'Mama Mac' McIntosh Dies



Mrs. A. L. McIntosh, 92, a resident of this area for 60 years and known to her family and friends as "Mama Mac," died at 3:30 p. m. Thursday at her home in Denton Valley community.

Born Dec. 1, 1869, at Nevada, in Collin County, she was the former Grace Elvira Bourland, daughter of the late William Harvey Bourland and Phoebe Ann Carruth. The family moved to Callahan County in 1902.

Mrs. McIntosh married the late Mr. McIntosh at the home of her parents Jan. 1, 1885. She always described the event as a "country wedding" with only members of the family and a group of the couple's schoolmates present.

"Mama Mac" was the mother of 15 children, 12 of whom are still living. The family lived on the same farm near Rough Creek for 33 years before moving to Denton Valley in 1941. Mr. McIntosh died in 1952.

She had been a member of the Methodist church for 54 years. Funeral was held at 3 p. m. Saturday at the Denton Valley Methodist Church with Rev. Marvin Cooper, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Denton Valley Cemetery.

Surviving are five sons, Joe of Odessa, Homer and Preston, both of Baird, Jesse of Abilene and Estes of Midland; seven daughters, Mrs. S. I. Smith and Mrs. E. M. Allen, both of Abilene, Mrs. E. J. Barton and Mrs. E. W. Crawford, both of Clyde, Mrs. Ray Clements of Chou-chilla, Calif., Mrs. Laura Phillips of Monahans and Mrs. Clovis Hooten of Cooper; 28 grandchildren, 52 great grandchildren, eight great great grandchildren and one brother, Ed Bourland of Clyde.

City Trucks To Aid In Clean Up Drive

The City of Baird will provide for special trash and debris pick ups during the Spring Clean Up Campaign, and is asking for the cooperation of the citizens in helping to make this one of the most successful campaigns ever held.

Tree limbs, brush, etc., must be cut up so that it is convenient to be loaded, and grass, debris and other items should be put in boxes whenever possible in order to speed up loading.

The City will haul all items light enough for two men to load, but all trash, etc., must be placed where it is convenient for the haulers to get to.

There will be no charge for extra hauling during the Clean Up Campaign, but after April 28th, the customary charge for extra hauling will apply.

The trucks will perhaps begin hauling from the South-east part of town and cover the entire city as rapidly as possible. More details will be available next week.

INCOME TAX ON PROFIT FROM SALE OF HOME
 In completing your income tax return, you are required to include in your gross income the profit on the sale of your personal residence. This profit is normally the difference between sales price less agent's commission and the purchase price of the house when you bought it. This additional income can, however, be postponed in the

situation where you buy a new residence within a one-year period before or after the date on which you sell your old home. However, you postpone the payment of tax on the sale only if your new home costs as much or more than the price you received for your old home after deducting the agent's commission, selling expenses and the amount you spent to fix the house up for sale during the 90-day period before which the house was sold.

For example, if you paid \$10,000 for your old house and sold it for \$15,000, you made a profit of \$5,000 on the sale. If you buy a new house within a year for \$16,000, you report no profit on the sale of the old house. You must, however, reduce the cost of the new home for later sale purposes by the amount of the untaxed profit you received on the old home. Thus, your new house cost would be reduced \$5,000 and would be valued at \$11,000 for later sale purposes.

Assume the same facts except that you spend \$500 fixing up your old house for sale within

90 days before selling it, and bought your new house for \$13,000 rather than the \$16,000 figure used in the example above. You would deduct the \$500 from the \$15,000 sales price to obtain the adjusted sales price. Inasmuch as the purchase price of the new house was less than the adjusted sales price in as old house, you would have to include the net difference of \$1,500 as capital gain in your gross income.

The value of your new house for subsequent sale purposes would then be reduced by \$3,500 which is the difference between the total profit made on the sale of your old residence, (\$5,000) and the amount you showed as income when you bought the new residence (\$1,500).

Often you sell your old house in one year and don't buy a new one until the subsequent year. When this occurs, you should show the fact of sale in your tax return for the year of sale and indicate that you intend to buy a new house within the one-year period.

When you later purchase a new house and have gain to report because it cost you less

than the adjusted sales price of the old house, you should amend your return for the year in which the old house was sold and report the proper amount of gain includible in income as a capital gain.

When you desire to build a new house to replace the old house sold, you are entitled to these tax benefits as long as construction begins within the one year period after the date of sale of the old residence, and is completed within 18 months after the same date.

