On this Monday night den mothers met for a training course, under the direction of Harry DeLashmatt, area executive at Amarillo. Present were Mrs. Neal Fulks, Mrs. Cayson Jones, Mrs. Frank Spring, Mrs. Charles Bainum, Mrs. L. D. Taylor, Mrs. Ernest Anthony, and Mrs. Fred Barker, Jr.

Next Monday night the councilmen will meet at the Bert Neeley home for training and planning conducted by Mr. DeLashmatt.

Over 60 boys in the community are eligible for cub scouting, being in the 7-10 age group. It is hoped that the parents will encourage the boys to participate in this productive program embracing handicrafts, fun, group activities, and character building.

Public Invited to Dedication of CROP Grain Car in Friona on Saturday, 2:30

In an impressive dedication ceremony, the Parmer County car of maize for the Christian Rural Overseas Program (CROP) will be sent on its way Saturday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. at the Santa Fe Grain siding in Friona.

Wilbur Charles of Bovina, county chairman of the program, has announced that 87,000 lbs of grain have been donated or provided for in cash by Parmer County, leaving only 3,000 lbs to make a full carload.

Anyone wishing to give a cash donation or grain to complete the car should contact the Santa Fe Grain Company prior to the Saturday ceremonies.

From Friona the car will go to Houston where the maize will be transferred to the hold of a ship bound for Japan and Korea.

Added features have been scheduled this week to give the Friona area one of the most unique Christmas programs ever presented in this locality. The churches, the chamber of commerce, the American Legion, various clubs, and individual businessmen are at work to make the December 14 program a real success and a greater gesture of goodwill toward the citizens of the county and surrounding communities.

A torchlight religious parade, under the direction of Rev. Russell Pogue, is being organized; those who have seen similar parades can verify their beauty, popular acceptance, and deeply impressive significance. Representatives of the Friona churches will make up the parade of seven Biblical Christmaside scenes. With other lights along the parade route dimmed, each float will be individually lighted, and the parade will be led by torch lights. Following each float will be carolers singing the appropriate song to depict the story of the scene.

FLAG DISPLAY

Merchants of Friona are asked by the local American Legion Post 206 to fly the American flag in front of their places of business tomorrow, December 7th, in the first appearance of these flags recently purchased by 41 businessmen of the town.

The City of Friona has placed stands for the flags, and the Legion has delivered the big 4 ft by 6 ft flags; the mass display of all these flags should provide a patriotic spectacle seldom matched in a community of this size.

SCS NEWS and VIEWS

MILD WIND EROSION
 In the 30-mile wind last Sunday only about one quarter in every ten sections observed showed signs of moderate wind erosion. Louis P. Merrill, regional conservator in Ft. Worth, has called for a wind erosion report every fifteen days. He also wants to know the moisture conditions and the areas in each county which are blowing.

Two and six-tenths miles of terraces were checked as complete for G. H. Lindop this week; an irrigation well was located for J. E. Knight; and a field was mapped for Earl D. Stevenson.

LEGUMES
 This will add to last week's list of Parmer County farmers who have legumes on the ground for soil improvement.

CONTOURS ASKED

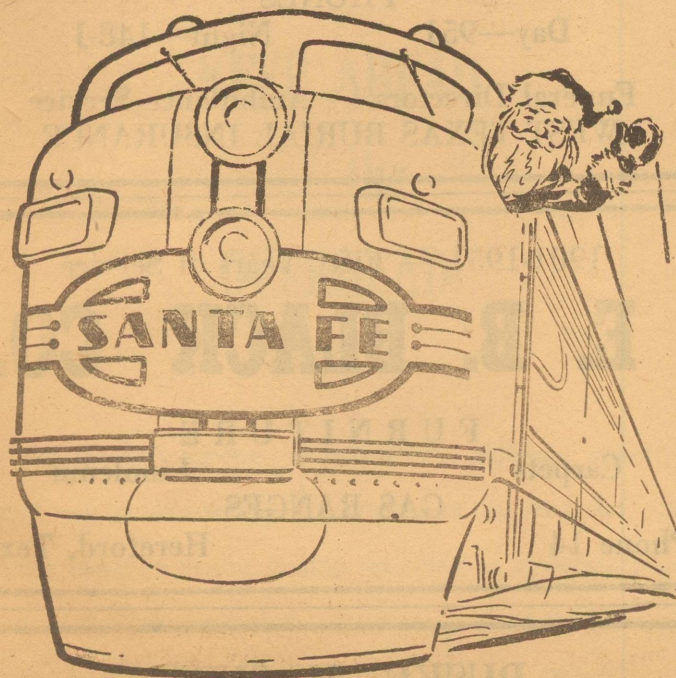
Contour farming is the easiest and one of the best conservation practices for dry land farming. It catches and holds rainfall, reduces runoff and erosion and distributes moisture uniformly. Two important conservation practices which should be applied at this season of the year are contour listing and stubble mulching.

