WEATHER

Moderate north winds have prevailed for the last two days, with scattered showers falling over the area. However, no appreciable moisture has been reported, with local conditions being very dry.

Wheat prospects have dimmed greatly, with Parmer County in line with others in the general report indicating that the entire wheat belt will see little more than 15,000,000 acres harvested. Farmers are preparing to substitute a huge acreage of cotton, grain sorghums, and some newer crops to this area.

On December 1, 1950, the government forecast a wheat yield in the 6-state wheat belt of 487, 016,000 bushels; present estimate is far lower at 273,000,000 bushels.

Martin, Fulcher, and Burnett Herds in Lead

W. E. Martin took high honors with his Holstein herd in the April tests of the Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement Association.

"Pet", a Holstein of the Martin herd, was high producer, showing a total of 2360 lbs milk, testing 3.2 buterfat to give 71 lbs of butter for the month. His entire herd showed an average of 1040 lbs milk; 36.3 average lbs. buterfat.

Runner-up herds were those of Martin Fulcher and D. C. Burnett, both Brown Swiss. Fulcher's herd averaged 832 lbs milk and 34.6 buterfat; that of Burnett's showed 757 lbs milk and 28.2 lbs buterfat.

Second high producer was a Brown Swiss, Florence, belonging to Burnett, producing 1940 lbs milk, testing 4.2, netting 81 lbs of buterfat for the month. Burnett's Florence was his buterfat producer, followed by W. E. Martin's Holstein, Pet.

Seventeen herds are now under test in the association, according to supervisor Leroy Stuart. Through the facilities of the organization, herd improvement is effected through emphasis on feeding according to production, the culling of boarder cows, the proving and stalling of herd bulls, careful attention to calving, breeding, and drying off dates, and the selection of the best heifer replacements, states Joe W. Jones, Parmer County Agent.

Several Observances During May Call to Our Attention That the Most Effective Bulwark of Democracy is the American Home, the Daily Family Life of Each Citizen

Coincidental or not, this week is being observed the nation over as "Family Week" ending with "Mother's Day" in the month designated as "Americanism" month.

To us, there is a distinct tie between these three observances. Certainly everyone throughout the United States is very much aware of need for return to true "Americanism". Recent bickerings and bungling on the national levels, all with world-wide implications, have brought home the fact to most of us that a strong Americanism is of definite necessity, just as much so as when we first cut our English apron strings or when we battled with Nazism.

How can we best inculcate the inherent privileges and obligations of "Americanism", or democracy if you had rather call it so, in the minds and lives of this generation and succeeding ones? We believe several implements are very effective, such as freedom of the press, the secret ballot, right of trial by jury, etc., but most effective of all is the American home.

Few of us accomplish feats that did not have

some inception or background in our home life. A successful double life is quite difficult, with most of our actions governed by the simple practices and habits and ideals within our own home. For this reason, we believe it especially appropriate that "Family Week" fall within that month dedicated to study of Americanism.

There is no substitute for home life and cooperation within the family for battling any problem, for gaining any end, or for developing the stamina needed in our every endeavor. The child who has been brought up in the home wherein the highest ideals of Americanism were daily recognized and emphasized, where the Christian principles were accepted and studied, and where loving brothers, sisters, fathers and mothers all lended a hand in developing abundant and wholesome living . . . that child not only is fortunate, but he or she is our greatest defense against the ravages and in-roads of communism or any of the "isms" that tend to destroy the most precious of our possessions — American citizenship.

Congratulations are definitely due the Modern Study Club of Friona.

Our immediate cause for posies is the tour arranged by this group, wherein the newer homes of Friona will be observed. Now this project is far from as trivial as it might appear on the surface. These homes reflect the strength of our town. Certainly there is no vestige of "boomtown" trends in the substantial homes erected here.

