### The Anti Prohibition Calendar

April 4-Precinct Mass Meetings April 6-County Conventions April 14-Convention at Fort Worth to Endorse Candidate for Governor

Dallas, Texas, March 7.—Following practically the same plan as the pros, the leaders of the State democracy, opposed to prohibition, in convention here today, decided to hold precinct county and state conventions to select their standard bearer for governor. The precinct conventions will be held April 4; the county conventions April 6, and the state convention, which will be held at Fort Worth, April 14. This action was decided on by the committee appointed shortly after noon today by Bryan T. Barry, chairman of the convention, following the introduction of a resolution to this effect by Jake Wolters and C. E. Lahe.

In the committee, members of which represented the entire state, considerable opposition was developed to the resolution as mapped out by Wolters and Lane. Some of the members said it as following too closely in the footsteps of the pros, but they were in the minority and the recommendation went to the conntion where it was adopted after a brief discussion. This pracally settled the work of the convention and adjournment came :30 o'clock, following a brief address by Johnathan P. Lane one by Governor Colquitt.

Colquitt's Appearance Surprise. The appearance of the governor on the stage was a surprise, as he announced several days ago that he would not attend the convention. In his address which was received with cheers and applause, the governor reviewed some of the recent political history of the State and said he was in favor of amending the Terrell election law so that candidates must receive a majority of all the votes cast in the election and not a glurality.

### GEN. KELLEY'S ARMY GAS COMPANIES SHARP CHALLENGE CREATES A PROBLEM

### ANTI LEADERS ARE RAPPED UNEMPLOYED IN TWO FACTIONS PPODUCERS Governor Johnson Orders Army to Go

to Work But They Refuse Employment

By Associated Press. Sacramento, Cal., March 7.--Sacramento wrestled all day with the un-employed problem, precipitated by the arrival here of General Kelley's army on its way to Washington. Tonight no solution had been reached, but a company of the state militia had been ordered out to guard the state arsenal and to be in readiness to answer a riot call. Companies at Oreville, Stockton, Chico and Woodland were notified to hold themselves in readiness for similar service.

300 Recruits Join Army. More than 300 recruits joined the army which is now divided into two factions of almost equal rival strength, one obeying the orders of General Kelley and the other composed of seceders.

Leaders of the men called at the executive offices today and demanded of Gov. Johnson that they be supplied with food and transportation to the state line. The governor ordered them to work instead and they refuse declaring they would accept no employment until they had completed the march to Washington. No decision could be reached by city and county officials as to what disposition should be made of the army. One of the questions debated was whether or not to ship it back to San Francisco where it started.

Bitter Feelings Between Factions. There was no disturbance at the rival camps, although emissaries of the seceders added to the bitter feel ing by inducing a number of Kelley's followers to desert. To the men, Go

An extract from Col. Roosevelt's

"If I were asked to name the one point in which there is complete difterence between the Brazilians and ourselves, I should say that it was in the attitude toward the black man As the Indian becomes civilized he is absorbed into the population, as is the case with us in Oklahoma and whoever has Indian blood in him is proud of the fact. The president of Brazil is one of these men, and there are a number of others among the leaders whom I met. It is an entire of Brazil were so mixed as to be wholly unlike that of Europe or the United States. It is mixed only in sense in which the population of Italy and Spain are mixed, as the population of southern France is mix ed, as the population is mixed in many parts of the United-States. As regards the major part of the population, the mixed race is such only in the sense in which that is also true of the United States and of most of the advanced nations of mankind There is one real difference, however This difference between the United States and Brazil is the tendency of Brazil to absorb the negro. My servation leads me to believe that in 'absorb' I have used exactly the right expression to describe this process It is the negro who is being absorbed the white man. The great majority of the men and women of high social osition in Rio are, of as unmixed hite blood as the corresponding class. Paris or Madrid or Rome.

On the contrary, the bulk of the work, even in Rio, is sdone by white men But these white men draw no line against the negro and in the lower ranks intermarriages are frequent especially between the negroes, the most numerous of the immigrant races of Europe. In the middle class these intermarriages are rare and the nigher class almost unknown so far as concerns men and women in dent. But even in the higher ranks there is apparently no prejudice whatever against marrying a man or girl who is, say, seven-eighths white, the remaining quantity of black blood be ng treated as a negligible element. The men and women with whom I closely associated were in the very great majority of cases Dure white save in the comparatively rare stances where they had a dash of Indian blood. But they naturally and unconcernedly told me the facts as I have above related them.

"Perhaps the attitude that the Bra zilians, including the most intelligent among them, take is best symbolized by a picture we saw in the art mu in Rio. It portrayed a black grandfather, a mulatto son and a white grandchild, the evident intention of the painter being to express both the hope and the belief that the negro was being absorbed and transformed so that he would become a white man.
