Can There Be An Answer?

What manner of man, what concept of liberty induces the leaders of our country to send forth the delegation carrying a white flag into the enemy territory of Korea, men willing to give their lives for freedom and justice?

What dwarfed and demented mentality finds reason in submitting to enemy cunning?

What philosophy deems it advantageous to allow the enemy press to exclusively broadcast to the world (from its propaganda department) the supposed details of the Korean conference?

What patriotism is it that prompts sending forth our young men to battle, depriving them of the just GI benefits in the meantime, sacrificing thousands of lives, then submitting to the indignities of a "peace" talk engineered by the

foe calling the strikes, even the location and terms of the conference?

When, oh when will America emerge as properly befitting, a strong, respected, and honored nation? Free spending of borrowed money, avished upon the peoples throughout the world, has failed to establish us as the beloved nation upon the globe. We have no more actual friends than previously. Frionans visiting other towns of the area often come back to report the favorable publicity that this area is gaining over the entire panhandle. And there is the even more frequent observation, "We visited in Friona recently, and we've never seen so many friendly people in any town."

We like to hear these reports, but believe me, they impose an obligation on us that cannot be ignored.

That obligation is to keep at the forefront. How? There are some suggestions:

We believe adequate money has been voted and spent to provide the necessities of an up-and-coming community; at least we can wait awhile before attempting other expensive projects. The far-sighted community voted overwhelmingly for the paving and the building of a new, enlarged school. We have supported these projects because we believed them necessary to the welfare of the town. What we are interested in, now that these facilities have been provided, is the wise utilization and astute capitalization of these benefits.

More businesses and more residents are al-

ready being attracted. Will paving, schools, churches, and the chamber of commerce be adequate reception? Well, there are a few other niceties that might add to their welfare. A well-kept park might even head the list. Cannot additional care be taken of the park with present personnel and facilities? (We don't mean cultivation of the present dandelion crop, either). Some organization or club already on the lookout for civic projects needing sponsoring might provide some playground equipment or tables within the park. In fact, it is gross waste to have the lawn and space and trees available, but no playground or picnicking inducements.

And there are other projects that would entail no city-wide expenditures. A welcoming committee from the chamber of commerce or the Lions Club would help the newcomer to appreciate Friona and its hospitality.

What was ever done about the library?

In considering these projects and other similar ones, it seems the main work ahead is not in concrete and stone or bonds or fund raising, but rather is the challenge of personal alertness to the "little things", the perpetual jobs, the art of being a good neighbor and gracious host.

DO YOU KNOW that the last session of the legislature passed a "Communist Control Law"?

As the session of the Legislature above set out. This bill sets a penalty of not less than two or more than twenty years in the penitentiary for anyone who sabotages or destroys any facilities or property used for National Defense, and a member of a Communist Front Organization who is in the such sabotage or attempted sabotage, the punishment may be after the effective date of the bill, register with the Department of Public Safety within five days, and anyone failing to do so may be fined not less than \$1,000.00 nor more than \$10,000.00 or by imprisonment of not less than two or more than ten years, or by both such fine and imprisonment. This bill requires all officers of the Communist Party or Communist Front Organizations now in the State to make a complete report of their organizations and activities to the Department of Public Safety, under the pen-

Other Editors Say Why a Loyalty Oath?

A state disgrace is the so-called "loyalty oath." Imposed by well-meaning state governments, these oaths cost money and are utterly useless, besides causing disunity and consternation.

A loyalty oath is well within the bounds of legislative power, however, and consequently will be worked to death during the present and forthcoming Communist scare prevailing over the nation. At the present only state employees are required to take the oaths, but how long will it be before a blanket requirement for oath-signing is made to every citizen of the state? Already students in state schools of higher learning are required to sign this oath.

Quite obviously, the main drawback to these oaths is not the mere physical act of signing a name. But an American citizen should not be required to sign a paper declaring he is an honorable patriot. It could be held as an insult to his integrity. On the other hand, if the oaths fulfilled their purpose it would be a pleasure to sign a loyalty oath for nothing but to point the glaring eye of public disapproval at any Communist non-signer. But it doesn't even work that way. A look at the Red doctrine will disclose the reason. To achieve a desirable goal, the Communist is allowed to cheat, kill, lie and take any other dishonorable means he may need. And it bothers a Communist but little to sign his name to a paper pledging allegiance to the United States.

