Cerebral Palsy Clinic  
Scheduled at Lubbock

A clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied children, will be held Monday, November 26, at Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center, 3502 Avenue N. Lubbock.

Orthopedic specialists from Midland, Plainview, and Lubbock, a neuropsychiatrist, pediatrician, eye specialist, and a dentist will be present to examine children.

Cerebral palsy is sometimes referred to as spastic paralysis or birth injury and may be evidence by the child's inability to sit alone, stand alone, walk or hold objects at the age these things are accomplished by the average child. Research has shown that treatment is most effective if started within the first few months of the child's life although children respond to treatment begun at a much later age.

Parents planning to bring children to the clinic are requested to register the children at the Center prior to the date of the clinic. Information regarding the clinic may be obtained by writing Dr. Esther Snell, Director, or calling Lubbock 6541.

County Follows Statewide Trend In  
Turning Thumbs Down on Amendment  
Proposals, Excepting Vets Land Bill

Parmer County voters Tuesday gave the heavy vote against all the proposed constitutional amendments with the exception of the Veteran's Land amendment which carried by a 2-vote margin, 119-117.

This voting trend followed the exact voting pattern of the entire state, with late returns from the Texas Election Bureau verifying the single change in the constitution.

Voting locally was tabulated as follows; with county returns listed first and Friona returns second:

- Amendment 1, Permission of statewide system of pensions for county employees: 42-195, 6-49.
- 2. Regarding handling of university funds: 95-141, 26-30.
- 3. Tax increase for rural fire prevention: 51-179, 13-43.
- 4. Bonds for purchase of lands for the veteran land program: 119-117, 24-33.
- 5. Welfare spending, 87-145, 19-38.

No concessions were made, no hopes were given birth, no friendliness was manifest.

And the good citizens are in their homes this evening, still without recognition.

Children, soon I shall have another bedtime story, for there will be more developments by that hour we are confident. Surely the masses have not been satisfied by the chest beating of the few, surely we, your fathers, will not stand idly by for any more years; surely proper action will be taken for our own rights. We would like to be friendly to every neighbor, every brother, but a long and hard trial and error method has proven the ineffectiveness and folly of further experiments in this effort; then. . . the time has come for us, your dads, to stand on our hind feet and secure every God-given right for you and your brothers and sisters, and let the hecklers congregate in some far corner of the realm, basking in the glory they alone bestow upon one another.

Legion, Auxiliary  
Have Annual Meet

Legionaires of the area were kept well occupied this week with local post meetings Monday night and the Zone meeting at Friona Tuesday night.

The Friona post and auxiliary held its annual dinner Monday night with a team of Legionaires led by S. T. Thornton preparing the meal. Canasta and "42" were played during the evening.

Tuesday night over forty attended the zone meeting presided over by Ralph Smith of Hereford. Smith emphasized the membership needs of posts in this district, pointing out increased quotas and telling of projects needing attention of all veterans.

Special speaker for the occasion was H. H. "Hut" Hutson, cartoonist, of Amarillo. Hutson made chalk sketches throughout his humorous and philosophical talk. He explained the mechanics of cartooning, emphasizing the purposes, methods, and reactions.

Refreshments were served by the Auxiliary.

A large group of citizens of Precinct 1 met with the County Commissioners Court today for the second time this week asking audience to hear plea for an independent road district to follow the boundaries of the precinct.

Represented by legal counsel, the group visited the court on Monday and were given no satisfaction. In fact much of the discussion by commissioners was conducted out of hearing of the petitioners, with three of the commission walking out of the meeting, presumably consulting with other parties.

Dissatisfied with the Monday reception, the group again asked for consideration at the meeting today. Entering the county courtroom, they were not recognized for approximately an hour and one-half, with final token recognition made in the form of a talk by H. L. Ivy, who assumed spokesmanship for the court. Mr. Ivy stated flatly that the court needed to study the effect of such a district on the other parts of the county. This came despite documents in the hands of the county judge, the court, and others, prepared by state highway officials specifically stating that this proposed district would in no way be detrimental to the county road program, rather enabling state-approved construction and releasing local road funds for additional road work in other precincts.

The precinct "citizens committee" carried to the court petitions signed by near three times the required 50 signatures. Judge A. D. Smith and other commissioners were non-committal in the meetings.