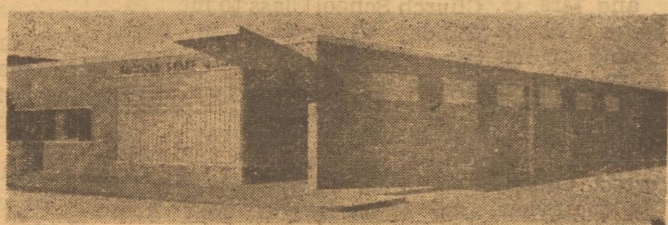

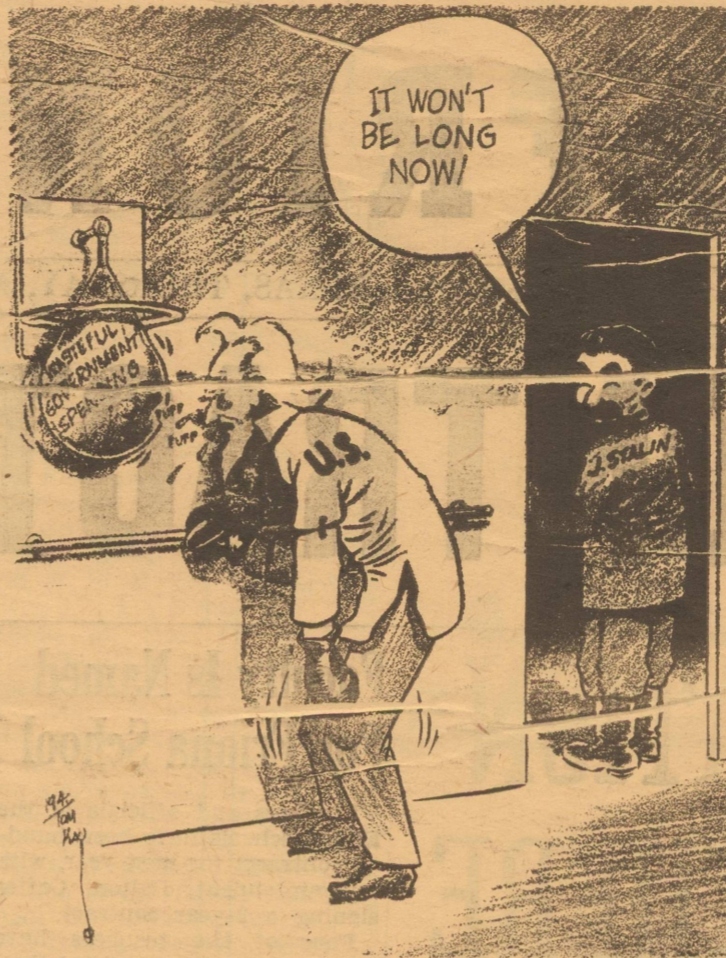

In spite of all evidence to the contrary, the United States Department of Agriculture persists in predicting wheat yields 50 per cent of normal in Texas and Oklahoma this year and we don't see where they get their information.

It must be that none of the Department of Agriculture experts have visited the wheat belt this season or they certainly wouldn't predict a 50 per cent crop.

The Department of Agriculture predicts a carryover of wheat on July 1 this year of about 425 million bushels and a carryover on July 1, 1952, of about 380 million bushels, based on the present crop.

Crop reporter A. W. Erickson, who certainly does visit the wheat belt, and regularly, declares that the government is always about three months behind the facts with its wheat estimates. It would appear that Erickson is being conservative. The government is about two two years behind.

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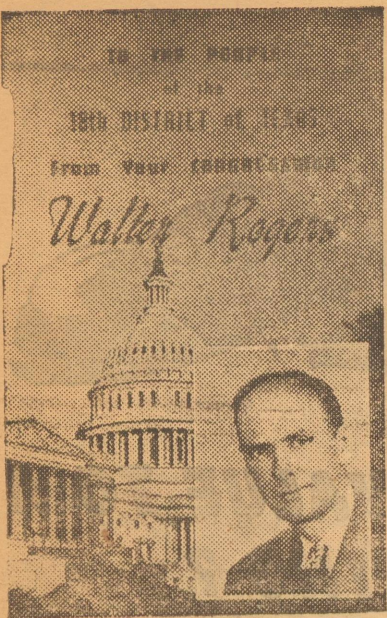
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MAIL