When we attended the University of Texas there was a fellow there by the name of Wendell Addington. He was a self-avowed Communist and upheld their actions. But when time came for all students to sign the newly-initiated loyalty oath, he walked up with the rest of them and with a flourish and a laugh put his name on the slip of paper. He then completed enrollment and finally received a degree from the school. Anyone who refused to sign the oath would not have been allowed to enroll.

What we mean is this: Why should honest Texas (or American) citizens be required to sign a paper saying he will not advocate or teach violent overthrow of the Federal government when the idea behind the oath is unstable, and Communists themselves sign it. And when the Communists are already known to law enforcement agencies and everyone else because of previous actions.

Only recently was a dispute in California settled in their Supreme Court over the loyalty oath. Regents of the University of California had required professors and other personnel of that college to sign an oath. About 200 professors quit in protest and the whole state was in an uproar over the issue. UC professors and instructors said they absolutely would not tol-

erate "legislative loyalty" nor would they have this loyalty forced upon them. They contended, and justly so, that this was a free country, and they didn't have to sign an oath. Saying they were loyal citizens. Of course, their argument was based on a matter of principle and they were as loyal to their country as anyone else. They just didn't want anyone to question their loyalty. And, according to their spokesmen, the professors would do anything in their power that would be effective in purging Communism from the United States.

Over the state and nation there is a thinly veiled contempt for the oath and this could be very well its downfall. As long as no one likes to have a governing body to tell them to be loyal to the United States form of government, then the oath is doomed to failure. But state representatives and senators will continue with the Communist-scare tactics and endeavor to force this issue on the people. We remember seeing a cartoon once in the Daily Texan, University of Texas daily newspaper, which showed an old worn out cowboy sitting astride his somewhat older-looking horse. He was being questioned by the proverbial city slicker out on the prairie. The cowboy was scratching his head and saying, "Am I now or have I ever been a... what!"

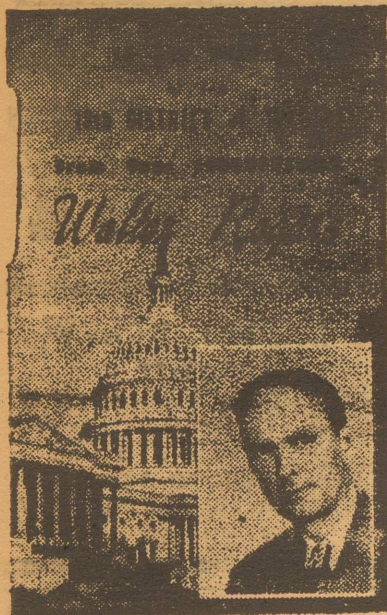

Many people are wondering when the Congress will recess. From the present outlook it is difficult to see how we could recess prior to September and the chances are that it will not be before sometime in October. There was some talk on the House floor about a short recess the first week of July, since the 4th came on Wednesday. However the House stayed in continuous session all week, including the 4th of July. The session on the Fourth was devoted to a reading of the Declaration of Independence and paying tribute to those great patriots who are responsible for this great forward step in the freedom of man. Representative John Rankin of Mississippi suggested on the Floor that the Congress should re-adopt the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution and that the country should get back to the principles therein voiced. One Washington correspondent wrote at length about the statement. In so doing he made especial mention about the "equality of man" and criticized Mr. Rankin, insinuating that Mr. Rankin is a "white supremacy" advocate. The columnist's remarks brought to my mind a transaction that took place on the Floor the other day concerning an all-negro veteran's hospital. The Veteran's Affairs Committee, of which Mr. Rankin is Chairman, had approved a bill creating an all-negro veteran's hospital at a cost of five million dollars to meet the needs of negro veterans that were not being adequately cared for. The hospital was to be staffed by negro doctors and negro nurses. When this bill came to the Floor it was openly attacked by the two negro congressmen on the grounds of racial segregation. These two negro congressmen

were joined by a group of ultra-liberal Democrats, ultra-liberal Republicans and a majority of the old line Republicans from the North and East. The bill was supported by a block of Southern and Southeastern Jeffersonian Democrats. The coalition of old line Republicans from the North and East, the ultra-liberal Republicans, the ultra-liberal Democrats and the two negro congressmen was sufficient to defeat the bill. It was openly admitted by all that there was a great need for the hospital and the negro veterans were in sad circumstances unless adequate facilities could be supplied. It was argued, however, by the coalition on both sides of the aisle that if the use of the hospital was to be limited to negro patients and negro doctors and nurses, it would be a segregated hospital and that they did not want it under those circumstances. The race issue flared openly on the Floor and was without doubt the sole reason that the bill was defeated. I tell you people this so that you may have some idea of what could happen if the FEPS and the Civil Rights legislation should ever reach the Floor of the House. Frankly the Republicans would be afraid to vote against the FEPC and the civil rights legislation for political reasons, and don't let yourself think otherwise. If that type of legislation is to be stopped, it will be stopped by the Southern and Southwestern Jeffersonian Democrats.