Collision Course - The Widow's Bite

"In an area where people live on farms or ranches, and particularly where plumbing facilities are not of the most modern type, there are likely to be numerous encounters with a wicked sister - a great habitue of the 'Chic Sale' type of outdoor privy - the black widow spider."

So writes a South Texas doctor, Leo E. Peters of Devine, who has treated a total of 21 patients with black widow bite in the last 13 years. In all but one case, the outdoor "John" was the site of action and the area of collision was the exposed "un-exposables." Dr. Peters describes his experience with patients in the February issue of the Texas State Journal of Medicine.

One of Dr. Peters' patients was bitten twice within seven months. The site of action and the location of the bite were exactly the same, that is, an outdoor latrine and the left but-

tock. Although documented instances of survival after a second black widow spider bites are unusual, this case is considered remarkable in that the victim had a relatively mild reaction to the second bite. A report of this case and its management is given.

The first time the patient, a woman, was bitten she was brought to the doctor within an hour. She was acutely ill, perspiring profusely, and had board-like abdomen. Following treatment, she recovered completely within two days.

The second time she was bitten, she suffered very little discomfort, her abdomen was soft with no tenderness and no muscle spasm, and she did not bother to go to the doctor for nearly 10½ hours. Following treatment, she was symptom-free within half an hour.

On each visit to the doctor, she brought with her the crushed black widow spider.

While the case is an interesting one, Dr. Peters could not conclude from this isolated incident that the patient had acquired immunity to the black widow spider venom. However, he does postulate that "Outdoor latrines should be passe," and that "Potential victims should look before sitting, especially in nice, quiet, dark places, and should beware of flank attacks and attacks from the rear."

Remove Scum From Stock Troughs

When water in stock troughs, reservoirs or ponds is exposed to sunlight, it may become covered with algae, commonly called green scum or slime. One way to remove the algae is to treat the water with copper sulfate (blue-stone), says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist.

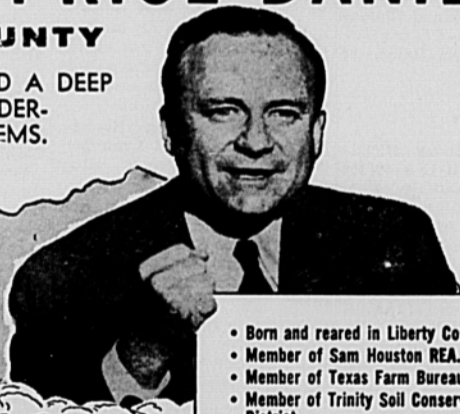
Care must be taken when using bluestone, because too much is injurious to livestock, humans and fish, explains the specialist. Safe dosage is 8 pounds of bluestone per million gallons of water, 1 ounce per 8,000 gallons, or 1 level teaspoon per 1,500 gallons of water. Livestock or humans should not drink water receiving more than the above dosage.

If a pond containing fish is treated, only one-fourth to one-third of the pond should be treated per application. Then wait several days before treating the next section, Cooper advises. This procedure enables the fish to move away from the treated area.

Preston Smith Has Plans for Betterment

Backers of the candidates contend that his own career as a successful businessman for more than 25 years is evidence per se that he knows whereof he speaks.

Preston Smith was born in Williamson County, worked on his daddy's farm in Gaines

County, and gained his early education in Dawson County. He is a graduate of Texas Tech in Lubbock, where he has been in the theater business and an active civic worker since 1936.

He and his wife, Ima, have two children, Mickey, 20, and Jan, 16.

Wayne Gibbens Makes Statement

Wayne Gibbens, State Representative and Democrat from Stephens County, today issued his formal statement of candidacy for a second term to the Texas House of Representatives from the newly created 63rd Legislative District, composed of Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Shackelford and Stephens counties.

6. Unemployment compensation legislation to better provide for those families whose breadwinners are honestly out of work, by slashing from this program all those who are too lazy to work and who will not accept a job when made available.
7. Equal rights for women by removing those gross inequities placed in the law years ago.
8. Economy measures such as the one that Gibbens co-sponsored during the last session of the legislature which would have saved Texas taxpayers \$26,000,000.00 by eliminating waste, extravagance and duplication in our too-many bureaus and agencies.

"Speaking to his friends in Indian, Frank Laubach said, 'Your illiterates have been the victims of educated scoundrels who have kept them in debt all their lives. Literacy is the only road I can see to their emancipation.'"

