TWENTY-ONE SPIES UNDER ARREST IN BRITISH ISLES

By Associated Press. London, Aug. 5.—Reginald McKenna the home secretary announced that twenty-one spies had been arrested in the British Isles during the last twenty-four hours, chiefly in important naval centers. The home secretary introduced a bill in the House of Commons to restrain the movement of undesirable aliens, with the object of facilitating the removal of spies. The measure was given a second reading. Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd-George announced in the House of Commons that the Bank of England rate was to be reduced to six per cent either tomorrow or Friday. The government he said had not yet decided to suspend specie payments.

ENGLAND BECOMES ACTIVE FACTOR IN CONFLICT, AND ISSUES CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS; WILSON OFFERS SERVICES TO NATIONS FOR PEACE

Today Witnesses War Moves in Practically All Of Europe

England's declaration of war came late Tuesday night when Germany failed to make satisfactory reply as to her intentions with respect to observance of neutrality of Belgium.

The United States today, through President Wilson, made an offer of good offices to the rulers of England, France, Russia, Germany and Austro-Hungary.

Events point to a great naval battle in the North Sea between English and German boats and England is apparently making ready for such a conflict.

A proclamation of what amounts to martial law has been issued by King George of England.

Great Britain is believed to be planning an expeditionary force, that is troops that would take the aggressive rather than the defensive.

Sweden continues preparations to defend her neutrality and has not replied to German and Russian notes regarding her attitude.

Austria is reported to have temporarily abandoned her invasion of Serbian territory and will use the troops to repel the Russians. Serbia, on the other hand, is said to be planning an invasion of Bosnia, the Slavic province in Southern Austria.

The Japanese premier declared that no Japanese fleet or army would be sent to Europe but great activity in the Japanese navy was noticed after the declaration of war between Germany and England.

Russian warships have captured a number of German merchant vessels in the Black Sea which is now isolated owing to the closing of the Dardanelles and Bosphorus by Turkey.

Russian troops were today in contact with the German army along the whole Russo-German border, while French and Germans touched on the French frontier.

Reports of a naval engagement off the Scottish coast were declared untrue by the British government.

The German cable was cut today between Europe and the Azores.

Preparations of the British navy were completed today and it was announced the government would seize foreign ships under construction in England.

The British public showed some anxiety about food supplies, which brought reassuring statements from the government. A scheme of control is to be introduced to regulate the prices.

The German ambassador had not left London today.

German troops are reported to have entered Dutch and Swiss territory.

London detectives arrested a number of Germans who are alleged to have been in possession of rifles and bombs.

The French authorities announced that seventeen Alsations desirous of reaching France from Germany, were shot by Germans.

The Belgian government announces the advance through Belgium of the Seventh and Tenth army corps.

The German fleet in the far east is said to have sailed from Tsing-Tau.

An embargo was placed by Germany on Russian funds in German banks.

WILSON OFFERS TO MEDIATE IN EUROPE

SENDS MESSAGE TO RULERS OF NEARLY ALL POWERS INVOLVED

By Associated Press. Washington, Aug. 5.—President Wilson has offered his good offices to all the European powers involved in war. The president has sent the following message to Emperor William, Emperor Nicholas, Emperor Francis Joseph, President Poincare and King George:

"As official head of one of the powers signatory to the Hague convention, I feel it to be my privilege and duty, under Article 3 of that convention to say to you in a spirit of most earnest friendship that I should welcome an opportunity to act in the interest of European peace, either now or any other time that might be thought more suitable, as an occasion to serve you and all concerned in a way that would afford me lasting cause for gratitude and happiness."

"WOODROW WILSON."

The offer was forwarded to the American embassies in the nations involved and through them transmitted to the governments. It was said at the White House that no intimation had been received that such an offer would be favorably received.

Hope For Acceptance.

President Wilson took the position that the European war was so stupendous that its effect on the entire world was liable to be so lasting that the United States, as one of the few large neutral powers, could not do otherwise than at least offer to be the means for bringing about peace. The proffer of good offices was not sent to Serbia and Montenegro because those countries are not parties to The Hague convention.

