Mark Osborn

In addition to regular business the council will also consider the adoption of a uniform plumbing code for Friona, consider an ordinance regarding dangerous buildings in the city and consider rules and rental fees for the adult softball field. Farwell man dies in grain train accident

Johnny Torres, 38, of Farwell, died Friday afternoon March 4 while testing grain at the AGP Grain elevator in Lariat. Torres, a long time employee of Farwell Grain Exchange, was on top of a train car testing grain at the Lariat elevator as the train was being moved to unload.

Sheriff's Department spokesman said Torres fell off the slow moving train down between two train cars onto the track and was run over. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Vi Hutto.

Mr. Torres' death marked the third tragic incident to strike AGP Grain Cooperative in recent months. Two men were severely burned from an explosion and fire at the Lazbuddie elevator and a Muleshoe man died from suffocation in a grain bin at the AGP Farwell elevator.

Let the sun shine in

"Knowledge will forever govern ignorance. And a people who mean to be their own governors must arm themselves with the power knowl-edge gives." James Madison, James Madison,

1822, 4th U.S. president. Next week, March 13-19, is Sunshine Week.

The timing of Sunshine Week in March was chosen because March 16 is the birthday of James Madison, father of the U.S. Constitution.

Sunshine Week: Your Right to Know is spearheaded by the American Society of Newspa-Editors to focus on the public's right of access to gov-ernment records. If you read newspapers during the next ten days you will find many editorial opinion essays on the topic of freedom of information and your access to it. The word 'sunshine' is used as a metaphor to make sure public information stays out in the open and is not kept hidden in the

As a retired director of the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas once said, "citizens tend to prefer closed public records until it is their ox being gored such as when a radioactive waste site pops up next door or a convicted child molester roams their neighborhood." Many people push privacy today until they need public records for one reason or

Open government is not just

should be of concern to every citizen. When local, state, and federal government officials make decisions about your lives and your tax money, it is your right to know before those decisions are made. Very seldom is a law once passed then un-When government is allowed to operate in secrecy the people are the big losers.

David Donaldson, a lawyer and a director of the Freedom of Information Foundation of Texas, wrote in an emailed oped piece: "The Texas Public Information Act has some special features that speed the process of openness. It provides a category of super public informasuch as records on the government's spending; title, salary, and dates of employment of government employees, and many other items that are declared to be public as a matter of right."

Donaldson writes that the Texas Open Meetings Act allows citizens to learn what will be considered at the next city council, school district, or county commissioner's meeting so they can be prepared if they attend. The Open Meetings Act also insists that final decisions made by those entities occur in the open where the public can see their elected officials acting and hold them accountable.

Elected officials here in the county are pretty good about providing information about their business. There are inof concern to the press. It stances when a city manager or police chief had rather not tell the newspaper something. We are all so hung up on privacy laws these days that public officials are nervous about sharing certain information. I don't blame them. There are plenty of cuckoos and nutcases running around looking for an excuse to cause trouble.

Besides it is easy for a public official to adopt a cares" attitude and just keep quiet about public issues. Evcity council and school board meeting held in Friona is open to the public. Each monthly meeting agenda has a spot for public forum. The Friona school board meeting on March 21 (announced elsewhere in this issue) sets aside a public hearing notice time to explain the 2003-04 Texas Academic Excellence Indicator System report for Friona schools. In other words an update on how the kids did.

As an old saying goes, I'll bet you a dollar to a donut no one from the public shows up.

According to Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott, whose office handles over 11,300 open records requests each year, there are several reasons why officials don't comply with open government laws: some don't want to follow the law; some are foot-draggers who want to impede information access and make it difficult to get information; but most often, he says, open government law violations happen because public officials don't know what the law requires

Abbott is proposing legisla-tion called the "No Excuses" bill which would require open government training for the 35,000 Texas public officials so they know not only the laws but the consequences for not following them. If it is mandatory education it is going to cost somebody some money. Mandatory state programs always do.

But then, as James Madison might ask, what is the price of ignorance?



Neugebauer tells Japan: take the beef

Congressman Randy Neugebauer acted last Thursday to express his displeasure with Japan for its delay in abiding by an October agreement to reopen its border to Ameri-

Neugebauer co-sponsored a House Resolution that was introduced by Congressman Jerry Moran (R-Kan.). This resolution urges the United States Trade Representative to impose economic sanctions on Japan if it continues to delay meeting its trade obligations under the October agreement.