In a telephone discussion with Judge Smith Wednesday, the Star editor was told that the (Smith) was sure the commissioners felt that time was needed to thoroughly study the situation." When asked if this was the voiced opinion of the court, Judge Smith failed to make any quotations by any commissioner. No specification was made of any future action, except what he "felt" they would examine all angles. He declined to repeat any of the specific statements made by Mr. Ivy or other commissioners.

# Editorially Speaking . . .

## Maybe a Clean-up ?

One civic improvement calls for another.... and this time we propose a needed project that costs no money - just a few hours time.

IT IS HIGH TIME FOR A GENERAL CLEAN-UP IN FRIONA.

An unusually large number of out-of-town visitors have stopped at the news office this week, remarking on the improvements of the paving, new buildings, schools, etc., but their final remarks were the ones we remember. . . "If you could just have a clean-up drive to clear the vacant lots, alleys, and even streets, you would have the most attractive little town we know."

The pitiful part of this is that a clean-up requires only our initiative and a few hours time. . . no money outlay, no skilled labor, no long-time planning; and if we do nothing about it we can attribute the failure only to our own pre-occupation or laziness!

Let's go just one step further in making Friona attractive. With the trees and shrubs of our town losing their leaves for the winter, the papers, cans, and whatnot hidden along the ditches and sidewalks are so, so much more easily noticed. A winter clean-up is possibly more important than the spring cleaning. . . but is Friona going to make the effort?

## On the Right Track

Reams of publicity, statistical, and plain propoganda material are received by every newspaper from the governmental agencies. Once in a great while we even open some of these envelopes, though not often, and on these occasions we wonder who is paying for the stuff and also whether the man whose name is affixed even sees the material.

We are glad to report one exception - that of the weekly letters regularly supplied by our congressman, Walter Rogers. We are convinced that he personally dictates these letters; we have his word for it, and those of you who have heard him in person know that he talks just as he writes - down to earth, touching the vital problems to our national government as it affects us - especially the "economy" angle. Mr. Rogers really preaches economy on all government levels.

This week some of us attended an open discussion conducted by Mr. Rogers at Hereford. Others heard him at Farwell. The same afternoon he came to Friona, looked over the town, and was honored with an informal coffee at the Pete Buske residence.

We conclude from the hours spent with Mr. Rogers Monday that little of the Washington stuff has rubbed off on him at this date. Though keeping a wary eye on the legislation there, he still thinks like one of our own citizens; he would feel right at home here, talking the language of just any of us, Jake Lamb, Frank Spring, Pete Buske, Russell O'Brien, or any of our good citizens.

So we will continue to publish his weekly news letters as another step toward correct reporting of the Washington scene; certainly closer links are needed between the voter and his representatives, and we believe this a beneficial link.

Mr. Rogers talked at the meetings and to many of us individually, principally on the need of economy in government, both in its civil administration and in the armed services. He flatly stated that he was confident most of the senators and representatives were sick and tired of tax measures, and that the brakes would be applied. We hope so!

We were interested in one reply made by the congressman to a fellow who jokingly inquired of his presidential choice; he replied, "I am in favor of a president from the Panhandle!"

We guess the life of a congressman is somewhat strenuous. When in his home district Mr. Rogers makes two or three formal talks each day, often a hundred miles apart, and then spends additional hours in small group confabs and in private conferences. And there are the individuals who have very real and private problems they wish to consult upon. One man wants a federal job for his daughter, while another wishes to know when steel will be available for school construction, etc.

So Mr. Rogers, we do not envy your job; but we personally hope you are well enough content with it to stay in there pitching for us poor boys who appreciate your efforts in behalf of economy and parity in government.