**STATE DEPARTMENT**  
The fight for a complete cleansing of the State Department is continuing and is getting results, but it is not proceeding fast enough to suit me. Over a year ago I told the people that I thought Mr. Acheson should resign. I have not changed that position nor my opinion. We hope that within the next several weeks Congress will have an opportunity to speed up this cleansing process when the bills on appropriations and other matters concerning the State Department are brought to the Floor.

**DEFENSE PRODUCTION ACT**  
We have received much mail concerning controls and inflation. The big question is "What is the proper procedure to curtail inflation?" If economic controls are the answer, my position is that these should be on a temporary basis, should be fair and equitable to all, and should remain under the constant control and vigilance of Congress. The controls themselves are not the great danger grounds of racial segregation. If they are handled in the above manner. The great danger in

controls is the administration of the controls, and I am not willing to place the economy of this country in the hands of a few egotistical bureaucrats with the power to discriminate and to indulge indecisions based upon bias and prejudice. We are a present in general debate on the Defense Production Act and will begin the discussion of amendments next week. It is my opinion that if a defense production act is passed, it will retain in the Congress the power that have heretofore been delegated to bureaucrats. Unless this is done, we would be better off without controls.

**THE HOUSE FLOOR**  
I had my first experience at changing a vote last week. The vote was being taken on whether or not the House should consider a resolution concerning the continued payment of Government expenses between July 1st and July 31st, while the various appropriations bills are being debated and voted upon. A move was started on the House Floor to cut out the funds necessary for General Dwight Eisenhower to continue to operate. Had such a move been successful, General Eisenhower's hands would have been tied and all of the work he has done so far would have been lost. I openly opposed such a move. At the time the procedural matter was being voted upon I was called to the long-distance telephone and when I returned to the Floor, it was my understanding that the move had been successful and that General Eisenhower had been tied hand and foot. Therefore when my name was called, I voted against the motion to consider the resolution. Immediately thereafter I was approached by several of the Texas congressmen, as well as several other Democrats, and advised that such was not the case. I obtained a copy of the resolution and satisfied myself that such move had not been successful. I then changed my vote from "nay" to "yea". This

is the only vote that I have changed since I have been in Congress and had it not been for the long-distance telephone call, I would not have had the misunderstanding.

**TAXES**  
The increase in Federal taxes was for defense purposes. Had this not been the case, the tax bill would not have passed. If this country is going to sustain a standing army and provide proper equipment, supplies and materials, it is going to cost money. I have a large number of letters in my office from men who are in the service. They are complaining about the pay situation with which they are faced. Their allowances are not sufficient to take care of their wives and children and many of these boys are sending home the small amount that they are able to retain out of their pay. These boys do not get paid on an hourly basis and they don't get paid time and a half for overtime. They are rendering a great service to mankind and humanity and it would be unfair and dishonest to require their dependents to live in poverty and squalor while these boys are serving their country. It would be criminal for the civilian population of this country to fail to provide these boys with the necessary guns, ammunition, food, material, supplies, clothing, etc., while they are a part of the force that will be the deciding factor in our ultimate protection.

