School Board Stands Pat on Decision To Omit Paving of Block on Cleveland

One of the constitutional amendments which Texas will vote on Nov. 13th concerns the veteran land program in the state.

Probably not as many veterans have benefited from the program as we might have wished, but we do want to commend the program on being one government undertaking that has proved self-supporting, even earning additional funds for loans to veterans.

The original 1946 program provided for \$25 million to be loaned for land purchases, payable in 40 years at 3% interest. Evidently the veterans have been paying off their notes at a more rapid rate in many instances, and the capitol has increased.

Now comes a proposed constitutional amendment calling for \$75 million more dollars to be made available for the same purpose.

Whatever your opinion, the situation bears close scrutiny, being a program that is paying off in hard dollars and cents. And if the program continues to work, this is so, so much better than direct handouts practiced in some states.

Split Vote Favors Pre-Announced Plans

The Friona school board, in a called session Friday night, declined to alter their paving plan announced recently whereby they would pave over 6 blocks adjacent to the schools and grounds and the home of Superintendent Caffey.

Omitted in the board's plans was the paving of Cleveland Avenue between 8th and 9th streets, and it was in interest of this block that over 150 local residents petitioned the board to reconsider, including this block in the paving program. The disputed block separates a one-block playground and the school buildings.

In a petition delivered to G. C. Cranfill, board president, by V. C. Krueger and others, the board was asked specifically to meet Friday night, reporting their decision to the city by Saturday morning.

The board considered the petition in open discussion, with Krueger the only petitioner present. Main objection to the paving of the extra block seemed to be the financial obligations incurred, with Hayes, Messenger, and London specifically naming this as a preventative of the action. Various benefits of the paving were conceded by most members present, but each discussion ended with reference to inadequate finances. P. L. London made the motion that board take no action contrary to its previous announcement, and the motion was simultaneously seconded by Hayes and Potts. Drake and Potts voted in favor of paving as asked in the petition.

Southwestern Public Service construction workers are well along on the project south of Friona providing new lines from Hub to Friona.

H. L. Outland, local representative of the firm, said that the new lines and conductors are larger, enabling better voltage and service to the Friona consumers under all conditions. Also, the poles are several feet higher than those previously standing.

Juniors Play Saturday

The Friona Junior Football team will play Bovina at Bovina this Saturday night rather than on Friday night as previously announced, Coach Roberson has stated.

Out of an originally set goal of 62 blocks of new paving in Friona, the contracting firm of Brown & Root has announced this week that sign-up is complete with 61 blocks guaranteed.

The construction crews are taking advantage of the conducive weather to push full speed ahead on the project, and completion date is virtually assured around November 1st, representative Dan Martin has said.

With the fire station bids being called for this week, all three phases of the October 21st, 1950, Friona Bond Election are either completed or in progress. At that time, \$50,000 was voted for the paving; \$15,000 for construction of city hall and fire station; and \$35,000 allotted to waterworks improvement.

The waterworks project took precedent over the others, inasmuch as new pipe needed to be laid before paving commenced, to guard against damage of paving by later excavations.

Legal notice outlining the mechanics of the entire paving program was first published June 7th, and the construction company representatives began moving into Friona in mid-June.

Since that time Friona already has become well-known over the entire area as the town that went all out for paving and other civic improvements; and the businessmen have noted the practically every visitor and salesman has commented on the striking appearance of the paving, prophesying a rapid growth of the town as a result of this and of the community spirit which made it possible.


The Seventh District Convention will be opened with a dinner for the officers at 6 p. m. Tuesday at the Jim Hill Hotel there.

Editorially Speaking . . .

Posies and Scallions are in Order

We have been asked on several occasions this week what we thought of the local school board action in refusing to pave the disputed Cleveland Avenue block between 8th and 9th streets.

First, let me qualify my answer or explanation by this observation. We have never, anywhere, seen as much interest on every public question as has been manifest in Friona, whether the project is paving, bond voting, circus attendance on Sunday, or the price of coffee. This is a healthy condition, and one not to be overlooked.

As long as the public remains aware of the problems confronting us, there is much more likelihood of correct solution.

We attended the called board meeting Friday night and were impressed with two factors: (1) the evident desire of the entire board to conduct the school business on a sound financial basis, and (2) the fact that over 150 people signed their names to a document asking reconsideration of an action they believed unwise.