Ten Dollars Protects Large Investment

Ten dollars is a small fee to pay to protect an investment amounting to thousands of dollars, but that's all a membership in Farm Bureau costs, according to Hilton Tarrant, membership chairman of the Callahan County Farm Bureau.

The county farm leader declared that membership in Farm Bureau is the best assurance that a farmer or rancher has that his economic future is protected.

"Farm Bureau is owned and

controlled by its members and is primarily designed to safeguard and promote agricultural interests on the local level, in Austin and in Washington," Tarrant said. He explained that one of the benefits a membership in Farm Bureau buys is full-time representation in the Texas Legislature and national Congress.

"Three out of every four organized farmers and ranchers in our nation belong to Farm Bureau," he explained. "And our organization spares no effort to obtain maximum membership participation in the development of policies that guide the organization on all levels."

The Callahan County Farm Bureau has set a quota of 250 member families for 1962. Last year the organization had 233 enrolled. The annual membership drive is now underway.

Start Early For Beautiful Lawn

Want a beautiful lawn this summer? Now is the time to start planning for it. E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist, says you need to watch all management factors because neglecting one may keep you from having an attractive lawn.

Fertilizer should be applied according to soil test recommendations. You can, however, use a sufficient amount of a complete fertilizer to supply two pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 sq. feet. Whichever method you choose, the fertilizer should be applied about the time the grass begins to grow. This should be done again in the fall, 30 days before frost, says Trew.

Throughout the summer, at 30 to 40 day intervals, the lawn should be topped with nitrogen at the rate of one pound per 1,000 square feet.

Another thing that will detract from lawn beauty is the presence of weeds. One of the best defenses against weeds is a thick, vigorous growth of grass. Weeds can also be controlled with chemicals. For chemical recommendations and application rates, ask your county agent for a copy of L-425, "Chemical Weed Control on Lawns."

Lawns should also be mowed regularly, points out Trew. Bermuda grass should be kept at a height of about 1 to 1½ inches, and St. Augustine and bluegrass at about 1½ to 2 inches. No more than one inch should be removed at a time.

Lawns should be watered when the grass begins to wilt, Trew says. Then they should be soaked to a depth of 6 inches or more.

If you start now, and continue managing your lawn through the summer, you can be the envy of the neighborhood. Local county agents supply additional information on lawn management and care.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — At a joint meeting of the Governor's Highway Safety conference and the Texas Safety Association, Gov. Price Daniel said that good traffic safety legislation still is lacking because citizens "have never taken enough time and trouble to tell legislators exactly what they want."

He said that five bills which have failed to pass will be introduced in the January session, "regardless of the identity of your next governor." These con-

- cern:
1. State financing to pay the salaries of driver-education teachers in public schools.
 2. Complete revision of the driver-licensing law.
 3. A chemical test law for use in cases of driving while intoxicated -- designed to free the innocent and provide medical evidence against the guilty.
 4. Adequate city and county traffic courts of record to handle traffic cases with efficiency and justice.

5. Authorization for additional highway patrolmen and additional pay for Department of Public Safety personnel.

Although the Legislature lately approved 51 additional highway patrolmen, a \$300 increase in pay and set a floor of \$4,947 annual salary, the governor reported the patrol still is 150 men short of its authorized strength of 804. He feels the pay hike was insufficient.

VOTERS LIST — Comptroller Bob Calvert added up the poll taxes and exemptions sent in by the counties and found 2,355,159 Texans qualified to vote.

This is an increase of 300,000 from 1958, the last non-presidential election year. But it is virtually the same as the number of qualified voters in 1952.

Still holding the record is 1960 with 2,599,924 Texans qualified to vote.

TEACHERS QUIZZED — Texas school teachers are pretty good at answering their examinations.

Texas Education Agency sent out questionnaires to about 95,000 school people. They expected a 30 per cent return but 92,000 answered.

Questions were part of a Texas Legislative Council study of teacher training.

Results will be fed through computers to give lawmakers an idea of what school people think about the way public schools are run and how teachers are trained.

WATER LOANS HIT — The state will borrow another \$15,000,000 on April 19 to help local water districts, river authorities and cities on their water projects.

Texas Water Development Board has the authority to borrow up to \$100,000,000 for this purpose.

Its first bond issue of \$10,000,000 is nearly used up in four loans. So another \$15,000,000 worth of bonds will be sold.

Major projects helped so far by this state program is the Toledo Bend reservoir on the Sabine River near Newton. It will get a \$15,000,000 loan over the next four years.

