With snow falling all Friday night with little accompanying wind, it lay from 8 to 10 inches in depth in most protected spots. The high moisture content netted from .6 to .9 inches in most communities.

Sub-zero temperatures accompanied the week-end moisture and cold wave, with several thermometers in Friona reading 6 and 7 below zero at one time early Saturday morning.

The farmers welcome the moisture, with immediate benefits being realized by the wheat farmers. Wright Williams of the North Plains Gin said that no damage had been done to cotton, with only a temporary inconvenience in pulling and ginning being felt. The local gin early today had weighed 2302 bales across its scales as probably some 75% of the cotton has been gathered, Williams noted.

The latest Santa Fe Railway crop report indicates that this section of the Panhandle is in much more favorable condition than most parts of Texas. The cold weather, accompanied by heavy frost, in early November caused serious damage to the tender vegetable crops of the Valley and Gulf Coast regions. The over-all state cotton production was lower than earlier estimates, but still 46 per cent larger than the 1950 crop of 2,946,000 bales, with the panhandle section yet to be reported.

Elmer Euler Won't Be Stumped by Hauling Problems

"This wagon last hauled cotton in 1917, it ought to get the job done now!" remarked Elmer Euler last week when he brought in a load of his cotton via wagon to the North Plains Gin Company at Friona.

Euler is realizing from one-half to three-fourths bale per acre on his 320 acres planted to cotton southeast of Friona.

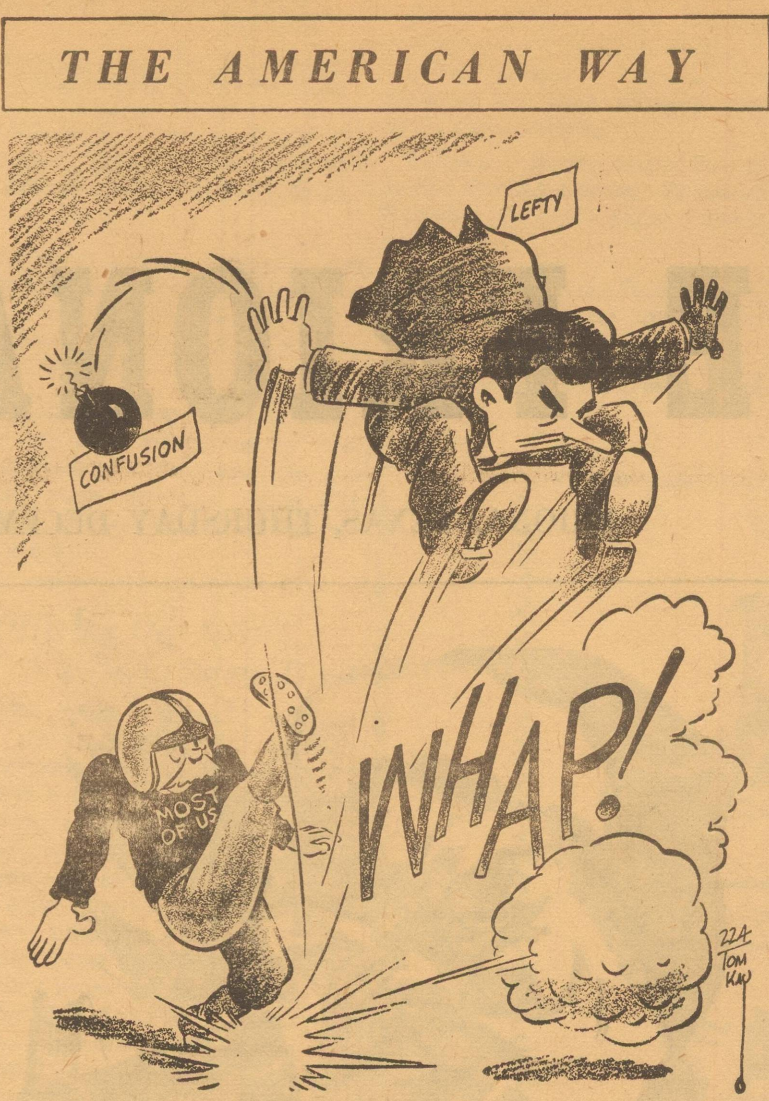
A flag at the school would have made the Friday display complete.

### "SMALL BUSINESS"

A grim jest makes the Washington rounds today. It is "A single atom bomb can save the country . . . if it is dropped on Washington".

What is meant is that seemingly this is the only way to eliminate the free-spending bureaucrats who have fastened such a hold on the American tax dollar.

So millions of families who found new taxes in November paychecks, ruining their budgets will be made happy to know their money will go to restore ancient ruins in Greece.

Marshall Plan officials rush into print to boast about their new way of throwing away dollars.

Congress, when more money was voted, was told that Marshall Plan would be changed to the Mutual Defense Assistance Plan, to aid free Europe arm for defense.

The fact that Congress accepted this statement indicates even Congressmen fail to understand lunacy.

And now with great pride, Marshall Plan officials rush into print to report how greatly they have helped the Austrian zither industry. A zither is a seldom used multi-stringed musical instrument.