"Through this resolution, we are sending a message that we

take our trade agreements seriously and we expect our partners to live up to their side of the deal,' Neugebauer said. "The United States has proven that our beef supply is safe, and we have held up our end of the bargain. Now, it is time for Japan to stop dragging its feet and open up its border."

Japan has banned all imports of beef from the United States since December 2003, when a single case of Bovine Spongiform Encephalopathy (BSE) was found in a Canadian-born cow in Washington

Since that time, the U.S. has

taken many steps to ensure the safety of the domestic beef supply. This includes the implementation of a rigorous surveil-lance program that exceeds the international standards set by the World Organization for Animal Health

The two countries agreed in October 2004 to a process that would allow for the opening of both borders to beef products from cattle younger than 20 months of age.

Despite these steps, the Japanese border remains closed to American beef, and Japan has not set a dated by which its new regulations will take effect.

"Japan has long been an important and vital trading partner for agriculture, and I would have rather not had to take this action," Neugebauer said.
"However, the fact remains that there is no scientific reason the Japanese border should remain closed to Ameri-

Thursday's resolution had received bipartisan support from at least 40 members of the House, including Agriculture Committee Chairman Bob Goodlatte (R-Va.). The National Cattlemen's Beef Association has also backed the measure

We need to tackle the Social Security challenge now

America's Social Security system is headed for trouble, two trains rumbling toward a collision. One train rumbles on tracks laid down by financial promises made when this New Deal-era program was established. The second travels on a path set by long-term demographic trends. To avoid the wreck, we need to change the courses of the trains, and the time to do it is long before the conductors on theses trains can see each other.

Without significant changes, the question is not whether this

accident will happen, but when. The demographic trends pushing us toward disaster are simple: birthrates are going down while people are living longer. This was not a problem in 1935 when President Franklin D. Roosevelt founded the Social Security program. With an average life expectancy of 64, only 54 percent of workers were expected to live long enough to collect their checks. Today, the U.S. Census reports the average life expectancy is 77.2 years and increasing. The Department of Health and Human Services reports that by 2050, American men will live an average of 79.7 years and women will live even longer

These trends will be amplified when 76 million Baby Boomers hit retirement age. Born between 1946 and 1964, they will begin retiring in 2008, and threaten to swamp the Social Security

For many years, there was no problem with Social Security, because the abundance of workers paid far more into the program than it provided to retirees. The excess money was placed in something called the "Social Security Trust Fund".

Unfortunately, by law, the Trust Fund is required to save the excess payments in U.S. Treasury bonds, which are, for lack of a better word, "IOUs" from taxpayers. The money itself has been spent. This means the minute the Social Security system takes less in from workers than it pays to retirees, it will have to draw on those bonds, which will have to be made good by taxpayers. This shortfall is predicted to begin as early as 2018.

Inaction is out of the question. According to the Heritage Foundation, if Congress does nothing to reform the system, Social Security will need general fund infusions to make up the difference in tax revenues and benefit payments amounting to \$72 billion in 2020, \$275 billion in 2030, \$429 billion in 2050, and \$719 billion in 2070. The long-term projections of Social Security's financial health will continue to worsen because, with each passing year, a surplus year passes and a deficit year is added in the calculation

Compounding this problem was the fact that changes in Social Security also weakened the financial health of the system. Origiandly, initial benefits at the time of retirement were linked to inflation, but in the 1970s they were pegged to the rise in wages, which tend to go up faster than prices. Couples with demography and the impending retirement of the Baby Boomers, the Social Security system is headed for a disaster.

While YCT-UT was merely running a table designed to celebrate Texas Independence Day, the protestors had gotten wind that the chapter was going to hold a 'Capture an Illegal Immigrant' event similar to one held in January at YCT's University of North Texas chapter. Regardless of what internal debate may have occurred among UT chapter members, no illegal immigration event was at UT, yet their Texas Independence Day celebration was crashed by protestors wishing to silence YCT's political expres-

"The State Board of YCT is very supportive of its campus affiliates, and we condemn all those who wish to stifle open political debate," said State Chairman David Rushing, a Southern Methodist University law student. "In this age of heightened national security concerns, our porous borders should be concern to all Americans. It is well within reason for a student group like YCT-UT or YCT-UNT to bring the illegal immigration issue to the table in a provocative manner

"YCT opposes illegal immigration, to be sure, but our reasons for this position are not racist, as some have charged," Rushing continued. "First and foremost, illegal immigration undermines our national security. If undocumented workers are able to make it across the Texas-Mexico border, why could Al Qaida associates not follow that path as well? This was the core rationale behind 'Capture a

"Second, but just as important, illegal immigration undermines the hard work and patient determination of those individuals from across the globe who have waited in line for a chance to become Americans legally," Rushing concluded.