The mail is still coming in on the MacArthur matter and continues to run in about the same ratio as reported heretofore. Out of about 400 communications received by my office, 390 were in violent protest to the President's action. Six approved the President's action, and four were to the effect that both the President and MacArthur were wrong. In addition to these, I received approximately 750 replies to the Fulton Lewis questionnaire. These have not been completely tabulated as yet but the ratio reflects an overwhelming majority against the Administration. I should have a final tabulation within the next two weeks. The great amount of mail coming in from these two sources, in addition to the regular mail, has prevented the office from keeping up with the correspondence as promptly as we would like. However, those who have written me will receive replies within the next few days, as we are doing our best to get the mail out as quickly as possible.

APPROPRIATION BILLS

Are you reading in your daily and weekly papers of the present activities of Congress in appropriation matters, but there are a few things that I would like to bring to you which are

not contained in some of the regular news stories. It is interesting to note that in all departmental appropriation bills and other appropriation bills not directly connected with national defense there are many amendments cutting down expenditures. The committees from which these bills come have done a wonderful job paring down the appropriations, but the committee cutting does not satisfy the whole House and numerous cuts are made in all of these bills. On the other hand it is interesting to note the almost unanimous approval of expenditures for national defense. The appropriations bill that was before the house yesterday authorized additional expenditures for defense purposes of approximately six billion dollars. This bill was ably explained by the Honorable George Mahon from the Lubbock district, and the Honorable Albert Thomas, from the Houston district. There was probably a great deal less debate on this measure than has been the case on most defense appropriation matters involving less than one per cent of the six billion-dollar bill. It certainly proves that this Congress is not going to be penny-wise and pound foolish in so far as preparedness is concerned, but is going to cut non-defense expenditures to the bone. During the debate in the defense appropriations bill it was brought out forcibly that this country is not prepared at the present time to wage a full scale war against a major power and that in order to remedy this situation, the defense program is a matter that cannot wait. It was also said that there might be some consolation in the fact that no other major power is at present prepared to wage a full scale war against us; the logic being that if Russia was so prepared, she would have already commenced hostilities on a full scale measure. There is no definite assurance that this logic is correct. No one knows just what Russia has. We do know that she has proceeded in the past by the infiltration method and by instigating internal strife and turmoil. It is against these weapons that we must be ever

vigilant. We cannot let down our guard for an instant

TRIAL OF RUMELY AND PATTERSON

A District jury here convicted Dr. Edwin A. Rumley or contempt of Congress for failing to fully disclose the source of the funds used in carrying on his lobbying activities. He will be remembered as the head of the "Committee for Constitutional Government", and the same man who was convicted after World War I for violating the "Trading with the Enemy" Act. His conviction there grew out of his activities with the imperial German Government during the war. He has been called one of the leading proponents of fascism in this country. William L. Patterson, the negro communist leader, was also tried here, but his trial resulted in a hung jury, which was 9 o 3 according to the reports. His counsel consisted of Vito Marcantonio, a former member of Congress from New York, and also one of the lawyers who represented the eleven communists who were tried and convicted before Judge Medina. A great deal of the testimony in Patterson's case centered around a heated argument in the Congressional hearing between him and a Georgia congressman by the name of Henderson Lanham. The argument of course was on a racial basis. It is my understanding that Patterson is to be retried.

DISCREPANCIES IN GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS

In a previous news letter I called to your attention some discrepancies that had been discovered in payroll matters in connection with the Sampson Air Force Base in New York, covered by the Appropriations Committee. Here are some more that were brought out at one of the hearings, and I quote from the record: "The administrative payroll for the period (week) ending January 8, 1951, of the original contractor (Five Boro Construction Corp., and Malan Plumbing Co., Inc.) shows salaries at regular rates as follows:

Arnold Kagan, president, construction corporation, general policy determination in charge of subcontracts, corporation liaison with U. S. Government on job, \$1,000.
 Sid Feldman, vice president, construction corporation, general policy determination in charge of subcontracts, general manages plumbing and heating, corporation liaison with U. S. Government on job, \$1,000.
 Nathan Cohen, secretary of construction corporation in charge of New York office in conjunction with Irving Feldman in charge of purchases and expediting of general construction materials and supplies for job, \$600.
 Edward Feldman, assistant project manager in charge of plumbing and heating and purchases of plumbing and heating materials and allocation to sites, progress schedules re plumbing and heating, \$500.
 Hyman J. Feldman, assistant project manager in charge of plumbing and heating, supervision of field operations plumbing and heating, \$500.
 Sol Feldman, assistant office manager New York branch office; assistant purchasing agent and expeditor of plumbing and heating materials, \$250.
 Irving Feldman, treasurer of corporation, in charge of New York branch office in conjunction with Nathan Cohen in charge of purchases plumbing and heating, \$250.
 Nathan Prashker, assistant secretary of corporation in charge of finance, liaison with banks, etc., \$200.
 "The payroll for the period ending January 13, 1951, appears to be the same as the one indicated above with the exception that at the end there is added the names of Robert J. Frankel, resident counsel - administrative representative in charge of subcontracts labor relations and other legal matters, for which no salary is indicated; and Raymond Borge (last name in doubt), office manager in charge of office personnel and operation, at \$150 per week.
 "The payroll for the period ending January 20, 1951, appears to be the same as the preceding one, including the last two names mentioned in the paragraph above.
 "The payroll for the period ending January 27, 1951, appears to be the same as the preceding one with the exception that on this payroll Robert J. Frankel received the sum of \$300.
 "The payroll for the period ending February 3, 1951, appears to be the same as the preceding one with the exception that the salary of Raymond

Borge is \$175 instead of \$150 as shown for the preceding period and there was added the names of Frank A. O'Hare, project manager at \$300; Joseph Henrichs, assistant project manager in charge of progress schedules and general construction purchase orders subcontracts at \$300; and William J. O'Hare, assistant project manager in charge of general field operations at \$300.
 "The payroll for the period ending February 10, 1951, appears to be the same as the preceding one."
 You will note that the figures shown are on a per week basis

and not a per month basis. It was practices of this kind that cost the taxpayers during World War II, and this Congress is not going to stand for any recurrence of this sort of thing. The "Renegotiations Act" this time is going to have teeth in it and is going to be used, and leeches on the Government are going to be shaken loose and required to answer for all shady practices. I am sorry that space will not permit me to go further into this matter, but will do so later on.