A hope that the president's offer might be accepted was prevalent in official circles because it is not necessary, under the convention, to change the present military status if they accept it.

Secretary Bryan has called a conference of all the European powers for late today when it is believed messages will be delivered supplementary to those of President Wilson, urging an acceptance of the tender of good offices.

STEAMER AT DOVER SAYS OCEAN FIRING WAS HEARD

Dover, Eng., Aug. 5.—The German steamer Franzhorn, on entering port here this afternoon reported that firing was audible in many directions but could give no definite information.

CABLE CONNECTION WITH GERMANY OFF

DIRECT LINE TO THAT COUNTRY CUT EAST OF AZORES TODAY

By Associated Press. New York, Aug. 5.—Direct cable connection with Germany was stopped today. The German Atlantic cable lines from New York to Emden via the Azores were cut about 1:30 a. m., at some point east of the Azores, possibly by British warships. The Commercial Cable Company which operates the American end of this line, made the announcement this morning of the cutting and refused to accept messages for Germany.

It was denied that the line had been cut by British warships on this side of the Atlantic. The cable was working, according to the announcement, as far as the Azores. Charles C. Adams, second vice president of the Commercial Cable Company said there was no trouble with the regular Commercial Cable Company's cables which run from New York to Serbia and then to points on the English coast. Communication with England over these lines still was being maintained. No hope was held out, however, for any immediate restoration of communication with Germany over the direct line.

The cutting of the German cable virtually completes the isolation of Germany from communication with the outside world, except insofar as messages may be exchanged by wireless. All direct communication with the United States is severed.

Hereafter all news of happenings in Germany will have to filter through hostile countries, Russia on the east, France on the west and England on the north. News of the cutting of the German line between Germany and England may be expected at any moment. Already these lands are in the hands of British authorities where they land on British territory. The only other possible outlet, telegraphically, for Germany, is to the east but on this side she is hemmed by Russia. All the land lines from Germany in every direction except to Austria-Hungary already have been severed.

The Atlantic Communication Company, a Germany wireless organization announced Saturday that it had closed for all private business having turned over its station at Sayville, Long Island to the German government.

BRITISH MINE SHIP IS SUNK BY GERMANS—DESTROYER ESCAPES

ENGLAND PREPARING FOR BIG NAVAL ENGAGEMENT

Public Buildings Converted Into Hospitals—Believed Expeditionary Force Will Be Sent Out

London, August 5.—Although five of the great European powers—Austria, England, France, Germany and Russia—are at war, and millions of men on land and sea are under arms ready to strike, developments of prime importance were few today.

In England preparations were rapidly completed for naval activities but the authorities would not permit any leakage as to military or naval movements. Several German steamships in British waters, some of them with German reservists on board, were declared prizes of war. The British government today commandeered the horses belonging to the express companies and big department stores, thus causing almost a suspension of business.

On the coast of the North Sea, where it had been erroneously reported that a naval battle was in progress last night, the British government has taken over all schools and public buildings for conversion into hospitals in readiness to receive the wounded men after the expected important battle between the German and English fleets.

Volunteers requested for the British army were taken as an indication that an expeditionary force was to be sent out.

German Troops Crossing French Frontier Repulsed

Paris, via London, August 5.—The French ministry of war today issued a communication stating that German cavalry and infantry were crossing the French frontier everywhere in reconnoitering parties. It adds:

"A squadron of German dragoons bore down on Villers-La-Montagne but were repulsed by French riflemen. A regiment of German cavalry advanced as far as Morfontaine but fell back before a fire of French infantry. The French mobilization is proceeding with the greatest order. An excellent spirit prevails in Alsace."

Santos-Dumont, famous aviator, offered his services today to the French government. The one-armed French general, Paul Pau, who fought in the war of 1870 has been placed in command of one of the French armies.

Belgium Prepares For Defense

By Associated Press.

Brussels, August 5.—German troops have crossed the Belgian frontier at Balhem, seven miles north of Liege; at Francorchamps and Stavelot, both about twenty-five miles to the southeast of Liege. A fight is believed to be in progress between the Belgians and Germans for possession of Fleron, six miles from Liege. The Belgian minister of war announces that the fortifications of Liege and the vicinity are firing vigorously at the German troops. Premier Debroqueville announced that all men trained in the past fifteen years had been called to the colors.

Invasion of Switzerland Reported

Paris, August 5.—It is reported from Montebeliard that the Germans have violated the neutrality of Switzerland.

LACK OF NATURALIZATION PAPERS MIGHT FORCE THEIR RETURN

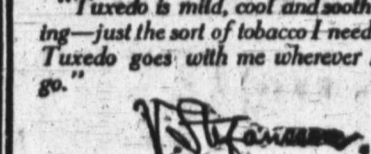

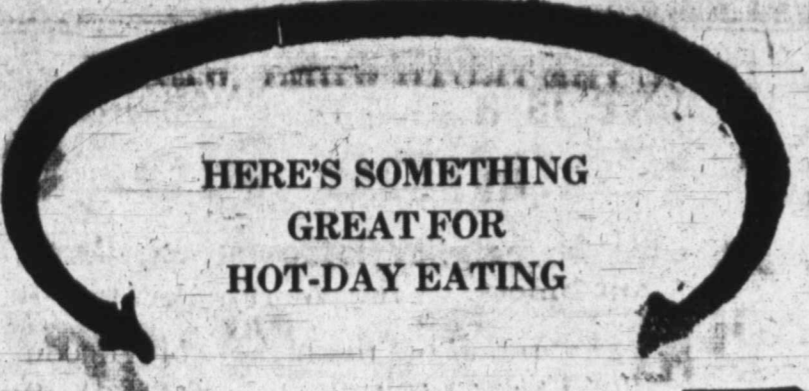

At The Theaters

The Lamar Air dome. Swor and Westbrook presented their new act of variety vaudeville last night to a large crowd at the Air dome, and will repeat it tonight. Swor is an extraordinary dancer and has the happy faculty of seeming to enjoy his work immensely. Miss Westbrook has a remarkable voice and sang several of the latest Broadway hits. The picture for tonight is a three-reel Universal special, "Dead Men's Tales."

The Gem. A Kalem comedy, "The Box Car Bride," tells the amusing story of a couple of elopers who are stranded twenty miles away from home, without gasoline, and the boy has given all his money to the mistress. They start to walk, but an open box car and get into it. It happened that the boy's father is president of the road and had just issued an order that all persons caught riding unlawfully shall be prosecuted and a reward of five dollars given for every arrest made. The conductor finds the bride and groom and promptly arrests the reticent to listen to any explanations. With two other hoboes they are brought before the president of the road. The situation is explained, but not until a number of laughable incidents occur. A two-reel Lubin, "The Crowning Glory," and two Lubin split reel comedies complete the program.

The Empress. "The Perils of Pauline" is the chief attraction here. Two Pathe comedies, both farces of the sidesplitting variety, are also shown.

Rescued from the savage Indians, Pauline promises Harry to be good and not get mixed up in any more adventures. But she finds it impossible to long endure the quiet life of the ranch, and as a harmless experiment they all agree to let her take part in moving pictures. She goes to Pathe Freres, finds Chief Director Gasnier, and is taken along on a side trip to Devil's Island as one of the angels in the production of "Paradise Lost." Business affairs keep Harry back temporarily, and Owen, who has booked himself as one of the "lost souls," leaves Hicks behind to hold Harry on the mainland. At last when Harry is ready to go he finds that the regular steamer has sailed. He gets a fast motor boat, but the owner has been bribed by Hicks, and he maroons Harry on a desert island. On Devil's Island the production of "Paradise Lost" has started, and a young disolute player named Booth has become enamored of Pauline. Owen sees an opportunity and arranges to carry her away. In the nick of time to prevent this scoundrelly abduction Harry scrambles up on the shore from an improvised raft on which he has made the trip from the island on which he was marooned.

Rushing up, he knocks Booth out. Pauline flees away to the shore, sees a hydroplane, speaks to the pilot who agrees to take her to the mainland. They have barely started, however, when the pilot lights a cigarette. The match he carelessly tosses away, lights on one of the wings and in a few moments the machine is in flames. Coward that he is, he grabs the only parachute and leaves Pauline to her fate. Quite equal to the emergency, however, Pauline reaches the plane and lands in safety, fully determined to take no further part in such foolish experiences. She has not reckoned, however, upon the villainous plans which Owen and Hicks are perfecting for her destruction.

The Majestic. "Quits," a Melies two-reel drama, "Andy Goes a Pirating," in which Andy's lurid taste in literature leads him to forsake the humdrum life as office boy for the more exciting one of a pirate on the "boonding main." His adventures end on an untimely end, but shies at the sight of bombs. Knows his trepidation, the Professor decides to test his courage, which he does in his own parlor with a bomb. Thereupon Luke determines to get even and goes after the Professor in divers ways. He disguises himself and comes in the presence of the Professor lighting a cigarette with a stick of dynamite. The Professor runs for his life, but his path is blocked by a Nihilist waving a butcher knife. The Professor is next captured and bound to a tree and a bomb is placed at his feet. He is nearly wild from suspense when help arrives in the form of Luke, who fearlessly seizes the bomb and throws it into the woods. It falls near a tramp, who picks it up, examines it carefully and then breaks it against a rock. It turns out to be a coconut, and the hungry bum eats the contents with gusto. Luke, who is ingenious, was the man with the bomb, and later naturally captures the Professor's daughter, who assisted him as the Nihilistic lady.

The Victoria. "Remorse," a two-reel, Thanhouser is showing today. The story is as follows: His uniform, that of a private of the Salvation Army, proclaimed his calling and this is the story he told: "I was once the pride of my father and mother—had many opportunities many young men lacked and the future looked bright. PROBABLE SCENE OF THE FIRST GREAT BATTLE AT SEA

Three widely scattered points in the map of the world have already been marked as the probable scene of the first naval clashes between the powers in the impending struggle. They are:

First point of contact: Waters of Northern Europe, here are massed: First and second home fleets, of the British navy ready to operate in the North Sea, the Atlantic and the Baltic.

German high sea fleet with eyes on the North and Baltic Seas. Russian Baltic fleet.

(France has no battle fleet in Northern Europe or Atlantic waters).

Second point of contact: The Mediterranean—five warships of the powers are massed as follows: British fleet with four battle cruisers and four light cruisers.

French fleet (dominant in these waters) with the first, second and reserve squadrons of battleships totaling sixteen and six armored cruisers.

Italian fleet with the first and second squadrons and the training squadron of battleships totaling ten and the first and second squadron of armored cruisers, six in all.

Austrian fleet with the first and reserve squadrons of battleships, totaling seven ships.

Each of the above fleets is accompanied by a full complement of torpedo boats and destroyers.

Third point of contact: In the Orient: Great Britain, Germany and France are ready for action, with the royal navy dominant and the Japanese navy ready to enlist to aid her ally under the Anglo-Japanese alliance should this become necessary. The strength of the powers in these waters is divided thus: British fleet, with the China, East Indian and Australian squadrons commanded by Vice Admiral Jerram numbering one battleship, one battle cruiser, two armored cruisers and six light cruisers with a number of small detached ships.

German squadron numbering two armored cruisers, three light cruisers and two smaller ships.

France has but two small armored cruisers in these waters.

According to the statements filed, Ferguson's campaign expenses were \$31,424.63. That of Colonel Ball about \$12,900.

No man who has ever succeeded in gaining the Democratic nomination for governor has a better opportunity than Mr. Ferguson to give the state a genuine business administration, and if he will only put his foot on the necks of peanut politicians and peanut politics he can carry out his promises to the people. Texas has been needing such a governor for a long while.

There seems nothing for Uncle Sam to do now except to quietly stand by and watch the scrap. Another case of patiently watching and waiting, and that's a whole lot better than fighting, especially when there is little to be gained and a great deal to lose. This reminds us once more that we have a great President, who is showing his greatness in every official act.

Perhaps if our county commissioners would appropriate a sufficient amount of money to install a few electric fans in the court house it would make it more pleasant and comfortable for those who are compelled to attend court and serve on juries during this kind of weather. Besides this, it is often the case that the court house is used for public meetings, and the district court room is frequently, on such occasions, crowded to the suffocation point. Electric fans would come in handy at such times. The commissioners themselves would find it more comfortable in the discharge of their duties if electric fans were installed. The cost would amount to very little compared to the comfort it would afford.

Cyclone Davis and Jeff McLemore are to be the two congressmen-at-large from Texas. The first mentioned is a bright, brilliant man, and at the present writing an extreme pro. The latter is a newspaper man, and we might add, one of the very brightest in the state. He is an anti-prohibitionist of the extreme variety, and that he led Davis a few thousand votes is probably due to the fact that in some of the anti-pro strongholds throughout the state the anti endorsed only one candidate for congressman-at-large, Mr. McLemore, and when it came to voting single-shot for him, Davis is probably the best debater in the state. On some subjects, he has no equal, and when the privilege of representing Texas on the floors of the National Congress is granted him, the people throughout the nation will hear from him and he will become a national character. In fact, he is already that.

THE INFAMOUS FEE SYSTEM.

A contributor to Farm and Ranch takes a fall out of the infamous fee system, which for many years has been the most highly perfected and scientific system of legalized robbery with which a long suffering people have been forced to contend. In the course of his treatment of the subject he pays his respects to the court reporter, who for some unaccountable reason, has been armed by law with a privateer's license which enables him to levy the heaviest and most unjust tribute upon litigants of any of the fat-fee-eating hens who enjoy sinecures under the provisions of law which authorizes them to make all citizens stand and deliver.

It may not be generally known, but the fact is that the court reporter's fees under the operation of the present fee system often exceed the fees of attorneys engaged in cases of minor importance. In hundreds of divorce cases which are uncontested, a fee of \$3 in each case is taxed for the court reporter for an average of fifteen minutes service in taking testimony in

shorthand, which is never written out and is no earthly use to either the courts or litigants. The average cost of statements of facts containing the evidence adduced in a district court case is from \$25 to \$50 each. The charges allowed other attaches of the court, while not proportionately extortionate, are in themselves a species of legalized robbery which is a disgrace. This writer illustrates the workings of the fee system by a comparison made in two similar cases, one of which was tried in Texas and the other in Oklahoma. The total cost in the Texas case amounted to the sum of \$175, as against a total cost of \$25 in the Oklahoma case, in which the work done far exceeded that in the former. While it is generally conceded that the costs in Federal courts are not open to the criticism of being merely nominal, those of Texas courts covering the same character of service are from 50 to 100 per cent higher.—Austin American.

THE SPEED MANIA.

There can be no doubt that the automobile has climbed to first place among modern vehicles; and, that more of them are being sold and used than anything that runs upon four wheels.

This within itself is good for the manufacturers and retail dealers, but not for the purchasers, with but few exceptions. If the auto craze could be confined to utility and practical purposes, there would be no reason to complain. But it seems that otherwise safe and sane people are attacked by the speed mania, and soon forget that public highways are made for any other purpose but for joy riders to hit the high places.

This speed mania is causing all reputable newspapers to sound a note of warning and all municipalities to pass laws regulating traffic.

But neither warnings or traffic laws appeal to speeders.

And now comes the Nation Council for Industrial Safety and promulgates these rules:

- 1. Be considerate. 2. Go slow; (1) Passing children; (2) passing vehicles; (3) approaching crossings; (4) turning corners. 3. Stop: (1) At railroad crossings; (2) behind street cars. 4. Use chains on slippery pavements. 5. When in doubt—go slow or stop. By what magnification of type, by what relief of raised enameled letters, by what brilliance of colors can these rules be impressed upon the mind of a multitude of devil-wagoners? People that mean well, but are too ready to take chances. If they won't spare their own lives they might at least refrain from taking chances with those of their persons.

OBSERVER.

A dispatch from Dallas says that pro leaders are already arranging to secure a man to run against Ferguson two years hence. Those pro leaders had better "back up." Ferguson has been nominated last amount to election. It is time for every last citizen of Texas to hope that his administration for the first two years will be such as to entitle him to a second term without opposition. We fought for Ball, but Ferguson won by a clear majority in a two-handed race. And now that he has won, it seems to us, we who supported Ball, should be content to wait and see and to give Mr. Ferguson a chance to demonstrate the correctness of the statements of his partisans or of his critics. But to begin now to arrange for opposition to his second term is not only foolishness from a political standpoint, but it is unjust to the voters of the state. Give him a chance to make good.—Denton Record and Chronicle.

It occurs to this paper that this is the correct light in which all supporters of Colonel Ball should view this matter. Give Ferguson a fair chance during his first term and he will make good. That should entitle him to a second term without opposition.

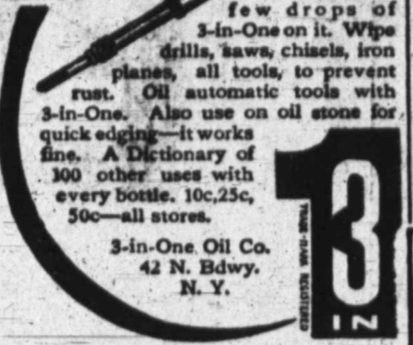

IMPROVEMENT EXPECTED IN GRAIN CONDITIONS HERE

Local grain dealers are expecting an early improvement in conditions in the grain market. A report reached here this morning that the British government had guaranteed against war risks on shipments of wheat in English bottoms to English ports and had ordered the Canadian Pacific Steamship Company's ships to load with grain for English ports.

The price remained at seventy cents here today and very little wheat is coming in. In Oklahoma the price has dropped to sixty cents. An effort is being made to have the ships in the harbor load with wheat and remain loaded in the harbor until it is safe for them to proceed on their voyages. This would relieve the congestion at the elevators but so far the shipowners have not agreed to do this.

One local concern has more than 90,000 bushels of wheat tied up on account of the war trouble and other concerns in this section have considerable wheat in the cars or in elevators on which they have been unable to realize. Under this condition they are urging the farmers not to deliver any more wheat than absolutely necessary to them.

SOUNDS LIKE NAVAL FIGHT TODAY ON COAST OF MAINE

Firing of Heavy Guns Heard at Portland—Warships Believed To Be Near There

By Associated Press. Portland, Maine, Aug. 5.—The firing of heavy guns off the Maine coast was heard early today. Eight or ten shots within two minutes were heard shortly before 7 o'clock by the keeper of Portland observatory. The sound seemed to come from a point twenty-five or thirty miles southeast of Portland and probably in the vicinity of Sequin Island. The shots also were heard at the harbor fort and at points between here and Bath.

Next November 3, Ohio will be known as the second state east of the Mississippi to give its women the franchise that is their right."

AMERICANS IN LONDON ARE MAKING BEST OF SITUATION

Prospects For Getting Steamer Home Are Very Slim and Everybody is Homesick

London, Aug. 5.—Today's developments marked the passing of "it isn't loaded" element among the Americans who are stranded in London. Even at the latest last night there were plenty of "humorists" whose nationalities made them feel secure against personal inconvenience however the fortunes of war might go—but they have been disappointed.

Every hotel lobby is full of men and women who sit about silently, speaking only to ask one question: "Is there any chance of getting out?" The wildest kind of rumors are being circulated. One grave faced San Franciscoan who had just arrived from Berlin declared that he had authentic information that Germany would have an army of 3,500,000 soldiers in the field within a fortnight instead of 4,500,000, which the English journals give as the Fatherland's war strength. Despite the patent absurdity of such a statement, this and others equally ridiculous are being accepted literally by the Americans, who are beginning to be genuinely alarmed at the possibility of a German invasion.

The American embassy, open all day, was thronged with anxious tourists, all bent on the same mission—to obtain definite assurance that it will be possible to get a liner to take them to New York this week. No such assurances could be given, but the probability of an American battleship or army transports being sent to take home the United States citizens was pointed out.

All day long the streets have been thronged with men and women who ordinarily would have been miles out of London enjoying a three-day vacation known as bank holiday, and they are now, at midnight, in Fleet street. The Strand is packed with restless crowds who wander about undecided where to go or what to do.