From time to time in the session the board members recognized want and probable need of a complete paving program, yet withholding action because they termed the project too pretentious for their budget.

Had the board failed to approve any paving whatsoever, we would have been very, very upset - letting it be known. But the board went as far as they believed at all possible, considering the school rebuilding program, increased demands on operating budget, etc. And that is all we would ask of an individual - to do the

very best he could. So, if the board has reached the limit of expenditures, then we'll string along.

But here are some brickbats, aside and apart from the final action:

Any problem attracting the attention of 150 Friona citizens deserves more consideration than an open-air meeting at the curb. Certainly with the chilly breezes of Friday night, a dark street for illumination, and curb or car bumpers for seats, the board did not dignify itself in handling the problem.

We defend the right of citizens to petition locally, just as we reserve the right to contact our congressman or other elected officials, making our wishes known. And we would like to know that our letter or our petition was at least given the courtesy of reading; the petition was not read in its entirety at the local meeting but was explained verbally. We must say that it was ably quoted by the board president, but the actual reading would have been proper, we sincerely submit. And we think the names of the signers should have been noted. Some people maintain that anyone will sign a petition for any purpose. We disagree. Frankly, we were approached on this petition. We didn't sign. But had we done so, it would have been deliberate and for a reason. We believe others feel the same way.

So, as we commend you, members of the school board, for taking action you believed of best interest to the district, we beg you on the other hand to handle the next situation a bit differently, won't you?

Tomatoes and Potatoes Off the Same Vine

Mounds, Ill. — Double action was uncovered here recently when it was found that a single row of plants had produced both potatoes and tomatoes.

Rev. I. H. Frazier seeded only potatoes in his garden plot, but the plants grew tomatoes on the vines and potatoes on the roots. Local naturalists pointed out that tomatoes and potatoes are members of the same (nightshade) family and occasionally both grow from the same seed or root.

Lockney H.D. Clubs Type Blood, Hold First Aid Schools

A blood typing campaign sponsored by the Lockney Home Demonstration Club recently resulted in 54 appearing to have their blood typed at the Lockney General Hospital. The drive was held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of last week.

The Home Demonstration Clubs of the county are also sponsoring first aid and home nursing courses to be taught here and at Floydada soon.

Perryton Youth Has Rhodes Scholarship

Duane Bell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aldon Bell, sailed Tuesday from New York for Oxford, England, where he will spend the next two years studying under a Rhodes scholarship at the University of Oxford.

The Perryton young man received the Rhodes scholarship last December at New Orleans, where the University of Oklahoma senior had gone to appear before the final interview board. He was one of four to receive the award from a six-state area of Gulf states, and earned the right to appear before the board in New Orleans by successfully passing an interview held at Oklahoma City.

The Rhodes scholarship is one of the highest academic awards available to American students and Duane was the first Panhandle resident to earn a Rhodes scholarship since 1932, when Jack Fisher of Amarillo was chosen. Fisher is now editor with the Harper Bros. Publishing Co. in New York and he invited Duane to have dinner and spend the day with him in New York the day before sailing.

Bell's winning of the Rhodes scholarship was unusual in that he was one of the few undergraduates to seek the scholarship. Most of the students considered for Rhodes scholarships are graduate students.

GI Subsistence Checks Are Slow for Students

Veterans who are in training in colleges and universities this fall under the GI Bill should make certain that they have funds of their own to tide them over several weeks since GI subsistence checks may be late in coming, VA said today.

VA added that it is doing everything possible to keep delays to a minimum. It has even gone to the extent of suspending, for the time being, those administrative procedures not directly related to the main job of getting veterans into training. But despite all efforts, some delays are bound to occur this year. It is possible that some checks to veterans who enrolled this fall may be delayed as late as December first.

Checks will be released throughout the months of October and November.

The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what bills the last session of the Legislature passed regarding minors operating motor vehicles?

Prior to the last session of the Legislature minors operating a motor vehicle in a careless and reckless manner were not subject to being fined for their acts.

The Legislature recognizing that minors between the ages of 14 and 17 years of age, have begun to operate motor vehicles more than they have in the past, and that they should be under the restrictions of the penal statutes, if they violate the laws regarding the proper use of vehicles, passed a bill making it possible to subject such minors to the penalties of the laws of the State of Texas.