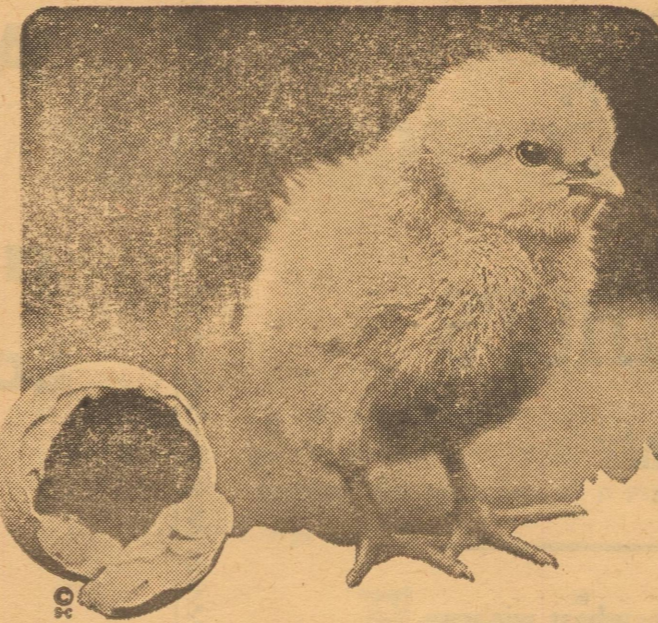

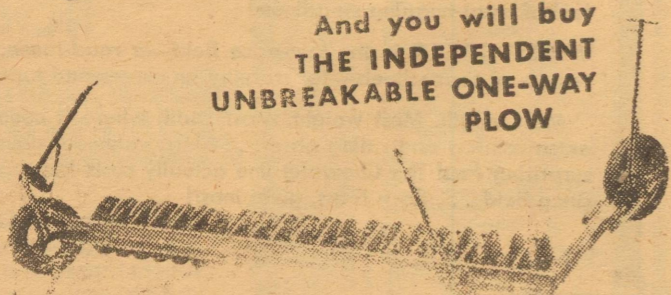

Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Stemming from a very modest beginning of 50 miles of line bringing service to 128 service connections in 1938, the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc. has evolved into a 1539 miles electric system bringing electric service to 2219 service connections in 1950, affecting the mode of living and the living standards of most of those counties served, affecting both those directly served by its lines and those indirectly benefitting from the improved farming methods, household practices, etc., enabled by its expansion.

For this reason, the Board of Directors and Management wishes to publish for the entire public to see — the correct and un-altered statement of our operations during the fiscal year 1950, just completed.

Recognizing the inadequacy of any printed report, we invite personal inspection of our records and facilities and operational techniques at any time, in fact we rather insist on your personal acquaintance with your R.E.A. In reality, we in the office and out along the lines in this job of operation, are your servants. This is YOUR business; its growth and welfare are dependent upon the satisfaction of you and the entire community. Any time that your service is not satisfactory, please let us know.

Though proud, and justly so, we believe, of the progress so far shown in the local organization, we want suggestions for future growth . . . it is your privilege and duty to assist us, especially at this point. Frankly, the entire investment here could be turned at a profit today; much of this may be credited to careful buying on favorable markets; other credit is due directly to the efforts and study of your representatives through the years. 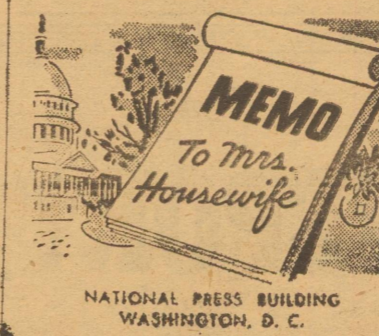

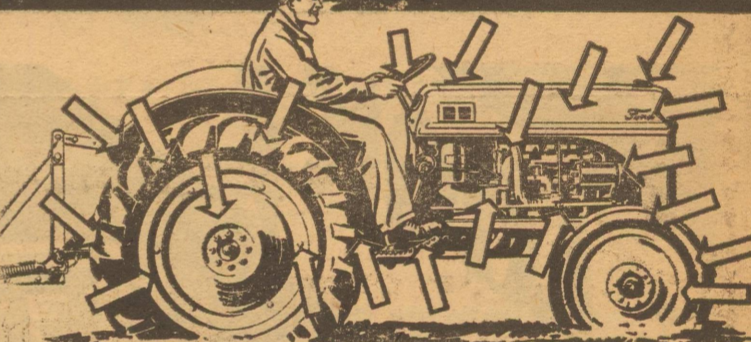

Association of Water Users Cites Reasons For Forming District

With another heavy irrigating season underway, many farmers in the South Plains area are having to lower the pumps on their water wells, according to reports received by the High Plains Water Conservation and User's Association.

Illustrating the fact that the problem is widespread, one farmer reported that a Plainview pump company put him on a waiting list at least two months before they could get to the job of lowering his pumps.

Other reports indicate that a lot of windmill wells, used mostly for domestic purposes, have failed in the 60-70 foot upper strata and have had to be deepened to the irrigation well level. This indicates that the higher water sands are being depleted.

While water levels have not gone down much and there seems to be no immediate danger of the irrigation water running out, this lowering trend is

interpreted by the association as a "danger signal."

"Now is the time to do something" about the lowering of water levels while the problem is small enough for us to tackle," a spokesman said.

An underground water conservation district, if created, will have conservation powers which should stop the gradual decline of the water level, or at least retard the decline, the association pointed out. Proper spacing of wells, prevention of waste, better pumping practices and a recharging program would keep the water levels up.

