Atmos Energy advises customers to expect higher winter gas bills

Atmos Energy Corporation (NYSE: ATO) said last week that natural gas utility bills for an average West Texas residential customer could be approximately 55 to 65 percent higher than gas bills last winter because of the effects of two disastrous hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico, the already-high demand for natural gas, and tight supplies of domestic natural gas production.

"Reliable natural gas service for our customers is our top priority. We expect that natural gas supplies will be adequate this winter to meet our customers' needs," said Gary Gregory, president of Atmos Energy West Texas Division. "Natural gas prices, though, will be much higher than last winter, and we are very concerned about their effect on our customers.

Gregory noted that Hurricanes Katrina and Rita disrupted about 15 percent of the country's natural gas production, which was already tight because of growing demands from power plants and other users. Cooler weather also could increase the bills customers will pay to heat their homes this

winter, because the past two winters have been warmer than

Assuming a normal winter, the average Atmos Energy residential customer in West Texas can expect to pay approximately \$900 during the winter heating months of October 2005 through March 2006. This estimate compares with an average cost during the last heating season of \$500.

An average bill provides a basis for comparison, but most customers will pay more or less, depending on their usage, regional weather patterns and gas commodity market conditions. Company officials said the estimate is based upon current marindicators for wholesale natural gas prices and the amount of natural gas that the company has in storage or has hedged using financial tech-

During winter months, 70 to 80 percent of a customer's total bill pays for just the gas alone.

"Customers pay only what Atmos Energy has already paid for natural gas—and not a penny more," added Gregory. We buy the gas on behalf of

customers. We simply pass the cost of gas on to our customers with no markup."

A gas utility earns its in-come from fees for delivering gas to customers and for maintaining its utility distribution system. Gregory said. Atmos Energy's rates charged for delivering gas to customers are regulated by each city within our service territory.

"Volatility of gas prices in recent months," Gregory said, "has been like a giant roller coaster. We have never seen natural gas prices change so fast, making it harder to predict our winter bills.

To ensure reliable service and to stabilize the price that its customers pay for natural gas, Atmos Energy buys natural gas during the summer months and stores it underground for use during the win-The company also uses fi nancing tools to lessen the effect of sharp swings in wholesale gas prices

"We're fully on the side of our customers in this matter, because high natural gas prices hurt their family budgets and increase our operating ex-

penses," he said. "We are doing everything possible to buy gas supplies or to contract for future supplies at as low a cost as possible."

Consumers can help manage their energy bill, too, by taking the following steps:

Doctors re-attach a 7-year-old boy's arm

A Big Spring boy suffered an injury while visiting his father

"I just remember waking up and seeing my arm. It was in a

"what do you remember about the wreck?" happened in a Killeen neighborhood on June 6. Kirk was seated in front of his father on an all

flipped.
"I flipped with it," says Kirk. "I was holding on to the middle of the handle bars."

Kirk's right arm was cut off 4 inches from the wrist. It was lying on the street until a witness picked it up and saved Kirk's life and his arm.

"This 20 year old boy was walking up to Kirk and saw the arm," says Jessi Taliaferro, Kirk's mom. "He figured it was like an organ transplant and immediately put

it on ice. Another person called 911. This young man had no medical training. He was a rodeo cowboy. He went to his bag and got a leather strap and tied it up high on Kirk's arm to stop the bleeding and covered the injured arm with a towel. A lady came over and held Kirk until the paramedics came. Response was real quick. A helicopter landed right at the scene of the accident and Kirk was surgery at Scott and White within two hours. You only have a six hour window to start putting an arm back on. Kirk lost 40 percent of his blood.

Doctors say it was a clean cut. The bones were spliced together with plates and screws and microsurgery connected the blood vessels and nerves. The operation took 8 hours. He is the hospital's youngest patient to receive a re-attachment.

That was 7 year old Kirk Simpson's answer to my question,

Kirk showed his sense of humor after the operation. When The accident doctors asked him to wiggle his fingers, he held up his good

hand and wiggled wildly.

I visited with Kirk a month after the wreck. He

'He was wiggling his fingers way before the doc tors thought he would," says Jessi. "They says percent use after a cut like that is good. he'll do better than that. He expects to have full use of his arm. Jessi says the nerves grow an

Iraqi constitution will not bring freedom to Iraq

As the world eagerly watches the Iraqi constitutional referenthe Bush administration and its intellectual supporters herald the occasion as a historic step toward freedom in the Middle East and security for America. This view betrays an appalling ignorance of the nature of freedom and the requirements of our national self-interest.

Politically, as America's Founding Fathers understood, to be free is to possess the ability to exercise one's rights to life, liberty, property, and the pursuit of happiness. To be free means that no other men, whatever their number or position, can coercively prevent an individual from taking the steps rationally required to support his life. It means no one can force him to accept beliefs or dogmas, control what he can or cannot say, seize the material wealth he has produced and earned, or dictate the goals he must live for.

A constitution is valuable only if it strictly delimits the power of government to that of protecting each individual's rights. History demonstrates that government is, potentially, the worst violator of man's rights. A proper constitution declares off-limits any governmental action that would trespass on an individual's rights, no matter whether that action is proposed in the name of the king, the common good, God, or public morality

The draft Iraqi constitution, however, grants virtually unlimited

As liberals have demanded in America for over a century, private property will be eviscerated. Although the proposed constitution nominally protects property rights, it explicitly allows that private property can be seized by the government "for the public interest." By contrast, public property "is sacrosanct, and its protection is the duty of every citizen." (In practice, this means that if the government takes a citizen's money business or home, he must stand aside—and then defend with his life what the government has stolen from him.) The state will dictate er an Iraqi can sell land to foreigners. It will manage the oil. It will provide to its hapless citizens "free" education and health care, "a correct environmental atmosphere," and work "that guarantees them a good life.