PADRE STUDY — Herb Petry, chairman of a special committee to study the various proposals for making Padre Island a recreation area, said the committee will have a meeting in April to decide on its recommendations.

Governor Daniel appointed a committee after differences developed as to whether Padre Island should be turned into a recreation area by the federal or state government.

A bill in Congress has authorized federal purchase of a large part of the island as a national

seashore area. But the bill has not passed the House of Representatives because South Texas Congressmen favor a smaller area, if any at all.

GI FARMS — Veterans Land Board has sold 20 repossessed GI farms for \$19,000 more than it had invested in them.

But it turned down bids on a Grayson County tract which drew 33 bidders.

Board tried, but failed, to put a block deal back together by advertising for bids on an 860 acre farm in Zavala County. The Board had set the minimum bid at \$150,000 but nobody bid.

Only qualified veterans who have not made GI land loans were eligible to bid on the tracts.

PROFESSORS PAY — Two University of Texas department heads told their troubles as they moved into a new \$4,000,000 business and economics building.

Dr. Cary C. Thompson, chairman of the economics department, said he recently lost a good faculty member to the University of Rochester which bid up his salary from \$7,800 to \$13,000 a year.

Dr. John Arch White of the College of Business Administration said his college had not had a full staff since the end of World War II. Last year he needed to hire 12 young instructors but could only find eight and then lost four of them. Other employers outbid his salary limits.

The two departments have a fine new building but are hard-pressed for professors for their growing number of students.

About Your Health . .

AUSTIN — Mankind is poised to begin the annual grudge fight with insect hordes that flourish in the warmth of spring and summer.

Inevitably the insect will lose as mankind -- armed with noxious sprays and dusts and aerosol mists -- seeks to ward off the bites and stings and the destruction of his food and clothing and home.

Only by constant fighting has humanity been able to hold its precarious own against more than one million different insect species which inhabit the world. Some 6000-7000 new species are identified each year to lengthen the list of known kinds. The United States is inhabited by approximately 600

injurious species, some of them vectors of human disease.

The vast majority of insects are neutral or indifferent where man is concerned, apparently content to let humanity go its way and demanding the same privilege. Others are highly beneficial, feeding on noxious weeds or troublesome insects, or pollinating crops. At least 50 different seed and fruit crops would be barren without insect pollinizers.

On the other hand, to fix a price on depredations of harmful insects varieties you have to re-gear your thinking or get lost in a maze of zeroes. Just counting field crops and stored grains, they wreck a yearly havoc of \$4 billion in the U. S. alone.

Flies, fleas and mosquitoes were and still are behind some of the most calamitous scourges the human race has ever endured, including plague, malaria, yellow fever and others.

The fact that most insecticides are toxic for humans as well as insects has caused some apprehension. It is true that people who use them carelessly do run real risks. But there is no evidence to suggest the general population is being insidiously poisoned.

A detailed study in the extent to which widespread use of agricultural insecticides might adversely affect the health of humans and domestic animals

is scheduled to begin in coming weeks, under auspices of the Texas State Department of Health and Texas A&M College. Insecticides, despite their great value as weapons against insects are only supplements to other control activities, the most important of which is proper personal and community sanitation.

As the warm weather strikes the area, everything begins to wonder about planting seed, fertilizers and such. Fertilizers have been a main topic of discussion for a long time and the main question always asked is do I need fertilizer and if so how much. The best way to get that one answered is by taking soil samples from your fields or pasture and sending them to one of the State labs. There is a lab at Seymour, one at Lubbock and another at Texas A&M College. All the labs charge the same

price, \$2.00 per sample, and all strive to give back an answer within one week's time. From the sample you send in, they will give you an analysis of what is in your soil and then the kind and amount of fertilizer that will be needed for the crop you intend to plant. This is the most reliable way to know if you need fertilizer and if so what kind and how much.

A soil sample sheet can be obtained from the county agent's office that gives instructions on how to take a soil sample and where to send it. These are free and are available to anyone desiring them. Now, right before planting time is the best time to get your soil tested so you will know for the coming season.

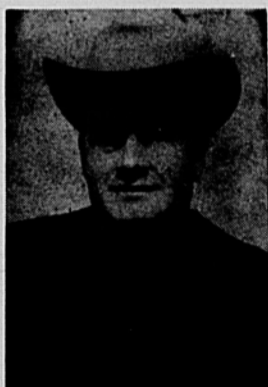