THE CHIEF'S CORNER by TINO SALINAZ Friona Police Department

Parmer County Crimestoppers

There have been a couple of cases within the last year where the question has come up on how a person can claim a reward on information they have on a crime. First of all the tip has to be reported to Crimestoppers at 1-800-774-TIPS or the local number of 481-9178. The information that you furnish must lead to the arrest and indictment of a suspect(s). When you call Crimestoppers your tip will be given a code number or code name that is assigned to you only. You do not have to give your name. Crimestoppers does not have caller ID so, therefore, your call cannot be traced.

When a tip is received by Crimestoppers that information is passed along to the investigating law enforcement agency. If the information that you provided is used in the arrest and indictment of a suspect(s), then you are eligible for the reward. The reward could be up to \$1,000 depending on the crime committed.

If you have information regarding a crime or any drug dealers in neighborhood, do your community a favor and call Crimestoppers. Remember, you do not have to give your name to report a crime. Your identity is never known.

NIGHT FALL

A book of fiction, based on actual events, can raise many intriguing and alarming questions. Nelson DeMille's, NIGHT FALL, is one of these books. Based on the crash of TWA Flight 800, on July 17, 1996, over Long Island, New York, which claimed the lives of 230 people, NIGHT FALL poses numerous questions. Are the true facts known or was there a huge cover-up?

After the Five-Year Memorial Service for the families of the victims. Kate Mayfield, an FBI agent, working with the ATTF, and her husband, John Corey, formerly a NYPD homicide detective, now working for the Federal Anti-Terrorist Task Force, decide to look again at the events surrounding the crash. Kate had been involved in the interviewing of the 200 or more witnesses to the explosion immediately after the crash. Most of the witnesses spoke of seeing a missile, or something like one, rising from the ocean and streaking upward with a trail of white smoke behind it, just before the plane exploded. But after the investigation was finished, the government ruled the crash was due to mechanical failure. Kate had never been satisfied with that ruling nor were many other people

After marrying John Corey, and seeing how good he was at investiga-tions, she wanted him to see what he thought had happened. She led him to interviews with two of the best witnesses, one who believed that the plane was shot down, and one who believed that the crash was due to mechanical failure. This began 48 hours of them getting on the wrong side of both their bosses and eventually being sent out of the country But that didn't stop John Corey.

He began following leads to answers immediately upon his arrival back in the United States. The more leads he tracks down the more curious the questions. Was there really a couple on the beach that evening that had a video they filmed that included footage of the crash? Who were they and why had that never been made public? Why did CIA produce an animation to explain the crash that almost no one accepted? The hunt for answers leads John on a fast-paced and harrowing journey that even includes the return of a man all thought dead. Things become more dangerous in rapid sequence. The ending is so unexpected and worth waiting for. But the questions remain.

I enjoyed the book and the fast-paced sequence of events. The

characters were interesting, but could have been more developed. The book seemed to be written to the formula of "This will be a hit movie so have to include bad language, attitudes and sex". The ending shocks so much that it makes the book worth reading.

Bush gives \$2 billion for love power Solving relations

President Bush told a group of religious leaders that his administration allocated \$2 billion to faith-based organizations last year to assist in their work of showing compassion toward Americans in need.

"No matter what your faith is, we're united in the conviction that to whom much is given, much is expected," Bush said at the White House Faith-Based and Community Initiatives Leadership

With the prosperity Americans enjoy comes "an obligation to reach out to brothers and sisters who hurt," the president told the gathering. The Bush administration reported that \$2 billion in competitive grants across seven federal agencies was awarded to faith-based organizations in 2004, amounting to 10.3 percent of the total funding awarded. In 2003, just \$1.17 billion was awarded in grants to faith-based groups across five agencies.

