## Rain Wednesday Evening Brings Varied Amounts of Moisture in Parmer County

One and One-Half Inch Is Heaviest Reported

Scattered rains fell over Parmer County late yesterday afternoon to bring sizable amounts of moisture in some sections.

Moisture in the Friona area varied from three-quarters inch to one and one-half inches. Leo McLellan, living two miles west of town, reported one and one-quarter inches.

Bovina had about a half-inch fall, with Farwell receiving one-fourth. Clovis had slightly more, with thirty-five hundredths recorded.

Black experienced only a shower, as did points in the north and northwest sections of the county.

Considerable hail fell at Hereford, but no damage has been reported, as the stones were of pellet size.

The moisture will benefit some of the wheat, although much of the crop has been written off due to drought, green bug, and oatworm infestation.

In other sections of the Southwest, the dismal wheat picture has been further clouded by brown aphids, rust, and mosaic disease.

Efforts to check the insect damage by spraying and dusting and the importation of parasites have brought varying results, but may lead to a definite long range control program.

Much of the local acreage usually kept in wheat is being prepared for cotton and grain sorghums, with the largest cotton acreage in the county history probable.

## Friona School Lunch Room Lauded Highly in Texas Education Report

The Friona School System received more commendations this week with signal recognition of its lunchroom operation.

In a letter from the District School Lunch Supervisor, Stella E. Peeks of Texas Technological College, stated:

"After a routine visit to your school, I wish to commend you (Superintendent Caffey) and your lunchroom staff for your above average School Lunch Program.

"Observation on March 14 and your file of menus served has shown that you are serving nutritious, palatable lunches which more than meet the requirements as set up by the National School Lunch Program. The fact that you serve hot breads and fresh fruits and vegetables often, as well as a complete protein as a main dish four times per week is outstanding. In view of rising food costs, I feel that you are able to do this as a result of careful management, good use of government commodities, and wholesale buying.

"You are fortunate to have a competent lunchroom supervisor and congenial lunchroom personnel who are eager to please the children in your school.

"The practice of making and keeping a daily record of commodities and supplies used is business-like and helpful in showing where food supplies are

being used and, for future reference, in preparing the same dishes again. This is an idea which I intend to pass on to other schools."

## Parmer Is Included In Water Reservoir

All of Parmer, Hale, Lubbock, and Swisher counties and parts of 17 other High Plains counties are included in an underground water reservoir designated by the State Board of Water Engineers.

The designation was delivered by James S. Guleke, member of the board, at a meeting Thursday in Lubbock of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, which had petitioner for the definition determine boundaries of a proposed underground water conservation district.

Included in the reservoir are parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Oldham, Potter, Randall, Terry and Cochran counties.

A map showing the exact boundaries of the reservoir has been filed in the county seat of each county.

The designation clears the way off the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association to petition the Board of Water Engineers to create an underground water conservation district.

The association will draw up petitions and forward them to each county represented in the reservoir designation. As soon as the petitions are signed, they will be mailed to the Board of Water Engineers.

When created, the proposed district will carry out a water conservation program through proper spacing of wells, prevention of pollution, educational programs and re-charging.

In making the designation, the Board pointed out that the proposed district will be the first of its kind in the world. Embracing about 13,000,000 acres, the High Plains pool is also the largest underground reservoir in the world.

# Editorial . . . .

## Will Your Boy be Placed on the Firing Fronts of Asia and Europe Simply Because he Flunked the New "Intelligence" Tests Promised by H.S.T. and His Clan in Washington?

The "bright boys" are to be draft exempt! Though no surprise to us, the announcement of the student draft deferment plans made over the week-end still was startling.

Likely some readers will take personal exception or offense when we condemn this practice, but we are most impersonal, and denounce the system for what we believe are gross injustices imposed.

First: Is the United States Army a penal institution or a national home for intellectual "weaklings"? It is not and it never will be. That boy alongside me in the Philippines or New Guinea might not have made but 45 on his mid-term exam back at school, but he passed a greater test cum laude on the battlefield. But under the new ruling that same boy would be laboring under a stigma imposed by some theo-

rist who segregated him from the "bright boys, worth keeping alive in the university halls" when they called him to the service of his country. God forbid!

Second: If actually there is need of American youth both to the Pacific and Atlantic sides of our country, sent there in "desperate need of preserving democracy" as the militarists and some state department jokers proclaim, then why not take all alike? We do not minimize the value of academic education, but please, let's not set up a national I. Q. to segregate the student from the boys up front.

This appears just another blunder, so similar to the Marine episode, of some months ago where in the President minimized the efforts of those boys.

Let's see to it that our congressmen know our viewpoints.

### More Disillusion

A cartoon appearing in a Texas daily intrigued us this week. Pictured was the lady buying a premium priced steak, explaining "I thought a big, thick, juicy steak might make George forget our financial troubles."

Original? No, probably not; likely she had been observing the barker in the greatest show on earth—the political show, that is, right here in the United States. It's just the same principle as the politician placating his flock, or the political barker at his side-show calling "Stand back, folks, don't crowd, our new-way liniment will remove the wrinkles and fever from your brow, let the government do the thinking, go on in the shade folks, and who will be the next person to have a bottle?"

Several years ago we began to disillusion ourselves, with the guidance of the Washington manipulators, that over-spending and inflation was just the thing, so long as immediate hand-outs were forthcoming. Special handouts were devised for this group and that clique, finally getting around to most everyone that could wield the voting pencil.

And it is up to you and to myself to call "halt" as such is the task placed before us of our own making. Distasteful, yes, but not to be

avoided or prolonged by more spending. In recent years the power of government has been expanded step by step and the responsibility of the people has shrunk proportionately. Our public payrolls have become a parking place for bureaucrats, breast-beaters, world-savers, and just plain gratters. More and more the people have been made to feel their utter helplessness and dependence upon government, which leads us from one crisis to another, and even from one war to another. Our government is now in the process of creating a tremendously large budget so that it can pass out enough patronage and pork to keep itself in power.