Stubble mulching means leaving enough crop residues on the surface of the fields to keep the land from blowing. Most farmers do this, but a few graze the stubble down to the bare ground.

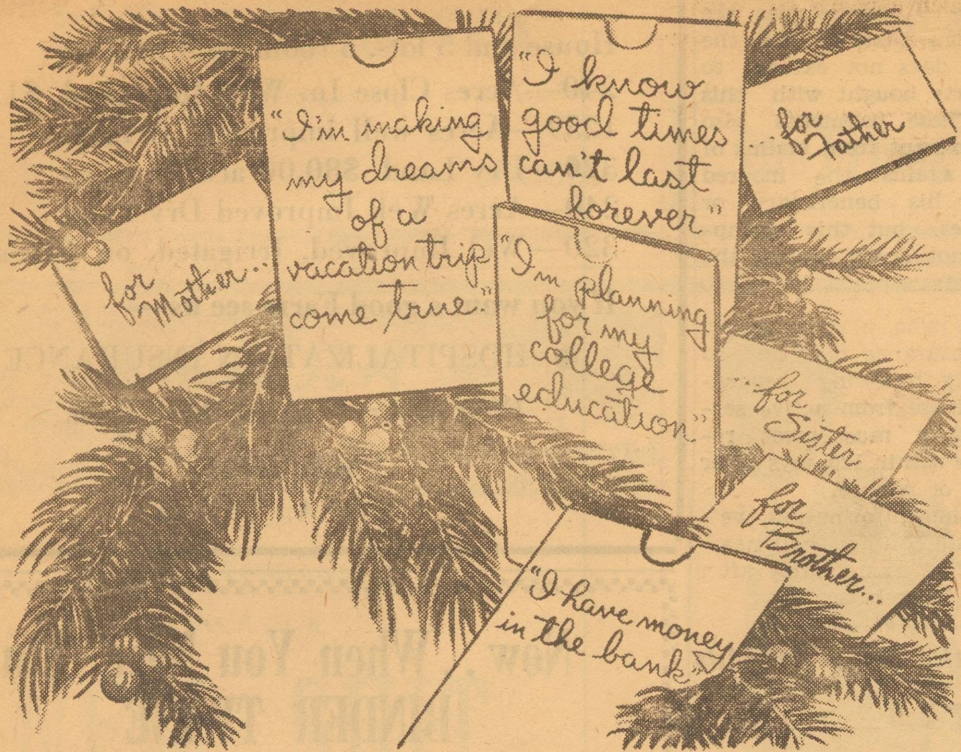

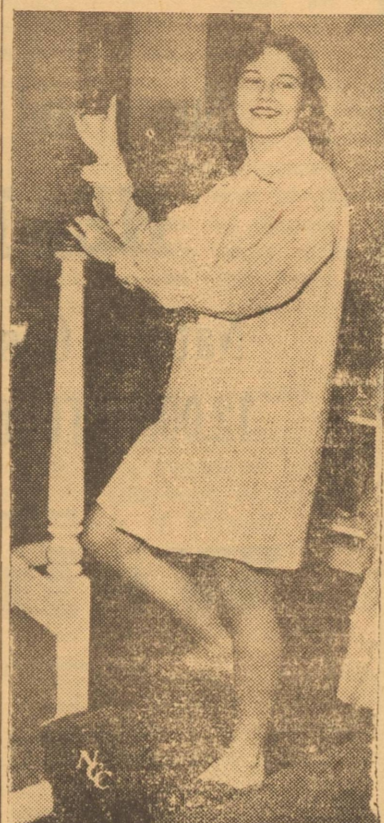
Paul Fortenberry has joined the Parmer County Implement Company firm as bookkeeper.