They carefully point out that Marshall Plan dollars, given to an Austrian government lending agency, financed the zither industry expansion.

Undoubtedly, more zithers is just what Eisenhower needed.

Divisions of men armed with zithers must be an ideal solution of Ike's problem of how to stop Russian armor.

Such blatant boasting of squandering American taxes, many believe, can only come from unbalanced minds.

And many a vacationing Congressman, finding constituents questioning his sanity for tolerating such things, will return to Washington in an ugly mood.

## Insurance Available For Disabled Veterans

Friday, December 7, 1951

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is the second of a series of four special articles, prepared by Veterans Administration, explaining the rights of newly-discharged veterans to Government life insurance.

**INSURANCE**

A special type of Government life insurance is available to veterans of the U. S. Armed Forces who were disabled in active military service anywhere in the world since June 27, 1950, the start of the Korean Campaign.

The amount of any policy may range from \$1,000 to \$10,000, less any other Government life insurance in force at the time of application.

These policies, in general, are the same as regular NSLI policies, except that the premium rates are on a different basis and the policies do not earn dividends. There are other differences, but most of the conditions are the same.

Although eligible disabled veterans must apply for this special insurance within one year from the date that VA finds their disabilities to be service-connected, they may make application immediately after separation or release from active service and thus set the machinery in motion for a ruling on the service-connection of their disability or disabilities.

Another group of persons may be eligible for this special NSLI for the disabled. This group includes: (1) persons provisionally accepted on or after June 27, 1950, for military service who suffer a disability while enroute under orders to a place for final acceptance or for entry upon active duty, and (2) draftees who, on or after June 27, 1950, suffer a disability while enroute under orders from their draft boards to a designated induction station.

These two groups must apply for the special insurance within one year from the date they suffered their disability or disabilities.

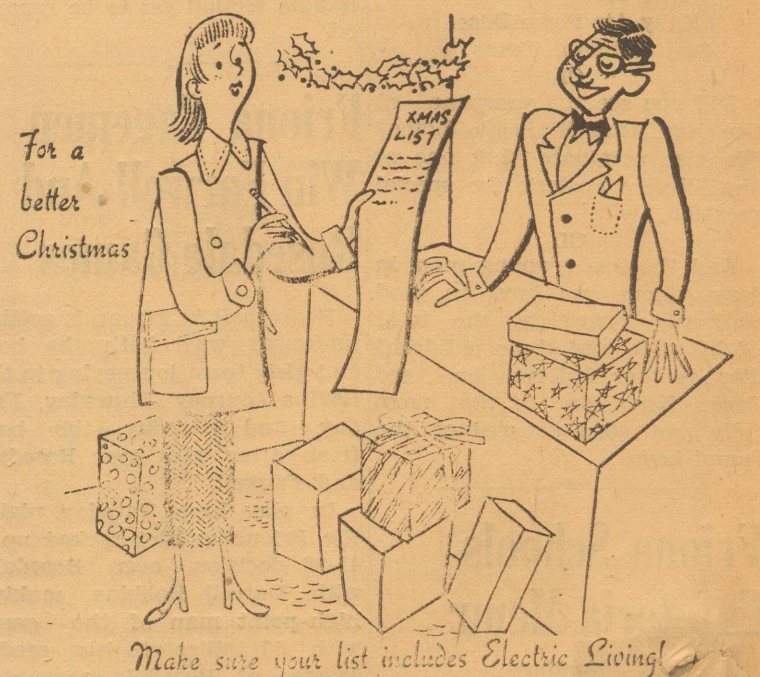
For further information, veterans should contact their nearest VA office immediately after separation or release from active service.

These veterans must meet two requirements (under Section 620 of the National Service Life Insurance Act).

1. They must have been released or separated from active service on or after April 25, 1951, under other than dishonorable conditions; and,
2. They must be found by Veterans Administration to be suffering from a service-connected disability or disabilities for which VA compensation would be payable, if 10 percent or more in degree. Further, they must not be suffering from a non-service-connected disability or disabilities that make them uninsurable.

These veterans must apply for the special NSLI to Veterans Administration within one year from the date that VA finds their disability or disabilities to be service-connected. Applications, with medical examinations and the required premium, should be mailed to Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C.

If the necessary requirements are met, totally disabled veterans may apply for a waiver of premium at the time they file application for the insurance. However, all such applicants should include the required premium with their applications and continue to pay this premium on time until they are notified by VA that waiver has been granted. Premiums paid under waiver will be refunded.

## The Law and You

**DO YOU KNOW** whether in giving a General Warranty Deed you should mention previous restrictions and reservations made prior to the time you executed a deed to real estate?

Under a General Warranty Deed the person selling the property guarantees to the buyer that he, the buyer, is receiving full, complete, fee simple title to the property. If there are defects in the title, then the purchaser may look to the seller, upon his warranty that the title is good, to make the title good, or to compensate the buyer for damages he has suffered by reason of the title not being good.

Therefore, if a person does not have the complete title, or there are any conditions, restrictions, or reservations which are against the land, the person selling the land should see that there is some mention, either generally or specifically of these conditions, restrictions or reservations, so that he will not be guaranteeing to the buyer that the land is free and clear of all liens and incumbrances, indebtednesses, restrictions and reservations.