The United States and local governments as founded by our forefathers was sound to its roots. But we're bungling. It is sad to think little can be done about it until 1952. But let's find "boys capable of leadership" to fill the necessary government posts at that time, from local area to state and national offices. It's not too early to give this careful consideration.

Someone has said that we're only sure of two things, death and taxes. Anyway the death rate doesn't increase every time Congress meets.



## Weekly Book Review

### "If You Had two Small Bookcases to Fill" Presents Choice Selection of Books As Chosen by Author Preston for Sister

Anyone who reads a great deal or would love to read more, some time or other has been asked, or has considered, what his top favorites would be in reading matter of permanent value.

Recently Edward Preston made just such a selection for his sister who was moving into a small apartment and had only two small bookcases to fill. Some of the books were ones that he knew she would have special interest in and the others he had added to give a full rounded out program of reading for information and to become a well versed individual.

First on the list is the Bible. Of it he says most people read it somewhat but he suggests that world's masterpieces of literature. He recommends the Pocket Edition which is edited from a literary standpoint and "is divided into sections of prose, poetry, fiction and drama. "After that it is likely that it will be better read as a whole and more often by those who now read it very little if at all.

As a basis of much great writing he suggested "Bullfinch's many short stories that makes delightful reading. A collection of the most known mythology in the world from the Greeks to present day folk lore.

"The Portable Greek Reader" was chosen because it is in a brief and readable form giving the thought and history that produced Western civilization. There are selections from the great Greek Philosophers, historians and dramatists which have been translated for you.

To make Roman history easy reading Preston has recommended Thornton Wilder's novel,

"The Ides of March" in lieu of the more difficult reading of Gibbon's "Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire."

Representative of the middle ages he chose Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales" in modern English and a historical novel, "The Corner that Held Them" by Sylvia Townsend Warner.

Because of his sister's interest in drama and especially Shakespeare he suggested that she buy and reread the Cambridge edition which is complete but added too, that she get a book from the Barnes and Noble outline series titled "Outlines of Shakespeare's Plays."

Authors from the nineteenth century not to be missed because of their time, tempo and thought are Melville, author of "Moby Dick" and Dostoyevsky who wrote, "The Brothers Karamazov."

For American background, Thoreau was chosen for his "Walden," Walt Whitman for his "Leaves of Grass" and Thomas Wolfe for "Look Homeward, Angel."

Another interest of the sister in social and political scene prompted Preston to advise "The Last Time I Saw Paris" by Elliot Paul and the "Confessions of a European Intellectual" by Franz Schoenberner and one of the Lanny Budd novels by Upton Sinclair.

For the fine arts, in music he suggested "The Victor Book of the Symphony" by Charles O'Connell and in the history of Art, "Art Through the Ages" by Helen Gardner.

And in closing the author says, "The books I selected have proved such an intellectual stimulus to my sister that I have begun re-reading some of them myself.

## The Law & You

By Robt. (Bob) Kirk

DO YOU KNOW whether being intoxicated will excuse you for a criminal offense you may commit?

Intoxication is no defense to a criminal charge. Even if temporary insanity results from the voluntary use of alcohol or narcotics, it is not a defense. The fact the Defendant has voluntarily used liquor or drugs and has allegedly reached a condition or state of mind in which he did not know what he was doing, will not excuse him for his actions which violate the laws while in such a condition.

On his trial for an offense committed while in a state of intoxication which results in temporary insanity, evidence may be presented to show what

his condition was at the time of the offense, and the jury will be instructed by the Court that they may consider such facts, for the purpose of determining the extent of punishment to be not consider the same with respect to his guilt or innocence, given the Defendant, but shall testimony merely as to drunkenness is not admissible as a defense or to lessen the punishment, but intoxication of such a nature as to render the individual temporarily insane may be introduced, which the jury may consider in determining the punishment.



It has been rather quiet during the past week around the Capitol. This is due to the recess of the House for a ten-day period. It is the lull before the storm, as the manpower bill will be on the Floor next week from all indications, and this is to be quite a controversial issue. The House committee has rewritten a major portion of the Senate version of this legislation. Indications are that the draft age is going to be a highly controversial matter. There will also be amendments undertaking to fix the power to send troops overseas, which is the question now being debated in a separate bill. The final version of this legislation is going to have a tremendous impact on world events. This Congress is being watched by all foreign powers with a great deal of interest. Events in the next three months will determine the course of this country for a long period to come. These events will definitely have a bearing in the period during which the preparedness program will continue. The approach of the UN forces to the 38th parallel in Korea brings closer to hand the decision of great importance. The question that this country faces or has faced since it was crossed last fall. The potential all-out war with China may well depend upon the correct answer to this question. It is certainly as important to China as it is to this country, if not more so. History reveals that there has never been a time when there was a unified China. The Red forces fully realize this and it is causing them great concern. A peaceful settlement by Mao at this juncture would be one of the greatest steps in history toward world peace. If he can save his face by ceasing hostilities, it will no doubt be done. If he does not feel that he can save his face, he will let every Red Chinaman die before he gives his cease fire order.

Actually these two statements are not in conflict. There is no question but that the public in many sections of the country has permitted the recent successes in Korea to create a feeling of security. This could prove detrimental to the preparedness program, but it has not had that effect to date. This Congress is not going to relax the preparedness program by reason of any temporary successes. We all realize that the salvation of this country and our way of life is going to depend upon the immediate building of a strong military force and that this force is essential as a backdrop in any peace negotiations with any aggressor nations.



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