The number of first-time faith-based grantees totaled 331 in 2004, representing a 20 percent increase over the previous year, the White House said. The Department of Housing and Human Services alone saw an 88 percent increase in the number of awards to faith-based organizations since 2002 - from 483 to 908.

One of the tests of character for America, the president said, is how the nation treats its weakest citizens, and part of the test is to understand the limitations of government.

"When I think about government, I think about law and justice. I really don't think about love," Bush said: "Government has got to find ways to empower those whose mission is based upon love, in order to help those who need love, to find love in

Bush said his goal over the next four years is to change the culture permanently so that faith-based and community-based organizations will be welcomed into the grant-making process of government. He noted that 10 federal agencies now have faith-

based offices, and three of those were added last year.

The president also reiterated that he is most interested in results, not in whether an organization claims a particular religion. The multiplication of new faith-based groups, particularly small groups that can achieve significant results, is an important objec-

"What I want to know is, 'Are we helping increase the number of new groups, small groups, and first-time appliers for federal money? Are we doing that? Are we getting beyond those great, courageous faith-based programs that have been providing help for a long period of time? Are we reaching beyond the Salvation Army or the Catholic Charities, the fantastic pillars of the faith-based program?" Bush said. "And the answer is, 'We are."

Solving relationship problems

Question. Do you get along well with others? We all need to admit that we sometimes have relationship problems. Sometimes we are more interested in winning an argument than we are in building a relationship. Throughout history, even in the Bible, man has had relationship problems. Cain killed Abel, Miriam fussed with Moses. Paul and Barnabas had a disagreement that caused them to split their mission efforts.

There are some basics that we must follow if we are ever to improve our problems and love demands that we try.

Perhaps the first thing we must do is admit that we have a problem. Admitting that we have a problem is maturity, not weakness. Our responsibility is to go to the one we have the problem with, admit that we have a problem, and lovingly try to correct it. Most of our strained relationships are self-centered. Ninety-five percent of my problems are because of Talley. Too often we blame others. WE look for fault and try to justify

But, we need to know that it takes more than simply saying "I'm sorry". We must also be willing to make the necessary changes. Our actions must come after our words. For each of us to win, both of us must win.

If you are really interested in improving your relationships with others, a good place to start is by trying to put I Corinthians into practice.

This text is about love and that's what it's going to take for you to improve yourself. Note these four things about I Corinthians 13

> Love is Essential, Not Optional No less than three times, Paul writes, "but have not love" (v. 1,2,3), he then adds the clincher. You're nothing. Take away love, that essential ingredient, and you have a car without wheels, a house without a foundation.

Love is a Demonstration, Not an Inclination Love involves action, movement, expression. Love <u>does</u>. It's not indifferent or passive.

Love is a Magnet that Draws Us Together, Not a Wall that Keeps Us Apart Verses 4-7 give us fifteen special expressions of love, each one of them a magnet.

Love is a Long-Term Investment, Not a Quick Real love has staying power. It refuses to look for ways to run. It refuses to turn its head. It opts for working through.

Love is what it will take to change our relationship problems. Of course you can't control what the other person does but you can control what you do

Upland cotton average price received by growers through January 2005

Cumulative Upland cotton marketings increased by 50 percent during the month of January and allowed total marketings for the first half of the 2004 marketing year to reach the 10.1 million-bale

January marketings were estimated at 3.698 million bales with an verage selling price of 39.6 cents per pound. Revised figures for December 2004 indicate 2,292 million bales marketed at an average price of 40.7 cents per pound.

Based on these numbers the 2004 Upland Cotton Weighted Average Price calculated through January 2005 stands at 43.72 cents per pound. This indicates that 2004 Counter-cyclical payments will per pound. This indicates that 2004 Counter/cyclean payments with be based on the maximum 13.73-cent payment rate allowed by current program rules. So far the calculated 2004 Weighted Average Price is well below the 52-cent threshold where Counter-cyclical payment

rates begin to drop.

Based on the latest figures over half of the 2004 crop cotton marketed to date was traded in December and January. Figuring in the level of activity being reported by High Plains cotton ware-houses, February marketings should also remain strong and provide another significant bump to the cumulative marketing total. The preliminary mid-month price reported for February 2005 was 38.1 cents per pound.