The bill states that any minor who has reached his or her 14th birthday, but has not reached his or her 17th birthday, and who drives or operates an automobile or other motor vehicle upon the public road or highway or street or alley in the State of Texas in a reckless manner, at an excessive rate of speed, or while under the influence of intoxicating liquors, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$50.00.

The bill further provides that any minor who drives a vehicle in a willful or wanton disregard to the rights and safety of others

without due caution or circumspection, and at a rate of speed or in a manner so as to endanger or to be likely to endanger persons or property, shall be guilty of reckless driving. Further that any minor operating a motor vehicle at a speed in excess of the maximum speed allowable under the existing laws shall be guilty of speeding. And that any minor who drives an automobile or other vehicle while intoxicated or under the influence of intoxicating liquors shall be guilty of driving or operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquors.

The bill further provides that should the Court deem it advisable, that the fine may be suspended and the minor placed on probation under the control and supervision of the court for a period of ninety days.

ADJOURNMENT OF CONGRESS

The Congress continues to grind towards adjournment. It is still conjectural as to when the necessary legislation will be ready for final decision. This could be within the next few days, or it could continue for several weeks. The major obstacle has been the appropriation bills — the failure of the House and the Senate to agree. The bills have been in conference committees and they have been working long and exhaustive hours, under pressure from both the Senate and the House. The reason for dissatisfaction upon the part of many House members has been the continued insistence by a number of Members of Congress for a one-package bill. Such a procedure is frowned upon by a number of the members, with whom I agree, for the reason that it defeats

the opportunity to vote separately on matters for which money is being spent. That is, the particular appropriations bill may include several matters that are excellent and one or two that are distasteful. Under such a situation the member of Congress is left in the dilemma of having to vote against the entire bill or to swallow the distasteful part of it in order to vote for the good portions. It is my personal opinion that much time could have been saved and most of the matters disposed of by allowing separate votes on the several items. It is entirely possible that when the bills come out of conference if the one-package theory is attempted, the Congress might recommit the bills with instructions for certain changes. This could cause delay that would prevent adjournment this year. As I said in a previous newsletter, such a situation would not disturb me greatly, as there is much important legislation that will be lost this year by an early adjournment.

INVESTIGATIONS:

The several investigations are proceeding on schedule. I have received some mail that is highly critical of the many investigations that Congress has had this year. Frankly, I am happy that the Congress has gone into these matters by its investigatory powers, so that the entire truth could be published. No democratic government could last long if truth is suppressed. It is deplorable that some people would use the Congressional powers of investigation for political and personal gain and undertake to create confusion and ill will by suspicion and innuendo. The committees which are doing investigation work are trying to do a good job and dare trying to dig out, in the final analysis, the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. Such a result should be the guiding light of any investigating body and the findings of that body should be made known to the entire citizenry, let the chips fall where they may.

INCREASE IN THE AIR FORCE:

The proposed increase in the Air Force to approximately 140 groups will of course be of great interest to many of you. I have known for some time that such

a program was looked upon with favor by some of the high officials in the Defense Department. This of course is going to cost a lot of money, and this money must come from the present income of the Government and not from additional taxes.

FOREIGN AID:

The foreign aid issue is still a primary issue here and will probably be settled just before Congress adjourns. Seven billion dollars is a lot of money, and I have not yet been able to convince myself that we can afford it in addition to the other burdens that we are now bearing. If you have any suggestions, please let me hear from you.

CONGRESSMAN PAT SUTTON OF TENNESSEE:

My good friend Congressman Pat Sutton of Tennessee was the victim of an attempted armed robbery the other night. He is possessed of plenty of courage and muscles. He clipped the would-be robber on the chin with a right, and kayoed him. Before he could get the police, the scoundrel had come to and departed. This little incident took place not-too far from the Capitol building.