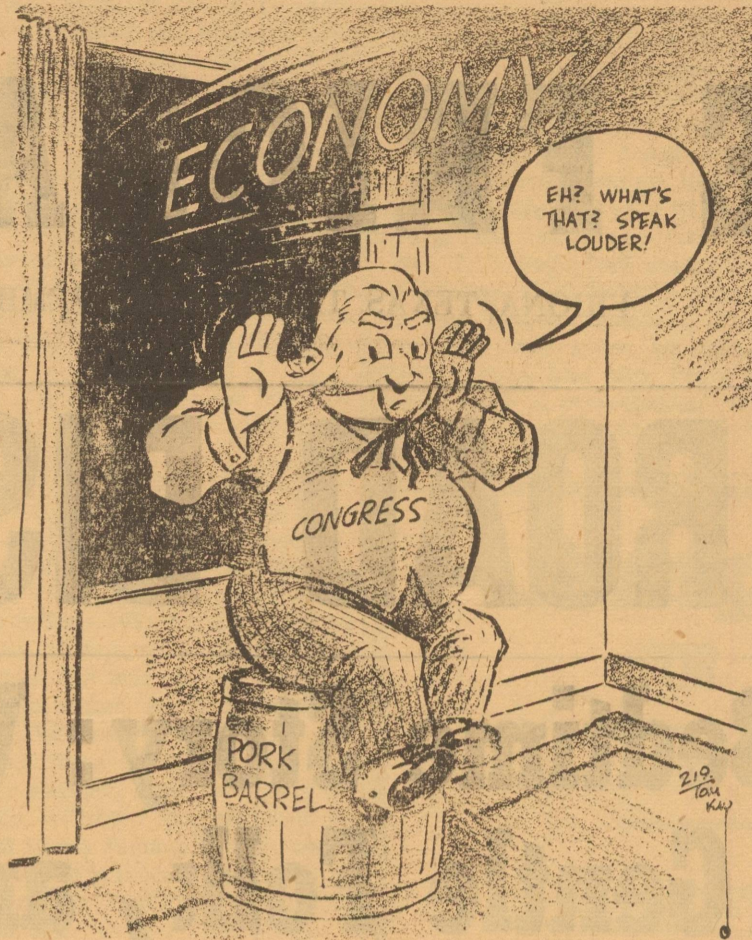

## The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what a "Deposition" is?

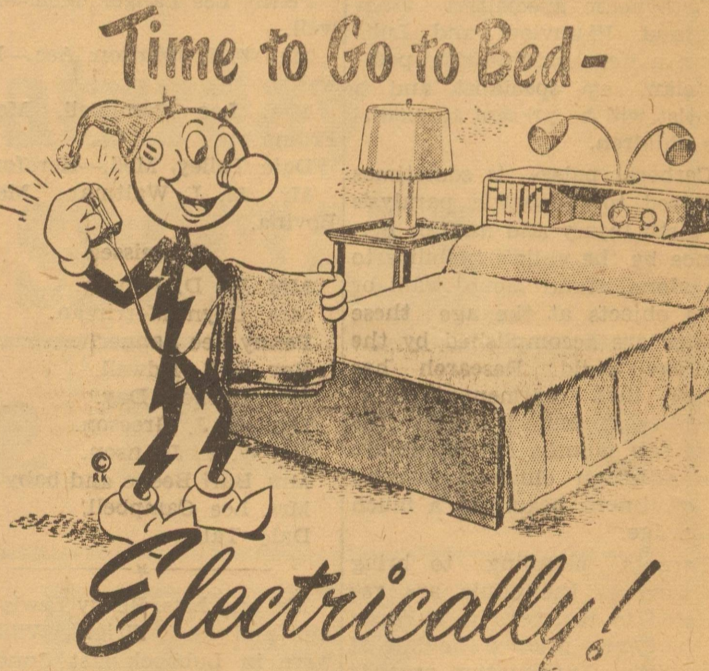
A "Deposition" is a means of the questions. The Notary then taking a statement to preserve reduces the answers to writing, testimony for future use in litigation, or to be used in a case which is then pending before the court.

At times, when it is thought that perhaps a witness will not be available at the time a suit comes to trial, a statement is taken from him that may be used on the trial of said cause.

To be capable of being introduced and used on the trial of a cause a statement must be executed with certain formalities. A simple sworn statement is not sufficient. Depositions are of two kinds. One kind is where the attorneys on each side go with the witness before a Notary and ask the questions and they are taken down by the Notary or the Court Reporter and then reduced to writing and signed by the witness. The other type of deposition is one in which the questions are written out in full by the attorneys for each side and the questions are sent to the Notary Public who notifies the witness to come in and answer

**APPROPRIATIONS BILLS**

Here is some information on the appropriations passed in the First Session of the 82nd Congress, which I think will be of interest to you. I did not vote for all of the appropriations bills that passed the House, and I voted in Committee to cut

many to the appropriations that finally did pass the House. I tried to cast a solvent vote; that is, I voted for appropriations that I felt absolutely necessary domestic expenditures. I did not feel that additional taxes should be voted, and therefore tried to keep expenditures within the amount of money that would be collected in taxes without increasing the tax burden. I especially call your attention to the percentage of expenditures earmarked for defense purposes:

Appropriations passed in the first session of the 82nd Congress approached those provided in the peak years of World War II. In the session just ended Congress voted \$91,826,541,716 in supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 1951 and in regular and supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year 1952. In addition to this amount, \$8,116,000,000 was provided in the form of permanent allotments which are made automatically every year to cover such payments as interest on the national debt and other recurring statutory items. This \$91.8 billion represents an eleven percent increase over the \$8.0 billion provided by the preceding session of Congress for fiscal 1951. On a per capita basis, the approved federal spending amounts to about \$836 for every man, woman and child in the country. The final amount of money voted was about \$4.4 billion less than the original amount requested by the Administration.

By far the greatest share of these appropriations is for national defense and defense-related activities. Funds voted to pay for past wars and for preparation for any possible new ones amounted to \$75.0 billion or 81.9 percent of all money provided in the session which just closed. Some of the larger items are as follows: \$56.9 billion for the Department of Defense with Army, Navy and Air Force getting \$20 billion, \$16 billion and \$21 billion of this respectively. To provide for aid and the defense of other countries against Communist aggression, Congress voted \$7.3 billion for mutual security. For such other activities as veterans' services \$4.1 billion was provided, and \$1.6 billion will be available to continue atomic energy programs.

Appropriations for non-defense activities took a much

smaller share or 10.7 percent of the total federal spending provided. The amount voted for domestic programs amounted to \$9,785,086,34, and was about one billion dollars less than that requested by the Executive. Large amounts were appropriated for the following public works programs: \$597 million for flood control, \$363 million for grants to states for public roads, and \$71 million for public power construction work. Relief payments to states will continue to be large with \$1.1 billion going for such purposes. Public health programs will have about \$359 million to spend with greater opportunity for research in heart disease and cancer. Congress has provided \$803 million for such agricultural programs as aid to farm operators, subsidization of soil building, conservation practices and the school lunch program. The federal government will continue to encourage education with \$141 million available to promote the various programs.

While large sums have been appropriated for the fiscal year expenditures will rise to this same height. This is largely due to the fact that contracts for such items as planes, ships, tanks and

# Soil Conservation News

By Bill Kennedy

## ROTATION

Mr. A. W. Anthony, seven miles north of Friona, planted 50 acres of Austrian Winter Peas in September 1950. On about April 15 of this year he turned them under and followed the peas with combine kaffir. A trial run showed that the kaffir was making 4500 pounds per acre, Anthony reported that the green bugs had damaged the top growth badly before he turn-

ed the peas under. He is pleased with the results and plans to start a rotation system with one-third of his land in peas each year.

## TERRACING

A terrace system was finished this week on the A. L. Carter and L. L. Chisum farm, nine miles north of Bovina. This was one of the largest jobs completed in several weeks with 4.8 miles of standard terraces and a 3,280

cubic yard diversion in the system. The structures were graded to spill on Jack Waltman's native grass.

A diversion terrace was checked as complete for Roy White, four miles south and one-half mile East of Hub. White's place sloped toward the running water draw and the 4,800 foot, 5,800 cubic yard diversion was graded to spill on native grass leading down to the draw.

## NEW COOPERATOR

Sam Aldridge of Farwell became a Parmer County SCD Cooperator this week. Aldridge was interested in a well location on his place 3 miles north of Progress. He is interested in improved methods of water application and irrigation land preparation.

## EXTENSIVE SURVEY

The Parmer County S.C.D. has had 50,733 acres surveyed in detail in the past two years. Erosion conditions have varied from slight to severe. 1,109 acres was found to have "Three" erosion which is explained as erosion which has removed all the topsoil and part of the subsoil in this acreage, seventy gullies were found which are approaching the stage of not being crossable by farm machinery.

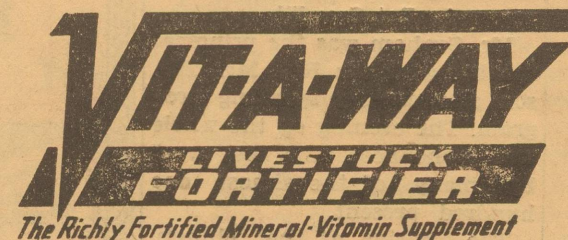