Failure to make mention of the outstanding indebtednesses, restrictions, conditions, reservations, and a giving of a General Warranty Deed as if the land were free and clear of all of these things could render seller liable to buyer for damages suffered by buyer if at a later date someone holding some interest in

**Precautions Given On Cold Infection**

"At this time of the year health officers and practicing physicians always expect an increase in the common cold," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, reminds residents of Texas. "Although good personal hygiene-adequate sleep, suitable clothing, moderate exercise and good nutrition - may help the individual to develop resistance to infections, colds frequently develop in spite of all normal precautions. The seasonal rise in colds and other respiratory diseases during the fall and winter months certainly suggests that the shift to cooler weather is partly responsible for their prevalence.

"The unhappy victim of a cold should make every effort to prevent spreading the infection to others. He can help by covering coughs and sneezes with a disposable paper handkerchief, by staying out of crowds and avoiding close contact with others - especially invalids, young children and old people. Evidence indicates that colds are readily transmitted from person to person.

"For his own sake the patient should rest as much as possible in order to help his body to fight the cold. If there is any fever it is advisable to go to bed and stay there. There is some question as to the effectiveness of the large quantities of water and fruit juices generally recommended in the past, but they can do no harm and may help to some extent.

"If a cold persists for several days the patient should by all means consult his family physician especially if there is an

accompanying fever. Although, as is generally known there is no specific cure for the common cold the doctor can prescribe medicines that will afford safe relief. Consulting the physician is strongly advised, also, because a number of communicable diseases have early symptoms similar to those of the cold and only a doctor can decide whether the patient has a simple cold or some more serious disease."

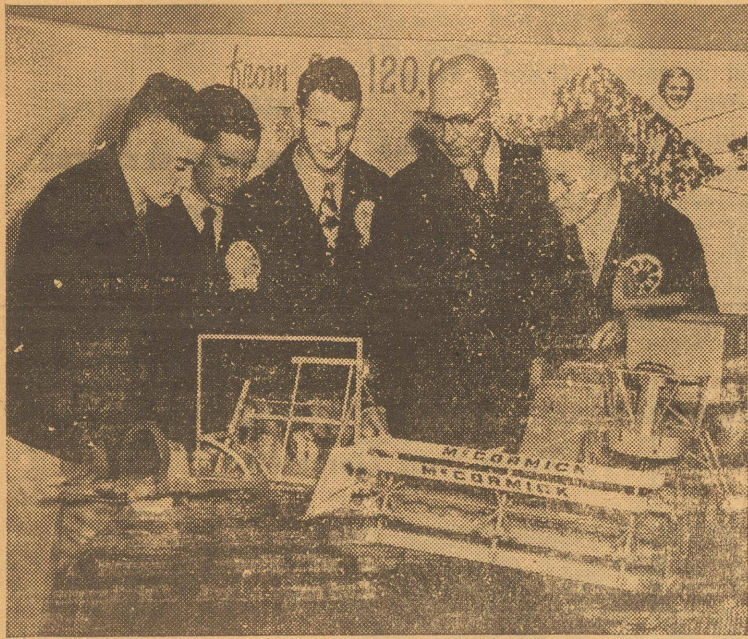

Jack Williams, County Chairman.

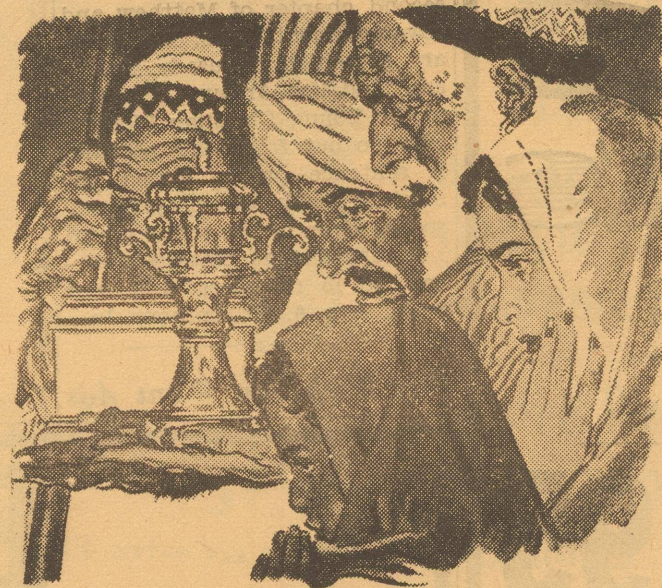

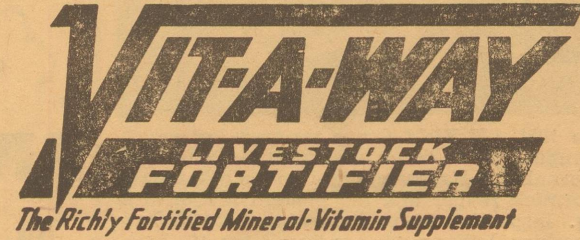
