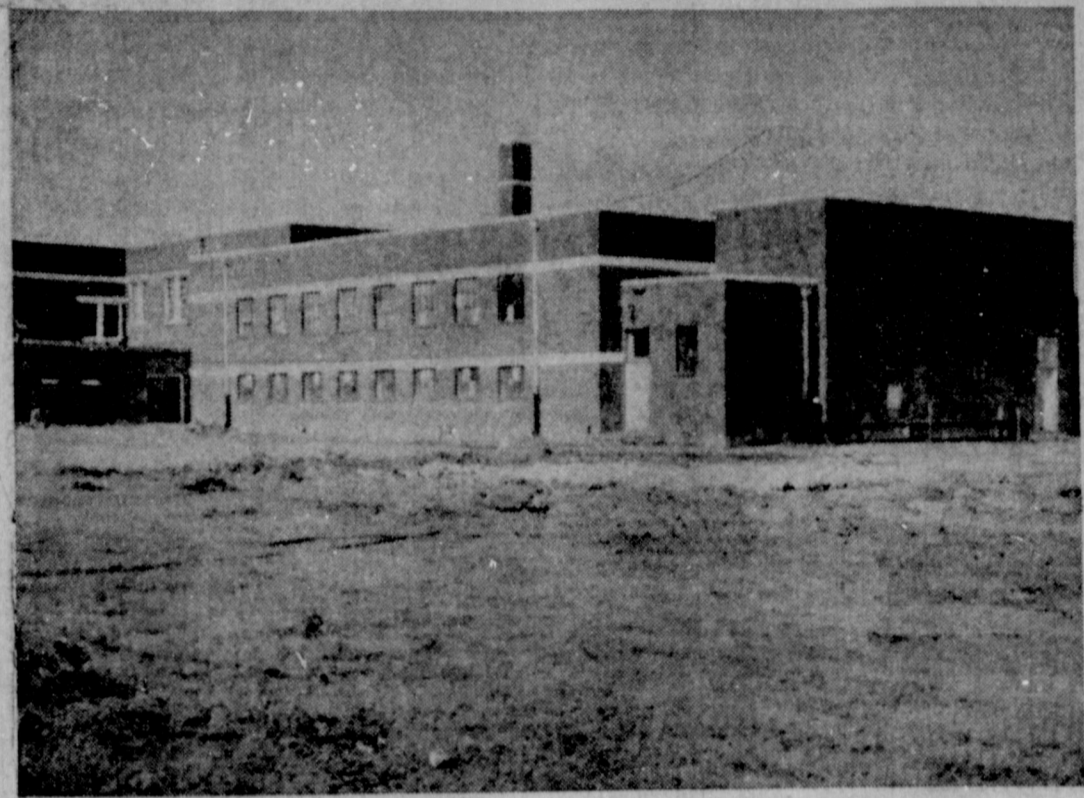

38 Worthless Checks Charges Filed: Rise Indicated

County Attorney Roger Gorrell says that although bad checks are paraded with charges in past months, there is indication among merchants that there is a sharp increase in checks they are holding for collection or filing on.

During October and up to November 20, 38 persons have been filed on for worthless checks. Of these, 11 have been arrested and one dismissed due to the check being paid off without the knowledge of the complainant.

Thirteen defendants are out of the county and have not been located by the sheriff's offices of these counties.

Seven of the defendants are out-of-state and cannot be extradited.

The whereabouts of six is unknown.

Eleven were arrested during the month of October after charges were filed in September or before.

One person has been filed on

for worthless check after a trial conviction. She has plead not guilty and will be tried in the coming term of court.

Gorrell states that this type of violation, if defendant is convicted carries a minimum sentence of 30 days in jail.

CITY SAVED FROM SERIOUS EXPLOSION

A power line failure, caused by the collapse of a pole on American Boulevard, Muleshoe, plunged the area into darkness nearly one hour Friday night.

The hot wire, carrying 65000 volts, fell across the five gas tanks of the Shamrock station, creating a hazard for the City.

Prompt action by the Southwestern Public Service Company avoided what might have been a disaster. Within

minutes of the Journal having reported the fallen pole, observed by a passing staff member, Fred Clements arrived on the scene and took steps to see that the incandescent hot line was immediately cut off. Although a large section of the Muleshoe Area was inconvenienced, Fred's prompt action saved what might have been a devastating explosion in Muleshoe.

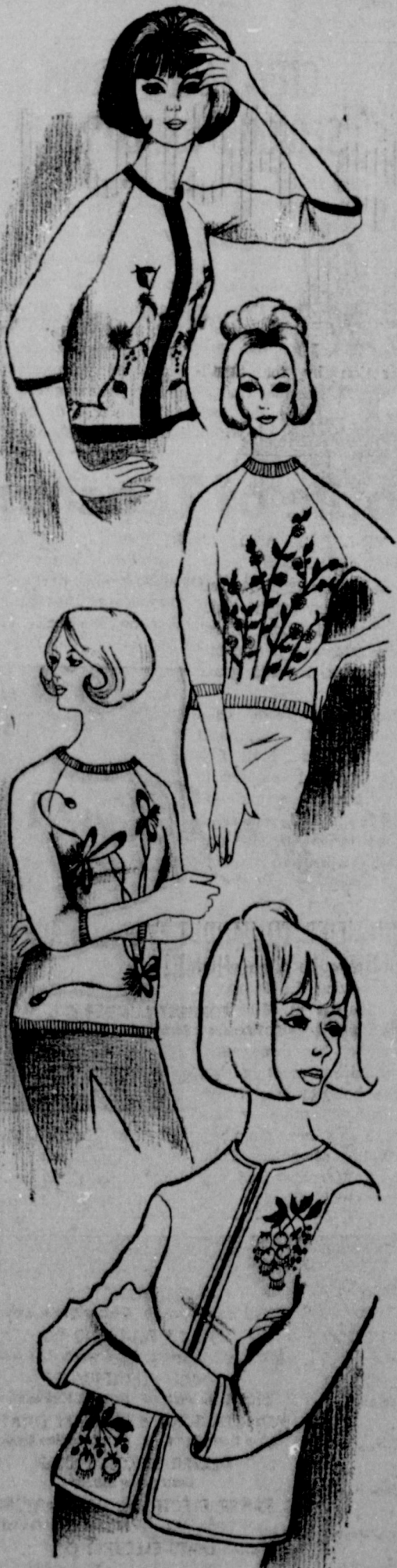

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
