Cattle Still Graze on a Billion Acres in U.S.A.

The grasslands, hay lands and forested range lands of the United States cover 1,135,000,000 acres, nearly 60 per cent of the total land area. They furnish about half of the feed for all livestock.

Nearly 250 million acres of the virgin grasslands have been plowed up and used for crops or for pasture in rotation with crops. The central prairies which formed the largest body of highly productive soils in America, have been converted almost entirely to crop land. Of the 400 million acres of western semi-arid lands, about 12 million acres have been reclaimed by irrigation.

The country has more than 175 million acres of improved pasture on fair to good land, but most grazing lands are semiarid or rough, un-cultivated, unfertilized, with rela-

all the roughage a dairy cow or steers now mostly privately owned ranches.

The dominant vegetation of 125 million acres of southwestern arid grazing lands is desert shrub, some species of which are grazed and browsed, but others are not palatable and cannot be grazed. Most of these lands in New Mexico, Arizona and southern California, are publicly owned and are used little or not at all for grazing.

The Pacific Coast States have nearly 100 million acres of grazing land, both open and forested. The humid pastures of Washington and Oregon contain about 5 million acres, and the irrigated pastures of the West about 2 million acres. Even if all the asable parts of western grazing lands were pushed to their physical limits as croplands, there would still be some 500 million acres left for grazing. Though the carrying capacity on the whole is low per limits are nutritious and supply feed for a large portion of the manual production, and better utilization of our agriculture would work toward conservation of our soil fertility. The most productive pastures are in mild, humid regions, or regions of mild climate where irrigation is practiced. A detailed account of the utilization of the grasslands of the United States is given by H. H. Wooten and C. P. Barnes in "Grass," the year-book of agriculture for 1946, pages 25-34.







Half Century of Progress in Commercial Fertilizers

Bowers of Swift & Company takes a mid-century backward look at the fertilizer industry and its products and gives a "guess-timation" of the future in "Crops and Soils"

In 1900 a typical fertilizer had but it also had a high-powered smell, for most of its nitrogen and phosphoric acid were derived from such fragrant sources as packing house tankage, dried blood, fish scraps, bone meals and even bat

A few years later the natural rganic nitrogen sources were supplemented by nitrate of soda from Chile and sulfate of ammonia, obained as a by-product of coke ovens. But some farmers were skeptical of the somewhat dedorized fertilizers, figuring that if odorized fertilizers, figuring that if bor. Today, everything in the fertile mixtures didn't have a bad smell, they could have no fertilizer plant—the manufacture of ingredients, mixing, transportaing power, either.

Less than & per cent of our fertilizer nitrogen is now derived from organic material. Instead, synthetic ammonia, produced by com-bining the nitrogen of the air with simple equipment, now by modern hydrogen from natural gas or steam under great pressure, is the basic source of bulk nitrogen.