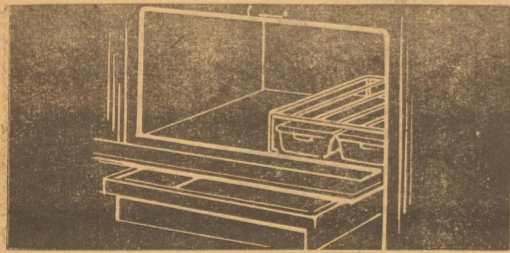

Acrobatic Jet Planes Will Feature Lubbock Armed Forces Day

"Defenders of Freedom," the armed forces of the United States, will go on display for the residents of the South Plains on May 19th when Reese Air Force Base holds "open house" in conjunction with Armed Forces Day. A team of jet aircraft, a sixty-plane fly-over, and the Liaison-directed firing of an artillery field piece are scheduled as part of the exciting informative show.

A full day of activities, designed to demonstrate to the public the pursuits of the military services, has been planned by RAFB Officials headed by Lt. Col. Kenneth A. Gaskin, Armed Forces Day project officer. Visitors will be admitted to the base, located 12 miles west of Lubbock on the Levelland highway, at 11:00 Saturday morning. The open house program will begin at one o'clock and continue until five.

Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., has contributed a "team" of jet fighter aircraft for the occasion; the "firecan" pilots will put their planes through a series of acrobatic and fighter tactic maneuvers.

A concert by the 514th Air Force band and a guest speaker, as yet unnamed, will also highlight the afternoon program. Field Artillery troops from Fort Sill, Okla., are slated to demonstrate the firing of an artillery weapon, radio-directed by a light Liaison plane.

Included in the many displays on exhibit will be technical and field equipment furnished by the Rotc, U. S. Naval Reserve, Army Organized Reserve Corps, and the U. S. Marine Corps in this area. All Reese-based aircraft—the twin-engine B-25 medium training bomber, the single T-28 and T-6 trainers, and C-47 transports—will be close enough to afford the public a good look. The jet fighter, the F-80 "Shooting Star", and other jet aircraft, will also be open to public inspection.

Hangars along the Reese flight line will be converted for the day into display buildings and concession stands. Engineering displays, engine and parts mock-ups, and aircraft equipment will be housed in the hangars. Refreshments, cold drinks and sandwiches, will be available there during the day.

Sixty aircraft from Reese, single and twin-engine trainers, will fly in mass formation over the area. The flight has been tentatively scheduled to include other towns in the Amarillo-Plainview-Lubbock vicinity.

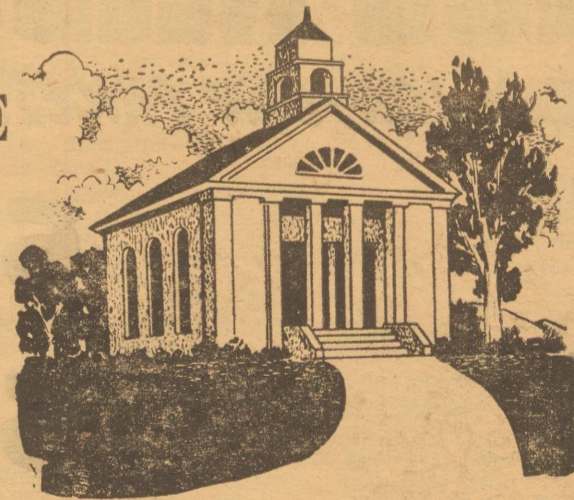

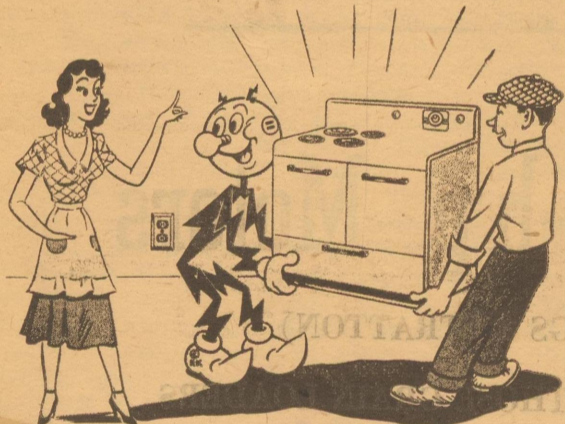