The government will also, as conservatives have long dreamed for America, enforce religious morality, "Islam," Article 2 declares, "is the official religion of the state and is a basic source of legislation: No law can be passed that contradicts the undisputed rules of Islam." Experts in Islamic law will sit on the Supreme Court. The state will guarantee protection of motherhood and the 'ethical and religious value" of the family. Citizens will have freedom of speech, of press, of assembly—so long as no one says or does anything that violates "public morality," i.e., the

And as if to leave no doubt that the state can exert total control over the individual's life, Article 45 adds that the government can restrict or limit "any of the freedoms and liberties stated . as long as this restriction or limitation in the constitution . does not undermine the essence of the right or freedom." Of course, part of the essence of any right or freedom is that it is

We in America had no reason to expect freedom from the drafters of Iraq's constitution. Like many of our own intellectuals on the left and the right (some of whom were advisers in Iraq), Iraqi intellectuals are either tribal or religious collectivists (or both). Whichever the case, they deny the individual and his rights. The tribalists deny material independence to the individual and seek to control his every economic step. The religionists, more numerous and powerful, deny spiritual independence to the individual and seek to dictate his every conviction and purpose in life. It is no accident that the draft constitution is both to advance Iraqi tribes and clans" and eager to promote Islam. Freedom's intellectual preconditions do not exist in Iraq.



The Bible is the only book that reveals what our purpose in life is to be. Our purpose can be found nowhere else. We must learn to walk in harmony with God's Word.



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
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Volleyball season enters final week

If a hearing request is timely filed, the executive director will complete the technical review, issue a preliminary decision on the application, and a Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARINGYou may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 30 days from this notice, the executive director may approve the application. If no hearing request is received within this 30-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and permit number; (3) the statement "fl/we) request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the fall. If the request is made by a group or an association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing, and the interests which the group or association seeks to protect, must also be identified. You may also submit your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy you concerns. Requests for a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 30 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice may be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any request for contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a schouled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in this proceeding.


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
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Wheat Producers speak before Secretary Johanns

packed room when he visited Lubbock, Texas, last week to ask farmers what they liked and disliked about the 2002 Farm Bill. This was one of the USDA Listening Sessions being held across the country to plan for the 2007 Farm Bill. The Secretary began by thanking farmers for all they do for our country and played a pre-recorded message from President Bush. Then, Johanns sat on-stage taking notes and listening to producers' comments for over three hours

Two members of the Texas Wheat Producers Association (TWPA) were among the 48 people who had the opportunity to speak directly to the Secretary. These members were: Tulia farmer Tommy Womack, former President of the National Association of Wheat Growers (NAWG), and Wildorado farmer David Cleavinger, current Secretary

Womack carried the message that farm programs were of extreme importance to all producers in Texas and that to implement these programs, producers need face-to-face contact with FSA employees.

Cleavinger commented that he is looking forward to working with Secretary Johanns and Congress to make sure agriculture is not the next New Orleans, "The government was told by New Orleans that their levies were weak - now agriculture is telling you our levies are

The group consensus was clear — leave the 2002 Farm Bill alone; it is working. Every group involved in agriculture from across Texas

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The U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Mike Johanns, was greeted by parts of Oklahoma, Kansas and New Mexico, were represented. From a cotton farmer in Southwest Kansas, to a rice farmer in Wharton County to the Texas Citrus and Vegetable Association in the valley, a full spectrum of commodities were present to comment on the Farm Bill. Bankers, CPAs and tractor dealers came from across the state to support farmers and tell the Secretary that farm payments are important to their local economies.

Also present to hear producers' comments were Congressman Ted Poe, District 2, Congressman Mike Conaway, District 11, and Congressman Randy Neugebauer, District 19.

Fifty to seventy people were still standing in line to speak when the Secretary concluded the meeting by saying he still wanted to hear from those standing, either by mail, phone or the response section of the USDA Web site.

'My tours have been a remarkable journey across American agriculture," said Johanns.

Ninety-nine percent of those who spoke in Texas said they do not want payment limits, but in other parts of the country, producers have said otherwise, said Johanns. There is a lot of support for conservation in every state. I have heard no negative comments on the rural economic development program — It is for sure making a difference everywhere.

Johanns added, that the U.S. farmer must have trade; exports represent 27% of our market place. Two-thirds of American agriculture is not subsidized at all. For these people, their "safety net" will be in the form of trade

The producers were much more united in Texas, said Johanns. In other states, there has not been such a unified voice on any portion of the past farm bill, or future farm bills.

"I believe we have to be very thoughtful on how we approach farm policy to support all and I stress "all" in agriculture, because we are in this together...I believe that the nation's investment in agriculture is enormously good policy. It is absolutely the approach we should adopt," said Johanns.

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

Football Fever Started Early

Football fever began early in our school's history. Indeed we have a very proud heritage which now includes several generations of Friona Chieftains. In speaking to one of the second generation Chieftains, he stated that sometimes "the field itself was moveable in the wide open spaces of the town of Friona. "When the grass in one spot wore out, they just marked off another field!" Imagine being able to do that!

One such early team was the 1927-28 football team for the Chieftains. Team members included Arthur Baker, Earl Beasley, J. D. Curry, Harris Evans, Roy Hall, Bill Hamlin, Elvin Johnson, W.H. 'Shorty' Jones, Granville McFarland, Hadley Reeve, Eugene 'Pete' Richardson, Edward Spring and Otho Whitefield who was the captain. As we examine their now vintage gear, we notice the leather helmets, very limited padding, longsleeved shirts with no fancy emblems or numbers. As we look at their schedule, we can appreciate their won/loss record that year:
