## The Law & You

*Do you know that a person nineteen to twenty-one years of age can be made of full legal age, except for the right to vote, by Court order?*

When a minor between the ages of nineteen and twenty-one years can show to the Court that he is fully capable of handling his own business, the Court may enter an order granting him the right to do so. The minor then becomes fully responsible for his acts, and contracts as if he had attained the age of twenty-one.

The Court will not indiscriminately enter such order but upon proper application, and a showing to the Court that there is a necessity for such authority to so act in his own behalf. The Court may in his own discretion enter such an order.

This proceeding is known as "removing the disabilities of minority." The order having been granted, the minor may do and perform any and all legal acts, just as if he had reached the age of 21 years, except that he may not vote until he reaches the age of 21 years. ## Weekly Book Review

**"Christmas Without Johnny" by Gladys Hasty Carroll is Deemed Good Reading For Any Season of the Year, Anywhere**

Gladys Hasty Carroll's new book "Christmas Without Johnny" seems to be a misnomer and one with a depressing title and should read "What Would Christmas Be Without Johnny?" It is a year round book with a happy ending during the Christmas season. It is a worthwhile, thought-provoking, little story of a nine year old boy who is a very sensitive and imaginative, who needs love and understanding. But his mother is busy with the house and his baby sister while his father has been holding down a job in town and running the farm so had no time for his son, though they do love him. His teacher at school was overwhelmed and too busy with routine to give him the special attention he so badly needed, and barely realized in time, her neglect. Even a Sunday school teacher who is jealous of another, hurts the boy, because of this. Then a few days before Christmas something happens to make them all realize what it would be like, without Johnny. All the time Johnny was trying to figure out what he could do to make people like him, and make his parents and teacher to love him as he so needed. Teachers and parents could learn a lot from the story and enjoy it at the same time. Here is a child that is unusual and seemingly misunderstood, at least he is enough different to be in a special class. And most groups of any size will have a boy or girl like this, to a degree. He suffered at the hands of all except his little friend, Linda, and only she seemed to understand and love him enough to fight for him when he would not fight for himself. He could not hate, no matter what they said and did to him or how much they failed to understand and neglect him. Mrs. Carroll has the ability to show the working of a small boy's mind and should be of great help to those interested in psychology of children. It is a story to be welcomed by parents, grandparents, teachers, church workers and friends of children anywhere. One teacher thought it was so good that she rechecked and read it to her class. She is an understanding teacher and in reading this to the class gave them an insight into boys and girls natures which might differ from their own. And would also show them that parents and teachers do not mean to be misunderstanding if younger folk do think so at times. The Christmas season gave Johnny a chance to show those about him his love for them, even if it did occur in an unusual manner and those about him every day realized what Christmas would have been without Johnny if things had not happened just as they did to let them know in time.

### No Blanket Deferment Given for Farm Workers

Emphasizing that the draft law provides no blanket deferment for farm workers, Brigadier General Paul Wakefield, state Selective Service director, has declared that local boards are required both by law and regulation to consider each agricultural worker's case individually, just as other men's cases are considered. General Wakefield said that regulations issued by the President provide for a deferred classification for farm workers only when the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the local board:

1. The man must be "employed in the production for market of a substantial quantity of those agricultural commodities which are necessary to the maintenance of the national health, safety or interest."
2. "The production for market of a substantial quantity of agricultural commodities should be measured in terms of the average annual production per farm worker which is marketed from a local average farm of the type under consideration. The production of agricultural commodities for consumption by the worker and his family, or traded for subsistence purposes, should not be considered as production for market. Production which is in excess of that required for the subsistence of the farm families on the farm under consideration should be considered as production for market."

The state director observed that "this still doesn't give the complete picture," and added that a man, to be eligible for farm deferment, must also meet the requirements in the section of the Selective Service regulations defining necessary employment.

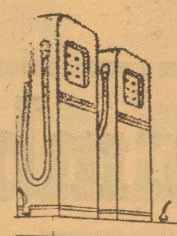
