Fire of undetermined origin early this morning gutted the high school building in Friona, with total destruction of all that part of the building situated from the study hall north.

Shortly after 2 o'clock this morning Lavon Haney saw smoke arising from the school, and he, with City Marshall Doc Camp, immediately turned in alarm to the fire department. Camp then circulated throughout town sounding the siren of his patrol car to waken fire-fighters. Pete Buske, whose residence faces the school grounds, awoke to the smell of smoke and upon seeing the already giant proportions of the fire, called the Hereford fire department.

Hardly a person in Friona slept after the 2 o'clock alarm, with most of the men lending a hand at one of the three hoses which poured a steady stream into the blaze throughout the early hours. 