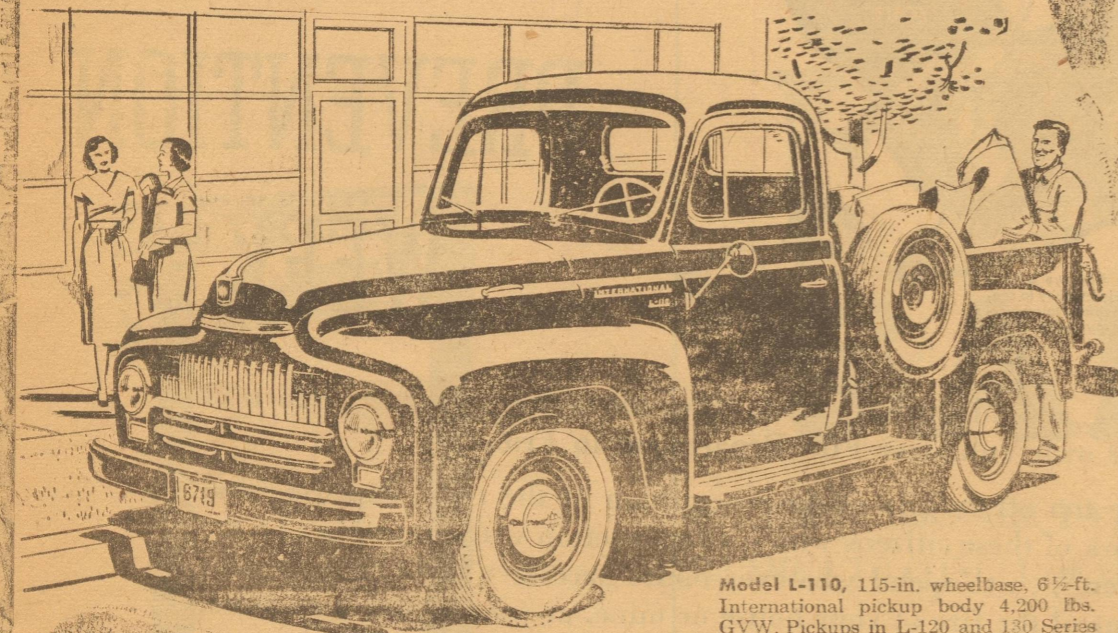

Fire Prevention and Civil Defense Go Hand in Hand

Fire prevention is an important part of civil defense. If an enemy attacks this country, his bombs, whether they be atomic, high explosive, or incendiary, will cause more damage by fire than they will by blast. Hence, anything done to make it hard for fires to start is a step towards preparing your community to protect itself if war comes.

The majority of all fires start in brushpiles, rubbish, or stored odds and ends that accumulate around the house. Closets, attics, and cellars are the main source of home fires, and plain ordinary good housekeeping is a strong line of defense against them.

Clean out your storage places. You will be surprised at how many burnable odds and ends are really useless to you. Don't let them make your home a fire hazard. Get rid of them. If local welfare agencies can't use them, call the junk man.

Don't stop when you've cleared out the inside of your house. Go after rubbish in your back yard, in alleys and in vacant lots near your home. Collect the rubbish and burn it. Don't leave it around to burn if an enemy bombs your city. Be sure to burn rubbish in metal containers.

Take a look at your electrical system. Buy new plugs and cords if yours are worn. Get advice from an electrician if your fuses blow frequently. They may be dangerously overloaded. His advice may prevent a bad fire.

Every winter costly fires are started by faulty furnaces, stoves, and other heating plants. Some result from too much soot in

chimneys. Others are caused by rusted or cracked pipes and fittings. Look over your heating system now. If your chimney needs it, clean it out. If the furnace pipes and connections are cracked and rusted, replace them.

Teach your family not to put magazines, papers, or clothing on radiators or near open flames. Don't hang flimsy curtains near your kitchen stove. Don't allow lamp shades to come in contact with light bulbs. Remember that such things don't have to touch flame to burn. They will catch fire simply because they are too close to the heat for too long.

Gasoline, benzine, naptha, and similar fluids should never be used indoors. When mixed with air, their vapors can be ignited by the spark of a light switch or an electric fan, or the tiny flame of a pilot light. Keep such fluids in tightly closed metal containers outside your home.

And remember: oil-soaked rags, especially rags that have been used to spread quick-drying liquids such as turpentine, paint thinners, and some furniture polishes, can catch fire by themselves. Oily rags should be stored in air-tight metal containers. It is best to keep them outside the house.