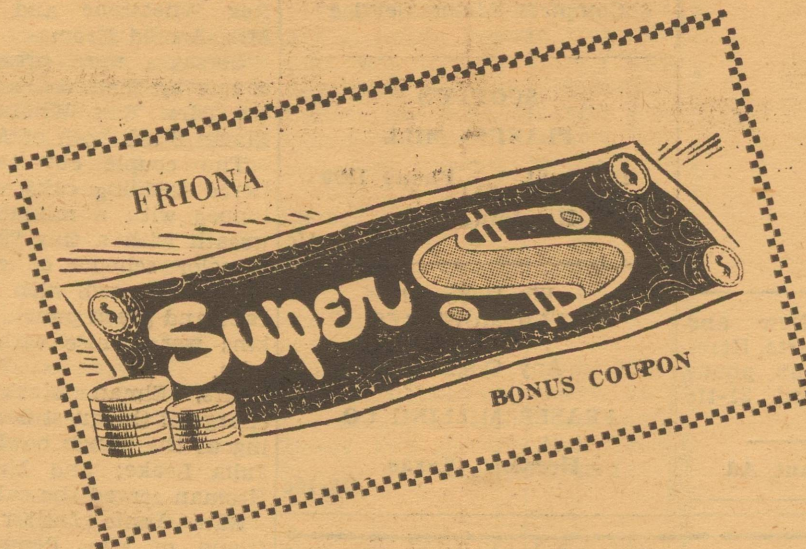



than in the child's home, according to officials of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Although a camp is an assembly of children at ages of greater susceptibility, Foundation officials take into account the off-setting factor of comparative isolation of camps from outside and new contacts.

Dr. Hart Van Riper, medical director of the March of Dimes organization, has advised that if infantile paralysis appears in the vicinity to take the following steps at camp:

1. Watch for symptoms — headache, sore throat, slight fever, nausea, constipation or diarrhea, fatigue and listlessness, and the more definite stiffness of the neck or back pain or sore muscles, or trembling.

2. Guard against over-fatigue or chilling.

3. Check screening to see that latrines and kitchens are well protected against flies.

4. Re-emphasize cleanliness and hygiene. Frequent hand-washing is important, especially before meals and after visits to the toilet.

5. Limit visitors to camp to lessen chances of the virus being brought in.

Dr. Van Riper urged all camps to have available the names and addresses of county and state health officers, the state representative of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, and the nearest volunteer chapter of the National Foundation.



Senate delay on House \$7 billion tax boost bill, causes concern among bureaus and officials. Every day of delay is just another day the public will hear more about the squandering of American wealth.

House vote on record-setting tax boost was close; could have been voted down had a non-partisan attitude prevailed.

However, in the Senate trend is less and less to vote on issues on straight party lines.

Thereby hangs cause of anguish in certain quarters. Not only are many Senators voting on a non-partisan basis, but Senators are investigating MacArthur incident shows that.

Senators are also becoming more and more concerned with the soundness of the American economy. At one time lip service was paid American small business but now Senators are digging deep into facts.

Sen. John Sparkman (Ala. D) as chairman of the Senate Small Business Committee, has launched searching investigations of bureaucratic moves that threaten business existence.

Nightmare of many bureaucrats is that before Senators act on new taxes they will probe.

If so, heads may roll. As Sen. Estes Kefauver demonstrated, it is dangerous to try and fool an aroused Senator.

Last week, this column reported that ECA release No. 2340 announced \$7,700,000 gift to British to help develop her African colonies. The release reported that coal and manganese mines, and other projects would be developed with American money.

It is now learned how money was spent. Of the \$7,700,000, \$4,261,000 has been in tobacco given to the British African colonies and the balance less than \$3 1/2 million, is food.

Such disclosures could wreck plans to saddle American people with billions of additional taxes.

Some Senator is bound to ask why Americans should pay taxes to send millions of dollars of tobacco to British Africa.

The letters FTC are supposed to stand for the Federal Trade Commission. Many now say they stand for the Federal Tweedledee Commission.

So far, Commission has refused to use its power to combat monopoly price cutting to destroy competition.

But this does not mean that in a dire emergency the FTC is incapable of rising to the great heights of a mole hill.

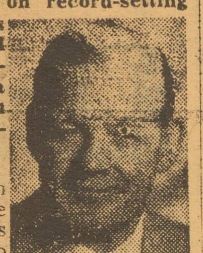
In Weymouth, Mass. a Line and Paul Mathews are co-partners in a shoe business. They called their little firm the Mathews Guild.

**SHIVERS INKS DRIVERS BILL**

AUSTIN, June 28 (AP)—Gov. Allan Shivers, signed tonight a giant appropriations bill, a drivers financial responsibility bill, a labor control bill, and rushed to complete action on numerous others before midnight deadline.

While signing of the appropriations bill was vitally important to the state, the governor's endorsement of the driver's fi-

nancial responsibility bill was apt to make a deeper impression on the average citizen.

The drivers financial responsibility law, effective Jan. 1, 1952, requires owners and drivers of motor vehicles to prove ability to pay up to, \$15,000 for bodily injury or property damage in case of accident.

Failure to prove financial responsibility will mean loss of driver's license and car registration.