THREE-CENT FARES AN ISSUE IN ELECTION AT TOLEDO

Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 4.—A special election is in progress here today to decide on the proposed \$8,000,000 bond issue, for the purchase of the street railway system and its allied utilities—the power, gas and heating plants. Labor organizations are behind the project and the voting today followed a spirited campaign of preliminary appeals to the people. The street car company several months ago refused to lower its fares to three cents, even though the city council so ordered. The council consequently held up the franchise grants and the controversy remains in litigation. The election today will either close or reopen the three-cent fare issue.

Mrs. Ammerman says she welcomes any investigation of her official conduct. "She denies with vehemence, however, that her fancy work has interfered with the conduct of her office. "That charge is merely brought by opponents of woman suffrage because the charge looks good in print," laughingly said Mrs. Ammerman.

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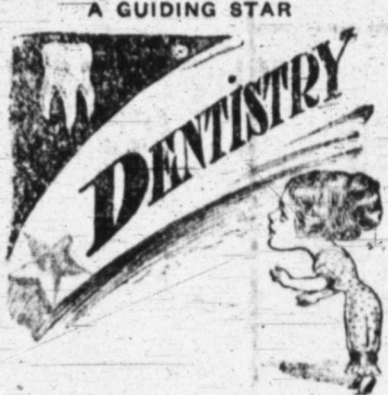

OSTEOPATHS MEETING IN ANNUAL SESSIONS
Philadelphia, Aug. 4.—The eighteenth annual convention of the American Osteopathic Association opened here today at the Bellevue-Stratford with 3,000 delegates in attendance. Mayor Blankenship of Philadelphia extended the official welcome for the city and Governor Tenor performed the same office as head of the state government. Dr. P. H. Ferguson's Nomination Costs Twice as Much as Four Years' Salary

Belton, Texas, Aug. 5.—James E. Ferguson will receive \$8,000 as salary from the State for the two years he is to serve as governor; if he should be reelected at the end of two years, as most Texas governors are, he will get a total of \$16,000.00 as his wage. It cost him \$31,424.63 to secure the Democratic nomination for governor, according to his statement of campaign expenses filed in this city. In other words, he has already paid out nearly twice as much as he can hope to receive from the State in salary, not counting what it will cost him to be renominated in 1916, and it will cost him something, even if he is unopposed.

The chief items are printing literature, newspaper advertising, and paying for poll tax lists, \$14,951.15; stamps \$3,290.50; auto hire, hotel bills and railway fares \$2,729.05; speakers' traveling expenses and hotel bills, \$4,707.15; telephone, telegraph and express \$1,802.47; campaign buttons \$957.33; other publicity expenses \$422.15; salaries of clerks, stenographers and office expenses, including railway fare, hotel bills, and all other expenses were \$325.

The statement shows that all expenses were paid by Ferguson. No one contributed one cent. In addition to the above, Ferguson filed a personal expense account of \$884.30, of which \$260 was for hotel bills and the balance for railway fares and auto hire.

DECREASE IN OVERDRAFTS IN STATE BANKS SHOWN

Austin, Texas, Aug. 5.—W. W. Collier, state commissioner of insurance and banking, has announced a decrease of \$2,634,949 in overdrafts by the 973 state banks of Texas. Mr. Collier, it was stated today, has sought to stamp out the practice of overdrafts. The comptroller of the currency here also favors discontinuing this practice.

Cleveland, Ohio, Aug. 4.—The greatest "wet" and "dry" campaign ever staged in Ohio began in earnest today when the "dry" forces filed at the office of the secretary of state a proposed constitutional amendment abolishing the present county local option law, and establishing the township and municipality as the unit in future liquor legislation.

Lines are closely drawn and each side will put forth every effort in the fight for its life. The anti-saloon league has been at work throwing out its forces in every village in the state, and its chief opponents, divisions of the personal liberty league, have taxed every resource to stem the tide of temperance in Ohio. The question promises to have considerable bearing on, if it does not completely overshadow the campaign for governor.

Seattle, Washington, August 5.—To draw a clear line of demarcation between the Republican and Progressive parties; to prove "that the Progressives intend to maintain a separate and distinct political organization, and to put a complete Bull Moose ticket in the field in every county in the state for the September primary election were the chief objects of the state Progressive convention which opened here today.