Grocery management for cattle

By TIM W. MCALAVY

Success with stocker cattle grazing winter wheat pasture hinges on "grocery management", according to a Texas Cooperative concern for stocker cattle, but it is a good idea to feed supple-Extension beef cattle specialist. In this case, "grocery managements containing magnesium to mature cows in order to prevent ment" means striking a good balance between available forage and supplements.

"You have to know what's on their dinner table each day and how to supplement their diet with additives, grain, low-quality roughage or silage," said Ted McCollum, Extension beef specialist based at Amarillo. "Keep an eye on when and how often they graze. This is a good indicator of what's on the table. If your wheat is getting thin or the weather is cold and harsh, they have to work harder and graze more to get the groceries they need." If their groceries get thin, it may be time to adjust stocking rates or bring in some supplemental feed, he said.

"Economics will balance the scale of where you need to be with stocking rates. Research with stockers grazing dryland wheat in the Panhandle has shown that boosting the stocking rate pounds per acre can reduce average daily gain by about one-third of a pound per day," McCollum said. "You have to balance stocking rates with expected gains, expected market price and your operating costs." Providing supplemental feed and additives increases operating costs and isn't necessarily profitable.


"Supplements for wheat pasture cattle have their place, but supplemental feeding isn't always economical," McCollum said. "Pencil out your supplement cost and then compare it to the market value of the additional weight gains it may produce. As a general rule of thumb, each pound of added weight gain is only worth about 50 to 60 cents because of price rollback in the market place. Aside from costs/returns, you also need to consider what those cattle really need in a good pasture supplement

Most cattle grazing wheat pasture have relatively low supplemental mineral requirements. Even so, producers should feed a ing.

"If adding weight gain is your goal, and the cost-returns are right, your supplement should contain an additive such as Rumensin, Bovatec or GainPro," McCollum said. "Aside from promoting weight gain, experience has shown that Rumensin also helps reduce bloat. Additives only cost about 2 cents per day per head but they must be delivered in a mineral or feed supplement. If fed properly, they can boost gain by one-fifth to one-third of a pound per day. The labeled/approved options for self-feeding these additives are limited."

Energy and protein are two other key ingredients to consider, said. "Grain is a good source of energy, but low-quality roughage is not. Feeding low quality roughage won't increase gains, but it can help prevent bloat," he said. "A wheat forageonly diet will produce better gains than a wheat forage and roughage diet. Wheat forage plus grain can be even better. Grain-based supplements that contain Rumensin or Bovatec are most economical when fed at relatively low rate—somewhere around 2 pounds per day per head, or less.'

Feeding silage as a supplement is another option. "You can stretch the available forage and perhaps use a higher stocking rate by feeding silage," he said. It's also a good, nutritious feed that can help you maintain or boost gains when forage is limited. Feeding times can be just as important as supplement ingredients, the specialist said. "Don't feed your supplement early in the morning when the cattle are actively grazing," McCollum said. "Wheat should be their main course meal. Feed your supplement as a dessert—after the cattle have finished their morning graz-

Silver haired Congress meets

on Social Security

The National Silver Haired Caregivers and Eliminate Taxes Congress, a bi-cameral body advocating for senior citizens in all 50 states, has very strong and differing opinions on the details of Social Security reform. The two bodies could not agree on the details of a reform plan. There was, however, agreement that the President and Congress should take ac-

The House adopted resolution #65 urging the "President and/or Congress of the United States to take the necessary action to appoint an independent nonpartisan Social Security Review Commission in 2005, with the charge of recommending legislation, policies and programs which would insure the solvency of Social Security into the future for our children and grandchildren. Such commission to produce a final report to Congress by the end of 2007."

The Board of Directors drafted a proclamation supporting the White House Congress on Aging to be held in the Fall. The proclamation made a special reference to Social Security proclaiming that "many substantial and pressing issues must be addressed and re-solved—prime among these issues is a timely review and adjustment to preserve the health and viability of Social Security"

Although the four-day session (February 26-March 1) was dominated by the Social Security issue, 46 other resolutions were adopted and prioritized by the NSHC. The number one prioritized resolution called for the reauthorization of the Older American's Act that was initiated on July 14, 1965, and rein funding for all titles of the Older American Act to ensure necessary resources to equately serve an estimated 17% increase in the population growth" (of older Americans).

Other resolutions prioritized in the top five requested the President and Congress to— Strengthen the Medicare Prescription Drug Plan—Further Prevent Elder Abuse—Require National Background Checks on