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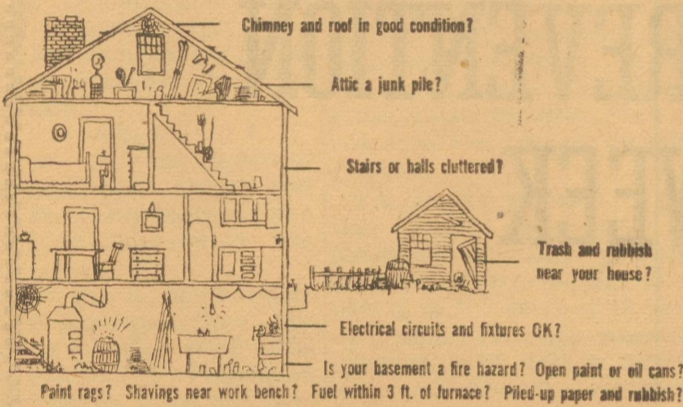

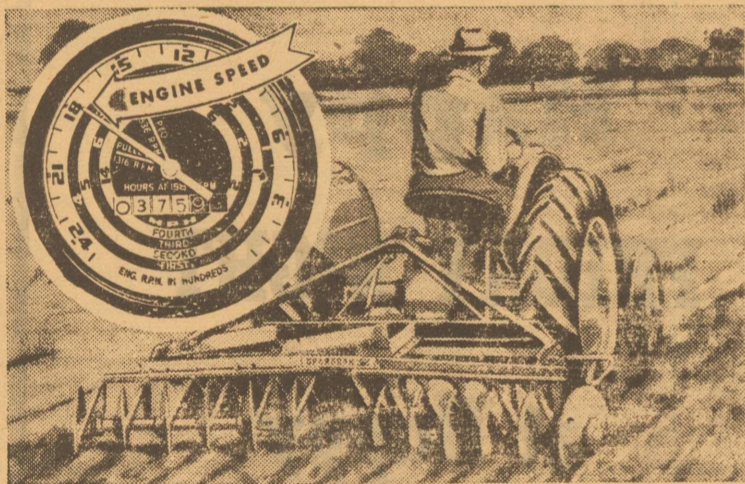

the national needs; and Mrs. Hardesty discussed "Carefully Called and Chosen."

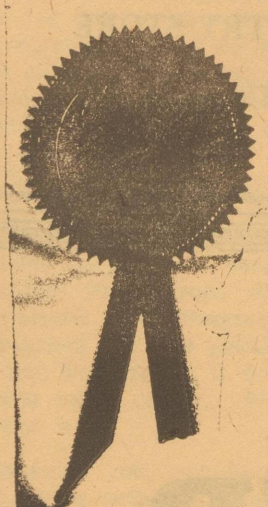

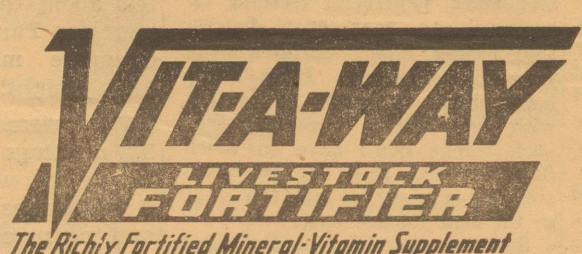

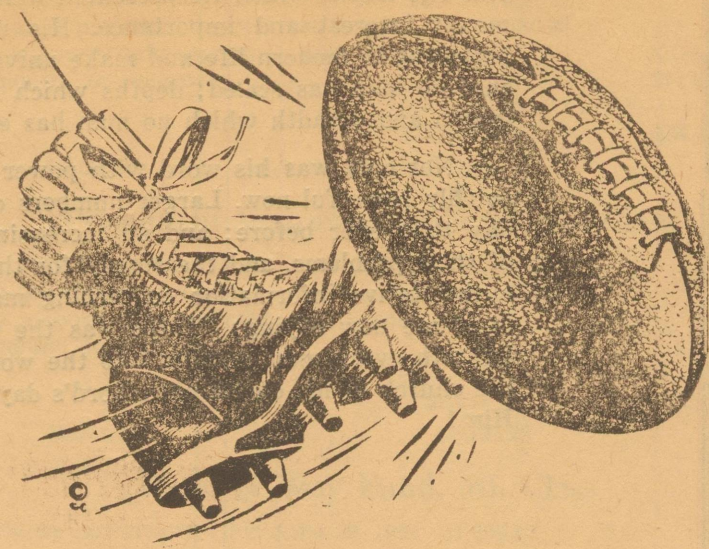
